New Telephone Rates Effective Oct. 1

The Public Utility Commission, August 5, granted General Telephone Company of the Southwest a \$31 million increase in annual revenues, including a \$4 million penalty for poor service, and ordered the Commission staff to initiate on Feb. 1, 1981, an investigation to determine the Company's effectiveness in meeting the Commission service objectives and standards.

New rates for Spearman customers will become effective Oct. 1, 1980, according to General Telephone will be \$6.65 for monthly residence one-party access charge, and \$17.60 for monthly business one-party access charge. There is an additional monthly charge for company-owned equipment connected to the network.

General Telephone filed on Feb. 25, a request for a \$58.3 million increase in annual revenues and during hearings which concluded in June staunchly defended its overall level of service attributing some service problems in 1979 on severe ice storms. Hurricane Claudette and extensive flooding during late summer and fall in GTSW service areas near Houston.

Company witnesses during the hearings also supported the need for the full amount stating that it was necessary to keep pace with the exceedingly rapid growth in GTSW's service areas, rapidly changing technology, the need to improve and expand service and services and an unprecedented high level of inflation.

F.E. Hightower, vice presi-

dent-revenue requirements, described the penalty-the first of its kind imposed by the PUC-as "unusually harsh", especially the additional provisions imposed by the Commissioners above those recommended by Hearing Examiner Philip Ricketts.

"We are extremely disappointed," Hightower said, adding "the Company probably will not determine its next step until the final order is received in the near future and fully evaluated."

Rex Bailey, vice president-marketing and service, said the Company will do everything within its power to keep General Telephone's service levels trending upward as they have been since the first of the year. He added it will not be easy without

the additional revenue, however, the Company still has every intention of meeting the service standards not presently being met.

Hightower said the Commission's ruling called for the \$4 million service penalty to be removed if the staff investigation scheduled in February 1981 revealed the Company was meeting the Commission service objectives and standards. If not, then the recommendation includes a suggestion that the staff be instructed to consider initiating proceedings to decertify the Company in its serving areas in Texas.

Rates in effect until October 1 were established on a city-by-city basis prior to the establishment of the PUC in September 1976, but under the tariff

approved by the Commission basic service rates will be based on the number of telephones which can be reached without a long distance charge and are placed in 10 separate groups. The monthly charge for company owned instruments will be based on the type of instrument.

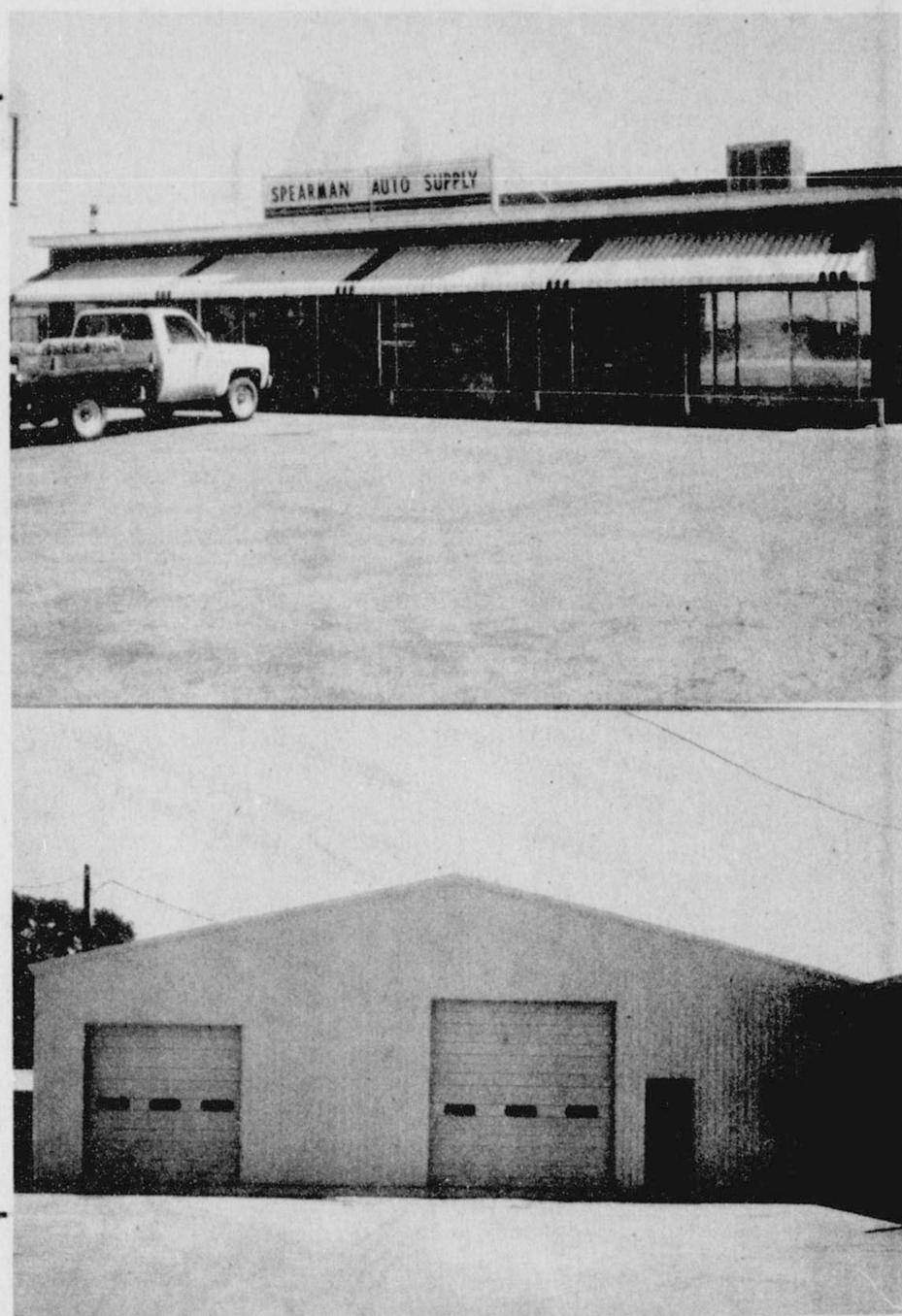

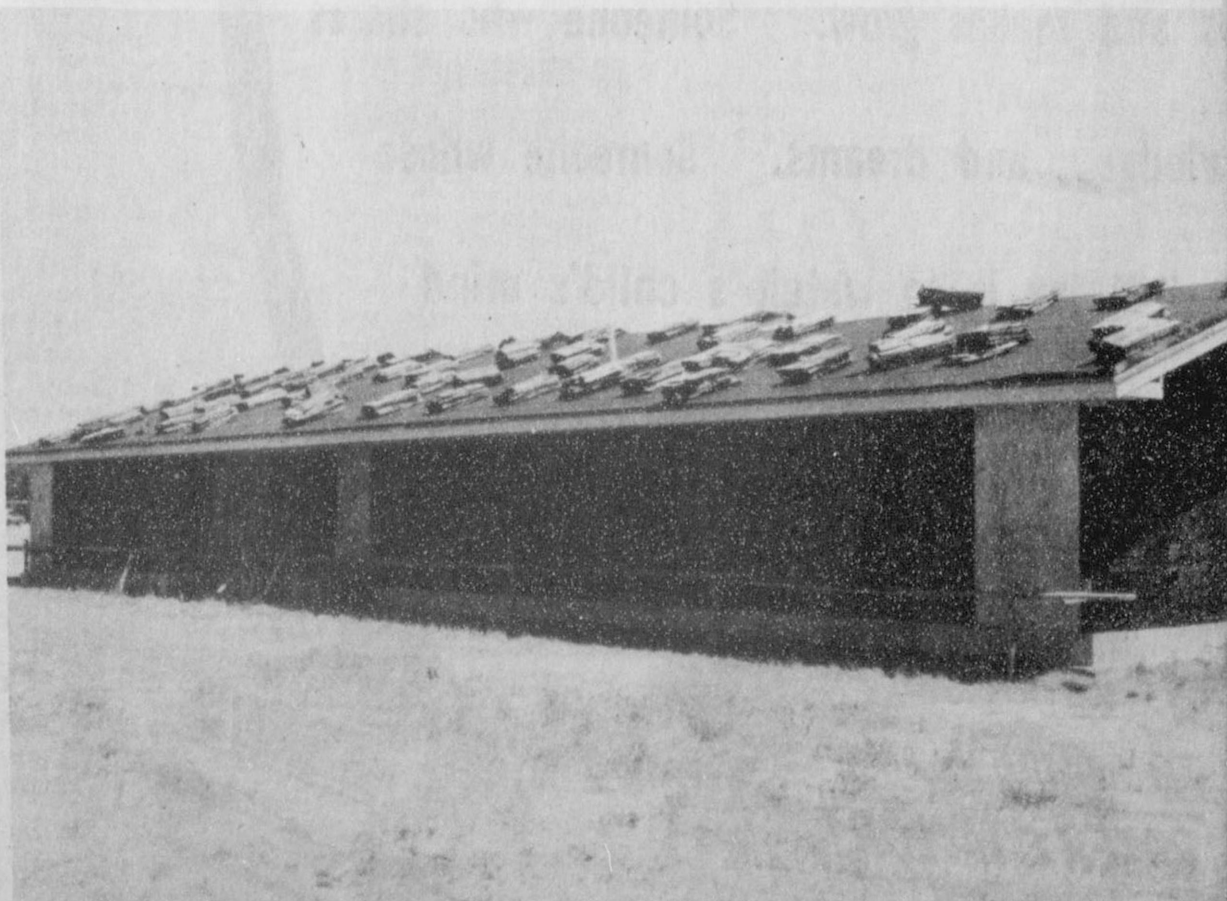

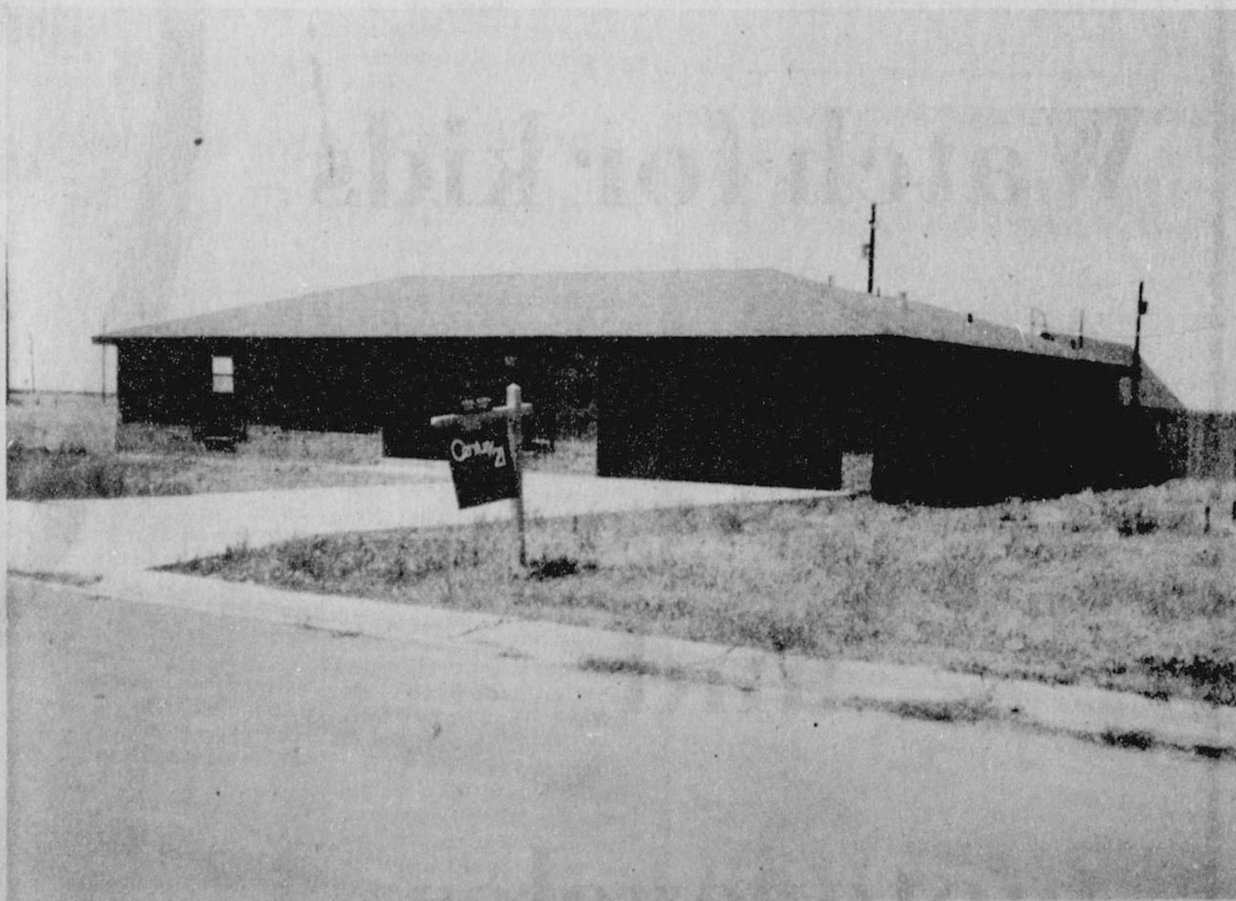


BILL PHELPS IS IN NEW LOCATION--



New Agreement Called From Grain Reserve

WASHINGTON--Sorghum in the new farmer-owned reserve is being called, because prices at selected markets--as adjusted to reflect farm-level prices--have been at or above the \$5.18 per hundredweight call level for five consecutive days, John Goodwin, acting executive vice president of the Commodity Credit Corporation, said today. Old grain reserve agreements for sorghum were called July 17.

Old and new agreement nets are also in call status. Barley, corn and old agreement and new agreement wheat have been released from the reserve. Goodwin said calling loans on sorghum in the reserve means farmers have 90 days from the date of notification of the call to repay their CCC reserve loans. Under the grain reserve program, farmers own the commodities and are not required to sell their grain. If they do not repay the loan, however, they must forfeit the grain to the CCC. About 23 million hundredweight of sorghum (1.04 million metric tons) are in the new grain reserve program.

County officials of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, will officially notify producers their grain has been called and the date by which the loan must be redeemed, Goodwin said. The farmer-owned grain reserve program, established by Congress in the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977, was designed to stabilize marketing. Under the program, farmers are eligible to place wheat and feed grains into a reserve during periods of low prices. In return, farmers receive CCC price support loans on the grain in reserve as well as annual storage payments. If prices rise to the "release" level, farmers can repay the loan and market the crop without incurring a penalty. The call level for feed grains under the new reserve program is 145 percent of the national average loan rate. The 1979 loan level for sorghum is \$3.57 per hundredweight. Data used in determining the call level includes a daily report by the Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA, which shows prices at selected markets. The markets reviewed by CCC for sorghum are Kansas City and Texas High Plains.

USDA Announces Final Wheat Contract Sale

WASHINGTON, July 11--Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Jim Williams said today the Commodity Credit Corporation has completed the sale of wheat contract rights that had been acquired as a result of the suspension of exports to the Soviet Union. The invitation, W-1, to bid on the contracts is therefore withdrawn, he said. CCC today assigned contract rights for 280,700 metric tons (10.3 million bushels) of U.S. no 2 or better hard red winter wheat, minimum 11 percent protein, maximum 13 percent moisture.

Three companies submitted offers last night for a total of 337,500 tons (12.4 million bushels). Each company bid successfully. The wheat contracts sold were scheduled for delivery free on board (f.o.b.) vessel--which includes transportation and loading costs--during October and November from Gulf ports. The weighted average price was \$4.84-1/2 per bushel (\$178.01 per ton). Yesterday's reported Kansas City spot market price was \$4.14-1/2 per bushel (\$152.31 per ton).

Williams said nine companies had bid in the 18 tenders held since May 7. Seven companies had been successful bidders and were assigned contract rights to accept delivery of wheat in each month June through November. Williams said he was pleased the wheat contract retendering process had been completed with no apparent adverse impact on market prices.



Texas A&M, in turn, is a part of the nationwide land-grant system which involves 52 other colleges and universities. The program receives further support through this link as part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

State, county and federal support, then, combine to make 4-H a unique organization, says Mrs. Winegarner.

But it's the support of private citizens, organizations, corporations and foundations whose assistances make it possible to multiply 4-H public resources many times over.

Yes, 4-H'ers are learning and growing through the development of their head, heart, hands and health. 4-H is shaping tomorrow's world, emphasizes Mrs. Winegarner.
