The reports were that he would and then that he wouldn't. Coy called the White House direct. How he got in, as to whom we don't know, but he did get through - confirmed the report as affirmative.

This morning (Friday) Channel 7 in Amarillo quoted, "According to a Spearman radio Station", there will be a meeting.

More people are getting involved! We welcome you and are proud of your decision to join in. We need everyone.

A tentative meeting date has been set for the Morse area on February 2 - at night in the Community Building. We are trying to secure speakers from Pampa for this. Come and listen - just good common sense is all you will hear.

We understand that Lipscomb County is organizing. When Lipscomb and Hutchinson Counties get organized this will complete every county in the Panhandle with 2 offices in several counties.

Did you know that there are more live cattle driven or hauled across the Mexican and Canadian borders into the U.S. than the total cattle numbers in Montana, North and South Dakota, Wyoming and Colorado? This 5 million head furnishes the annual beef supply for 8 million people or for all the people in Washington state, Utah, Montana, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Idaho and Nevada. Our great "White Father" is more interested in the well-being of our neighbors than his own people.

A bushel of wheat on the Chicago Board of Trade trades at around \$2.75 now. Transportation costs to Europe or Japan is approximately \$1.00 per bu. Making it a laid-in price of \$3.75 per bushel. These governments add enough profits and tariffs to the price that the processors in those countries pay \$7.00 to \$7.50 per bushel for it. Who is getting the pie? - foreign governments and it is coming out of the American farmers' hide, mine and yours. I'm tired of Uncle Sam trying to buy friendship at my expense. He has never learned the lesson that "you can't buy friendship"!!! Will he ever learn?

Had a wonderful meeting last night (Thursday) and heard good reports from the first group that went to Washington. Gravel people, men and women, who were there, graciously came over and gave us their impressions. Thank you for coming! We appreciated the talks. The men and women from Spearman that went to Washington gave good reports.

A few more cracks are showing. National Association of Wheat Growers has endorsed the movement.

Gene Cudd, local implement dealer and President of the Texas Farm Machinery and Hardware Dealers Association, believes that they will draft a resolution endorsing the American Agriculture movement.

He is also on the Board of Directors of National Association of Farm Machinery Dealers and he thinks a resolution from that Association will be forthcoming shortly along with national ads. Thank you Gene!!

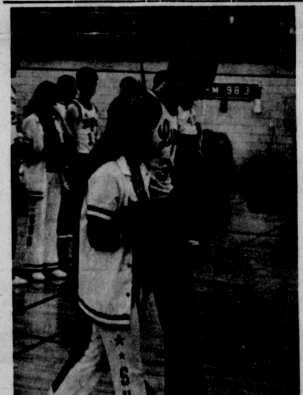

Ground Hog Supper Planned

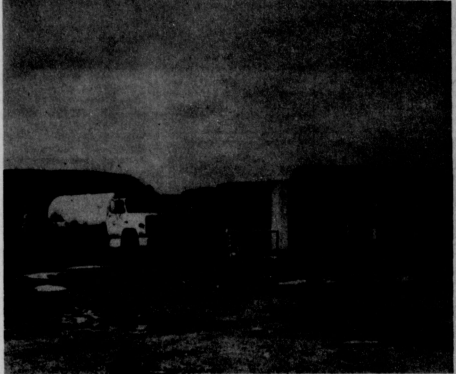

Damage Minor In Truck Fire



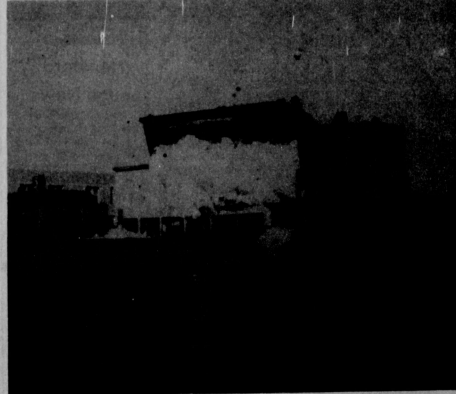
ALL OUT -- This is the scene after the firemen completed their task. Units from the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department and the Hansford County Sheriff's Department Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 25, responded to an alarm on the Steele Ranch some 13 miles north of Spearman on FM760 where a tank truck used to gather drip gas was on fire.

There was no explosion and the driver, identified only as Red, was not injured and some \$300 damage was reported done to the truck which is owned and operated by a Borge firm.

The fire was confined to the right rear quarter of the small tank truck when firemen arrived at the scene near the storage area where the liquid is stored before being collected.

The truck was being loaded when some of the fluid splashed on a heater unit and caught fire, according to investigation at this time. The driver realizing what happened disconnected the vehicle and pulled off to one side.

To prevent an explosion, firemen doused the tank with cold water while others applied water directly to the fire and flames were extinguished within five minutes although firemen remained at the scene for some time thereafter before allowing the truck to proceed back to Borge safety.

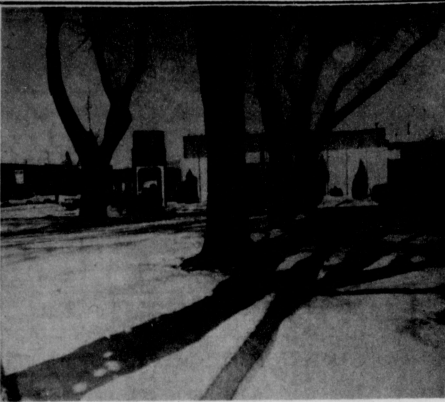

Truckers and Farmers Deliver "State of the Nation"

Under a January 19, 1978 date line is a "State of the Union Message" delivered by Truckers and Farmers to the nation as a whole and individually. Following is the message:

"Every year the President gives the 'State of the Union' message to the Congress. Every year, if it was a bad year, the President will say that the coming year shows promise. If it was a good year, the President will say that he hopes the Congress continues its sterling record of achievement. Every year, the President will take credit for much of what happened that is good, and explain his lack of responsibility if that year was particularly bad.

Everyone knows this, yet each year, Presidents and Congressional politicians alike ride into Washington on rhetorical retreats. But this year, the public is catching on--fast--to the fact that campaign promises are not necessarily translated into action programs.

Even though the farmers have been suffering for years, it wasn't until the Carter Farm Bill was turned into law that the farmers themselves saw that they would be tied to a loss for another four years.

The President speaks of human rights. The Congress passes minimum wage laws, but there are no minimum wage laws for farmers, no minimum wage laws for independent truckers. Both are operating at far less than parity, and 1977 was the year that separated the political wheat from the rhetorical chaff.

Now the President can blame previous Administrations for the farmers' plight if he wants to. In fact, he has, but the fact is that the President reversed himself and pledged support for small truckers.

Yet, in spite of that pledge of ten months ago, no Congressman on any key committee has been given the green light to push and pass legislation like H.R. 2443 which President Carter was forced to refer to in the Clinton, Massachusetts, town meeting.

show that the current Farm Bill is a disaster and the President is merely buying time with promises of action, hoping that the farmers will go to work and forget about their demand for parity.

It won't work this time, Mr. Carter. And for four years the truckers have been waiting, waiting, waiting for some relief from the burdensome costs which have them in even worse shape than the farmers.

There was a ray of hope when President Ford endorsed legislation that is now House Bill 2443, and most truckers realized that it wasn't until March 16, 1977, in Clinton, Massachusetts, that President Carter made a stand that theoretically would help the small, independent truckers. But that promise of almost a year ago has not been translated into action.

It is the only reason why, dear citizens, are being held up today, because the truckers are tired of waiting, tired of hearing promise after promise after promise.

The President cannot do it alone, of course, but it remains to be seen how much concerned he really is when a whole year drifts by and nothing is really accomplished, except the usual occasional "hearings."

There have been two to a dozen hearings about truckers and the past two and a half years. The Congress knows the problem, The President knows the problem. What are they waiting for?

Perhaps, if we could bring Jerry Ford out of "retirement" for a few days, he would explain the free enterprise system to this Congress and this President. The Truckers seem unable to do it unless they stop what they do best--delivering the goods.

Remember, this interruption of your schedule is but a small sample of what could happen if this President and this Congress don't act in a decisive way--and soon.

The "State of the Union" message won't contain any reference to broken promises to farmers and truckers, we are sure, and that is why the truckers are delivering one of their own.

Is Jimmy Carter, the President, the same as Jimmy Carter, the campaigner--reversing himself on issues, buying time with promises of concern?

It has been four years since the truckers last staged a nationwide shutdown.

They have been patient, and will be patient again--up to a point, but what happens in Washington on January 19 is but a tiny preview of what could happen if this President and this Congress do not respond and pass into law one simple bill--H.R. 2443--which could give the truckers the justice they deserve.

Apparently, the only way Washington will respond to the issues is to bring the issues to Washington.

This is the only reason why, dear citizens, are being held up today, because the truckers are tired of waiting, tired of hearing promise after promise after promise.
