Negotiations were completed last week for the air strip, and the title was presented to this group of men who were instrumental in getting the work done on the project. Mayor Blodgett stated that dirt work should begin on the new airport in early October. Present plans call for joining the old strip with the new strip, which will be 5200 feet long. The highway between the two strips will be closed, and the high lines will be either covered or removed, making this one of the safest air strips in the Panhandle.

City Manager Resigns Here

The pledge and invocation was given, to start the city meeting Tuesday evening in Spearman, with all city commission members and the mayor present. The minutes of the regular city council meeting of April 25th were approved. In other business, a request by Hansford Golf Club for the use of a 35,000 gallon water storage tank was approved.

The board approved a request by Golden Spread Center for lease of city property. This is the property just North of the new center, and will be made available for parking in the near future, for the Golden Spread Center.

The board approved placing of bids on the following: A. 1 Utility Bed and B. SPRINKLER SYSTEM AT ROCKET PARK. The board also considered an appointment to Spearman housing board. The board discussed participation in Texas Panhandle Employment Alliance, and also considered accounting procedure recommended by the city auditor.

The review of monthly fire, police, ambulance, animal control, and municipal court reports were made. April bills were paid and current cash position reviewed.

The board considered a resolution authorizing the city manager to execute an interim financing agreement with the First State Bank of Spearman, Texas.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Mark Neff, city manager, who is moving to Fort Stockton, Texas, where he will take over as city manager June 9th.

The board conducted a 2 hour executive session Tuesday evening, and announced immediately after the session that no action on anything had been taken. It was apparently a discussion of personnel, which came up concerning the appointment of a new city manager for Spearman.

This newspaper joins in wishing Mark Neff the very best, and of course his charming wife Betsy will also be missed by all of us. Betsy was a teacher in the Spearman school system.

Mark was just named last week as one of the outstanding young men in America, and we wish him and Betsy the very best at Ft. Stockton!

Caprock Industries Buys Kansas Feedyard

Leoti, Kansas, May 17 - Hi-Plains Enterprises, Inc. said today it has entered into an agreement in principle to sell its assets - a commercial cattle feedyard at Leoti - to Caprock Industries, a wholly owned subsidiary of Cargill, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

A joint announcement by Wayne J. Madill, President of Hi-Plains Enterprises, and Ward R. Watson, President of Caprock Industries, said a definitive sales agreement is being completed and the sale must be approved by holders of more than 50 percent of the 1.2 million outstanding shares of Hi-Plains Enterprises common stock.

Pending stockholder approval, Caprock Industries will operate the facilities on a lease basis beginning June 1, 1978. According to Madill, the Hi-Plains Enterprises board proposes to liquidate the corporation, resulting in an ultimate

cash distribution to the firm's approximately 900 stockholders of about \$1.50 per share.

Hi-Plains Enterprises was organized in 1966 as a public corporation. It was one of the finest organizations to begin commercial cattle feeding ventures in the Plains area. All of the present officers and directors were founders and original directors of the company.

Acquisition of the Hi-Plains Enterprises property will expand Caprock Industries' commercial cattle feeding capacity in Leoti to approximately 75,000 head of cattle on feed at one time, Watson said. Caprock Industries currently operates three feedyards in Texas and one in Leoti. Watson said the expansion of Caprock's feeding capacity from 40,000 head of cattle to 75,000 head will continue to provide a feeding program for an expanding number of commercial customers.

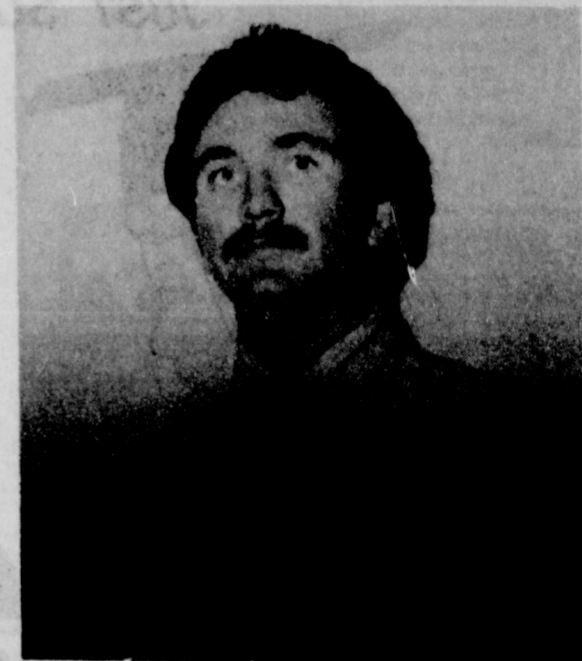

PURPOSES

American Legion Boys State is a plan for training in the functional aspects of citizenship. It is a program of

education sponsored by the American Legion, Department of Texas. Its purpose is to teach the youth of today constructive attitudes toward the American form of government. Boys State attempts to show that all a democracy needs is an intelligent citizenry and a clean, honest, and impartial administration responsive to the will of the people.

This program, originated in Illinois in 1934, has been adopted by the National Organization of the American Legion and is now in operation in forty-seven states.

PROGRAM

The objective of the Boys State is to "educate our youth in the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities of American citizenship." It is wholly a plan for training in the practical aspects of government. It is functional in that applications of the principles of democratic government are made in every way possible. The Constitution and the Statutes of the State of

Texas are the patterns from which the fundamental law of The American Legion Boys State has been developed. Boys State should be thought of as being a mythical 51st State with a constitution, statutes, and ordinances constructed by its citizens to govern themselves.

Citizens of Boys State not only will be required to review knowledge already acquired concerning the political machinery of a commonwealth, but they will find themselves performing exactly the same functions as real officeholders in the everyday world. In Boys State, citizens organize their own city, county and state governments. They choose their own officials in accordance with regular election procedures. They learn the duties of the various city, county, and state officers. They introduce and argue their own bills in a Legislature. Justice is administered by their own law enforcement agencies and courts. In Boys State, the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. Here each boy "LEARNS TO DO BY DOING."

The sad part is, Satan and the world were there immediately to say, "This is the path of truth," drugs, sex, revolutionary violence, etc.; but I walked five years in deception before I met a Christian who told me Jesus is

the truth, the life and the way.

God today is drawing young people and Satan is there trying to lead them astray through the media, motion picture, television, magazines, music, etc. The Body of Christ must also be there in equal proportion directing them in the truth!

I graduated from RHEMA in 1975 and immediately, under direction from God, returned to Hays, Kansas, my old college town, went to my old bar and turned it into a church.

We presently have outgrown the old bar and are involved in a building-program. People are being saved, delivered, and filled with the Holy Ghost. In short, people are being healed, and when the people are healed, the land will be healed.

I was violent, and still am, only now the weapons of my warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds. With the Word of God, we can take the land for God.

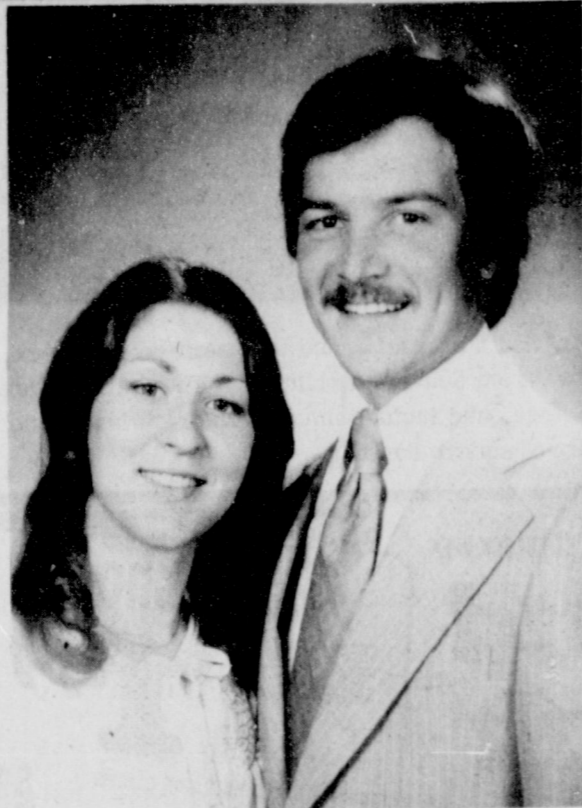
