The first of two "Town Hall" panel discussions on drug and alcohol problems will be held in Spearman Thursday, November 17. after viewing a special videotape of THE CHEMICAL PEOPLE, at the High School Auditorium.

> A cooperative effort of the Spearman Lions Club, Morse Lions Club, Spearman Ministerial Alliance, Pringle-Morse P.T.A., the County Judge's Office, and Spearman Independent School District, the session will help the community understand the use and abuse of drugs.

Rich Melton, chairman of the Hansford County task force to organize the town meeting discussion, points out that the telecast has aired on Amarillo's Channel 7 on November 3, but too many local conflicts prevented our community to schedule meetings for that date. "November 17 will work much better," Melton says.

Videotape players and screens will be in the High School Auditorium for viewing the film. Afterwards, there will be a panel discussion led by Betty Womble of Morse. Panel members will include Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, Chief of Police D.J. Alberts, Dr. David McClellan, Rev. Bill Schardin of Faith Lutheran Church, Eddy Clemmons. Principal of SHS, students

Kim Nelson, Cinda Novak, and concerned parent Loretta Cook.

The second of the two-part nationwide and community-wide program will be the following evening, November 18, and is designed to motivate organization of groups to deal with drug and alcohol problems in their own communities, notes Melton.

Again, tape players and screens will be provided in the school auditorium for viewing the program on November 18.

Melton encourages parents, teachers, and students, especially teenagers, to participate in the two special programs.

"We want to involve as many as we can. Admission is free, and we hope to fill the auditorium." declares Melton.

A hope to improve facilities

City Councilmen moved a step closer in their efforts to expand and improve softball and youth facilities, a joint city-Spearman Jaycees project during a regular council session Tuesday night.

The aldermen first held a public hearing on the City's proposed grant application to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for matching funds to construct the new facilities and expand and improve present ones. There were no local visitors present to voice opin-

ions on the grant application, but City Secretary Jim Murray and Gary N. Haner and David Spell of West Texas Consultants explained how some of the grant money would be used, if obtained. West Texas Consultants, an Odessa based consulting firm of engineers. planners and surveyors, will prepare the grant application for the city.

Murray said some of the money would be used to reconstruct the outfield fences to make the present Little

League park and the present nearby softball diamond both confirm to regulation softball park specifications, yet could also be used for Babe Ruth League games.

Another expense would be the necessary moving of light standards presently behind these fences, the laying of underground cable, a Texas Parks and Wildlife requirement, if grant money from this department is to be used.

Under the plan, first proposed to the councilmen a previous session by Jaycee President Mike Cudd, the Jaycees would deed the ballpark property back to the city, so the city can claim the property as its in kind match of the state grant money. Therefore, the city would have to spend very little money, if any, on the project, yet fullfill the state "match" requirements.

Murray told the councilmen the Jaycees have agreed to be responsible for moving the



turkey from last year. Shoppers will find plenty of turkey in the stores, but prices will vary significantly between different types of turkey products--plain whole turkey, self-basted store brands and

self-basted national brands. Economy and tradition aren't the only reason that the average American consumes about 11 pounds of turkey per year. Turkey is one of the best high-nutrition, low-calorie

foods around. Roasted dark turkey meat contains 30 percent protein, 8.3 percent fat and 203 calories for a 100-gram serving, which

is just under a quarter-pound. Roasted light meat contains 32.9 percent protein, 3.9 percent fat and only 176 calories per serving.

When shopping for a turkey, look first for the white, circular USDA inspection mark located on the package. This mark assures that the processing was done under sanitary con-

The designation of a grade on turkeys is not mandatory, but a high percentage do have

a USDA grade mark. Most turkeys sold at retail are Grade A turkeys. Some stores also have Grade B turkeys and a few may package Grade C turkeys. Don't hesitate to buy a grade B or C turkey when they are available. The price will be lower, and the factor that

management for large or small families. Dieters should select freshdressed or frozen plain turkey. Pre-basted frozen turkeys have more calories and usually cost more. Those on saltrestricted diets should also avoid pre-basted or processed turkey, since salt is added to

preserve the meat and enhance flavor.
