

**TEXAS PECAN PIE** 

1 1/3 C. all-purpose flour

1/2 tsp. salt

2/3 C. shortening 3 T. water

Mix flour and salt together; add shortening and cut into flour with fork or pastry blender. Add water and mix gently with fork in stirring motion. Gather pastry into a ball and place in pie tin. With tips of fingers, spread pastry along bottom and sides of pie tin, shaping with a high, fluted edge. Makes one 9-inch pie shell.

1 1/2 C. brown sugar, firmly packed

1/2 C. granulated sugar 1/4 C. water

2 T. all-purpose flour

1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 C. evaporated milk 1 1/2 C. pecan halves 3/4 tsp. vanilla

Combine first five ingredients in small bowl and mix well. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add evaporated milk and mix well. Stir in pecan halves and vanilla. Mix well and turn into unbaked 9-inch pie shell. Cook in preheated 400 degrees F. oven for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees F. and cook an additional 35-40 minutes, or until filling is puffed in center and is well browned. Let pie cool before cutting.

The bill, as adopted by the House, would establish a national commission to monitor the Voluntary Effort, appropriate \$10 million for the funding of state voluntary or mandatory cost containent programs, eliminate any standby authority for a mandatory hospital revenue cap, authorize the coordination of Medicare and Medicaid audits as well as encourage philantropic support for hospi-

The hospital position was strongly supported by all but three of the 24 Texas Congres sional House members. Hurst commended espcially Congressman Phil Gramm who took active part in the floor debate. He also commended Majority

Leader Jim Wright and Congressmen Sam Hall, Charles Wilson, James Collins, Ray Roberts, Jim Mattox, Bill Archer, Jack Brooks, Jake Pickle, Marvin Leath, Jack Hightower, Joe Wyatt, Kika de la Garza, Richard White, Charles Stenholm, Kent Hance, tom Loeffler, Abraham Kazen, Ron Paul, M.D. and Martin Frost.

Individual farm and ranch information is kept strictly confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

County estimates for 1978 and January 1, 1979 inventories are available on livestock, poul-try, dairy, field crops, small grains, cotton, vegetables, fruits, and pecans and cash receipts from the sale of Texas farm commodities.
