## City Has Special Meeting

The City Council of Spearman, Texas met in a special city council meeting June 3, 1976 at 10:00 A.M. in the council chamber of the city hall for the purpose of discussion with Dr. Stan Abrams concerning an incident involving a city patrolman. It was deemed an urgent public necessity that these matters be discussed on this date in order to further the public welfare of the citizens of the City of Spearman.

The incident consisted of a roadblock set up by Sergeant Wayne Maynard of the Spearman Police Department, and the subsequent shooting of the tire of Dr. Stan Abrams.

At the time of the incident, Sergeant Maynard had been in pursuit of a stolen vehicle from inside the city of Spearman on Highway 15 west toward Gruver. Sergeant Maynard had radioed ahead to Gruver Chief of Police Jimmy Ratliff, asking him to set up a roadblock ahead of the vehicle which was westbound on Highway 15. Ratliff attempted to get a shot at the vehicle tire, but was unable to.

The subject's vehicle then turned north on Highway 207 to Guymon. At this time Officer Ratliff and Sgt. Maynard, were in radio contact. Sgt. Maynard radioed to Off. Ratliff and asked if the vehicle in question had turned on him. Ratliff stated yes. (Meaning turning on Hwy 207 North). Sgt. Maynard took this as meaning the vehicle had made a U turn and was heading back towards him. So with only a few moments notice Sgt. Maynard stopped his patrol car in the right lane with wheels slightly over in the left hand lane. Sgt. Maynard then stated that he lift his patrol car with his lights flashing, went to the left rear side of his car to, not only observe the oncoming car, but also to be able to use the back of the patrolcar for an arm rest in case he had to fire his handgun in order to stop the approaching vehicle.

Sgt. Maynard stated that he picked out a point in the road ahead to fire if the car continued past this point. (Approximately 50 feet from the patrol car) This distance was chosen to shoot the right hand tire out to prevent the

car from continuing on and to stop the vehicle with the most safety to the lives of the person or persons in the car, to keep the car from crashing into his car, and his own personal safety.

After the car had passed this point, Sgt. Maynard fired hitting the right front tire of the vehicle which at this distance, Sgt. Maynard estimated the vehicle to be traveling at approximately 50-55 miles per hour.

Dr. Abrams stated that he had observed the patrol car in the west-bound lane and had started to slow his car at approximately 3 car lengths from the patrol car (It was approximately at this point that Sgt. Maynard had shot the tire, unknown to Dr. Abrams.) so by the time that he was next to the patrol car he was traveling from 20-30 miles an hour and was unable to see anyone. He pulled to the shoulder of the road and started around the patrol car. At this time his wife said that she believed their tire had been shot! He proceeded to stop at this time. Sgt. Maynard, realizing he had the wrong vehicle, pulled behind the vehicle to check on the safety of the occupants...

Both Sgt. Maynard and Dr. Abrams agreed that the Abrams vehicle was not traveling "at a high rate of speed", as was reported in a local news release the following day.

showmanship preliminaries beginning at 4:00 p.m. at the WTSU Nance Ranch. Later that same evening the Texas Hereford Auxiliary will host an ice cream supper at the Villa Inn in Amarillo.

Thursday activity kicks off at 8:00 a.m. with the registration of contestants and a special attraction in the form of entertainment. Following the bi-centennial style opening ceremonies, the remainder of the morning will consist of the showmanship finals, a judging demonstration, judging contest and weight guessing contest. The Panhandle Hereford Breeders, in addition to sponsoring several of the contest awards, will also provide the noon luncheon.

Special guest speaker for this year's event will be Lori Longacre, American Junior Hereford Association Director, Eureka, Ks. Other special awards include a trophy to the high individual judge and a belt buckle to the high individual judge who is a TJHA member.

Instead of using blankets which could get piled onto a baby's face, put the child in a zippered bag which keeps him warm without blankets.

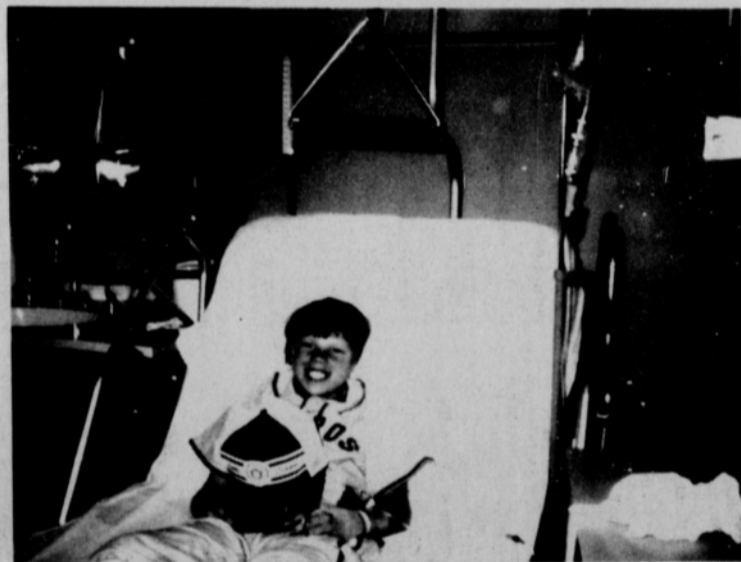

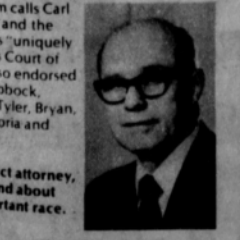
**Get Top Dollars Out Of Irrigation Water**

Bushland, Texas: Research at Texas A&M North Plains Research Field at Etter is showing how to get top dollar out of every inch of irrigation water. If fuel cost continues to increase, wise use of irrigation water will make the difference between success or failure in the farming business according to Dr. John Shipley, Associate Professor and Cecil Reiger, Research Associate with the Texas Agri-

cultural Experiment Station who operate the Etter facility. In a recent two year experiment with grain sorghum, a 5-inch pre-plant irrigation was applied to assure a stand. This was followed by 1, 2, 3 or 4 irrigations at one or more of four sorghum growth stages. States were 6 to 8 leaf about July 4, 6 to 8 leaf about July 25, flowering about August 10, and milk about August 24. All possibilities were tested and there were a total of 16 treatments. Yield results were compared to pre-plant irrigation alone. RS 671 sorghum was planted on May 23 each year. The soil was Sherman silty clay loam and fields were furrow irrigated with 4-inch applications of water. Pre-plant irrigation produced 2100 pounds of grain per acre. Applying one additional irrigation at boot increased the yield to 4100 pounds per acre. If the one irrigation was delayed until flowering, yield was 4000 pounds per acre. "There was not much difference in yield from applying a single post-plant irrigation at either boot or flowering."

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Shipley stated. A single irrigation at the 6 to 8 leaf stage reduced yields 300 pounds per acre compared to preplant only. "This irrigation stimulated forage growth and used water that was needed later to produce grain", the scientist said. Yields were increased to 5400 pounds per acre when two irrigations were applied at both boot and flowering. Applying two irrigations at other stages resulted in less than 4900 pounds of grain per acre. The best combination for 3 irrigations was 6 to 8 leaf, boot and flowering, which yielded 6200 pounds per acre. Three irrigations at boot, flowering or milk stage did well, yielding 6000 pounds of grain per acre. Applying 4 irrigations, or one at each stage, gave a yield of 6800 pounds of grain per acre. "Close analyses of these data show how to get the most grain per acre-inch of irrigation water", Dr. Shipley stated. The first 4 inches of irrigation water applied at the boot stage made 2000 pounds of grain more than the preplant alone, or 500 pounds per acre-inch. The second 4 inches of irrigation water applied at flowering increased yield an additional 1300 pounds per acre, or 325 pounds per acre-inch of water. The third application made 200 pounds per acre-inch and the fourth only 150 pounds of grain per acre-inch. At \$4.00 per hundred, one well-timed irrigation paid \$20.00 per acre-inch. Returns per acre-inch were reduced to \$13.00 with the second irrigations, \$8.00 with the third, and \$6.00 with the fourth irrigation. With fuel price getting higher and higher, good management requires that we be fully aware of the return per acre-inch of water", Shipley stated. "This is especially true if a farmer has plenty of land and a limited water supply."

The two scientists conducted another study to help farmers get more grain per inch of water used. A short season hybrid, RS 626 was planted on May 17 on land that had been preplant irrigated. On July 10, one acreage of RS 626 was irrigated at the boot and 2 weeks later on July 24 a different acreage of RS 626 was irrigated while it was heading. RS 671 a medium late maturity hybrid was planted on June 7 about 3 weeks later than RS 626. It received the boot irrigation on August 7 and a heading irrigation 2 weeks later on August 21. Irrigation water was applied at close to the optimum time for a single post-plant irrigation. In this study, RS 626 irrigated once yielded 4000 pounds the same as in the previous study. RS 671 yielded more and made 4900 pounds of grain per acre. The irrigations were spread over an 8 week period and maximum yield per acre-inch of irrigation water was obtained for all water pumped during the entire irrigation season. In the first study, a pre-plant irrigation yielded 2100 pounds per acre. With RS 626, the increase in yield from the one irrigation averaged 1900 pounds per acre or 475 pounds per acre per acre-inch. With RS 671, the difference between 2100 and 4900 pounds per acre is 2800 or 700 pounds per acre-inch of irrigation water. Three, six and nine pounds per acre planting rates were compared. Six pounds per acre proved to be a good average.

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# Rodeo Teams Headed For National Finals

For the second straight year, Panhandle State University will send both men's and women's rodeo teams to the national finals in Bozeman, Montana to be held during the week of June 14-21. The men's team will be making their second consecutive trip to the finals and the women's team will be going for the fourth straight time. The men's team qualified for the finals by finishing second in the Central Plains Region this year and the women's team got a chance to go when the second place team in women's competition, OSU, decided not to make the trip. PSU women's team gets an opportunity to go since they were the third place team in regional standings. Southeastern State University won the regional titles in both men's and women's divisions.

Panhandle State's men's team suffered through a year of frustration and injuries. They started the season with injuries to key personnel and ended the season in the same fashion. "When we are healthy," says rodeo coach Phil Martin, "we are the best team in this region and one of the best in the country." "If our kids draw well at the finals, we have as good a chance as anyone there," PSU's long time rodeo sponsor and coach Dr. Lynn Gardner shares Martin's optimism in stating that "this is our best team ever at PSU and with a little luck we could bring home a national title." Official team members to the national finals will be Gary Walker, Boise City; Rick Furnish, Guyton; Rocky Zollinger, Laverne; Ken Wilcox, Conway, Arkansas; Bill Brecheisen, Hugoton, Kansas; and Jim Brecheisen, Hugoton, Kansas; Jack Strain, Goodwell; Mike Landrith, Goodwell; Hank Downum, Miami; and Danny Engelman, Beaver, will also attend the national finals as individual competitors.

Panhandle hopes for a national title rest upon the performances of several seasoned veterans of college rodeo. Gary Walker will be making his first trip to the finals, having missed last year because of a broken leg. Walker is a strong threat in all three riding events - barebacks, broncs, and bulls. Rick Furnish will be going to the finals as one of the top saddle bronc riders in the country. He won the bronc riding title in the Central Plains Region for the second straight time this season and was runner-up for the national title last season. Ken Wilcox will be making his third trip to the national finals and is a real threat anytime he rides broncs or bulls. Furnish and Wilcox will also team up at the finals in the team roping event. Rocky Zollinger will be headed back to the finals to compete in all three timed events. Zollinger is a double tough team roper and will take Jack Strain along as his roping partner. Jim and Bill Brecheisen will be roping together at the finals in team roping and each will compete in bulldogging and calf roping. Hank Downum

# Sales Tax Procedures To Be Rewritten

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday his office has rewritten sales tax procedures on agricultural exemptions to make them as easy to read as a mail-order catalog.

"Inflation has squeezed the farmer and rancher tighter than a bale of wet hay," Bullock said. "Our new procedures are clear enough for them to be able to take advantage of the sales tax exemptions to which they are entitled."

The new procedures will be effective about July 15, he said.

The Comptroller said the procedures clarify the fact that the following items are exempt from

the sales tax: expendable supplies such as hand tools, baling wire, binders twine, hardware, tires and lubricants for farm machinery; fences, pens, gates, cattle guards and chutes; and structures that can be considered a piece of equipment, such as automated laying houses and farrowing houses. However, most farm buildings, such as barns, garages, warehouses and family dwellings, are taxable, he said.

Exemptions for farm machinery and equipment and storage facilities will be clearer, Bullock said, as well as the general exemption for all medications and tonics given

to farm animals. In addition, he noted, the term "farm or ranch" has been clearly defined for the first time.

Bullock said the new procedures tie in with Internal Revenue Service regulations. Proof that the IRS has allowed an item as an investment credit will be evidence that the item should be exempted from the sales tax, he said.

However, he emphasized, any farmer or rancher seeking an exemption must have an exemption certificate on file with the retailer at the time of purchase.

The Comptroller said that persons needing more
