## City Council meets in executive session

The City Council of City of Spearman, Texas, met in regular session in council chambers of City Hall, 30 S.W. Court, on February 26, 1985, Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett presiding. Aldermen present were Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Bob Pearson, and Burl Buchanan. Members of the staff present were Jim Murray, city manager; Charlotte Sheets, city secretary; and D.J. Alberts, police chief. Visitors present were Dorothy Karns, Kelly Burch, Beulah Burger and Kerry Henton.

At 7:30 p.m. Mayor Blodgett declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance to our flag was led by Garner followed by the invocation given by Mayor Blodgett.

Motion was made by Garner to approve the minutes of the regular city council meeting held on February 12, 1985, as written. The motion was seconded by Buchanan. Motion was unanimously carried.

A motion was made by Pearson to authorize the Mayor to enter into an engineering contract with McMorris and Glover to provide consulting engineering services for the 1985 sealcoat. The motion was seconded by

Garner and unanimously carried.

Garner made a motion to authorize the city manager to advertise for bids for the 1985 sealcoat program. The motion was seconded by Nicholson and carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Garner to accept the 1983-84 annual city audit as prepared by Kerry L. Henton, C.P.A. and to approve payment for professional services rendered in the amount of \$6,000.00. Pearson seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Garner to authorize the city manager to enter into a maintenance service contract for the city's IBM System 34 computer with IIT Servcom, a division of IIT Services, Inc., subject to the city manager verifying the provision in the contract regarding updates. The motion was seconded by Nicholson and unanimously carried.

At 8:08 p.m. a motion was made by Nicholson to declare the meeting closed to the public in order for the City Council to enter into executive session under Article 6252.17G V.T.C.S. for the discussion of personnel matters. The motion was seconded by Buchanan.

Alderman McClellan left the meeting at 8:15 p.m. during executive session.

At 8:33 p.m. motion was made by Garner to declare the meeting open and stated that no action was taken only personnel matters were discussed. Pearson seconded the motion and it unanimously carried.

Mayor pro-tem Garner presented two complaints which he had received from citizens regarding trees which obstruct the view of traffic at 10th and Archer and a vehicle and horse trailer at 7th and Haney which also obstruct the view of traffic.

Alderman Pearson presented a motion to the board to commend the Police Department, D.J. Alberts and the patrolmen for their professionalism and a job well done. Second was made by Garner and the four remaining aldermen voted in favor of this motion.

The mayor extended his invitation to the council to attend the City of Borger's open house to be held on March 9, 1985.

Motion was made by Garner to adjourn. Mayor Blodgett declared the meeting adjourned at 8:35 p.m.

## PDRA asks state grant

An application for up to \$15 million in Texas water development funds will be filed Thursday by Palo Duro River Authority to assist in building a lake for municipal water supply for North Plains cities.

Johnnie Lee of Spearman and Bob Davis of Amarillo, bond advisor, will take the application to Austin, reports Lee, PDRA manager.

The proposed lake would provide water for member cities and counties, including Dumas, Sunray and Cactus, Stinnett, and Moore and Hansford counties.

And, another member may be Ochiltree county, reports the PDRA manager, who met last week with civic leaders from Perryton.

The application for \$15 million will be made to the Texas Department of Water Resources for development funds for the reservoir, planned for the junction of Palo Duro and Horse Creeks, northwest of Spearman.

Several months ago, TDWR indicated that some

state funds probably would be available for the project.

Moore county and the three cities in the county voted Jan. 19 to join PDRA. A similar election joined the City of Stinnett to the river authority.

Cost for the project is estimated at approximately \$55 million.

Included in plans are a dam, a 90-mile distribution pipeline and a water treatment plant. The lake is designed to impound some 69,000 acre feet of water.

"I feel we are going to get a lot of help for this project from the water resources board," Lee declares. "The state can buy up to 50 percent of the water in storage at the lake or purchase any bonds we issue."

The application which will be made this week will be based on the present membership of the district - but the application may be amended to include Ochiltree county if residents there decide to join.

## March 6 filing date for City and School Board

March 6 is the filing date for three positions for City Alderman and two positions for Spearman School Board.

City Alderman terms expiring are those now filled by Wilson McClellan, Bob Pearson and Burl Buchanan.

Lee bases the possibility of Ochiltree membership on a meeting he had last week at the PDRA headquarters in Spearman with 27 residents and civic leaders from Perryton.

"Their position is very encouraging," the PDRA manager declares. "The petition they submitted last fall with 217 signatures is still good but the board will have to consider it again." Ochiltree annexation may be on the agenda for the water authority board of directors March 6.

Lee says an annexation vote could be called April 6 when school and water districts and cities hold their spring elections.

"The time will be short but the election can be held then," he says. "If Ochiltree votes to join the district, the PDRA can amend its application to the state water board. We need to go ahead now to tie down the state funds for our project."

Pizza has an undeserved reputation as "junk food." Yet, nutritional analysis of fast-food and frozen pizza shows it can be a nutritional part of a balanced diet.

Differences in pizza recipes can, of course, have a substantial impact on nutrient content. But in general, pizza contains substantial amounts of the key nutrients. They only things it's lacking is vitamin C.

If you're a typical adult woman who consumes about 2000 calories each day, one serving of pizza represents between 15 and 20 percent of your daily calorie intake. For good nutrition, a food that takes up that much of your calorie allotment should also contribute a similar proportion of your daily nutrient needs.

Pizza meets this requirement. Most pizzas contribute at least 15 to 20 percent of the U.S. RDA of protein, calcium, riboflavin and several other nutrients.

The cheese provides protein and calcium. Both the cheese and the crust contain riboflavin. The pizza crust also contributes thiamin, niacin and iron. Vitamin A is in the cheese and tomato sauce. If any vitamin C is present, it comes from the tomato sauce.

When you add toppings to pizza you add calories, but you can also add substantial amounts of nutrients. For example, red or green peppers supply vitamin C that isn't present in a basic cheese pizza.



People on low-calorie diets can enjoy pizza too. One slice of cheese pizza, at about 145 calories, makes it a good alternative to other low-calorie lunches.

Pizza's one significant nutritional limitation is the amount of sodium it contains. It isn't a good food for low-sodium diets because both mozzarella cheese and tomato sauce contain substantial amounts of sodium, and some pizzas contain added salt or other sodium-containing seasonings.

**Two Bit Sermons**

Marks of a New Testament Church  
If you will notice as you drive into any town, there is usually a variety of signs that will mention one of several churches. As you continue thru this community you will see that there are many churches that do not have signs posted. Dealing with "Baptist" churches alone, I have found as many as 74 different types of "Baptist".

In Matthew 16:18 Jesus calls the church just that, the church. Jesus again in Matthew 18:17 calls his Local assemble simply the church. Acts 2:47 says that the Lord added to the church. Acts 8:1 begins by stating the fact that there was a church in Jerusalem. In the same book, Acts, we find that there was also a church Antioch (13:1). In Acts 15:41, Paul and Silas went to the churches. Again in I Cor. 1:2, we find that Paul writes a letter to the church at Corinth. In Philip-

pian 4:15, Paul says that there is a church in Philippi. Next in I Thessalonians 1:1, we see that Paul writes a letter to the church in Thessalonica. In Revelations chapters 2 and 3, Jesus speaks to a church or the churches. Finally in Revelation 22:16, I find Jesus again speaks to the churches. I find that in our society today churches have many different names. Yet the names are important. In most instances, the name will tell you much about the church that meets in that particular building.

The word Baptist is a name that stands for 3 basic principles. First, is the fact that our only method of baptism is to immerse. Nor will any other baptism be acknowledged as right. Second, that only the word of God may be used as a guideline for the church. Third, that the church is a local church and never, universal in its application.

**Texas Most Wanted  
List a success**

Governor Mark White today announced that detectives from the Austin Police Department, acting on a tip to Texas Crime Stoppers, apprehended "Texas Most Wanted" fugitive Darwin Adrain Fowler.

Fowler, 34, a former State of Texas bank examiner, was arrested without incident at his Austin residence. State-wide publicity about Fowler began Saturday, February 23, 1985.

Fowler was wanted on two counts of Attempted Murder following the May 12, 1983, shooting of two employees of a Lubbock car wash. Both employees survived the attack.

Police reports indicate the shooting resulted from an argument over a broken windshield. Fowler has indicted by the Lubbock County Grand Jury on May 24, 1983, and had remained at large until his arrest on February 25, 1985.

Fowler was the seventh fugitive featured as "Texas Most Wanted," and the first to be arrested.

Another fugitive, Joseph Patrick Costello, who was wanted on a murder charge in Kermit, turned himself in just before he was to be featured by the state-wide program.

Governor White announced the start-up of the "Texas Most Wanted" program at a January 10 press conference.

"It is clear, from the apprehension of Mr. Fowler, that the new Texas Crime Stoppers program has focused new public attention on unsolved crimes and is making it very difficult for fugitives to avoid detection in Texas," Governor White said. "I am pleased by the quick and immediate success of the program and believe that it will continue to benefit society by increasing public awareness and participation in the criminal justice process."

Sgt. George Vanderhule, coordinator of the Austin Crime Stoppers Program, said Fowler was working as a realtor and accountant in the Austin area.

## Burton Schubert to attend "Dance for Life" National Farmers Union Convention

"Unity, Solidarity, Equality" will be the theme and rallying cry as family farm producers from across the nation gather in Phoenix, Arizona for their National Farmers Union convention March 3 through 6. Joining more than 1,200 convention attendees will be delegates from Texas Farmers Union. Delegates include: Pete Ballew, Executive Board member, Andrews; Floyd Borchardt, Executive Board member, Crowell; Craig Bryant, Elgin; Jim Holmes, Mart; and Linda Lowrey, Plains. Alternate delegates include the following: Gary Cook, Wilson; Derel Fillingim, Hico; Joe Rankin, TFU Vice-President, Ralls; and Wanda Shadden, Executive Board member, Dublin. Other members planning to attend are: Mike Moeller, TFU President, Buda; Robert Green, TFU Secretary, Hartley; and TFU Directors Cathy Jo Harman, Happy; James McLintic, Groesbeck; and Burton Schubert, Spearman. In addition, Kim Keene of Commerce, winner of TFU's 1984 FFA scholarship will attend as a youth representative.

The NFU convention will concentrate on the 1985 Farm Bill, farm cooperative finances, agricultural exports, and world hunger with a host of nationally known policy makers and speakers. Delegates representing NFU's 300,000 members nationwide will consider legislative priorities as part of their policy deliberations.

Conditions facing family farmers have steadily deteriorated, leading

this year's NFU convention delegates to consider some of the toughest farm policy directions in recent history. Just a few of the facts that will weigh on delegates' minds as they deliberate the best route to lead U.S. farmers back to prosperity include:

\*Parity, a measurement of farm price equality with other income, has slipped three points from 57 percent in December 1983 to 54 percent in December 1984. Agricultural real estate values have dropped by \$82 billion in the past four years, while farm equity has dropped \$110.5 billion from 1981 to 1984.

\*As of Jan. 1, 1985, USDA said 17.6 percent of the nation's farmers have a "high" debt to asset ratio of more than 40 percent; 6.6 percent of the nation's farmers have a "very high" debt to asset ratio of more than 70 percent.

\*Estimates are that more than 200,000 farmers nationwide are in deep financial trouble and will be forced out of business unless policies are changed to target immediate relief to family farm producers.

Highlights of the NFU convention will include a presentation from one of the major players in the Congressional debate over the 1985 Farm Bill and two panel discussions, one on finance for farmers and their cooperatives, and the other on agricultural exports.

The convention will open at 7 p.m. March 3 with a special program for youth and young couples.

### Gary Gilbreath earns

#### "Distinguished Student" status

Gary Z. Gilbreath from Gruver, fall graduate in agricultural engineering, has earned "Distinguished Student" status at Texas A&M University.

Recipients of the "Distinguished

Student" honor must earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio, out of a possible 4.0, during the most recent grading period. The student must also be registered for 15 semester hours.



## Fugitive of the Week



THOMAS MARTIN ELIASON

Tyler, Texas -- Almost nine years have passed since Thomas Martin Eliason dropped out of sight.

Yet detectives from the Tyler Police Department, who have warrants charging Eliason with the April 4, 1976, slaying of a local businessman, say they get occasional reports of the elusive fugitive's wanderings.

"We've heard he's been in Houston, Dallas, Colorado, and even paid a visit to Tyler a few years back," said Sergeant Nelson Downing of the Tyler Police Department. "But the information has always been just a little bit late

to catch him."

This week Eliason has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the capture of the 41-year-old fugitive.

Until that fateful April night in 1976, Eliason had only minor brushes with the law. He had been arrested for burglary and some misdemeanor assaults.

But on April 4, investigators say the ex-soldier tried to force his way into his former girlfriend's second-story apartment. When that failed, investigators noted in their report,

the suspect climbed up a gutter pipe and entered the apartment through a window.

Eliason's ex-girlfriend was inside the apartment with a male visitor she had recently met. The woman and her visitor tried to flee the apartment. The visitor was shot twice in the side as he ran down the stairs.

The victim managed to make it to his car, but was shot six more times with a .45-caliber automatic as he tried to start his car. Eliason's ex-girlfriend saved herself by hiding in some nearby bushes.

Eliason's pickup truck was found abandoned by police at a dump site near Tyler. His motorcycle was left at his apartment. But after calling and threatening his former girlfriend a few times, Eliason dropped out of sight.

He is described as a white male, 5-9, 165 pounds, with blue eyes and brown hair. Detectives say that until the late 1970's, Eliason's hair was very long and he wore a beard. But recent sightings indicate he has cut his hair and has gained about 20 to 30 pounds.

The fugitive has worked in the oil fields, for a tree service and also was a retail salesman. Investigators say he can pass himself off as a "professional type" of businessman.

Police Reports indicate that Eliason used to ride with both the Bandito and Scorpion motorcycle gangs, but detectives are unsure if he still does.

Anyone with information about Eliason's whereabouts is asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative effort between Texas Crime Stoppers, the Department of Public Safety and local law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

As of February 25, 1985, the Department of Public Safety reported that Thomas Martin Eliason is wanted on the following warrant:

#5238B, Issued by Smith County, Texas, April, 1976.

## Change in Exemptions for Children of Divorced Parents

The Tax Reform Act of 1984 will simplify the rules for determining dependency exemptions for children of divorced and separated parents.

In the past, a custodial parent was assumed to be able to claim the exemption, the Internal Revenue Service said. However, special exceptions allowed non-custodial parents to claim the exemption by meeting certain requirements for support paid. Divorce instruments in effect by December 31, 1984, will continue to use these old rules the decree is modified to expressly state that they no longer apply.

Beginning with divorce instruments executed in 1985, the custodial parent is granted the exemption at all times unless a written

waiver states that the custodial parent will not claim the exemption. To claim the exemption, the non-custodial parent must attach a copy of the waiver to his or her tax return each year.

The new rules will not apply to divorced parents, but also those who are still married and have lived apart the last six months of the year. However, it will not apply in cases of multiple support agreements.

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Many years before my time as an active teacher, teachers were looked upon as not very ambitious people; considered not too bright to have selected a profession which did not pay well. The general consensus of public opinion was that we knew when we chose our profession we were aware the pay was low, and we should be satisfied whether or not we received a raise. If we asked for a raise we were being militant! Some still fell it is unprofessional for a teacher to ask for more money! In very recent years while attending school board meetings I was shocked to hear a board member say "Teachers are chattel (slaves), and we'll treat them as such!" Another one of our board members, when asked by our Amarillo Classroom Teachers Association's president for a cost of living raise for the faculty replied, "Yes, I noticed last week that hearts of palm were up 20 cents a can." What a put down!

Teachers in Texas, unlike our more aggressive peers in other states, were slow to begin fighting for higher salaries-one contributing factor to our older retirees now receiving such meager retirement checks. Also many years ago teachers of Texas were given a one time opportunity to speak for themselves and their successors in a vote to determine whether teachers would contribute to the Social Security System. Our destiny was influenced because most teachers were women whose spouses were paying Social Security, and the young and single lacked foresight, plus their small checks wouldn't stand another deduction after teacher's retirement and IRS contributions. Consequently the plight of our retired teachers is sad! We have people barely subsisting on \$300-\$400 per month with no other means of support. Without Social Security we are not eligible for Medicare, and such small checks from The Texas Teachers Retirement System does not provide enough to pay for health insurance. These people are suffering, and we can't get the Texas Teachers Retirement System or the Legislature to pay attention! Teachers salaries are controlled by the Legislature because teachers are paid with tax dollars. We are still being controlled by the Legislature

and the TTRS who together control the ten billion dollars in our state fund. They are keeping many of our people who taught 40 to 50 years below the poverty level-treating us like cattle! These are people who paid into this fund for many years! We want the fund to remain actuarly sound, but those in control prefer we keep our mouths shut, and let them build the fund within five to six years to \$20,000,000,000. To some of them that would be a feather in their cap while they let the people for whom the fund was created suffer!

The state gives all state employees, and retirees including college and university professors \$85 for health insurance per month. Those people are also eligible for Medicare. We, too, are state employees, but we do not receive Medicare, and we are excluded from health insurance by the state! These retired people worked hard for the public, and with pride, but who, by reason of their destitute circumstances, inability to pay bills, and lack of medical insurance are suffering physically and mentally from reduced self esteem. This is a disgrace to our state, and yes, to our nation!

Two years ago the Legislature could see how big our fund was growing so they voted to reduce what the state had been contributin, and the active teachers contributions (percentage wise) to the retirement fund. Instead of using the money on retired teachers it went to one of their pet projects. They promised two years ago to resume the higher percentage of contributions to the fund, but already have a bill in the hopper to continue the reduced percentage! Continuance of this practice could result in making the fund actuarly unsound!

We believe if each retired teacher in the state would be given a \$5.00 per year service per month increase in pay to come from the Texas Teachers Retirement fund, it would greatly relieve the situation at no expense to the state.

I am one of the lucky ones who does have a husband who supports me. I am not hurting, but many are, and it is in their behalf that I am pleading that those who read this letter write to your legislators, the governor, Speaker of the House, and the Teachers

Retirement Board of Texas in support of the issues set forth in this letter. Thank you.

## Larger Estimated Payments May be Due in 1985

Changes in the rules governing penalties for underpayment of estimated tax will affect persons who use this method to pay taxes throughout the year, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Those who pay too little tax or have insufficient withholding, will continue to be subject to an estimated tax penalty. However, the Tax Reform Act of 1984 has changed the exceptions that may be used to eliminate or reduce the penalty.

For the tax year 1985 and after, there will no longer be an exception to the penalty based on prior year's facts and current year's rates and exemptions, and no exception for payment based on 90 percent of the tax on actual taxable income for the period ending before the month in which the installment was due. These have been listed Exception 2 and Exception 4 on Form 2210. The

other two exceptions on Form 2210 will remain.

The IRS will be able to waive the penalty if it would be inequitable because of casualty, disaster, or other unusual circumstances. It may also be waived for reasonable cause where the taxpayer retired after attaining age 62, or became disabled, during the taxable year for which estimated tax payments were to be made or in the preceding taxable year. Anyone owing less than \$500 of tax, including alternative minimum tax, will not have to file estimated tax returns.

## New Law Defines Resident Aliens

In an attempt to eliminate confusion over the income tax status of aliens, the Tax Reform Act of 1984 has provided some specific rules for determination of resident alien status. They will become effective January 1, 1985.

Aliens who are lawful, permanent residents at any time during the year, or who meet the requirements of the substantial presence test will be treated as resident aliens, the Internal Revenue Service said. All other aliens will be treated as non-resident aliens. Resident aliens are taxed on worldwide income, and non-resident aliens are taxed only on income that is from the United States sources or connected with a United States trade or business.

Lawful, permanent residents have passed the so-called green card test. That is, they have received, and retain, immigrant status with permission to remain in the U.S. permanently.

The substantial presence test is based on presence in the U. S. for specified periods of time over a three-year period. Students, teachers, and persons related to foreign governments may not qualify for this test. Also, persons with a foreign tax home and close foreign ties will not qualify.

These rules affect classification of aliens for income tax purposes only. They do not affect gift and estate tax law or immigration regulations.





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## Larger Charitable Deduction for Auto Use

If you use your car while providing services to a charitable organization, you will be able to take a larger tax deduction next year, the Internal Revenue Service said.

A deduction is now allowed for either the actual out-of-pocket expenses or 9 cents per mile. Beginning in 1985, the standard mileage rate will be increased to 12 cents per mile. Parking and tolls are

also deductible in addition to either the standard mileage rate or actual expenses, but nothing is allowed for general repair or maintenance.

## Caring For Children

Dear Andrea:

As a parent of a teenager, I am particularly concerned about teenage suicides. I understand that the rate of teenage suicide is extremely high. I know that parents are often totally surprised by a child's suicide. I don't think my child has suicidal tendencies, but how would I know? What can I do to keep this horrible nightmare from touching our lives?

Dear Rochelle:

Teenage suicide is very high. It is a sad fact that so many people who are just beginning to experience life, choose to end it.

Sometimes a parent doesn't have a clue. Usually they do, or would if they were aware of the signs.

Any drastic change in behavior is a clear sign. It may not necessarily mean suicide, but it does mean that something is the matter with your child. A teenager is not completely developed emotionally, yet is bombarded with

strong emotions. They are hard for him to understand. He cannot always handle them. Often he cannot even explain that something is wrong, or ask for help. So he behaves badly. A good student's grades drop. A neat person becomes messy. A polite child becomes rude and sullen. A happy outgoing child becomes unhappy and reclusive. Be aware of any of those signs.

Knowing that someone cares is probably the single most important thing for a teenager. Show your care by exhibiting a sincere interest in things that interest him. Make a habit of spending a few minutes each day alone with each child. Instead of sending your child into the kitchen to wash dishes, wash them with him. Shared work is often the basis for feelings of comradeship. Conversation comes naturally without being strained. If you jog or walk, encourage a child to come with you. If you regularly spend time with your child — real time, where you are actually paying attention to him — you will notice changes. Lines of communication are more likely to be open. In addition, your attention will give him a sense of being loved, and that is the best preventative.

If you do notice severe changes, don't hesitate to ask for professional help.


