



The Breeden Blade we have is fitted with Coco Bolo, an exotic wood widely used by custom knife makers. Bob recently came into some 90year old Bois d'Arc -- "Bodeark" we called it when we hunted it for bows -- that finished off in varigated hues ranging from golden yellow patches to a rich, grained brown.

Calfhood Vaccination

Proposal

AUSTIN--Regulations to require calfhood vaccination for brucellosis control under certain conditions are being proposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

"This does not mean a 100 percent mandatory or compulsory vaccination program for all heifer calves." Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, TAHC, said.

Amendments to the Texas brucellosis program now proposed by Commissioners of the TAHC would require official calfhood vaccination of all heifers born after Jan. 1, 1982, which fit into these categories: 1. Heifers being moved into

the state; 2. Heifers changing owner-

The following are excep-

tions: Heifers consigned to slaugh-

ter, to a quarantined feedlot, to a quarantined pasture, or those S branded and consigned to a special regulated pasture. "Heifers fitting into these situations would not have to be vaccinated," Dr. Holcombe explained.

Several benefits may be derived from these changes, Dr. Holcombe said. They include:

An increase in vaccinations will result in greater immunity in cattle herds against brucellosis:

Vaccinated heifers will have more freedom of movement in market and breeding channels: Vaccinated heifers have

more value than non-vaccinated heifers. Additional states are now

requiring vaccination before entry.

Commissioners are requesting public comments on the proposals. Additional hearings will be held on the matter Location: Concert Hall Theater before final action is taken.

Safety Of Kerosene

Heaters Discussed

Dramatic increases in home users should use kerosene heating costs have developed a demand for small portable heaters to provide spot heating according to Karen Harruff. County Extension Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The agent points out, however, that many challenging questions are being asked by consumers about the safety of the kerosene type heating units.

Hazards associated with kerosene heaters include:

1. The lowering of available oxygen and a possible increase in carbon monoxide.





explore such questions as: Why is food so costly when it is so abundant?


Should the government continue to play a role in the production and pricing of farm products?

For each reserve day of inpatient care Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$130 a day. The 1981 figure was \$102.

After 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility, Medicare will pay covered costs except \$32.50 a day. The 1981 figure was \$25.50.

The Medicare medical insurance annual deductible is also scheduled to increase in 1982 the first increase since 1973. The 1982 annual medical insurance deductible will be \$75 up from \$60. Medical insurance generally pays 80 percent of the approved costs or charges for covered services and supplies after a person incurs covered charges equaling the annual deductible.

November 12 - Tiny fingers are beginning to form on my hands. Funny how small they are! I'll be able to stroke my mother's hair with them.

November 20 - It wasn't until today that the doctor told mom that I am living here under her heart. Oh, how happy she must be! Are you happy, Mom?

November 25 - My mom and dad are probably thinking about a name for me. But they don't even know that I am a little girl. I want to be called Kathy. I am getting so big already.

December 13 - My hair is growing. It is smooth and bright and shiny. I wonder what kind of hair Mom has.

December 13 - I am just about able to see. It is dark around me. When mom brings me into the world it will be full of sunshine and flowers. But what I want more than anything is to see my mom. How do you look, Mom

December 24 - I wonder if Mom hears the whispering of my heart? Some children come into the world a little sick. But my heart is strong and healthy. It beats so evenly: tup-tup, tup-tup. You'll have a healthy little girl,
