

For Brush Chipper . . .

Council Accepts Equipment Bid

At its Nov. 28 regular meeting, the Spearman City Council accepted a bid from Industrial Disposal Supply Co. for the lease-purchase of a disc brush chipper. That company was the second low bidder on the chipper, but their bid was accepted because the low bidder, Badger Chipper Co., had received poor performance ratings in the past.

Jim Murray, city manager, stated that the director of public works performed an extensive background study on the low bidder and received poor performance information on the company. After discussion on the matter, council members voted to award the bid to the second low

bidder.

In other business, the council voted for membership in the Texas Innovation Group, at an annual fee of \$750, and voted against membership in the Panhandle Area Alliance.

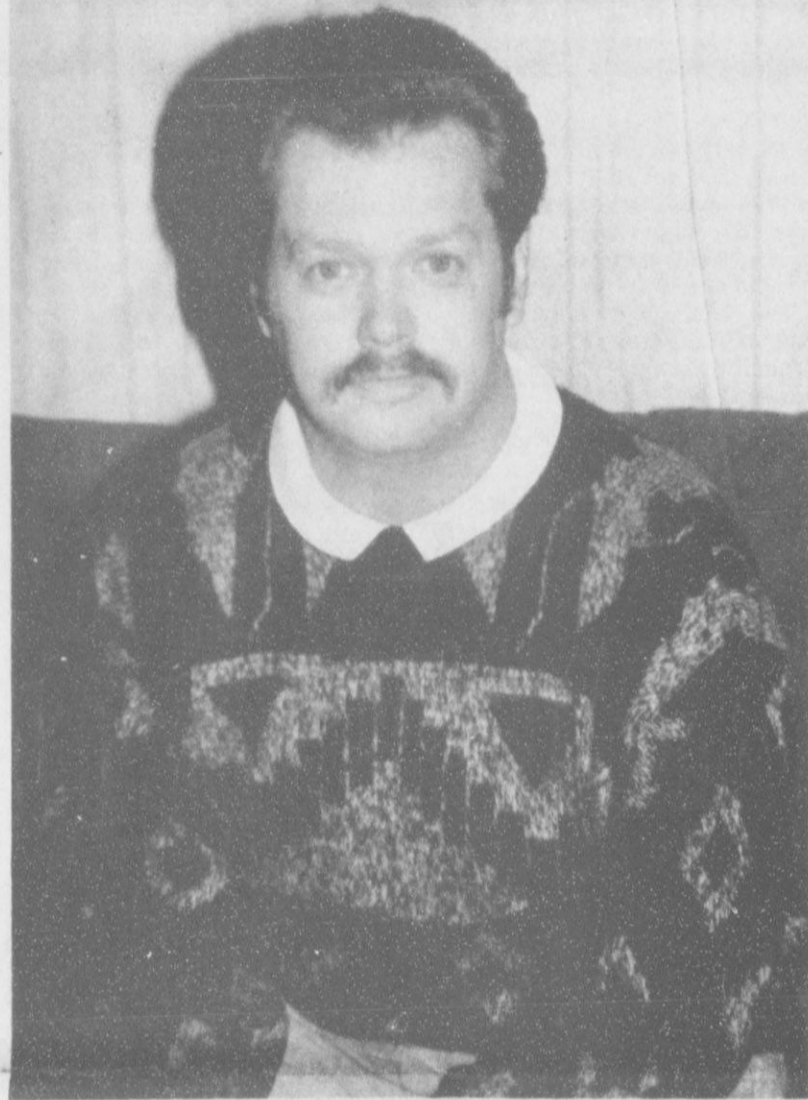
Murray stated that he attended a recent Panhandle City Managers meeting where a program was given on the Texas Innovation Group. The group is a way the public sector can participate with the private sector companies in research and development of products that can be beneficial to the city. He said that the program pointed out small cities are the better members of TIG because of stronger commitment by manage-

ment, less bureaucracy and because they are more interested in testing new products.

Mayor Pearson thanked Alderman Boxwell for being chairman of the ad hoc committee to review the proposed plans and specifications of the new animal control shelter.

The council set one meeting date for the month of December, which will be Tuesday Dec. 12. Approval was given to minutes of the Nov. 14 council meeting.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Bob Pearson; Aldermen Wilson McClellan, Bob Boxwell, Don Reed and Burl Buchanan; City Manager Jim Murray; and City Secretary Cheryl Gibson.

County Business Down From Last Year

Hansford County businesses reported gross sales of \$15,286,349 during the second quarter of this year, according to figures released by the State Comptroller's Office.

According to the State Sales and Use Tax Analysis, provided by the Comptroller's Office, gross sales for the same quarter in 1988 totaled \$15,344,384, which represents a .4 percent decrease from last year to this year. Use tax purchases totaled \$72,859 during the second quarter of this year.

The amount of gross sales subject to the state sales and use tax totaled \$5,161,246. There were 144 reporting outlets in Hansford County for the second quarter.

These totals are for all industries.

Gross sales reported by 75 retail trade outlets in Hansford County totaled \$8,748,074, said the Comptroller's Office. Gross retail sales for the second quarter of last year were \$9,031,102. This shows a decline in retail sales of 3.1 percent from last year. Use tax purchases in the retail trade division totaled \$10,555 for the

second quarter of this year, and the amount of gross sales subject to sales and use tax for the quarter was \$3,652,348.

The State Comptroller's Office says that by definition, reporting outlets are individual business locations with a sales and use tax permit who filed a return.

Gross sales is the total amount of all sales, leases and rentals of tangible personal property and all labor and service charges made during the reporting period. Use tax purchase is the cost of all taxable items removed from inventory for personal or business use and all purchases on which no Texas sales tax was paid or use tax accrued.

Taxable sales is the total amount of sales, leases and rentals of taxable personal property and taxable labor and service charges made during the reporting period.

The amount subject to the state sales and use tax is calculated by taking taxable sales and adding use tax purchases.

Oil, Gas Production Figures Announced

Hansford County produced a total 31,630 barrels of oil in the month of September, according to the Texas Railroad Commission. Natural gas production for September totaled 2,899,767 mcf (thousand cubic feet.)

Texas crude oil production averaged 1,744,425 barrels daily in September, according to preliminary figures released by Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance. September 1988's preliminary crude production averaged 1,857,951 barrels daily.

This figure compares with preliminary August production of

1,755,463 barrels daily. Final production reports for August indicated average production at 1,766,936 barrels daily.

Hance said the preliminary Texas oil production figure for September is 52,332,761 barrels, down from 54,419,363 barrels in August. September 1988's preliminary Texas oil production was 55,738,519 barrels.

According to Hance the state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary September production were: Gains, 3,484,085 barrels; Ector, 3,103,232 barrels; Andrews, 3,095,164 barrels; Yoa-

kum, 2,818,073 barrels; Hockley, 2,578,594 barrels; Gregg, 2,470,891 barrels; Pecos, 2,465,933 barrels; Crane, 1,550,595 barrels; Scurry, 1,259,740 barrels; and Kent, 975,504 barrels.

Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 438,178,660 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in September, compared to the August gas production total of 461,397,148 Mcf. September production was down two percent compared to September 1988's production of

449,928,981 Mcf.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary September production were: Webb, 23,132,828 Mcf; Zapata, 21,797,359 Mcf; Pecos, 19,598,106 Mcf; Panola, 12,989,939 Mcf; Hidalgo, 12,466,569 Mcf; Hemphill, 8,621,775 Mcf; McMullen, 8,472,425 Mcf; Crockett, 6,855,959 Mcf; Nueces, 5,917,726 Mcf; and Matagorda, 5,890,750 Mcf.

Texas gas production in September came from 186,164 oil wells and 46,008 gas wells.

Filing Period For Offices Opens

On Sunday, Dec. 3 candidate filing will be open for six county offices in preparation for the primary and general elections.

According to County Clerk Amelia Johnson, candidates can begin filing with their respective party chairmen on Sunday, Dec. 3.

Democratic party chairman is Carl Archer. Republican party chairman is Roy Bulls.

The candidates can file anytime between December 3 and January 2.

Candidates need to designate a campaign treasurer and register that person with the county clerk before collecting or spending any

money.

The offices coming up for election are County Judge, currently held by R.L. McClellan; County and District Clerk, currently held by Amelia Johnson; County Treasurer, currently held by Norma Jean Mackie; and Justice of the Peace, currently held by Johnny P. Vernon.

There are two County Commissioner posts up for election in precinct number 2, currently held by Joe T. Venneman, and precinct number 4, held by Val Winger. Winger is the only Republican holding local office at this time.

Filing fees for the offices are

\$600 for each office except Justice of the Peace. The filing fee for Justice of the Peace is \$300. The filing fees are collected to offset the cost of local elections. The local parties have to pay the expenses of the local primary elections. State and Federal election expenses are absorbed by those respective governments.

In lieu of paying the filing fee, a candidate can get on the ballot by petition. The candidate must have at least 60 signatures of registered voters to accomplish this. For some of the offices more signatures are required.

Other general requirements for the offices that candidates must

fulfill include:

1. Be a United States citizen;
2. Be 18 years of age or older on the first day of the term to be filled;
3. Have not been determined mentally incompetent by a court;
4. Have not been finally convicted of a felony from which they have not been pardoned;
5. Have resided continuously in the state for 12 months, and in the county or district for six months immediately preceding the filing deadline date; and
6. Satisfy other eligibility requirements prescribed by law for the offices.

The 19th century French scientist Louis Pasteur demonstrated the great capacity of animals to adapt to their environment, even an unfavorable environment.
