

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE FIRST CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF SPEAR MAN

The First Christian Church was begun in November, 1926 with Evangelistic Services led by Jasper Bogue, District Evangelist. During that time 39 persons were lined up as Charter Members.

They met as a Church for an indefinite period of time in the IooF

In 1946 they built a small stucco building which had 4 Sunday School rooms. They used these buildings until 1949 when they were sold and moved away. The present Church building was built on the same site.

Today we have about 300 members. We have both Morning and Evening Worship every Sunday and Sunday School. On Sunday evenings before Evening Worship we have two very active youth groups. One for the Junior High and one for the High School age. Rev. Martin Foster is the present minister.

President Reagan has proclaimed November 11 as Veterans Day and has called upon all Americans to recognize 'the valor and sacrifice of our veterans."

This year's Veterans Day theme is 'A Grateful Nation Remembers," and the President has urged Americans to reflect on the great achievements of those whose sacrifices preserved the country's freedom and its way of life.

"Veterans Day gives all Americans a special opportunity to pay tribute to all those men and women who, throughout our history, have left their homes and loved ones to serve their country," the President said in his proclamation.

'With a spirit of pride and gratitude, let us recall their heroic accomplishments and thank them for their unselfish devotion to duty. They are indeed worthy of the solemn tribute of a grateful nation," he said. The President has called on Feder-

al, State, and local government officials to display the U.S. Flag and to encourage and participate in patriotic activities nationwide and to support the observance of Veterans Day with suitable commemortive expressions and programs.

In the 33rd annual observance at Arlington National Cemetery, the tradition of honoring the unknown soldier on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month will begin with the Presidential Wreath Laying Cere-

It was at that hour on November 11, 1918, that the world celebrated the end of World War I hostilities, a day that later became known as "Armistice Day."

Various Veterans Day observances will be held throughout the nation at many of the Veterans Administration's 109 national cemeteries.

JV Wins

Can the Varsity and the Junior Varsity play together as a team? That seemed to be the question on everyone's mind going into the final game of the season here Thursday night. The Lynx answered that question by gaining over four hundred yards in total offense, 22 first downs, and 4 interceptions against the Highland Park Hornets. The defense in return held the Hornets to 73 yards on the ground and 102 yards passing.

The Lynx opened the game by forcing the Hornets to punt on their first possession after the kick-off. Being lead by Jeff Gustin, Alan Beeson, Brett Davis, and Mark Garcia, the Lynx marched 57 yards on their first set of downs for the TD. The score came on a 21 yard pass from #10 Brett Davis to #81 Kevin Nelson. Point after failed.

Following the kick-off #28 Alan Beeson intercepted a Hornet pass on the 48 yard line. Davis connected on his second and third passes of the game. The second to #88 Tim Woolley for 7 yards, and the third to #80 Keith Benson for 10 yards and the second touchdown of the game. #40 Jeff Gustin added the extra points going around the left side. Highlights for the remainder of the second quarter was a pass interception by Alan Beeson and a 18 yard pass reception by #80 Keith Benson. The Hornets scored on an intercepted pass and kicked the extra point at the close of the the half.

The Lynx offensive line played a big part in Thursday's game. On one side #64 Norman Scroggs and #74 Matt Tucker opened the holes for the running backs. On the other side this job was handled by #80 Keith Benson and #78 Scott Swan. This excellent job of blocking allowed Mark Garcia and Jeff Gustin to power their way 65 yards and the third Lynx touchdown. The score coming on a 14 yard run by Garcia. Davis kicked the extra point and the Lynx lead by 14.

During the Hornets short possession Tucker and Swan dumped the quarterback for a 9 yard loss, and then Brett Davis intercepted a Hornet pass and returned it to the 29 yard line. The Lynx's downs expired deep in Hornet territory. The defense forced a punt and the Lynx again took over in good field position. Davis connected with Tim Woolley for a 25 yard pass and to Kevin Nelson on a 20 yard completion. Garcia picked up 11 yards and Brett Davis went across the goal line from the one. The kicked extra point was good, giving the Lynx a commanding 21 point lead.

In the 4th quarter #12 Shawn Cook dumped the Hornets for an 8 yard loss before forcing them to punt. From the 31 yard line #40 Delwin Whitmire rushed for 25 yards along with a 15 yard penalty that put the ball on the Hornet 31 yard line. #31 Scott Wilkerson and Delwin Whitmire gained 2 yards each before the Lynx were dropped for a big loss. Then #33 Pete Saenz went through the left side of the line for a 36 yard touchdown. Extra point failed. With 8:40 left in the game the Hornets star player took the kick-off and returned it 72 yards for the touchdown, extra point was good on a kick, and Spearman's lead had been cut to 13 points. With 4:42 left in the game the Hornets on a fourth down conversion faked the punt. The Hornets found a brick wall consisting of #22 J Ga ett and #77 Tony Pacheco that stopped the try for the first down. Pete Saenz gained 7 yards and Delwin Whitmire busted loss for 21 more, that was called back due to a penalty. Saenz picked up the first down on a 17 yard run. #88 Jerold Blan added another 12 to the 6 yard line. #40 Delwin Whitmire scored across the left side for a 6 yard TD. Extra point failed. The Hornets scored the final score of the game on a 13 yard pass with the extra point conversion failing. The Lynx totally devastated the Hornets in a 40 to 21 victory to end the gridiron season.





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

Vietnam Veterans

The Texas Vietnam Veterans Memorial will be a living Memorial designed to remember those Texas Veterans who were killed or are Missing in Action, as well as to honor those who returned to live and work in our communities.

The statewide Memorial will be located on the Texas State Fair Grounds in Dallas. The State Fair Ground site was selected because it is the most visited tourist attraction in the State and will provide the optimum opportunity for Texans to visit this historical Memorial.

The Memorial will encompass an area of approximately 12,000 square feet and will be surrounded by 80,000 square feet (approximately 2 acres) of landscaped area. The Memorial will permanently enshrine four granite tablets bearing the names of the 3,244 Texans who were Killed in Action. These tablets, constructed of natural Texas granite, will be surrounded by two reflection pools. An eternal flame will stand vigil over a single tablet containing the names of the 162 Texans who remain Missing in Action. Additionally, the Memorial will incorporate two covered arenas designed to accommodate small groups and provide seating. The Memorial was deliberately designed with the large surrounding landscaped area to serve as a natural place to hold large services on Veterans Day, Memorial Day and other appropriate times. It will serve all citizens of Texas by providing a place to visit, learn and reflect upon this turbulent period of our history.

The Memorial was designed by Gary Garmon and Richard Martratt of Martratt/Garmon Architects (a Dallas based architectural firm). Mr. Martratt is a Vietnam Veteran who served from 1966-67.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund of Texas is a non-profit organization chartered to raise \$2.5 million for the construction and perpetual maintenance of the Memorial to be located on the Texas State Fair Grounds.

In 1921, an American soldier - his name "known but to God" was buried on a Virginia hillside overlooking the Potomac River and the city of Washington. The Arlington National Cemetery burial site of this unknown World War I soldier became the personification of dignity and reverence for America's veterans.

Similar cermonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an "unknown soldier" was buried in each nation's highest place of honor (in England, Westminster Abbey; in France, the Arc de Triomphe).

These memorial gestures all took place on November 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I hostilities at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The day became known as "Armistice Day"

Armistice Day officially received its name in America in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 year later by

similar Congressional action. If the idealistic hope had been realized that World War I was "The War to end all wars", November 11 might still be called Armistice Day. But shortly after the holiday was proclaimed, World War II broke out in

Europe and shattered the dream. Sixteen and one-half million Americans took part. Four hundred and six thousand died. The families and friends of these dead longed for a way to honor their memory.

An answer to the dilemma of how to pay tribute to those who had served in this latest, great war came in a proposal made by Representative Edwin K. Roes of Kansas: Change Armistice Day to Veterans Day, and make this a occasion to honor those who have served America in all wars.

President Eisenhower, in 1954. signed the bill proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day, and he called for Americans everywhere to rededicate themselves to the cause of peace.

On May 30, 1958, two more unidentified American war dead were brought to Arlington Cemetery from overseas and interred in the plaza beside their Comrade of orld War I. One was killed in World War II, the other in Korea. A law passed in 1973 provided for the interment of an unknown American who lost his life in Southeast Asia during the Vietnam era. For several years no qualifying remains were discovered so a memorial plaque was placed in the Amphitheater's Memorial Display Room. On Memorial Day 1984, however, the Unknown Serviceman from that conflict was placed "In Honored Glory' alongside his fellow countrymen.

To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army honor guard, the 3rd United States Infantry (The Old

Guard), keeps day and night vigil. A law passed in 1968 changed the national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. It soon became apparent, however, that November 11 was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, Congress, therefore, enacted legislation (Public Law 94-97) which returned the observance of this special day to its traditional date beginning in 1978.

Final Planting November


November 15 is the Final Planting Date for Insured Barley and Wheat in Hansford County, Texas, according to Jakie Harris, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation





Yes. Cases of AIDS related to

medical use of blood or blood products

are being prevented by use of HTLV-

III antibody screening tests at blood

donor sites and by members of high

risk groups voluntarily not donating

blood. Heat treatment of Factor VIII

and other blood products helps pre-

vent AIDS in patients with hemophi-

lia and other clotting disorders. There

is no vaccine for AIDS itself. However,

there is good reason to believe that

individuals can reduce their risk of

contracting AIDS by following existing

recommendations. Communities can

help revent AIDS by vigorous efforts

to educate and inform their popula-

tions about the illness, with special

emphasis on educational activities for

members of high risk groups. Mean

Prior to donating, you should have a good night's rest-at least 6 hours of sleep within the past 24 hours. Eat a good breakfast, even if you usually omit it. You must not have a cold, sore throat or flu. You are eligible to donate blood once every 8 to 10 weeks.

We hope that you will consider sharing your good health by volunteering to donate blood on November 18, 1986 when the Blood Center comes to our school.

Here are some of the facts about AIDS that are furnished by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that concern the donating and receiving of blood donations.

IS THERE A DANGER OF CON-TRACTING AIDS FROM DONATING

No. Blood banks and other blood collection centers use sterile equipment and disposable needles. The need for blood is great, and people who are not at increased risk for getting AIDS are urged to continue to donate blood as they have in the past. IS THERE A LABORATORY TEST


