fusty.

and water available at all times, they are valuable protective devices; if chemicals are spilled on the skin or clothing, remove the clothing and wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water; remove contaminated clothing upon completion of
the chemical use and scrub with soap and water; place contaminated clothing contaminated ciothing, equipan area inaccessible to humans and animals and dispose of unused chemieals and "empty" chemical containiers immed $x-$ ately and in the prescribed manner,

There is always danger of spoilage organisms entering he food when it is transferred from kettle to jar; this is rue even when you are exreason caren-kettle canning is not recommended.
