# Poll Tax **Drive Set** Saturday

A door-to-door canvass will be made here Saturday in an effort to increase the sagging poll tax sales in the county.

A poll tax is not required for federal offices voting, but

a person must get a receipt showing he has registered and not paid the tax.



Did you know there are from six to eight million items in your local supermarket . . . 123 of which you give a hard look . . . and less than 30 with whick you make it to the checkout counter? It makes me tired just thinking about all those decisions.

Average shopping time in the store is 30 minutes - and for every minute past a half-hour you linger, you'll probably spend 50 cents more.


You can tell I don't linger very long by any counter except the ones with frozen or very-very-easy-to-prepare foods, by my recipes. They usually begin with some kind of mix or prepared

the ones with frozen or very-very-easy-to-papers. They usually begin with some kind of mix or prepared food and go from there.

This one, quick cinnamon twists, starts with a can of refrigerator biscuits. It also calls for 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts and 2 tablespoons cinnamon sugar.

Pull each biscuit to about six inches in length. Dip in melted butter, then in mixture of nuts and cinnamon sugar. Twist, place on ungreased baking sheet and bake at 475 degrees eight minutes. Delicious with mid-morning coffee.

Lastly, to make a very good fruit salad dressing, blend 2 cups sour cream and a 6 ounce can of frozen lemonade concentrate. It's tart and tangy over a mixture of fresh and canned fruits.



### Internal Revenue Reminds Public To Use Numbers

A taxpayer's number is the principal method of identification under the Internal Revenue Service's Automatic Data Processing, according to Ellis Campbell, Ir., District Director for Internal Revenue Service's northern Texas District. Mr. Campbell says all individual taxpayers should verify their Social Security numbers by reference to their Social Security Cards or by contacting the Social Security Administration if there is any question of the correctness of a number. If there has been any change in marital status or in the tax-

If there has been any change in marital status or in the tax-payer's name, the nearest social Security office should be contacted to make any of these changes on his or her Social Security records.

The taxpayer's 1965 income tax return will be matched

The taxpayer's 1965 income tax return will be matched with his Social Security records before a refund is made. Therefore, if a discrepancy exists in the name and Social Security number, there will probably be a delay in issuing a refund.

By making any of these corrections at an early date, the taxpayer could avoid any delay in receiving a refund.







### 14 Injured In Rural Wrecks During 1965

Fourteen people were injured in rural accidents in Hansford County during 1965, according to a report released this week by the district Texas Highway Patrol.

No one was killed this year, but the 10 accidents which ino jured the 14, did an estimated property damage of \$11,730.

The county ended the year with no accidents in December.

Ochiltree County had seven accidents in December to bring their year's total to 52. There were 29 people injured in the 52 accidents and three people killed. Total damage was estimated at \$45,817.

Sherman County had only 12

rural accidents during the year and 13 injured with no deaths. The estimated damage in the wrecks was \$42.540.

Heavily populated Hutchin-son County was the four county leader with a total of 118 rural accidents. There were 68 persons injured and two killed in the accidents. Property damage was set at \$87,725.

In the 31-county Panhandle district there were 2,377 accidents.

dents on highways and rural roads. In these wrecks 83 persons were killed and 1,577 injured. Total property damage was estimated at \$2,013,757.

Six of the 31 counties in the THP's Amarillo district had no traffic fatalities in 1965. These were Briscoe, Donley, Foard, Hansford, Lipscomb and Sher-man--but 90 persons were in-jured and property damage reached \$156,448 in automo-

bile accidents in those six counties during the year.

"It is estimated when the final reports are tabulated, we will find that less people were killed in Texas traffic accidents." dents during 1965 than in 1964; W.J. Sergeant stated. The final count is expected to be about three per cent less than the 1964 all time high of 3,006 traffic deaths,

Mrs. Pat Cates, the official weather observer said the snow measured three to four inches


and it had .17 of an inch of moisture.
