## PDRA Progress Reported

An optimistic report concerning the Palo Duro River Project was given the Palo Duro River Authority of Hansford County during the meeting Wednesday, April 5, at the PDRA office in the Hansford County Courthouse in Spearman.

Acting General Manager Johnnie C. Lee reported the three representatives of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers

from Tulsa, Okla., advised the PDRA that data was compiled into a report on the project and the report was optimistic on the future of the reservoir. Lee added that a spokesman for the representatives of the Corps noted that there would be some physical evidence of progress during next year, not necessarily at the site of the dam.

Future meetings are to be held as work progresses.

In other matters taken up by the PDRA, minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and bills as presented were paid.

The PDRA also invested \$60,000, a fee from Diamond Shamrock, in one-year certificates of deposit.

## Resident Fined

Spearman resident Jerry Chris Trout, 17, has been placed on probation for six months and fined \$206.80, including court costs, by Hansford County Judge Johnnie C. Lee after pleading guilty in connection with an incident in Spearman at 1:30 a.m. April 2 in which Trout's car ran into a telephone pole at Fifth and Roland.

Trout was arrested by city police at the scene and was taken to Hansford Hospital for emergency treatment of a bump on the head and then released.

It was noted in the report of the collision that Trout will have to pay approximately \$120 for the ruined telephone pole.

A companion in the car with Trout at the time of the collision was not charged.

## Pot Possession Brings Fine

A do-it-yourself marijuana crop being transported in the back seat of a car owned by a Silverton, Texas, resident and in which he and two passengers were traveling was involuntarily "set aside" Tuesday night, April 4, when the portable agricultural effort was discovered after the vehicle had been stopped for a minor traffic violation.

Spearman Police Chief Steve Wisniewski reported that Officer Ricky Morris stopped the car at 8:29 p.m. at Third and Archer and while talking to the driver, noticed some small tubs in the back seat in which appeared to be growing some marijuana.

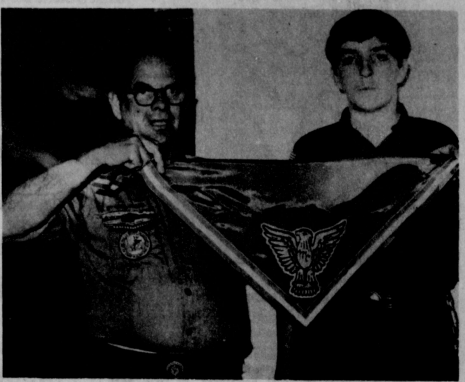
Investigation revealed 83 marijuana plants, four assorted bags of marijuana seed, two small partial bags of marijuana and some assorted marijuana paraphernalia.

Arrested at that time were Larry Dean Edwards, 21, Andy Lee Bullock, 19, and Fidencio Balino, 25, of Silverton, each on a charge of misdemeanor possession of marijuana--an amount under two ounces.

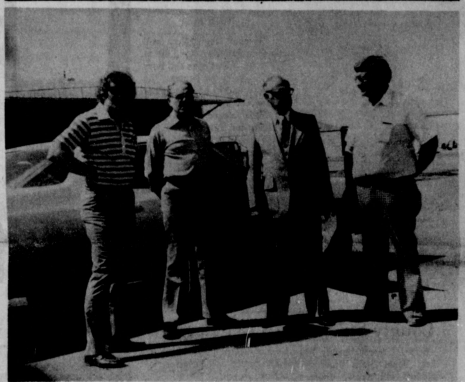
Bullock was the owner of the car on Wednesday, April 5, appeared before Hansford County Judge Johnnie C. Lee on the misdemeanor possession charge to which he pleaded guilty.

Bullock was assessed a fine of \$231.80, including costs, and charges against his passengers were dropped.

The three were employed in the Spearman area and were in the process of relocating their place of residence in the city at the time they were stopped.

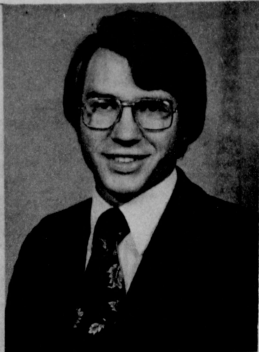

To be honored are more than 695 May graduates and the 240 December graduates who have filed for degrees and have completed all requirements.

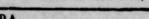

**Students Produce Own Traffic Safety**

Fourth grade students in Brantley Corneisen's class at Pringle - Morse school have produced their own colorful filmstrip on traffic safety with the materials provided free of charge by the Texas Office of Traffic Safety.

In "The Safest Show on Earth," class members create their own illustrations for a full color, sound filmstrip exploring key aspects of passenger, bicycle and pedestrian safety.

The Texas Office of Traffic Safety makes available to the school all necessary materials without cost for "The Safest Show on Earth." After the students finish their illustrations, the drawings are processed into a filmstrip by Media Intensive Learning Corporation, designers of the program.

The filmstrip is returned to the class originating the drawings, along with a lively sound track cassette narrated by children. Both the filmstrip and the cassette become the property of the school.

More than a half million children across the nation have participated in the program to date. Initial evaluation from evaluation efforts in Texas indicates that the program is contributing to a reduction in traffic accidents among school children.

**Postal Consumer Protection Week Proclaimed**

American consumers lost an estimated \$1 billion to mail fraud and misrepresentation by mail in Fiscal Year 1977, Postmaster T. Ray Robertson said today.

In order to heighten public awareness of the problem, April 19-15 has been designated the third annual Postal Consumer Protection Week by Postmaster General William F. Bolger.

"The public must be constantly on guard against fantastic claims and get-rich-quick schemes," Postmaster Robertson said. "The nation's best defense against unscrupulous mail artists using the mails is an informed public."

The Postal Service actively investigates mail fraud and false representation by mail, and assists with mail-order and service problems.

The Postmaster stressed that the overwhelming majority of companies making up the \$60-billion mail-order industry are honest and dedicated to customer satisfaction. But, as in many other industries, a few operators are out to bilk the public.

"Schemes directed at consumers are limited only by the imagination of the con artist," the Postmaster said. "They know many people are willing to invest their hard-earned money on offers which sound too good to be true."

Typical examples of mail frauds and false representations by mail include work-at-home schemes, phony franchises, miraculous "cures" for a variety of illnesses, weight reducing plans with no proven medical value, and a variety of investment offers such as buying land through the mail.

Businesses also become victims of mail frauds and false representations, Postmaster Robertson said. "Companies pay out millions of dollars each year for imaginary or useless business directories, phony in-

voices and contributions to non-existent organizations."

The Postmaster urged consumers to ask companies to back up their claims if an offer sounds too good to be true. "But if you feel you've been victimized by fraud, or have not received the merchandise you ordered, contact my office or a postal inspector," the Spearman Post Office phone number is 659-3313.

Postmaster Robertson would also like to remind consumers that whenever they have a problem with their mail service to fill-out a postal Consumer Service Card, available at the post office or from your letter carrier.

"We can't help someone with a mail problem until we know about it and the easy-to-complete card assures prompt action on our part."

#### Don't toy with safety

Unsafe toys can do untold harm to children. Here are some precautionary measures to take when toy shopping.

Pass up any toy that easily comes apart, leaving sharp metal or plastic edges exposed. Also, pass up dolls and stuffed animals that have straight pins or other built-in hazards hidden in the body, hair or clothing. (And be sure to check that doll clothing and stuffing are labeled "nonflammable.")

If you're shopping for an older child, keep in mind that many "toys" - science sets, for example, containing real chemicals - can be potentially dangerous. Chemicals and

equipment must be labeled; and the directions enclosed should be both simple and complete. Bicycle skates, boards, and other riding equipment should be examined for parts that might injure a child if they fall. All screws, bolts, clamps must be secured tightly.

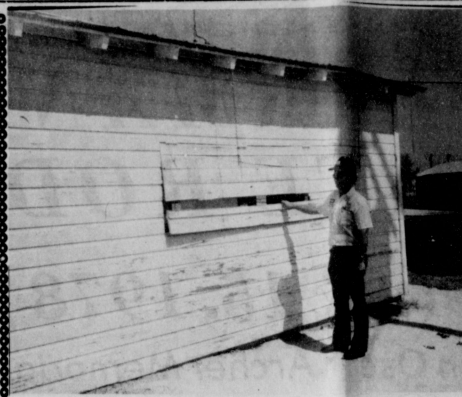


