Consumers
spend millions in mail orders

Shopping by mail can be the
ultimat -or in frustration, if things go wrong.
Last year Last year Americans spent $\$ 43$
billion on products mail. on products ordered by $\underset{\text { Most mail-order shoppers mu }}{\text { mail }}$ be satisfied, since mail-order sales have been on the increase for years, and rose over 11 percen between 1986 and 1987 alone.
However, problems with orders also top the list of consumer complaints made to Better Business Bureaus throughout the nation.
Common problems include over chandise, failure to deliver, de layed delivery, failure to provide refunds for undeliverable goods failure to answer letters of con
plaint and outright fraud plaint and outright fraud According to Bonnie Piernot, a
consumer economics consumer economics specialist
with the Texas Agricultural Exten sion Service, buyers can take some steps to avoid mail-order problems.
"Ordering from catalogs or com panies that are well-known or have
a track record in the mail-order a track record in the mail-orde
business will generally increase your chances of being satisfied she said.
"The reputation of the company is important because advertisements for mail order goods in newspapers or on television are not
screened and the claims may be exaggerated or untrue," said Piernot.
She advises consumers to keep a copy of the order and the advertise ment being answered and a note when and where it was sent You need a cancelled check or credit card statement to prove that the order was received by the seller," she sai
"Consumers have to do their part too. Before ordering clothing,
for example, check the company's for example, check the company's return or exchange pificy. If yo about size and color without seeing the item, you should select a mailorder firm with a liberal exchange
policy polic
Also be sure to give necessary
information. Mail order companies information. Mail order companies
complain that many problems are caused by consumers failing to give complete or correct addresses, said the specialist.
With the Christmas catalog shopping season approaching, Piernot said consumers should know the Federal Trade Commis
sion regulations regarding sion regulations regarding mail
order:
Goods must be shipped within 30
Goods must be shipped within 30
days of receiving the order or days of receiving the order or
within the time stated in the within the
advertising.
Companies that can't deliver within this time period must offer the consumer the option of a refund or an additional waiting period.
Following the Following the second waiting
period, the order is automaticall cancelled and the money refunded Lnless the customer notifies the company of willingness to wait even longer.
A mail-order company must adjust a refund to a credit account within one billing cycle.
Cash, checks or money orders sent with purchase orders must be
refunded within seven busines days of a legitimate request to do days
so.
Consumers don't have to accept refunds in the form of credit for addional company merchandise.
regulatices not covered by these magazions include photofinishing. seeds and growing pook sets, c.o.d. orders.

Piernot said that when you have a complaint about mail-order ser-
vice or merchandise, contact the company first. If you don't get a response, write to the Better Business Bureau in the city where the mail-order company is located You may also wish to complain to

Panhandle residents say teach ers are doing a good job; are caring and well-informed in their subject matters; are hard working and deserve a pay raise. These findings are the result of a public opinion poll released today in the Panhandle area by the Texas State Teachers Association. The telephone poll was conducted for TSTA by The Texas Poll which is sponsored by Harte-Hanks Com- munications and Texas A\&M munications and Texas A\&M Uni- versity and has a margin of error of versity and has a margin of error of three percentage points. It was conducted between Aug. 15 and Sept. 1. Speaking at a morning news conference in Amarillo, TSTA Vice President Ollie Besteiro said a poll shows that 77 percent of the Panhandle region gives the local schools a passing grade, with over half giving an 'A' or 'B.' Similarly, nearly 60 percent graded teachers as 'good' to 'excellent.'.' Besteiro said TSTA sioned the poll out of concern for a growing teacher morale crisis throughout the state. She said a similar poll of teachers conducted last spring found that 37 percent of Texas teachers were seriously con Texas teachers were seriously con- sidering leaving the profession due to low pay and low morale. The poll showed teachers believed that the public held the profession in low esteem. "This " "This new Texas Poll proves that the public supports their local teachers," Besteiro said. hope these findings will be a big boost to morale everywhere The poll found that 76 percent said teachers are caring; 79 percent said they are well informed in their subject matter: they are hard working: and 80 percent said teachers deserve a pay raise. When asked how the raise should be funded, 69 percent said it should come from a combination of local and state funds. of local and state funds. "Only nine percent believe that alaries should be paid exclusively by the state treasury," Besteiro


those "This should serve notice to those school districts which have
been cutting back on local distriet salary supplements.' Almost 80 percent said that teachers should have a say in formulating educational policies in
their districts while only 13 percent felt that the school administrators and school board should make those decisions exclusively. These figures closely parallel those in a
national NEA Gallup Poll which found that 63 percent of the found that 63 percent of the
American people want to see more teacher control over the decisions that affect how students learn. A plurality of the Panhandle residents believes teachers earn
less money than other professions less money than other professions equally capable with other professionals in other fields. "Unfortunately,
believe teachers get less respect than other professionals, primarily because of low pay, as pointed out
in other parts of the poll,"" the vice president said.
In the area of teacher training, 62 percent believe that teachers receive the same quality of educa-
tion as other professions. tion as other professions. In the area of school reforms, a
slight plurality believes that the changes have improved the quality of education in Texas schools but that they have made the teachers' jobs harder and have had no effect
on their pay. Further, a plurality on their pay. Further, a plurality
believes that the reforms have had no effect on the quality of teaching nor on the competency of the teachers.
