## 200 turn out for 'Chemical' meeting

Thursday night for the first of two town meetings on drug and alcohol abuse, in what sponsors hope will be an all-out Drugs.

Some of those attending the meeting were surprised the film classified alcohol as not only a drug,
but the most widely abused drug in America, calling it "The drug of choice."
Statistics used in the film were based on a study made by the University of Michigan and updated every year. The survey was conducted in cities and towns of ell sizes
film. America, according to the Some of the statistics presented included: -93 per cent of ell high school seniors have at one time or another drunk alcohol; -16 percont of all high school deily:
--Of this 16 percent, one half were drunk within the last two weeks (at the time of the survey);
-The second most kidely abused drug is marijuena, that a large part "right out in marijuana is done "right out in the open" and that 'kids know its there;'
-60 percent of the seniors sur-

Sheriff McF erlin seid there is an alcohol and drug problem in Spearman, but not a big one. He said he wanted to congratulate the young people of the community because we have "very ew drug problems here.'
He said the community cannot deny there is no problem at all here-that about six months ago a subject was arrested with what was These polls later proved to be more than caffeine pills, but that people often are fooled into buying these thinking they are buying drugs.
MdParlin said the sheriff's department hes no problem at all working with the school system or the teachers in Spearman, Gruver and Morsers, and he thanked the educaMinse, and he thanked the educa-
tional community for its cooperation. Chief Alberts said that he took feels that there is a drug-alcoho
problem here, but not one of major proportions. He took and praised the community's youth as a whole. The sheriff and police chief also released statistics compiled showing arrests made over tre last 10 years on
charges of drunkenness, DWI, Mlecharges of drunkenness, DWI, Mlepossession, and drugs.
Dr. MoClellan said he definitely did not feel he was an expert on drugs, but that he has in his medical practice seen evidence of drug abuse and alcohol abuse in the community. He told of a girl who had been brought into the hospital in virtually a coma after having four to maybe
six beers. He said this is evidence alcohol is a drug.
The Rev. Shardin, seid that while drugs and alcohol are evidence of problems in society, they are just the tip of the icaberg, proof of angers, fears, frustrations, hopelessness
and such feelings as "Who is Godr". "Nobody cares about me...
Mrs. Cook said she is concerned because there is some drugs and alcohol problem here, adding she has two children.
She said it is the job of parents to take the first step in trying to find
the solution to drus problems.
