Hank the Cowdog is a delightful new book by writer/cowboy, John Erickson. I read the first sentence of this book and I knew I wasn't going to be able to put it down. It begins, "It's me again, Hank the cowdog. I just got some terrible news. There's been a murder on the ranch." After an opening like that, you know you aren't going anywhere for a while. I sure didn't.

If you haven't already guessed, the book centers around the life of Hank, the cowdog. Hank is an honest, hardworking sort who describes himself as simply "four legs, a tail, a couple of ears, a pretty nice kind of nose that the women really go for, two bushels of hair and another half-bushel of Mexican sandbars." However, Hank's life is anything but girl-watching and siestas. Hank is the head of ranch security and is responsible for handling all kinds of tough jobs that only a good cowdog can handle. You know, things like keeping the coyotes in their place, helping the cowboys out, and just generally keeping one eye open at all times for anything that looks

suspicious. And if that isn't enough to keep a guy busy, there's been this murder on the ranch and Hank is the only one who can track down the guilty culprits and bring them to justice. The book takes you through the case, right alongside detective Hank and introduces you to some pretty comical characters along the way. You get to meet Drover, Hank's not-so-helpful sidekick; a mean old boxer named Bruno; Pete, the barncat; and Sally May, a cowboy's wife — just to name a few.

I don't want to tell you 'whodunnit', but I will tell you that not a page gets turned that you don't find yourself chuckling (or at least grinning pretty big). Hank the Cowdog is a book that can be enjoyed by every age and one that you will want to share with your friends and neighbors. Just be sure to get your copy back, because you're sure to want to read about Hank again.

"God's Prison Gang," a newly released film featuring Al Capone's getaway driver, the last member of Bonnie and Clyde's gang and two other notorious criminals who have become Christians will be shown at First United Methodist Church, 407 South Haney, on Sunday, June 9, 1985. The showing is scheduled to begin at 7:00 PM.

The film, shot behind the walls of New York's Attica prison, is hosted by Art Linkletter. It tells the story of how the work of International Prison Ministry is accomplishing what more guards, higher prison walls, and greater financial expenditures have failed to do — keep released inmates from returning to lives of crime.

Telling their stories in the 44 minute film are George Meyer, Al Capone's favorite driver; Floyd Hamilton, (Public Enemy #1) the last of the Bonnie and Clyde gang; Jerry Graham, the "robber king" of California; and Ted Jefferson, convicted of crimes from drugs and robbery to murder.

Also featured is "Chaplain Ray," whose Dallas-based International Prison Ministry has changed the lives of thousands on inmates over the past 18 years.

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Breaking the silence habit

Most of us have heard the proverb "Silence is Golden." Indeed, many of us have quoted it to our children. The truth is, in marriage, silence can be frustrating, infuriating and destructive, especially in the realm of feelings, wants and needs.

Take, for example, Mrs. X, married eight years, mother of three active children. After a gruelling day of "Mommy, can I...," Mrs. X is tired. She needs to get out of the house, she thinks to herself. When Mr. X comes home, he's greeted by a cranky wife and three cranky kids.

"How was your day?"
"It was awful. The kids were monsters. I'm so tired, I can't think."

Let's pause for a moment and look at what's been said. Mr. X knows his wife is tired. He also knows that the kids and Mommy did not get along very well today. He suspects that the kids are tired, too. Being an exceptionally alert fellow, he also knows that there is nothing cooking in the kitchen for dinner. So far, the most important piece of information is still a secret - what Mrs. X wants. Mr. X replies cautiously.

"Uh, I'm sorry you've had a bad day." Cold sweat breaks out on Mr. X as he pauses. "Do you want me to grill some hamburgers?"

Mrs. X jumps up furious. "I'm not hungry, I'm going to bed." as she slams out of the room.

Poor Mr. X. If asked, he would probably tell us that sometimes he just doesn't understand his wife, and his wife would agree with him. Why didn't Mrs. X tell her husband what she wanted? "He should know..."

This communication habit, called "Silence is Golden" or "He (she) should know how I feel", is one of the hardest habits to break in marriages. There are two reasons. The first, unfortunately, is that women are not usually taught to go after what they want. Women who do are called pushy or, worse, unfeminine. "I" messages, "I want", "I need", "I think", "I feel", don't come easily to women. We are taught to be passive communicators. "Aren't you cold?" rather than "I'm cold." Sometimes a disclaimer is added to "I'm cold" to keep a woman in the passive role. "I'm cold" (assertive) becomes "I'm cold, aren't you" (passive).

The second reason is that "If I have to tell him (her), it doesn't mean anything. Acts of love must be spontaneous, and marriage is one of the few places this rule applies. In business, partners, employees and sales people are all given specific information about our wants and needs. Orders for lunch or dinner are clear and precise. Requests for donations pour over the radio and TV. Yet in marriage, husbands and wives are expected to read each other's minds.

Resentment simmers and arguments erupt because couples are playing guessing games with vital information about feelings, wants and needs.

Here are a few steps to help break the "silence" habit: (1) Never assume that your partner knows what you feel, want or need. When you were a baby, your mother could assume you were wet, hungry or tired when you cried. As an adult, you are responsible for stating your own needs.

(2) Overcome your fear of "I" messages. Decide what is the worst that could happen when you speak up (or if you don't) and plan for the consequences. You'll be doing yourself and your mate a favor by learning how to express yourself more clearly. (3) Be persistent. Even if your mate doesn't understand or gets upset, keep trying. Reassure your partner of your love, but tell him (or her) that this is how you are. (4) Don't interpret your mate's insensitivity or unawareness as hostility or rejection. Men and women express caring in different ways. If you are unsure of where your partner stands, ASK. (5) Never, Never, NEVER accuse. "You make me feel... you always... you never..." are great ways to stop an exchange of information, start an argument and block change. Putting your mate on the defensive will keep the "silence" game going. Say instead "I feel scared" "I want to talk" "I would like you to do such and such."

(6) Be willing to negotiate. Once you've broken the silence habit, remember that marriage is a two-way street. Neither you nor your partner will always get everything you need and want. You've assumed responsibility for your own feelings, needs and wants. Be gracious enough to recognize the feelings, wants and needs of your mate.

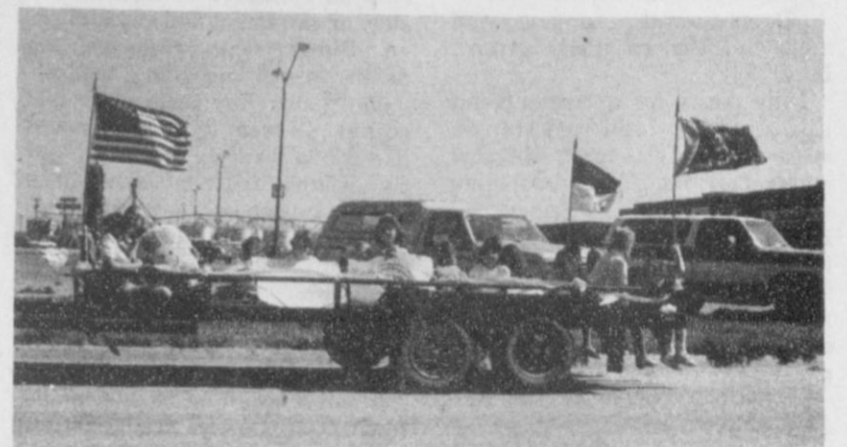

Pesticide Drift Committee report

The Pesticide Drift Committee, chaired by Representative Steve Carraker of Roby, TX, completed four months of work May 20, 1985. This was a forty man committee composed of representatives of Chemical Applicators, farm labor, State Board of Insurance, E.P.A., Biomedical Sciences, Trial Lawyers Assn., Audubon Society, Extension Service, and eight farmers of different commodities across the state. W.R. Moore of the Texas Wheat Producers Board represented Texas Wheat farmers on the committee.

He reports that of special interest to wheat farmers were recommendations that approve the use of all forms of 2-4D for control of winter weeds in wheat. Agreement was finally reached so that the high volatile Butyl Ester 2-4D may be used anytime subject to the Texas

Herbicide Law, Chapter 75 and the Texas Pesticide Law, Chapter 76.

2-4D is considered a very important chemical for the economical control of winter weeds in wheat, especially the various mustards, and the Butyl Ester form is particularly effective during the cold weather. It is essential that these chemicals be used properly to assure their continued availability, Moore said.

Having the right technical staff or producer-members at the right place at the right time, such as Moore's service to the Pesticide Drift Committee, is the principal purpose of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, supported statewide by producers through a 1/2 cent per bushel self-assessment to protect their interest and enhance their income.

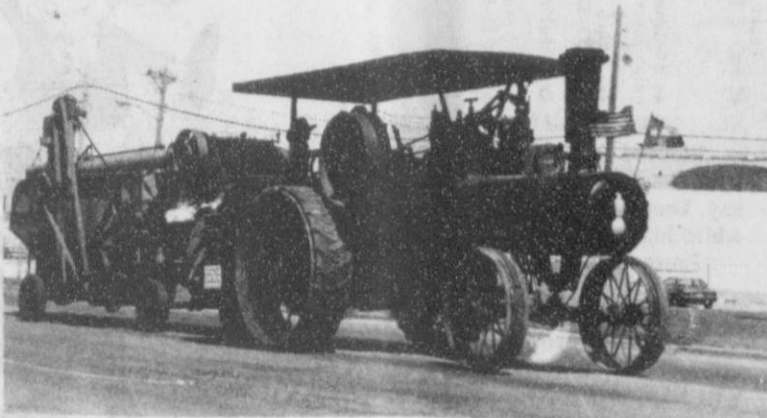

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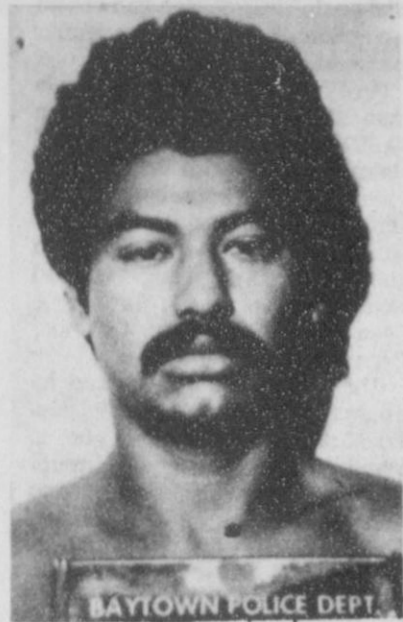
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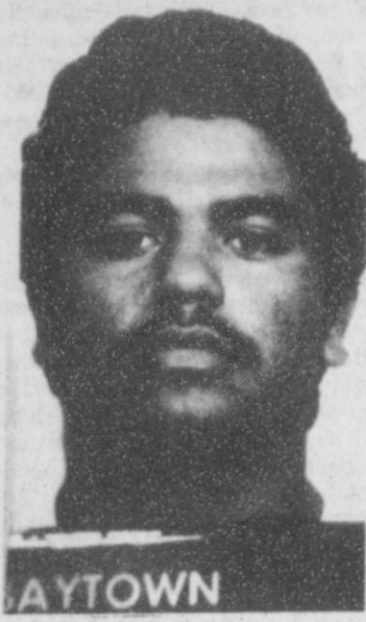

BAYTOWN, Texas -- Police say brothers George Duran Trejo and Servando Trejo Duran, Jr., have wandered the same path through most of their life.

They lived together in Baytown, worked at the same type of jobs, and even might have killed together.

Now they are linked together once again. The pair, wanted on warrants charging them with the December, 1984, murder of Eusebio Gomez, have been added to the Texas Most Wanted list. Rewards of up to \$1,000 each are being offered for information leading to the capture of the two fugitives.

Detectives with the Baytown Police Department say that around 2:10 a.m. on December 15, 1984, Trejo and Duran got into an argument with Gomez around Harbor and Market Streets. A witness told investigators that Duran stabbed Gomez in the heart, while Trejo hit the victim on the head with a baseball bat.

An autopsy report indicated that either the stab wound or the blow to the head would have been sufficient to cause Gomez' death.

On January 24, 1985, the brothers were indicted on murder charges by the Harris County Grand Jury.

Servando Trejo Duran, Jr., is 23 years old, 6-0, 195 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. When last seen by authorities, he was wearing a thick mustache. He has a tattoo with the name "Marie" on his right shoulder. Authorities say Duran sometimes uses the first name "Jimmy".

George Duran Trejo is 17 years old, 5-3, 210 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes.

Detectives say that although Duran and Trejo are brothers, one uses his father's last name and the other uses his mother's maiden name.

The pair usually find work in the construction industry, primarily as laborers.

Investigators believe the brothers might have fled to Mexico and could be residing in a border town, just out of reach of American authorities.

Anyone with information about the location of Duran and Trejo is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program.

In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities. Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

SHOPPING FOR SWIMWEAR? KNOW THE FABRICS!

Before you pay big money for that little bikini, check to see what kind of fabric it's made from. Differences in fabrics will also make a difference in how the swimsuit feels and whether it looks as good in September as when you bought it in May.

Swimsuits are generally made of knit fabrics. These fabrics are stretchy, mold to the body and recover to their original form. Knit swimwear fabrics come with one-way and two-way stretch.

Some swimsuits, especially men's trunks, are made from woven fabrics. Since woven fabrics resist stretching, these swimsuits require elastic at stress areas such as the waist, leg openings and bodice area.

Women's and girls' swimsuits are often made from knitted fabrics of 85% nylon and 15% spandex. Some fabrics contain as much as 25% spandex for greater elasticity and holding power. Cotton and polyester are often blended with small amounts of spandex for knitted fabrics with a natural fiber look.

Here are some fibers commonly used in swimsuit fabrics and their wear features: o Nylon and polyester are strong, elastic, resist abrasion and dry quickly. Nylon has greater elasticity than polyester. Both fibers are wrinkle resistant and easy care. They are especially good for swimsuits that will get a lot of wear.

o Spandex has excellent stretch recovery and has fair resistance to damage from sunlight, oils and abrasion. It's weakened by chlorine and needs to be rinsed well in worn

in chlorinated water. Even with rinsing, fabrics high in spandex will wear out soon if exposed to chlorine frequently. A swimsuit high in spandex might be best seen at the swimming pool rather than in it!

Cotton is soft and feels comfortable. It's most successfully used in swimwear fabrics in small quantities because it is not elastic, has poor stretch recovery, dries slowly and feels heavy when wet.

Whatever fabric you choose for your swimsuit, remember that it's designed for use in cool to lukewarm water. Exposing swimwear to hot tub temperatures will cause the fabric to wear out much more rapidly than normal.

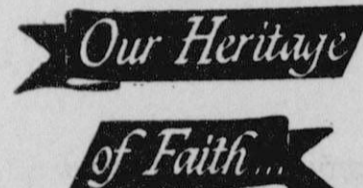

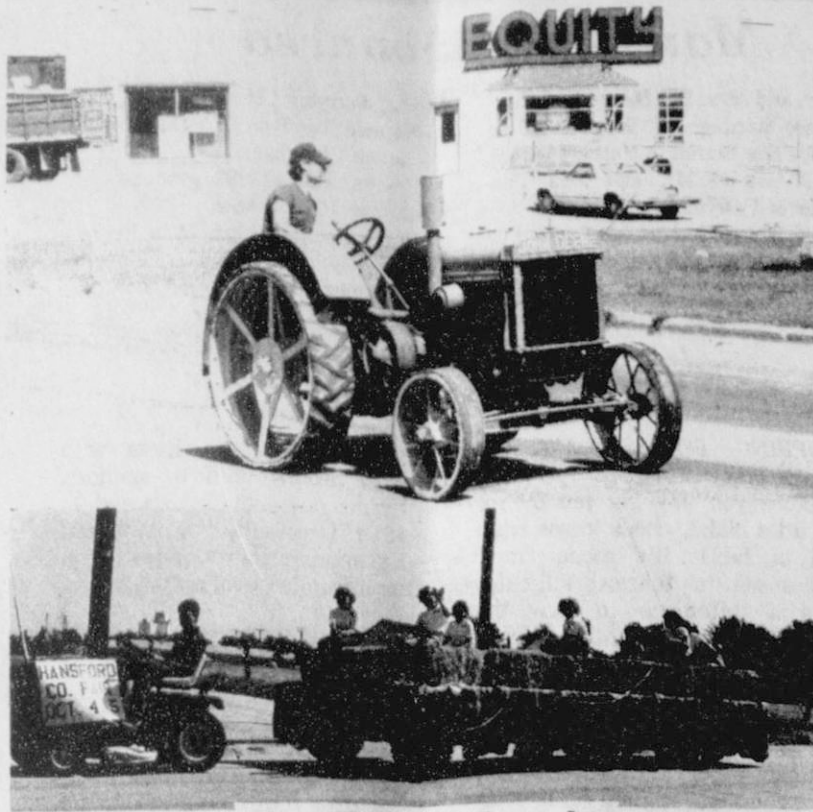
