8.50 inches of rain West of Spearman



Spearman received one of the best rains in the history of Hansford County Wednesday of this week. A heavy shower moved through Spearman at 3 p.m. Wednesday dropping .25 moisture in the city limits. Three miles north of Spearman and on into Waka it rained nearly two inches at this time. Also, R.C. Porter, who farms

4 miles southwest of Spearman received 1.90 in this early downpour. Another shower fell in Spearman after 5 p.m. and this shower totaled .65 bringing the total rain to .90 in Spearman. From 6 p.m. on until 8 a.m. Thursday morning Spearman received 3.10 inches by our official Reporter rain gauge. Gruver received over two inches.

Mother Nature, however went on a rampage 3 miles west of Spearman as she dumped 8.50 inches of rain on the Reynolds farm. Also, between Spearman and Gruver, Omar Cotter 5 miles west of Spearman, reported 5 inches of rain. Oscar Donnell reported 6 inches of rain at old Hansford. Needless to say, Hansford County

received an ample supply of rain. Discouraging to Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties, was only a .24 rainfall.

The heavy downpour created several problems in the area. The golf course road was inundated for approximately 1 mile. A highway department truck stood by to assist stranded drivers who were going to

the golf course Thursday. The golf course lake ran over and baked up some 6 to 8 feet on the back side of the dam. After running on the golf course dam the water almost took out the bridge south of Carter Crawford's home.

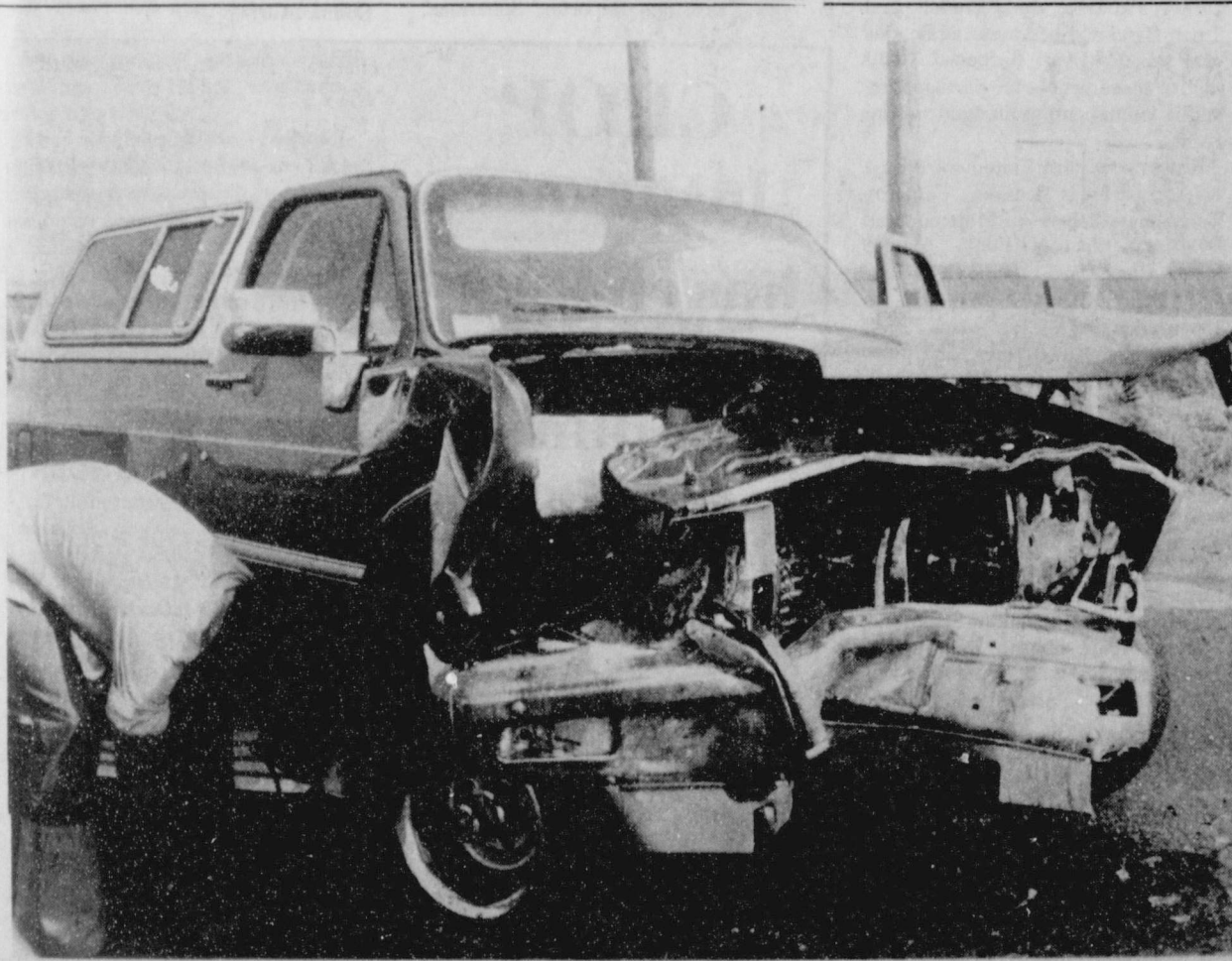
Sheriff's officers report water across the highway in many areas. Also a near drowned skunk float-

ed into town and was discovered in the Permian yard. He soon regained his bearings and went back west where he had come from.

Panhandle police and sheriff dispatchers report 4 inches in Spearman, 3 inches in Dalhart, 2 inches in Vega, and 1.15 inches in Miami.

For an informal time of sharing, there will be an After-Glow Monday thru Wednesday evenings following the worship services. These will be held in various homes announced each evening.

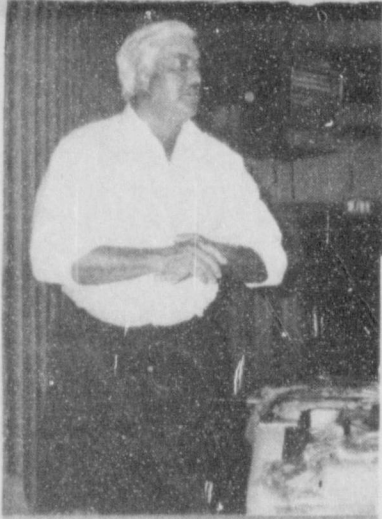

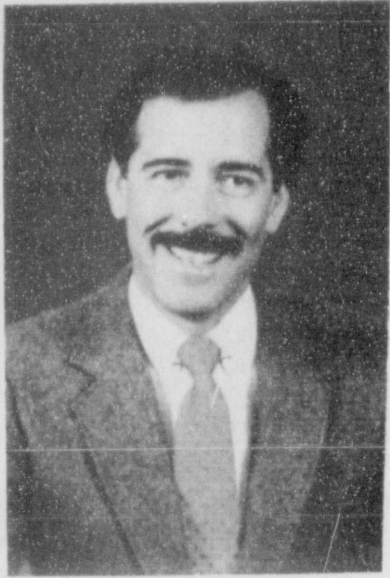
EDWARD DEAR

Jimmy Alexander at Union Church

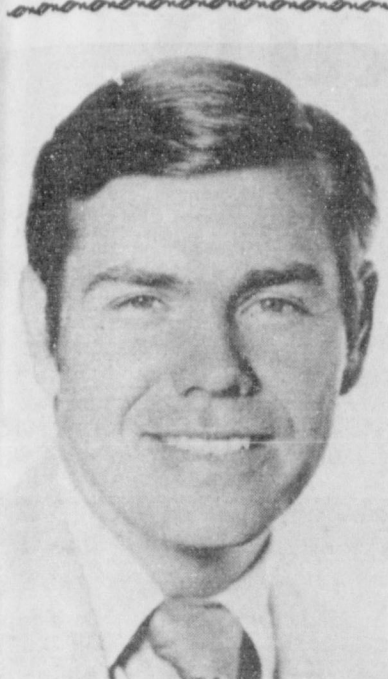

The Sagen Family

Chris Sagen and his wife Symeva, emigrated from Norway to Wisconsin where their children were born. Peter was born in 1873, Ida 1880, Mathilde 1888 and Hannah 1895. Peter married Galena Shirley. Their children were Chalmer, born 1900 and Pearl, born 1903 in Wisconsin. Lawrence was born 1905 in South Dakota. In 1909 the Sagen families and Galena's mother, Martha Shirley, moved to the new community of Oslo in Hansford County, Texas.

Chris Sagen bought land about three miles southwest of the Oslo church. Peter bought land just south of the church. Their youngest child, Alvin, was born in August 1910 in their new home. He was the second baby to be baptized in the church.

Galena Sagen was critically injured in a run-away horse and carriage accident in Guymon, Oklahoma in 1911. She died from those injuries in October, 1912 and was the first person to be buried in the Oslo Cemetery.

The thirty-eight inch copper bell

was cast in Sweden, purchased by Martha Shirley and given to the Oslo Church in memory of her daughter, Galena. It was installed in the new white church in 1913. When the new stone church was built in 1949, the bell was moved to the new bell tower. When the church burned in February 1950, the tower and bell were saved by firefighters from surrounding towns. This bell is rung every Sunday and at special events. For funerals, it is tolled once for each year the deceased lived.

Peter Sagen and his four children moved to Wisconsin in 1914. The Alvin Sagen story is in the Hansford County History Book I.

Alvin, a returned Commander in the U.S. Navy, and his wife Mary live in Venice, Florida. They corresponded with Bill and Joyce Johnson and in June 1983, they visited the Oslo community to see Alvin's mother's grave and the bell his grandmother had given in her memory. He never got to see the white frame church that his father and grandfather helped build. Alvin and Bill climbed up in the bell tower and located the inscription on the bell.

Myths about nutrition abound

Old beliefs die hard, especially when it comes to eating. Over the years, many people have accumulated myths about food and eating habits from their families, from what they read or from their own experiences. Here are some popular myths and the facts about each: **MYTH: It is impossible to lose weight if you travel or eat out frequently.** FACT: Meal options approved by the American Heart Association can be found in some restaurants, hotels and even airplanes, to reduce portion size, choose appetizers as the main course, order a la carte or share food with a companion. Order dressings and sauces on the side, look for terms on the menu that signify low-fat preparation, such as steamed, poached and broiled. Avoid foods that are buttery, buttered, fried, creamed, 'in its own gravy' or in hollandaise or cream sauce. Ask for low-fat and non-fat dairy products and margarine instead of butter. Trim visible fat from meat and remove skin from poultry.

MYTH: Overweight individuals eat more because they are hungrier. FACT: People who are overweight begin with the same appetite as those who are not overweight. Overeating may come from a genetic hormone disorder, but most overweight individuals eat out of habit or psychological need. **MYTH: Carbohydrates should be avoided, especially if you are trying to lose weight, because they are high in calories.** FACT: Not all foods high in carbohydrates are high in calories. Complex carbohydrates, found in vegetables, beans, cereals and some fruits, contain essential nutrients with the calories. Simple carbohydrates found in refined sugars contain primarily calories, no nutrients. **MYTH: Non dairy creamers are better for your health than cream.** FACT: Although the American Heart Association recommends using low-fat and non-fat foods rather than whole dairy products, beware of most imitation dairy products, including nondairy creamer. Many of these contain coconut oil, a highly saturated

fat, as substitute for butterfat. **MYTH: All vegetable oils are unsaturated. Certain vegetable oils, such as palm and coconut oil are high in saturated fats. You will find these primarily in commercially baked goods, cookies and candies.** **MYTH: Children can eat what they want because they are unaffected by the dangers of atherosclerosis.** FACT: Dietary changes begun in childhood and maintained for a lifetime may reduce the risk of heart disease, since atherosclerosis (a buildup of cholesterol and other fats in the arteries) often benefits in youth and progress through young adulthood. It also seems that minimal or 'early' atherosclerosis, expected in younger patients, may be more likely to regress than advanced disease would. 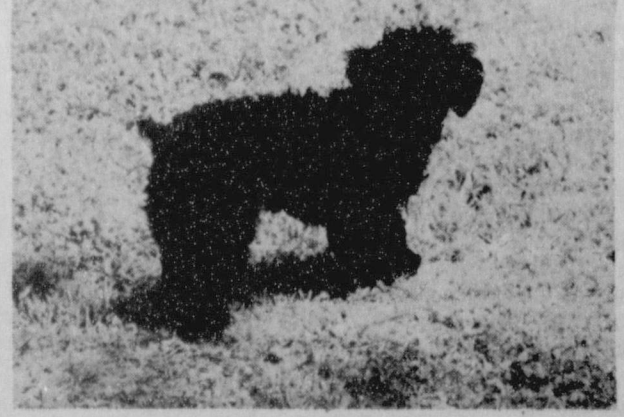

PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 1985

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

propriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

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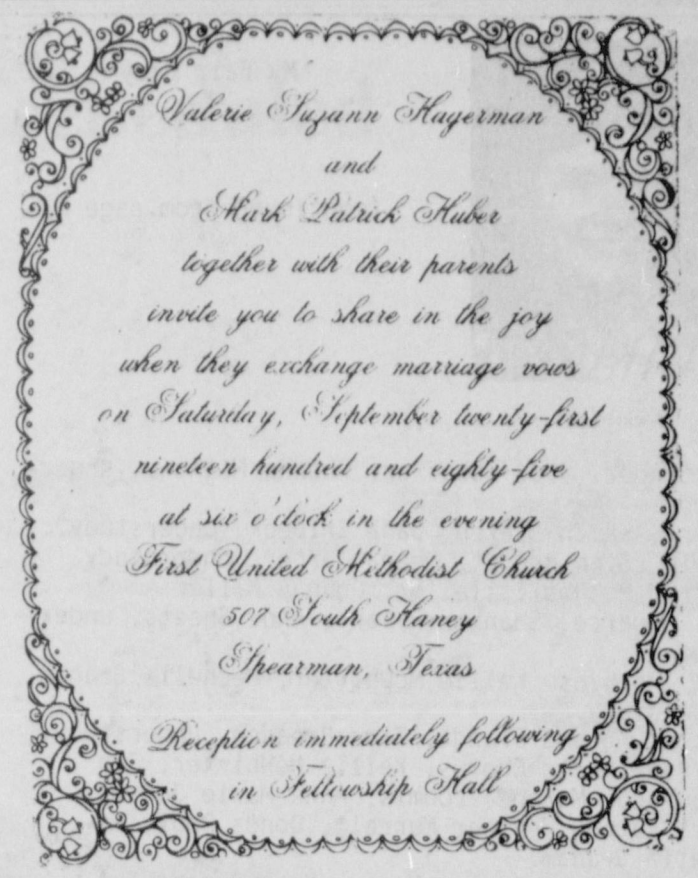

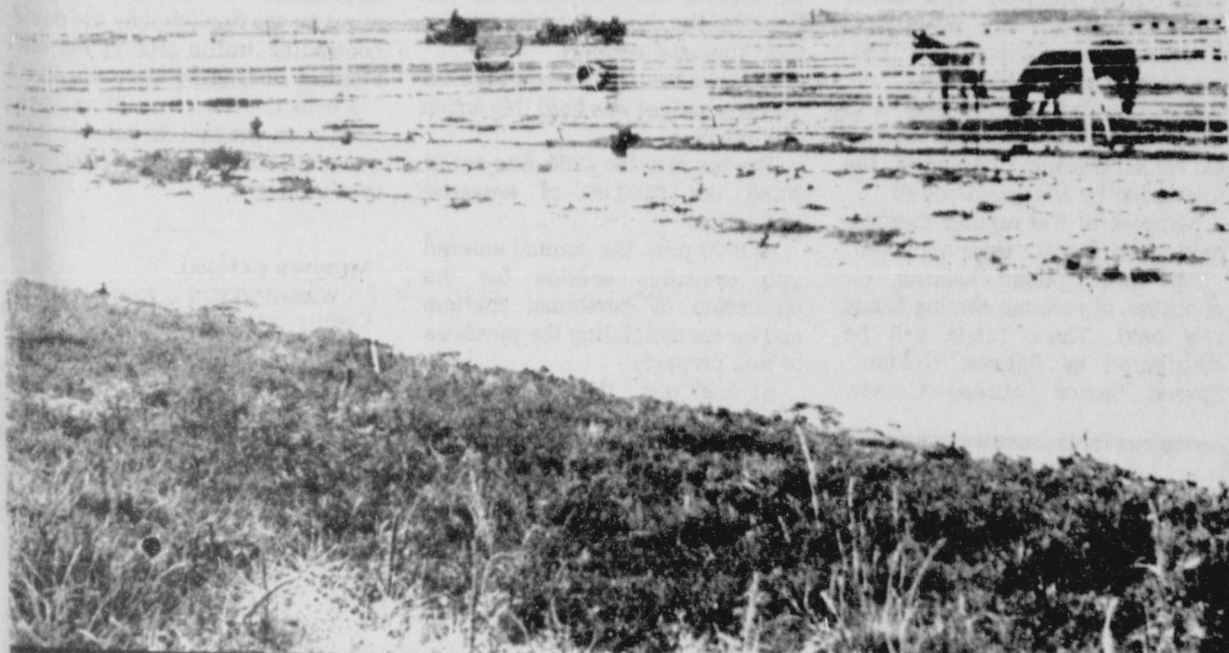

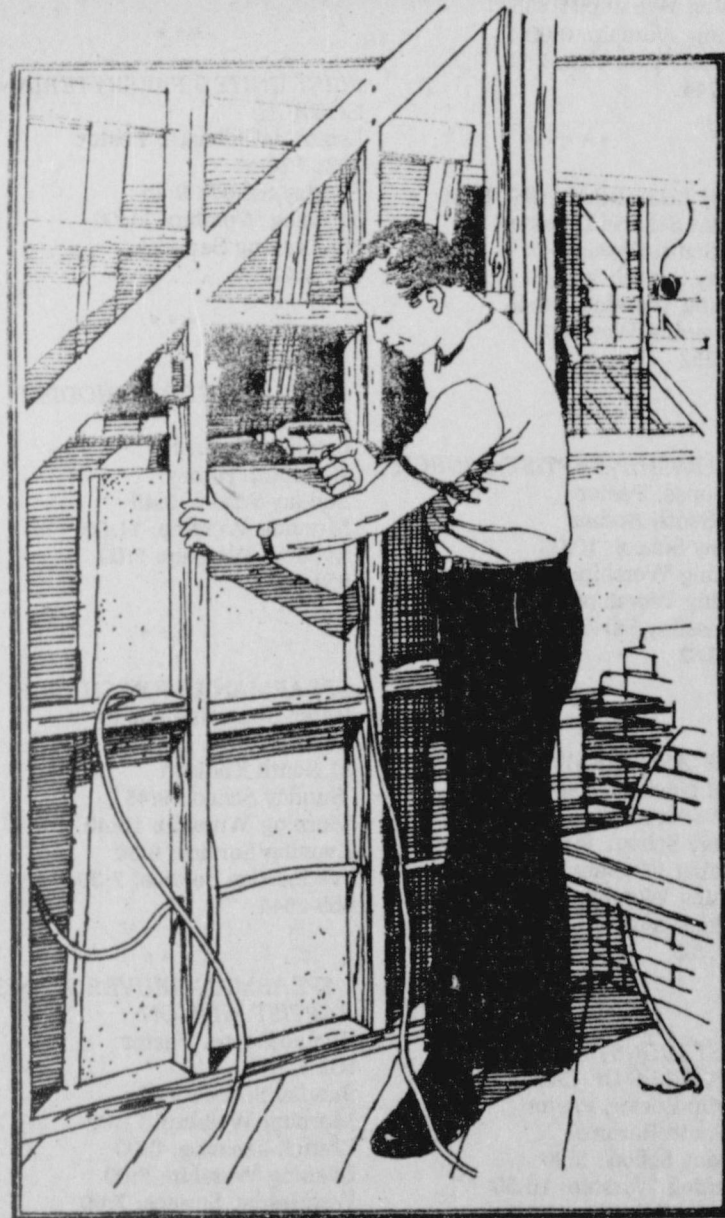

The city council of the City of Spearman, Texas, met in regular session in council chambers of City Hall on Sept. 10, 1985 with Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett presiding. Alermen present were Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Burl Buchanan, and Mike Cudd. Staff present were Jim Murray, city manager, Charlotte Sheets, city secretary, D.J. Alberts, police chief, Ron Antalek, fire chief, Timothy Zeiger, city attorney, Kevin Glover, city engineer. Visitor present was Helen Boyd.

The meeting was opened with the pledge of allegiance to our flag led by Ed Garner, followed by the invocation by Maryor Blodgett.

Minutes of the regular meeting held on August 27 were approved.

The final public hearing for allocation of revenue sharing funds was held. These funds will be distributed as follows: Golden Spread Senior Citizens Center,

\$5000.00; Station Master's House Museum, \$2,000.00; Health & Sanitation Department: Equipment - \$24,000.00; Gas department: equipment \$3,400.00; H & H EMS; Equipment \$1,200.00; Fire Department; Equipment \$4,400.00; Health & Sanitation Land & Betterments - \$5,000.00.

Helen Boyd of the Station Master's House Museum was present to express her appreciation on behalf of the museum to the city for their financial support.

A public hearing on the proposed 1985-86 budget was held. No action was taken.

The tax rate for 1985 was set at \$0.68 per \$100.00 of assessed evaluation.

At 8:20 p.m. the council entered into executive session for the discussion of personnel matters and for contemplating the purchase of real property.

At 9:20 p.m. the meeting was

reopened and it was reported that no action was taken.

The monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports were presented, and unanimously approved.

Monthly bills payable in the amount of \$628,464.36 were approved and current cash position presented.

Alderman Cudd expressed his appreciation to the Police Department for the fine job they are doing controlling traffic around the elementary and junior high school.

Kevin Glover, consulting engineer, was present to answer any questions concerning the 1985 seal-coat project.

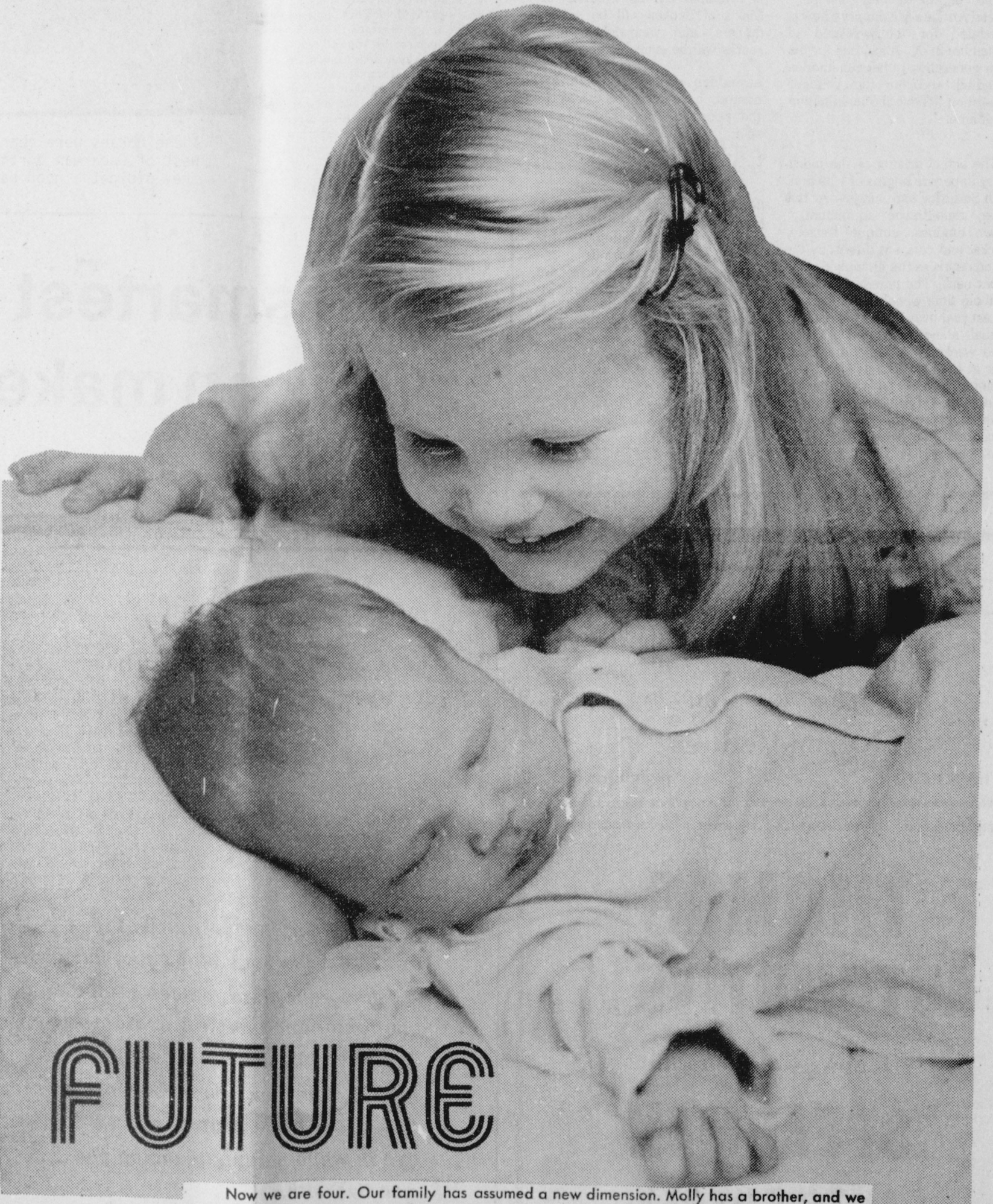
