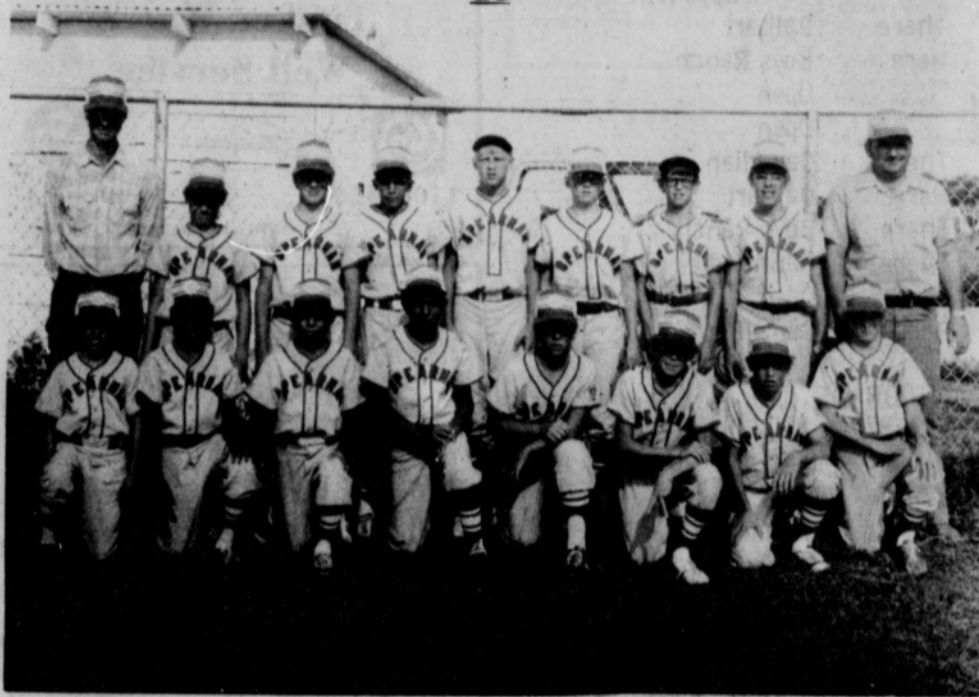

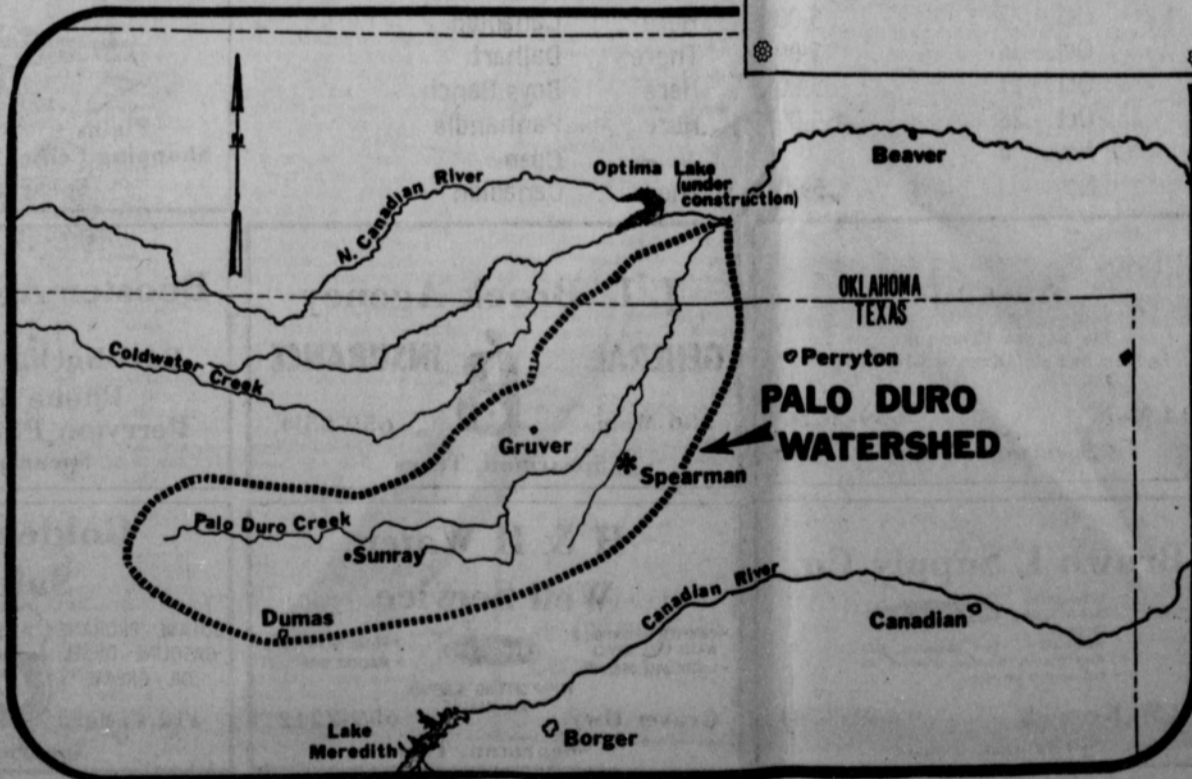
Western Gift Store now open in Spearman

A public meeting to present background information on studies which have been started by the Tulsa District Corps of Engineers on Palo Duro Creek, a tributary of the North Canadian River, will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 22, at the Spearman High School Auditorium in Spearman, Texas.

The activities initiated this year in the Palo Duro watershed located in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles include water supply and hydrology investigations, a flood plain economic inventory, and an environmental profile. Fiscal year 1977 studies will cover ground water inventories, and irrigation and recreation needs.

The Palo Duro Creek investigations are part of a Corps study of the Canadian River Basin to develop long-range water and related land resource management and development plans for the future. The basin study will include investigations of flood control, water supply, irrigation, recreation, water quality, bank stabilization, power, and other water resource problems and needs.

The Palo Duro Creek presentation of Col. Anthony A. Smith, Tulsa District Engineer, will be followed by discussion, when interested persons will be given an opportunity to express their views, ask questions, and furnish information on items of concern.

"We want the plans that result from the investigation to meet public needs and preferences," Col. Smith said. "We need to hear the desires of citizens who live in Palo Duro watershed in order that we may conduct our planning efforts with their objectives in mind."

Cattle Scabies On Increase

Only one outbreak of cattle scabies--in Nebraska--was reported nationwide during June, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reports. This compares with four outbreaks in June, 1975.

The one outbreak brings to 77 the number of cases found in 10 states during the past 12 months. This is a sharp increase over the 45 cases in the previous 12 months.

The Nebraska case was in Fillmore County. According to officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), quarantines have been placed on affected

premises. The quarantines will not be lifted until such cattle are treated with permitted pesticides under federal or state supervision and found free of scabies mite infestations.

APHIS officials said scabies outbreaks cannot be prevented without the help of ranchers. Cattlemen are urged to check their stock regularly and report suspected scabies to their veterinarians, or federal or state animal health officials. Symptoms of the disease include constant tail switching, scratching, scabby sores, rubbing against objects, and hair patches on fences.

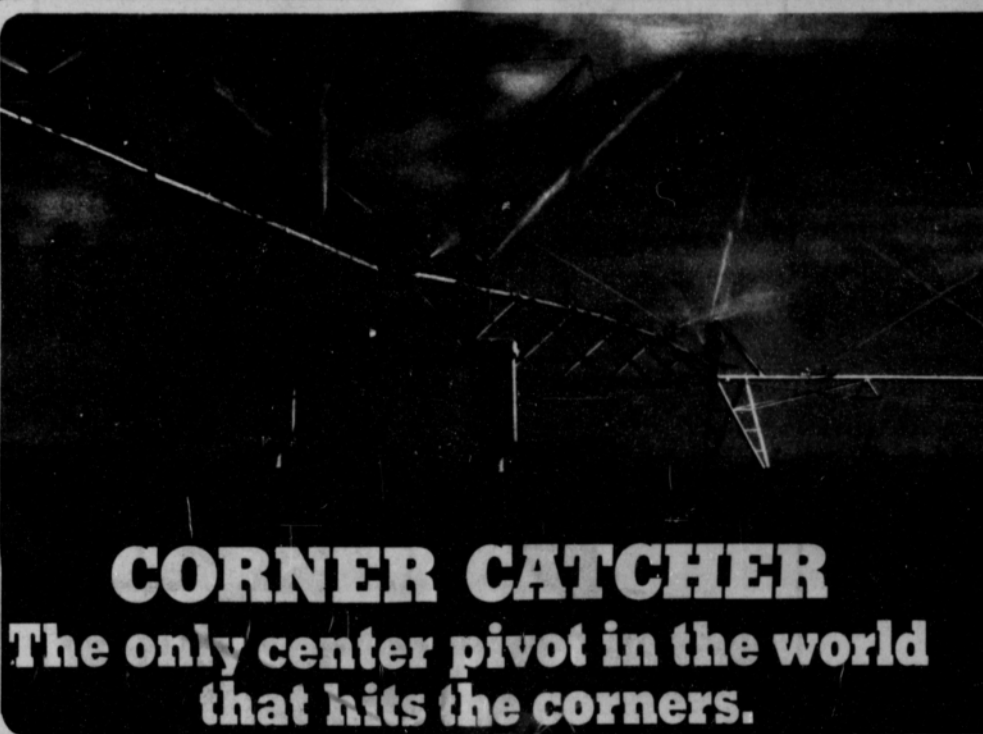

Olympiad Set This Week



The games of the XXI Olympiad are slated to begin this coming Saturday, July 17 and will last until August 1 in Montreal, Canada (if the present difficulties over the entry of certain athletes can be resolved).

The original Olympic games were held in the sacred valley of Olympia on the Eastern Coast of Greece as a festival dedicated to the god Zeus. The Games were revived in the modern era through the efforts of Baron Pierre de Coubertin, who believed that amateur sports as a common denominator would contribute to the international good will.

The first modern Games were held in Athens in 1896 and have been continued every four years except in times of world wars. Twenty-three sports comprise the 1976 Olympic Games program including archery, cycling, equestrian, fencing, gymnastics, judo team handball, field hockey, modern pentathlon, rowing, shooting, soccer, swimming, diving, water pool, wrestling, volleyball, weightlifting, and yachting.

The United States has been an enthusiastic leader in the Olympic Movement from the beginning. Dur-

ing the 20 Olympiads since James B. Connolly won the first gold medal ever awarded in The Modern Olympic Games in the triple jump in 1896, the United States has won 1,368 medals, twice as many as any other nation.

In 1972, the United States sent 431 athletes to the XX Olympiad at Munich, Germany where American gold medalists included Swimmer, Mark Spitz; runner Dave Wottle; and marathon victor Frank Shorter who gave the United States its first victory in 64 years.

The United States Olympic Team members are supported through the generosity of its citizens with Government subsidy in any form being neither sought nor received.

Panhandle Eastern Customers may be especially interested in talking with Mr. Harris regarding their new gas contracts for the coming fiscal year. According to Mr. Harris, the cover letter sent to these customers did not explain that farmers can negotiate quotas upward. Since the contracts do not have to be signed until August

1, customers may want to talk to Mr. Harris before signing them.

Also being discussed at this meeting will be current Federal Power Commission proceedings and the recent clarification of the weakening El Paso decision weakening the Priority 2 status. This leaves irrigators with limited, short term relief.
