May futures at \$2.96 bushel . . .

Cash wheat price at higher market level

There's a brightening horizon in Hansford county as economic indicators are beginning to show a firm move upward in futures trading. Where it will lead is anyone's guess at the moment, as any well-versed commodities trader well knows, but the upward indication in the marketplace has anticipations running cautiously optimistic.

Futures trading on the big board in Chicago had July wheat closing at \$2.96 a bushel on the strength of a reported 4-million metric ton contract between the United States and Russia.

Almost 1-million metric tons of the staple product is already on its way to the Soviet block.

Cash cattle prices remained firm for the fourth straight week this week with some fat cattle being sold in the \$72.50 to \$73.50 range. The futures market here posted a loss, however, in anticipation of greater numbers of cattle being placed in feed lots.

Where's the new 65 mph speed limit?

If you're looking for the new 65 mph speed limit signs, then travel some 120 miles southwest to Amarillo and take I-40 east or west. Then it's 65 all the way to Tucumcari or Oklahoma City.

If that's too much of a bother, then settle back and continue to enjoy the 55 mph speed limits in the bulk of the Texas Panhandle area. Any faster and you could be courting the highway patrol.

The new 65 mph speed limit which went into effect this past Saturday affects only rural interstate highways -- those designated with the letter "T". And the Panhandle of Texas has a serious shortage of interstate designation.

All other highways in Texas still carry the 55 mph speed limit and the Texas Highway Patrol is cautioning Texas drivers to watch their speed as driving in excess of the 55 mph limit will result in a speeding ticket.

Pat Dear, Billy Miller honored . . .

Awards given by Spearman CofC

Pat Dear and Billy Miller were given special recognition at the Spearman chamber of commerce's membership breakfast with Mrs. Dear receiving the Small Business of the Year award and Miller -- former owner-publisher of the Plainsman -- being given a special Appreciation plaque for his community service work over the years.

Mrs. Dear is the owner-operator of the Bunkhouse and was singled out from the list of Spearman businesses for the singular honor.

Voting for the Small Business of the Year award was done by Spearman individuals and businesses during a 4-day balloting this past week in the chamber offices.

"I'm nearly to small too qualify (for the award)", Mrs. Dear jokingly declared in receiving the award. "I truly appreciate this and it is an honor."

The Spearman businesswoman has operated the clothing store for almost 15 years and is active in the chamber where she serves as committee head for the Existing Business committee.

In presenting the Appreciation plaque to Miller, chamber president Bill Pittman notes, "This plaque is in appreciation for his outstanding community service to Spearman and Hansford county."

The June fat cattle futures had fallen to around \$67 by market close Thursday as traders awaited official word on the number of cattle on feed across the nation.

That could change abruptly, however, depending upon the statistics which were scheduled to be released after press time Friday.

"A lot of time the market will move because of the attitude of the people involved," notes Charles Shieldknight head of AGCO of Spearman. "I think the most important thing right now is that attitudes have changed."

Those changed attitudes are becoming evident in the market place as a wave of optimism begins to sweep across the nation.

"We've seen our local markets come from \$2 or less a bushel up to \$2.60 - \$2.65 a bushel," notes Carl Archer, owner of Speartex Grain Company.

Most grain and cattle men remain cautiously optimistic, however, when it comes to the commodity futures market.

"It's a little worse than throwing dice in Las Vegas, the long-time Hansford grain businessman notes.

"But it looks like it might hold for awhile."

With some 160,000 acres of wheat expected to be cut in Hansford county this summer, the rise in cash grain prices translates into needed dollars for an industry which has been depressed since the early 1980's.

Hansford county ranked first in the state in wheat production in 1985 with some 7.6 million bushels of grain cut. Production was down in 1986 with 4.8 million bushels of wheat cut, but Hansford still ranked second for the Texas wheat crop.

"It's still too early to speculate on production for this year," reports county extension agent, Burt Williams. "Nationwide they're talking about a two percent difference for this year."

At this point it has to be ranked as optimistic speculation, but with the current increase in the cash grain market, the 60-cent upward move could mean anywhere from \$2 to \$4 million in extra revenue for Hansford farmers in 1987.

"We really won't know anything until the grain is harvested and in the elevators," cautions Shieldknight.

C.A. Gibner endowment memorial established by Spearman CofC

A memorial scholarship endowment in the memory of C.A. Gibner has been initiated by the Spearman chamber of commerce, reports chamber president Bill Pittman.

The endowment will be funded by donations from the community and the first scholarship award is expected to go to a graduating Spearman senior from the class of 1988.

"The funds will come from Clay's friends, customers, fellow bankers and anyone who wishes to honor and perpetuate Clay's name and reputation," notes Pittman.

Mr. Gibner, a long-time

Hansford banker, died April 26. Donations to the special scholarship endowment will be tax deductible, reports the chamber president.

"The purpose of the scholarship is to continue the work that Clay did throughout his long service to Hansford county in helping financially those who need it," declares Pittman. "Also, it is to perpetuate his name and reputation for future generations."

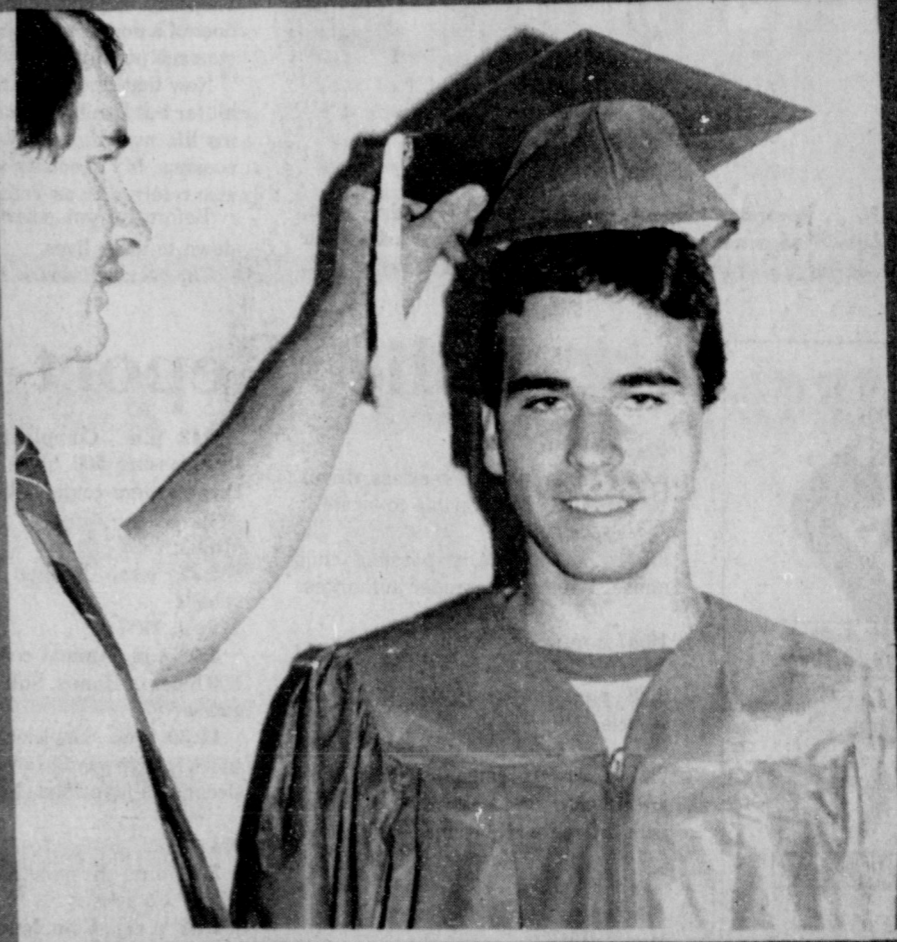
Contributions to the endowment fund can be made either at the Spearman chamber of commerce or the First State Bank in Spearman.

A former Gruver resident was arraigned Friday before Hansford J. P. Pete Vernon, and bond was set at \$5,000 in connection with a pair of burglaries in Gruver last March.

Phillip Paul Walters is being held in Hansford county jail on burglary charges stemming from the March 31 break-ins of Gruver Lumber Company and G&G Foodliner in Gruver.

The Hansford prisoner is one of three men who are alleged to have broken in to the two Gruver businesses. Walters was brought to Hansford Sheriff R. L. McFarlin from Vega where the other two remain in custody.

Brian Edward Bingham and James Wesley Barron, both of Amarillo, remain in the custody of Vega officials following their arrest there on similar charges.

Walters was brought back first for questioning surrounding these burglaries and others, reports the Hansford sheriff.

Spearman pool opens June 1

The first swim day of the 1987 summer season is scheduled for Monday, June 1, reports the Hansford Y -- operators of the municipally-owned facility.

Hours for the pool will be ladies only from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays and to the public from 1 to 5 each afternoon except Sundays when the pool will open from 2 to 5.

Teen night will be each Tuesday evening from 8 to 10 o'clock and family night swims will be each Thursday during that same time period.

The pool can be rented at any other time for \$25 per hour.

Fees for the pool remain unchanged from last year with children 12 and under admitted for \$1 per session, youth from 12 to 18-years old will be charged \$1.50 and adults, \$2.

Season passes are available at a cost of \$40 for 12 and under, \$50 for 12-18 and \$60 for adult. Family season pass cost will be \$150.

COMMENTS

OPEC's successful four-month campaign to restrain crude oil production is increasing confidence within the oil industry that the wild price swings of 1986 are a thing of the past.

The Wall Street Journal reports a growing number of industry officials

are convinced that oil will remain at \$18 a barrel or more in the months ahead. This increasing confidence is reflected in the crude oil futures market, where prices for West Texas Intermediate have risen to about \$19 per barrel for most delivery months.

Despite the higher prices of recent weeks, U.S. oil operators polled by the Journal say they do not plan to resume domestic exploration until oil sells for at least \$25 a barrel.

T. Boone Pickens, Jr., general partnership of Mesa Limited partnership, projects that crude oil prices will reach \$22 to \$24 per barrel by early 1988 and \$26 to \$28 per barrel by early 1989. Even at those prices, Pickens doubts that the domestic rig count will top 2,000 -- less than half the 1981 record of 4,500 rigs.

Band nominees sought for Sea World

Nominations of outstanding high school musicians are being sought from more than 1,000 Texas high school bandmasters for the new Sea World of Texas All-Star Marching Band. The deadline for nominations is Saturday, May 23.

The elite, 104-member ensemble, to be comprised of 14 to 18-year-old musicians, will represent Sea World of Texas at four major events in the coming year.

Performances commence in Dallas with the State Fair of Texas Oct. 10-11 and include an appearance at the May 23, 1988 grand opening of the newest Sea World park, now under construction in San Antonio.

The All-Star Marching band also will perform at the Cotton Bowl Parade in Dallas (Jan. 1, 1988) and the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Parade (Feb. 20, 1988).

"The Sea World of Texas All-Star Marching band will be an ongoing musical organization, dedicated to the highest standards of concert and

Marching performance," said Lynn Gillam, vice president of entertainment for Sea World. "Band members will have the opportunity to play under the direction of nationally renowned musicians and conductors. They will serve as musical ambassadors for what will be the world's largest marine life, family entertainment park."

The program has been reviewed by both the University Interscholastic League and an advisory board of eminent Texas educators. The band's performance schedule has been structured to minimize school disruptions and maximize musical training.

Members of the advisory board include Al Sturchio, manager, Sea World of Texas All-Star Marching Band, and executive secretary of the Texas Bandmasters Association (TBA) San Antonio; Bob West, supervisor of music, Klein Independent School District, Houston; Robert McElroy, vice president, band division, Texas Music Educators Association, Austin; and

Richard Floyd, director of music ties, University Interscholastic League, Austin, who serves on the board as an ex-officio member.

Sturchio brings to the Sea World program more than 30 years' experience in elementary and secondary music education. Prior to his affiliation with TBA, Sturchio was an instructional officer of fine arts for San Antonio's North East Independent School District.

Nomination/application packets were mailed to high school band directors May 1. Each director is allowed to nominate one student in each of three categories: woodwinds, brass and percussion. Also, band directors who have an exceptional drum major may include that student as a fourth nomination.

Nominated students then complete and mail application materials by May 23 to Sea World in San Antonio.

Nominations will be screened by the Sea World band staff. Selected students will be invited by mail for an interview and live audition to be held at regional sites during June. The band's first rehearsals are scheduled for Labor Day weekend.

Fifty alternate musicians and two alternate drum majors will support the band on special occasions.

Sturchio stressed that students first must be nominated by their band director. He added that all applicants must be Texas residents and be at least 14, but less than 19 years of age on Sept. 1, 1987. Sturchio said musical ability will be the principal selection requirement, with good marching and instrument doubling abilities an asset.

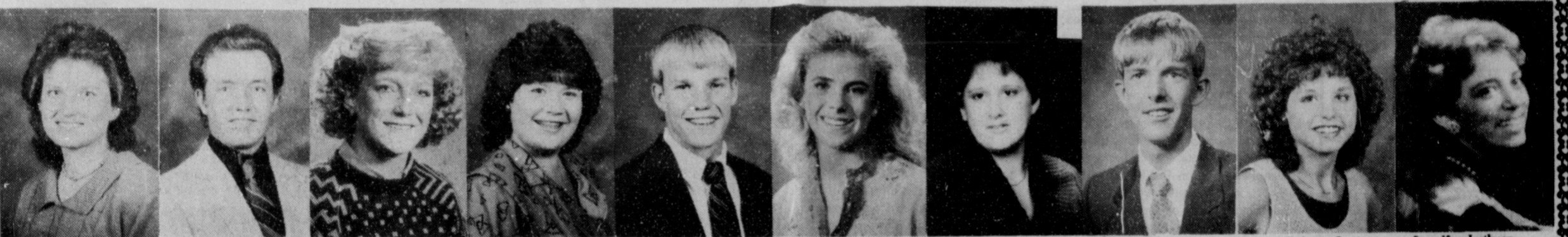

For recreation, the entire Nelson family enjoys their skiing trips. Dennis also plays bridge.

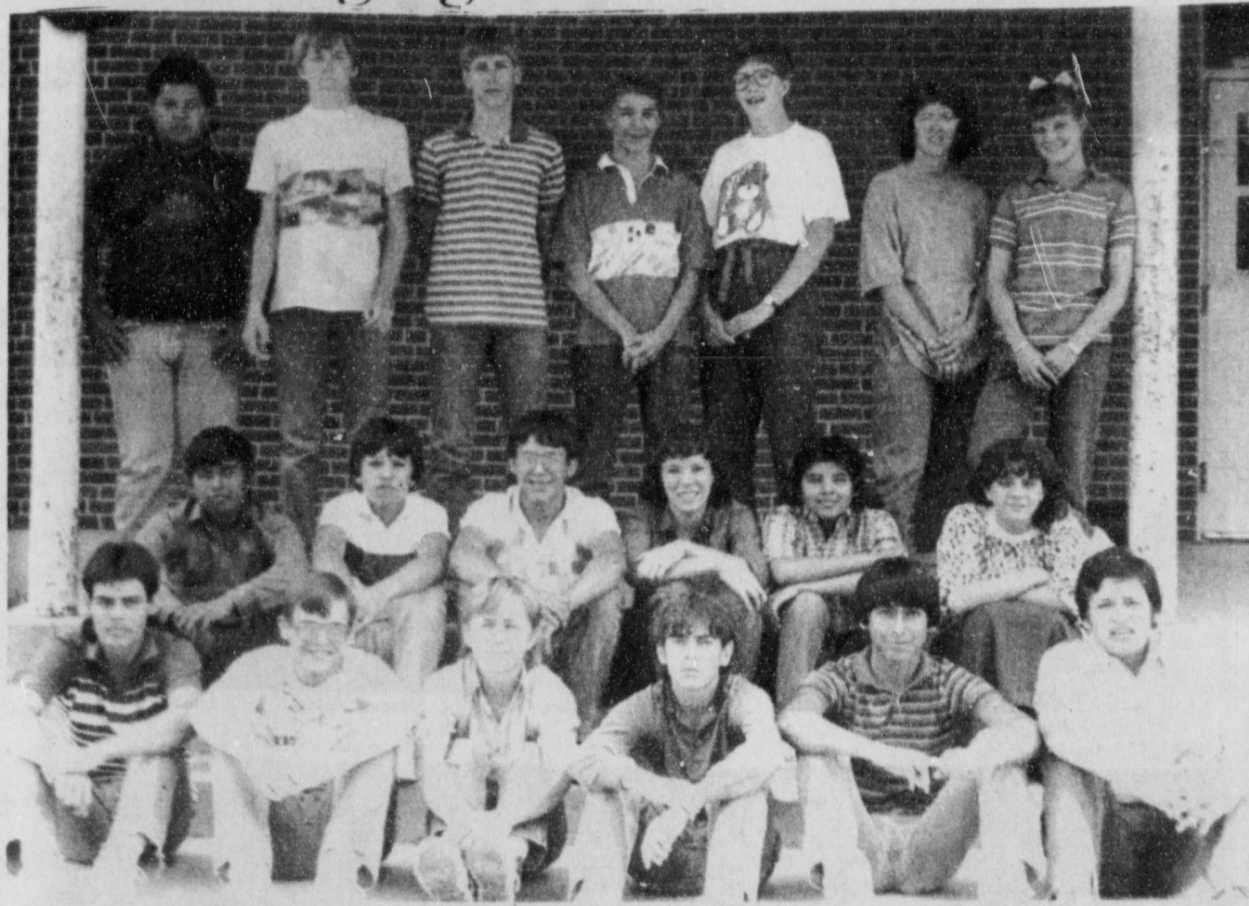
Judy takes pride in making careful selections of merchandise when she goes to market; being aware that the ladies and girls of this area are fashion-conscious and fastidious about their appearance.
