Council leases pool to YMCA

The City Council met in regular session in council chambers of City Hall, 30 S.W. Court, on April 23, 1985, with Mayor pro-tem Ed Garner presiding. Aldermen present were Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Burl Buchanan, Mike Cudd. Staff present were Jim Murray, city manager; Charlotte Sheets, city secretary; D. J. Alberts, police chief. Visitor present was Kelly Burch.

The pledge of allegiance to our flag was led by Cudd followed by the invocation given by Buchanan.

Motion unanimously carried to approve the minutes of regular city council meeting held on April 9.

The council approved a lease with the YMCA for the operation of the municipal swimming pool for 1985.

They awarded a contract to Gordon's Cabinet Shop to build a counter and shelving and to repair

counter tops for the city hall building.

Alderman McClellan made a motion to approve the amended mutual aid agreement with the City of Gruver. The motion unanimously carried after being seconded by Buchanan.

City manager Jim Murray gave a status report on proposed legislation on municipal annexation privileges for general law cities. No action was taken.

Meeting dates for the month of May were set for the 14th and the 28th.

Kelly Burch was present to state his complaints regarding the upkeep of the rocketslide park. City manager Jim Murray stated that he would have the problems taken care of.

The meeting adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

Faye's Daze

First, congratulations to our own Mary Lou Wysong for being selected by W.T.S.U. for the distinguished service award. I have long been a champion of Mary Lou's. She has resigned as Chamber of Commerce manager and will be retiring soon. Her shoes will be hard to fill.

Speaking of awards, if you didn't get to see the "Seven Who Care" presentation on KVII-TV Tuesday, you really missed a show.

Seven volunteers were selected out of 274 nominations. The show recognized volunteers who put in an unusual amount of time and effort to help others and usually without very many people even knowing about it.

Tom Henry Miller of Claude is a fellow who has been bedridden for 46 years, unable to get out of his bed and able only to use his right hand. However, equipped with a bank of telephones and a CB radio, Tom Henry is on call 24 hours a day for the sheriff's office, the Medical Center and the Veterinary Clinic. He dispatches calls for the fire department and relays ambulance calls. He writes a weekly column for the Claude News and operates a leather working shop out of his bedroom, making finely tooled belts, billfolds, and larger items even though he has only partial use of his left arm. He was present Saturday night, strapped to an ambulance bed, and made a moving response after being given his award. A number of Claude friends were present, a tribute to the love that community has for Tom Henry.

Willie B. Harwell of Wellington is a 76 year old lady who lives in Wellington and has retired several times but keeps on working as a volunteer. She has put in 12,500 hours as a volunteer with the Collingsworth Retired Senior Volunteer program. She is chairman of the Meals on Wheels committee, delivers meals to the home bound. She and her husband established the first day care center in Wellington and she is chairman of the volunteer program for the Satellite Center in Wellington. Willie is a lively lady with a long list of accomplishments in the Wellington community as a volunteer worker.

Boots Bezner of Dalhart is another grandmother who started out working with 4-H programs in Deaf Smith county and continued when she moved to Dalhart. She has motivated thousands of young people in 4-H programs in the past 28 years and remains an active 4-H leader today. She also has over 600 hours of volunteer service as a member and past president of the Hospital Auxiliary. In between times as a volunteer for other agencies, she works on various programs of the St. Anthony Catholic Church in Dalhart.

Marvell White is a black lady of Amarillo who holds a master of education degree and has spent most of her life helping and inspiring young people to achieve goals that some at first think are unattainable. She organized and help build Our Community House, a multi-service neighborhood center, in 1958. In more recent years, she organized the Amarillo United Citizens Forum, a self-help community development organization which works on housing, community involvement, decreasing crime

and curbing school drop-out rates. Right now she is building a Black Historical Cultural Center and assists senior citizens by writing letters and providing transportation for them. She is an acknowledged leader of Amarillo's black community and is held in high respect by all races. Marvell is a dignified, soft spoken woman who obviously commands respect wherever she goes.

Willie Jo Scott is another grandmother who seems to find time to help others. She is a special education teacher in Clovis, N.M., but after school, and on her own time, she teaches non-English speaking students to read and write English. She has taught English skills to a great many people, including some from other countries. Willie Jo also visits the Curry County jail every week to visit with inmates and helps them with correspondence, making telephone calls for them, and in general giving them a bit of uplift in the knowledge that someone cares for them. For some 13 years she has taught Sunday School at the Retirement Ranch, a convalescent home for the elderly.

Tommy Hawkins and Charles Patton of Amarillo are a winning team, chosen for the award because of their "Make A Wish Foundation" which grants wishes to terminally ill children. In one short year, more than eight children from Cheyenne, Okla., to Midland have been granted their wishes including trips to Disneyland, attending Michael Jackson concerts and being a Dallas Cowboy Cheerleader for a day. Charles was not present, but Tommy accepted the award, breaking into tears as he recounted some of the children he and his partner have helped. Parents of one small girl were also present and told how their daughter had been thrilled by being taken to Dallas where she actually became a Cowboy Cheerleader for a day before passing away last year. These two men also have other volunteer work to their credit, but the main challenge is their Make-A-Wish Foundation.

Carmen Hernandez of Canyon has overcome a lot of handicaps, including that of polio which she contracted as a child. She founded and directs the Canyon Community Family Services Organization which provides financial help for emergencies such as utility, medical and food bills. She has raised a lot of money for various causes such as purchasing a life-saving kidney dialysis machine for a Canyon patient. She volunteers with Planned Parenthood, various other organizations as well as giving time to unwed mothers, the elderly and the unemployed.

SCS Golden Anniversary

April 27, 1985 marks the Golden Anniversary of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service - a milestone in a voluntary conservation movement that has involved more than two million farmers, ranchers, and other landowners and operators. "SCS can be proud of what it has done," said Billy C. Griffin, State Conservationist for SCS in Temple. "It has helped to reduce soil erosion, conserve water, reduce flooding, improve rangeland, and protect other natural resources. "In Texas, about 200,000 landowners and operators voluntarily apply conservation measures with SCS assistance," Griffin continued. "They have built more than 220,000 miles of terraces, applied conservation tillage on 2.9 million acres of cropland, and are using planned grazing systems - with regular rest periods - on 13 million acres of grassland." Griffin said SCS technical assistance is available through 201 locally run soil and water conservation districts. SCS efforts in promoting conservation tillage and planned grazing systems today parallel the agency's early efforts in convincing farmers

to use contour stripcropping, terraces, crop rotations, and other practices that returned eroded fields to productive cropland and pasture. Along the way, SCS has achieved an international reputation in the field of soil and water conservation. What has been accomplished in 50 years is the result of Federal and State agencies and local groups working together to solve the Nation's soil and water problems along with the leadership and investments of farmers and ranchers. These accomplishments also needed the support of conservation districts and professional organizations and the dedication of people from all walks of life who feel a sincere sense of stewardship for the land. Everyone in the United States has benefited from the protection of soil productivity and a cleaner environment. "It's time for celebration as we observe 50 years of soil conservation and it's time for renewed commitment as we look ahead," Griffin concluded. "After all, it's the next 50 years that matter."

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



I believe that the involvement of these people toward this memorial substantiates the fact that "To know Pat was to love him."


Now I will ask Virginia if she will turn on the switch that will allow Pat's light to shine just as it did all of his 64 years.

"Jogging Burglar" sought



CLEDIS CLARK WEATHERFORD

Tyler, Texas -- Cledis Clark Weatherford is known to law enforcement officials in East Texas as the "Jogging Burglar".

There's a good reason for the nickname. In what police describe as an "active" career, Weatherford is renowned for the various disguises he uses while casing residential neighborhoods for possible burglary targets. His favorite is to wear a jogging suit.

In living up to his nickname, Weatherford has managed to keep jogging at least a step in front of the law. He has been wanted by the Smith County Sheriff's Department for more than five years on a felony charge of burglary. And when he finally is caught, police departments throughout East Texas and Oklahoma would like to talk to him about 37 unsolved burglaries -- primarily in wealthy residential

areas. This week the elusive Weatherford has made the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to his capture.

Weatherford is described as a white male, about 45 years old, 6-0, 180 lbs., with graying hair and brown eyes. He has a scar on his head.

Detectives say Weatherford has used a variety of aliases, including Cledis Cecil Weatherford, Clet Weatherford, Cloda Weatherford and Cledis G. Weatherford. He has driver's licenses from Texas and Oklahoma.

Weatherford has been wanted since December 27, 1979, when he failed to appear to begin serving a federal prison sentence.

Investigators say they believe he still is somewhere in Texas because he has family in the state. He was last seen driving a 1979 white and red Lincoln Continental Mark V with Oklahoma license plates MY-3368.

Anyone with information about Weatherford's location is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477, or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between Texas Crime Stoppers and the Department of Public Safety. It is designed to enlist the public's cooperation in tracking down fugitives who have been charged with major crimes within the state.

Cash rewards are also offered by the 127 local Crime Stoppers

programs throughout the state for information leading to the solution of any major crime and the capture of wanted felons.

As of April 22, 1985, the Department of Public Safety reported that Cledis Clark Weatherford is wanted on the following warrants: #479236; Burglary; Issued by Smith County Sheriff's Office.




