Maize Harvest To Be Largest

Combines are beginning to take the initial bite out of the largest irrigated maize crop in Hansford County's short history.

All over the county the big hungry machines are chewing into fields of grain that is maturing before the first frost. However, elevator operators and farmers say the great massive push will come after the frost is on the pun'kin."

Agriculture officials in the county are predicting a maize crop in excess of five million bushels for the county.

They base their predictions on an estimated 50,000 acres of irrigated maize in the county and an average yield of 100 bushels per acre.

County agent Robert Adamson said many, many farms have maize that will exceed the 100 bushels by a big margin. But, in some places where farmers got their wells in operation late and tried to water too many acres, the yields will be lower.

Based on Adamson's conservative estimate of the crop, the harvest should produce an income of eight and one-half million dollars for the county.

The production and income figures do not include the grain produced in Ochiltree and Hutchinson counties that will move into elevators in Hansford County.

Adamson said farmers who have put irrigated maize on new ground and added just a small

amount of fertilizer are getting outstanding yields. He said this shows that production in future years will far outstrip present yields.

Dry weather for the past two years has forced area farmers into irrigated farming. On Oct. 4, the local office of the water district had received 184 applications for new irrigation wells since Jan. 1.

Of the 184 applications there have been 123 wells completed, 17 applications cancelled and six dry holes. The rest of the wells are listed as incomplete, but many may be pumping water and the logs not yet turned in to the water district office.

With the new wells and application on incomplete wells, Hansford County already has a possibility of 435 farm irrigation wells. There are 21 industrial wells in the county serving towns and plants. At the present time there are 380 wells known to be pumping water on irrigated crops.

Adamson said the new wells will greatly increase the irrigated wheat acreage in the county this winter. The acreage could almost triple that of last year when there was an estimated 30 to 35,000 acres in the county.

Predicting that 400 wells will be in operation in time to aid the wheat crop. If each well waters 200 acres of wheat, then the acreage will be 80,000 acres.

The 19-year old woman was listed as being in an extremely critical condition Tuesday night.

Mrs. Pittman and her six-week old son were enroute to Perryton for the baby to have a medical check-up.

The family lives in Goodwell, Okla., where Frank Pittman attends Panhandle A&M College.

Mrs. Pittman is the former Eva Cator.

which will include a variety of musical numbers. Or if you can't attend, the program will be broadcast on KEYE in Perryton.



End of an Era!

Right now Spearman merchants are probably having the poorest business season in several years. Dry weather has produced successive crop failures and a dry fall is not promising much in the way of dry land wheat for winter grazing. Things could be looking very dim for this area if this year did not mark the end of an era in Hansford County.

With the big push in irrigation, forced on by the past two dry years, massive dry land farming and complete crop failures will take their place in the past of Hansford County along with Old Hansford, horses and buggies and the sod plow.

The first large irrigated maize crop is on the eve of harvest. This crop is going to have a much larger impact on the local economy than many expect. The bulk of the crop will not begin moving to the elevators until the first frost, but the crop is in the fields and barring storms and a long wet fall, it will put many dollars in circulation.

With more irrigation wells being drilled all the time and more acres going under irrigation, the prospects for years of no agriculture income are passing into limbo.

Some wise early riser has said that it is darkest just before the dawn. Hansford County's new day of irrigated agriculture will give the area a completely different kind of economy that will be prosperous for the many that are to follow the water here.
