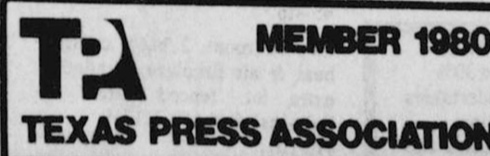

Council raises city salaries

Following resolution of the city-county firefighting pact in a special meeting, Monday night, the Spearman city council continued the session to treat on two other matters--one of which gave Spearman city employees a raise in pay.

On two occasions following the Stephens consulting firm's recommendations in the area of salaries and wages, the matter had been postponed for further study although the report had been accepted and approved. Following an executive session, Monday night, members of the council approved the across-the-board increases recommended by the Stephens firm which grants each city employee an equitable increase in earnings, according to City Manager Jim Murray.

Also on the agenda for the special Monday night meeting was the H&S Emergency Medi-

cal Service. H&S has posed a budgetary problem almost as thorny as the city-county firefighting agreement and there was no immediate solution Monday night.

The matter was tabled. "We did not compile an actual spread of salary and wage increases in dollars and cents for public release," Murray said, "although it is a matter of public record. Each city employee will know how much it is when he draws his or her first increased paycheck in the new fiscal year."

"All city employees can rest assured the increase was fair, ratio-wise. That is the reason we employed the Stephens people."

Murray said he felt some decision would be reached in the matter of H&S at the next regular session of the Spearman city council.

There have been times when I would have given my eye-teeth to print every story in the paper just exactly the way it happened. This is exactly what an Indiana editor did recently...and it turned out this way:

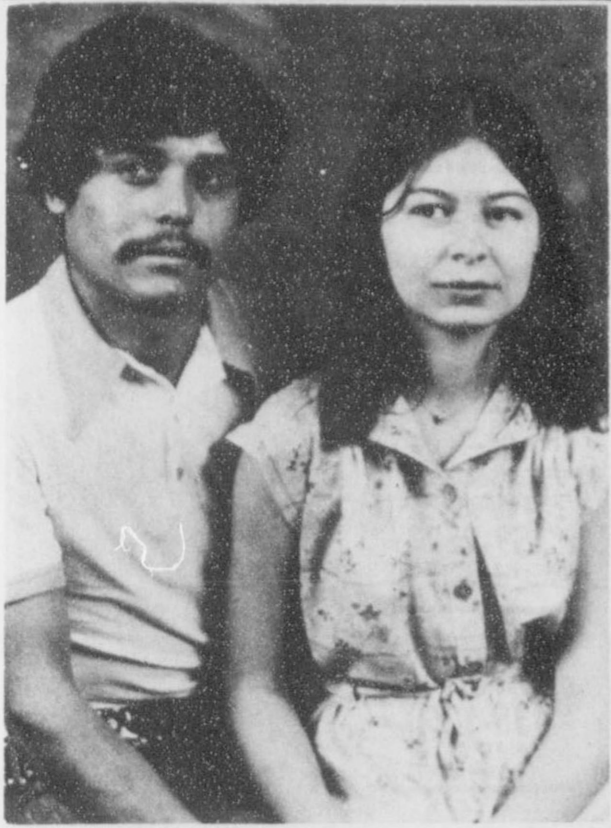
JOHN COYLE, local grocerman, is doing poor business for a good reason. His prices are high, his store is dirty and his clerks are insolent. How can he expect much?

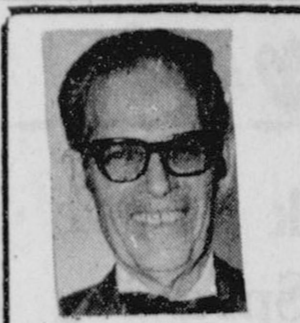

INDEPENDENT EMPLOYEES

The exact status of a worker is sometimes debatable, and this question can be crucial regarding injuries while working.
