The Guest Speaker was Don Cortez, Assistant Coach University of Texas at El Paso.

The Menu for this year's Athletic Banquet consisted of Bar-B-Que, Potato Salad, Beans, Cole Slaw, Texas Toast, Iced Tea or Coffee and Peach Cobbler, this was catered by the Spearman FFA. Future Farmers of America, and the Spearman School Cafeteria.

After everyone had had their share of the meal, James Cunningham--Master of Ceremonies--introduced Mary Ann Martin, the Junior Cheerleader, who would give the Invocation. As Mary Ann finished, Eddie Clemmons--the Senior Cheerleader--was introduced. Eddie welcomed everyone to the Banquet. The Presentation was by Junior Cheerleader, Denise Blackburn.

From the Ceiling were all the Charlie Brown Gang, on the tables there were more of Charlie Brown's Gang. The Cafeteria was packed at this moment.

Everyone was on the verge of asking "Who are the Winners!!" But before anyone could, Mr. Cunningham introduced the Coaches and their Wives/Husbands.

The moment everyone was waiting for--the Awards would be presented now.

This year the Master of Ceremonies, Mr. Cunningham, had done some homework. Before he announced the Coach who would recognize the winners of the awards, Mr. Cunningham named the previous winners of that certain award. The first award was the Basketball Outstanding Lynxette and the Fighting Heart Lynxette. As for the "Lynxette Fighting Heart Award" was begun earlier that 1978, but was not in the Place Mr. Cunningham had looked, as a matter-of-fact, Coach Newton said that the other Place was at the Junior High Gym. Mr. Cunningham had the previous winners since 1978 which was Carrie Clark; Christy Collier was the 1979 winner and in 1980 Nancy Wilson had won the award.

Coach Newton, Varsity Basketball Coach, was introduced. As Coach Newton went to the Speakers' Stand, he recognized Terry Crocker and Gary Rambo for assisting him and coaching the 7th, 8th, 9th and Jr. Varsity Girls. Coach Newton recognized the All-District Players--Kenda Burke, Nancy Wilson, and Mary Ann Martin. Before he got to the First Award of the Night he talked a little about the recipient. "She was named the Most Valuable Player of District 1-AAA, she was an All-District Selection and will be playing in the Texas/Kansas all-star game, up to that point almost everybody had a good idea of the winner. This year's winner for the Outstanding Lynxette in Basketball is Kenda Burke!"

As Coach Newton awarded Kenda her Award, everyone was anxious to find out about the winner of the Fighting Heart Award. Coach Newton again, said a little something of the winner. "...She played when she was hurting..." The winner for 1981 is Margaret Reed!!

Mr. Cunningham, again, told everyone what year the Basket-

Carl Close was the winner; in 1968 there were two winners, Carrol Day and Charles Shieldknight; Mike Davis was the 1969 winner; in 1970 Rondell Schell was the winner; the winner in 1971 was Edgar Womble; in 1972 Ronnie Head was the winner; in 1973 Randy Schell was the winner; there were two winners in 1974, Martin Hendrick and Terril Brummett; in 1975, again there were two winners, Terril Brummett and Roger Jones; Roger Jones was the winner in 1976; in 1977 Doug Steele was the winner; Randy Reid won in 1978; in 1979 Zane Newton was named the winner; in 1980 Steve Shields was the winner.

The "Lynx Fighting Heart Award" was begun in 1979 and the winner was James Whitaker and in 1980 Steven Tindell won the award.

The Lynx Basketball Coach is Larry Morris. Coach Morris recognized Coach James Collinsworth and Coach Tom May for assisting him and for coaching the 7th, 8th, 9th and Jr. Varsity Basketball teams. Coach Morris introduced the winner by telling the audience a little something about the winner for this year's Outstanding Lynx. He was an All-District selection and had a high percentage of rebounds. The winner for the 1981 Outstanding Lynx in Basketball is Steve Shields!

The Fighting Heart Award winner was a guy who "...did everything expected of him". The 1981 recipient of the Fighting Heart Award is Jamie Bulls.

The next Award was the Golfing Award. The Master of Ceremonies, Mr. Cunningham, said that there had not been a Girls Golf Trophy in the past, just a Boy/Girl Award, in other words, a girl or guy would be chosen as the winner. The Award, before this one, was called the Outstanding Golfer and had been started in 1968 with Bruce Brown being the winner; Junior Salinas won the Award in 1969; in 1970 Tony Harper was the winner; in 1971 there were two winners, Junior and Tony Salinas; there were two winners, also, in 1972, Scott Latham and Martin Hendrick; James Salinas was the winner in 1973 and 1974; Carla Harper came right back and won the Award in 1976 and 1977; in 1978 there were two winners, Carrie Clark and Greg Hazelwood; in 1979 and in 1980 Greg Hazelwood was named the winner.

The "Outstanding Girl Golfer Award" was begun in 1979 and Jana Buchanan was the winner and in 1980 the winner was Betsy Jones. Mr. Cunningham then introduced the Girl's Golf Coach, Gary Rambo.

Coach Rambo took the stand and had a few things to say about the winner, she is a very young and determined athlete. The 1981 winner of the Outstanding Girl's Golf is Betsy Jones, for the 2nd year in-a-row.

Coach Larry Morris is the Boy's Golf Coach and he said a few things about this year's winner, he is a very competitive young man. The winner for the 1981 Outstanding Golfer for the Boys is Jimmy Morley, who was not present.

Bill Strawn and Roger Odegaard were given Honorary Degrees.

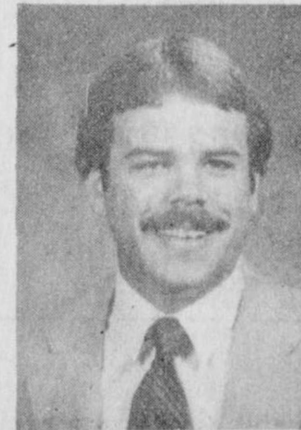

Thursday was awards day at Spearman Junior High School with recognition for everything from spelling to "super-teacher."

Teresa Tindell, valedictorian and Nick Wirsdorfer, salutatorian, were recognized but speeches were not "practiced" as in the past because of the number of awards to be presented in the time available.

Ann Sheets and Kelly McWhirter received certificates for their performances in the junior division of the recent Spelling Bee sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News, as did Heather McRae and Charles Godfrey for their records in the senior division.

Mollie Holton recognized the current corps of cheerleaders: Tiki Jackson, Tammy Savage, Carlee Dickson and Linda Evans.

Cheerleaders for the coming year are Carlee Dixon, D'Lyn Orr, Michelle Savage and Jill McClain.

At this point, University Interscholastic League winners were recognized as were academic honor students with grade averages above 90. These have already been published in The Papers.

Medals were awarded in recognition of student council members.

Medals also went to Choir participants in the Southwest Music Festival at Amarillo, April 30. Ratings at that event were: 1-superior; 2-excellent and 3-good. There were 21 participants from the school with eight rated superior; nine, excellent and four, good. These include solos, ensembles and mixed ensembles.

Then came awards presentations in the fields of boys and girls athletics. Starting with Coach Jimmy Duncan—who took a modest stand until a presentation forced him to front—all coaches received a token from their players. In most instances it was a basketball autographed

by all the palers in the program under that particular coach.

In addition to Coach Duncan, those making awards were Mollie Holton, Sheila Watley, Dan Shaver, Terry Crocker and Tom May.

Following athletic awards, it was only fitting that physical fitness follow. There were two levels of recognition in this program: an achievement award and the president's citation award. As was pointed out in preface to the presentations, the achievement awards were no mean accomplishment because many students did not even reach that level. Of course, the presidential citations were the highest.

At the fifth grade level, Kim Jenkins won the president's award while 10 fifth graders received achievement awards.

At the sixth grade level, it was the first year for presidential awards to Kayla Eaton, Melissa McClain, Brenda Salgado and Tammy Shields.

It was the second year for Kerry Holt and Sherry Vernon and the third year for Carry Ann Guthrie and Jill McClain.

There were 22 achievement awards at this grade level.

In boys physical fitness there were four achievement awards while Britt Davis and Carl Irvin received their first presidential awards.

At the seventh grade level, achievement awards went to four and first year president's awards went to Dusty Hill and Allen Myers.

Band Director Craig Zink explained there were no awards to be presented to band members since competition was still underway in that area. These will be presented May 18.

Principal G. W. Robinson announced the loss of five teachers.

Mrs. Athalie Traylor is retiring. Zink is quitting to assume the head of his family's business in another state and Mrs. Holton, Sheila Watley and

Meriam Mercer are quitting for various personal reasons.

Band Director Zink drew a standing ovation from the student body when his departure was announced as a tribute for the work he has done with the band students and for school spirit.

Faculty member Edwin Pearcy, recipient of the "super-teacher" award last year, was introduced by Principal Robinson to make the presentation this year. (Robinson noted that the secret selection committee was so secret they did not know each other.)

Coach Tom May was named "super-teacher" for the current year and presented the T-shirt, symbol of the honor.

He drew a standing ovation from the student body.

There was one commendation for the entire student body. It came from Principal Robinson and was echoed by all the coaches. Students were told that visitors from other schools had noted the pride and care they invested in their school building and the exemplary behavior they had evidenced on trips to other schools.

WTSU Professor To Give Oslo Address

WTSU—Dr. Peter L. Petersen, professor of history at West Texas State University, will give the dedicatory address of an historical marker honoring the Hansford County settlement of Oslo on Sunday, May 17.

Petersen, who is of Danish descent, will dedicate the memorial to pioneer settlers of Oslo before the unveiling.

May 17 annually has been observed by Norwegians as Norway's Constitution Day since 1814. The traditional "Syttende Mai" celebration at Oslo Lutheran Church will begin registration at 9:30 a.m., worship at 11 a.m., a noon lunch, music and folk dancing and the dedication of the Texas Historical Commission marker at 2:30 p.m.

The marker is located 18 miles northwest of Gruver on Farm-to-Market Road 2349 and is 2.5 miles south of the Oslo townsite.

According to the marker, Oslo was established in 1908 when Anders L. Mordt, a native

Norwegian, secured the sales rights to 100 sections of land in Hansford County. He recruited the first settlers from other Norwegian colonies in the Midwest.

He also published a weekly Norwegian language newspaper and organized the annual Norwegian independence day celebration. Community worship services were conducted beginning in 1909 and, a year later, the Oslo Lutheran Church, often referred to as "The Cathedral of the Plains," became the center of the farming settlement.

Severe droughts in 1912 and 1913 ended the land sales and the Denver and Gulf Railroad bypassed Oslo for Gruver. More than 30 families remained and many of their descendants live in Oslo.

Petersen, who has researched the history of Oslo, said the church, parsonage and cemetery are the only physical remnants of the settlement. He said he will center his address on

comments about the United States as a nation of immigrants and that Oslo serves as a reminder of "our rich, ethnic heritage as a nation."

The annual celebration attracts former residents from many parts of the United States. Norwegian folk dancing will be led by dancers from the Dallas-Fort Worth area, Amarillo and El Paso.

The memorial is a special project of the Norwegian Society of Texas, which Petersen is a member. The celebration and memorial presentation also are sponsored by the Hansford County Historical Commission.

Flagpoles stand near the marker with Christian, United States, Norway and Texas flags.

Petersen, who came to WTSU in 1967, is a member of the Norwegian American Historical Association, Immigration History Society, State Historical Society of Iowa, Agricultural History Society, Panhandle-Plains Historical Society and the editorial and publication committee of the Danish-American Heritage Society.

Alfalfa Weevils

The alfalfa weevil is a key insect pest of alfalfa produced for hay in this area. A spot check for the larvae showed some fields with light infestation in Hansford County. Producers should check their fields closely to determine if control of weevil population is necessary.

Adult weevils are small, about 3/16 inch long, light brown with a drab stripe down the middle of the back. Female weevils lay their eggs inside the alfalfa stem, and the hatching larvae feed on the terminal

leaves and buds. Young weevil larvae, less than a week old, are off-white in color and less than 1/8 inch long. Older larvae are green, with a white stripe down the back.

Alfalfa weevil larvae will feed on alfalfa foliage for 3 to 4 weeks before reaching maturity.

A decision to control alfalfa weevils should be based on plant size, damage and number of weevil larvae present.

Alfalfa that is 7 to 14 inches in height, control is necessary when 25 to 30% of plant stem terminals show weevil feeding damage.

On alfalfa close to the cutting stage, when the top 3 inches of

plant stem terminals on majority of plants are being damaged.

Alfalfa within two weeks of cutting, it may be advisable to cut early rather than apply an insecticidal treatment.

Several chemicals are suggested for alfalfa weevil control such as Alfa-Tox, Furadan, Diazinon, and Guthion.

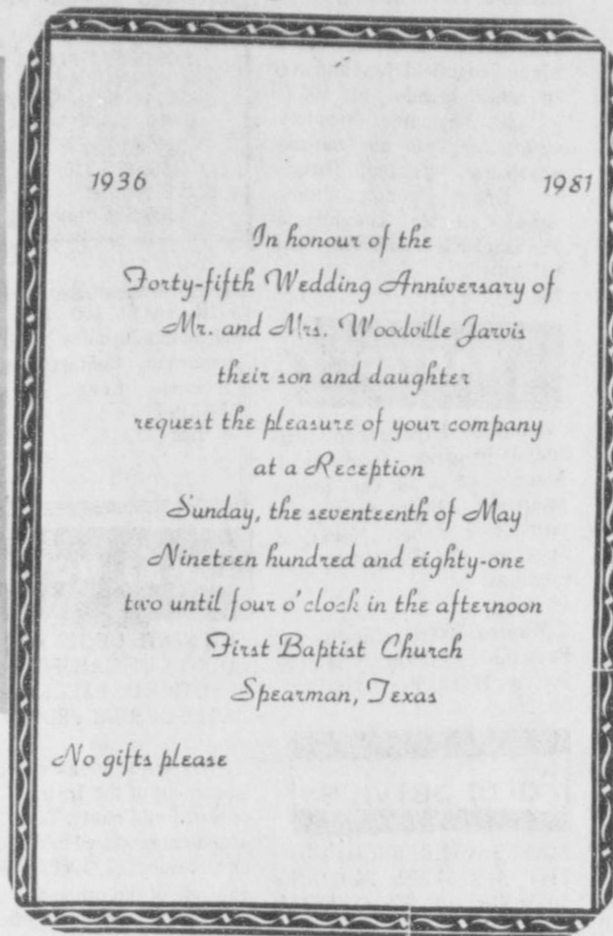

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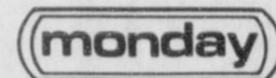

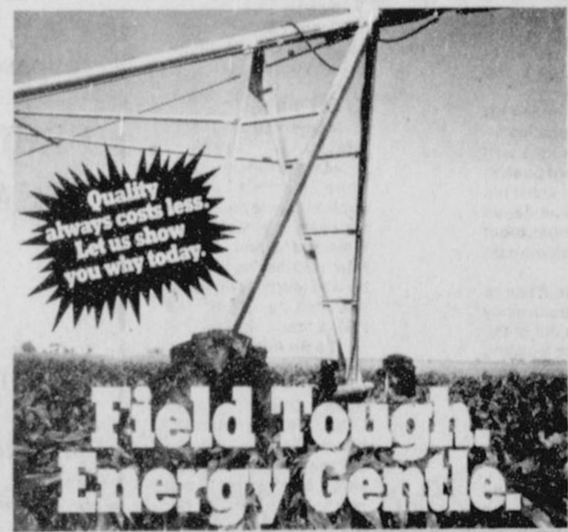

One has grave doubts about the federal government getting so deeply involved in charges of sexual discrimination or harassment. There is, of course, some sexual harassment, and some discrimination-but it works both ways.

Males complain an attractive female gets on much quicker in business, utilizing her looks, and perhaps, charms. Females, especially the anti-feminists of the era (who claim to be feminists), complain that attractive females are sometimes harassed.

True, sometimes, in both cases. But is this the

business of the federal government in Washington? It must be admitted, honestly, from the start that females tend to stress, in dress and makeup, etc., their appearance.

Males, by instinct, tend to react. That's the game as it has been played for thousands of years. One can't have it both ways--dress strikingly, with all the tricks and cosmetic gimmicks to attract attention, and then resent it, from males, when it comes.

Thus it would seem far better to leave the great mire and bog which is the sexual harassment question to local authorities, perhaps up to the state level, at the highest. There is some good accomplished when charges are pressed and one is punished, but there is also much injustice in this, many punished for what is a normal response to the flaunting of sex, provocative dress or even the body language of a walk.

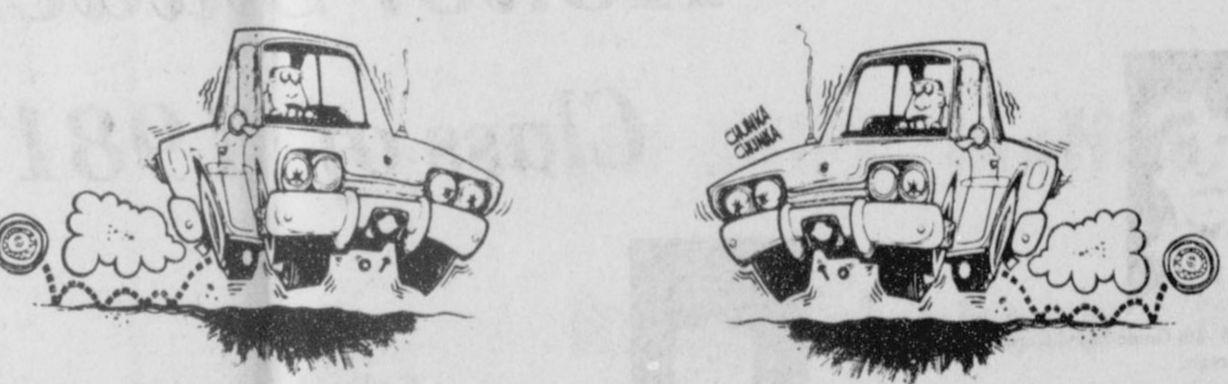

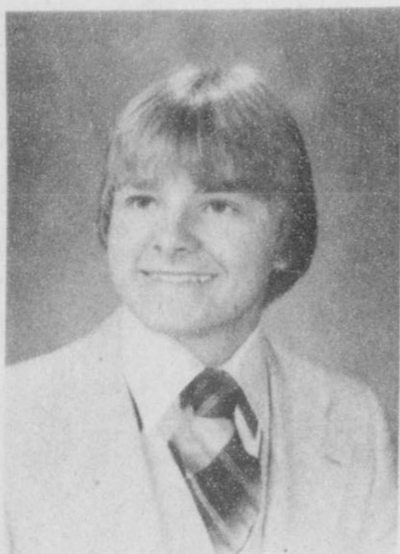

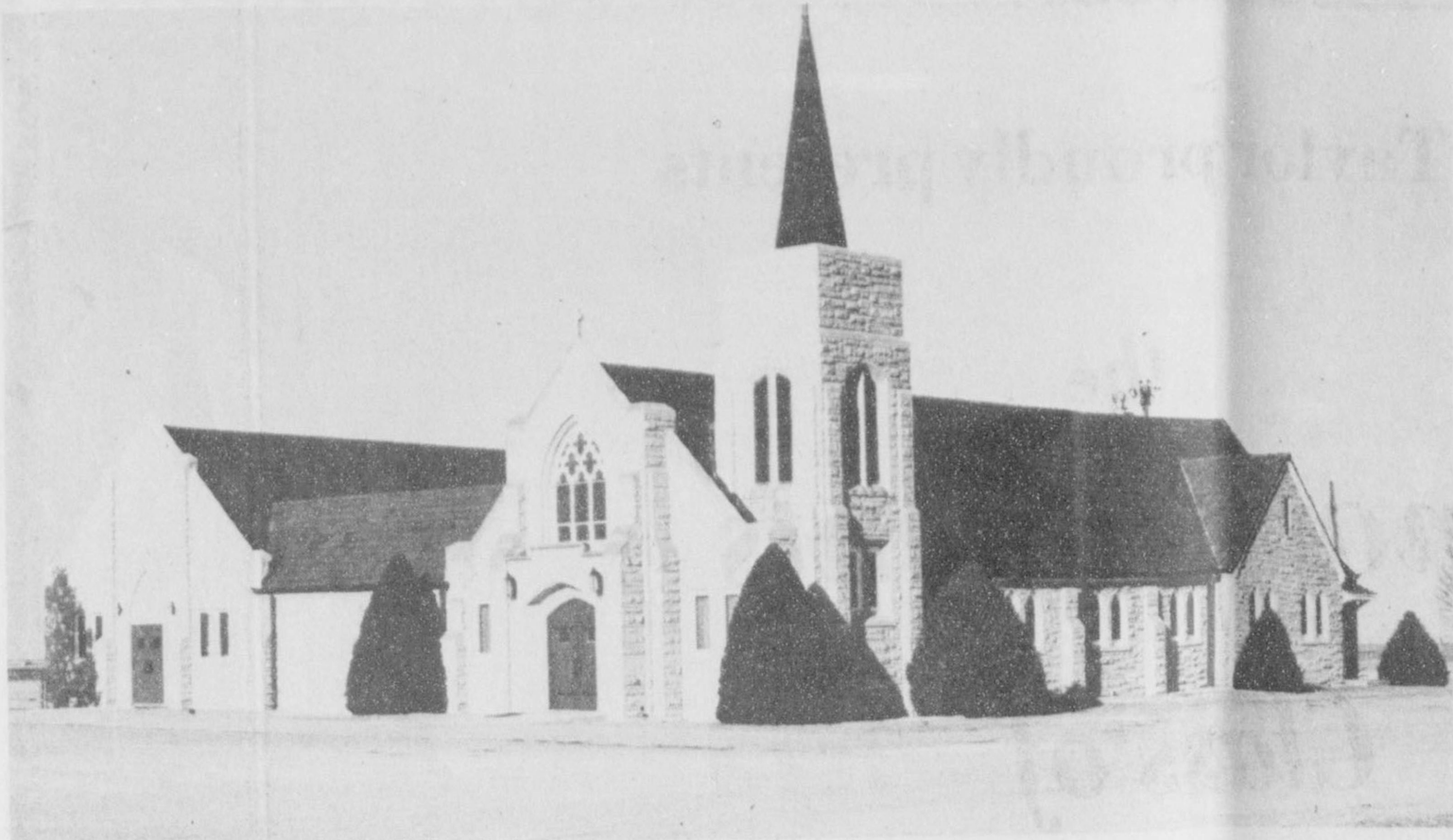
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Dedication of Historical Marker

president of the church. The speaker for the dedication will be Dr. Peter L. Peterson of West Texas State University, Canyon, Texas. Much of the research that made this dedication possible and much of the local interest is due to the work of Dr. Peterson. Dedication and unveiling of the Norwegian

Society of Texas. Special guests will be recognized by John Mark Stavlo. Jim Johnson will be Master of Ceremonies. Norwegian Folk Dances will be led by members of the Amarillo chapter of the Norwegian Society of Texas.

(From Gruver) 6 miles west on SH 15, north on FM 1262 to FM 2349 then west one mile. (From Texhoma) 11 miles east on state line road, then south and east across Frisco Creek brakes after com-

ing upon the flats, 1 1/2 miles east, then south on caliche road 3 miles.

THE OSLO COMMUNITY
In 1908 Anders L. Mordt, a native of Norway, secured from R.M. Thomson and R.T. Anderson the sales rights to 100 sections of Hansford County Land he named Oslo. The first settlers were recruited from existing Norwegian colonies in the Midwestern United States. To promote the development, Mordt advertised his inexpensive Texas Land in major Norwegian language publications across the nation. He also published a weekly newspaper, The "Oslo Posten", and organized an annual Norwegian Independence Day Celebration, "Sytende Mai" (May 17),

which attracted crowds from surrounding towns in Oklahoma and Texas.

Community worship services were first conducted at the Oslo schoolhouse in 1909 by the Rev. Christian Heltne. Officially organized the following year, the Oslo Lutheran Church became the center of the farming settlement.

Mordt's land sales ended in 1913 as a result of a severe drought. When the Denver and Gulf Railroad decided to bypass the area, the towns of Oslo (2.5 mi.s) declined. Although many settlers moved away, more than thirty families remained.

Today the Oslo Lutheran Church serves as a reminder of the area's Norwegian Heritage.

A historical marker will be dedicated at the Oslo Lutheran Church, Hansford County, Texas on May 17, 1981 at 2:30 p.m.

This marker will be dedicated to the memory of the early pioneers who settled this community. Several families came

and established homes in the spring of 1909. Each year brought more families to the community. Everything went well until 1913 when there was no rain for thirteen months. During this period of drouth many of the settlers moved away with reports less optimistic than the advertisements from the Mordt Land Company who had promoted the sale of the land.

Through the years many have come and gone, but a good number of the earliest settlers and many more who came later became permanent residents and their descendents are the prominent leaders in the community today.

From 1924 to 1930 most of the farmers changed their farming operations from the use of horses to tractors. This released much of the pasture land that was necessary to feed the

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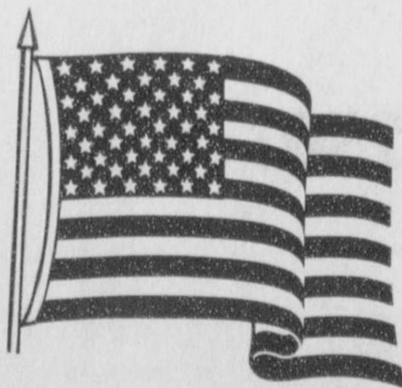
