

City Parks Demand Attention

Why are the parks unmowed this summer?

A surplus of rain during the past month and a lack of funds was the answer given by City Manager Darce Foshee Friday afternoon.

Where did all the 25 cent park fees on water meters go?

This 25 cents which causes so much controversy does not go as far as one might think. This tax, fee or whatever you name it, puts approximately \$285.00 per month in the park fund.

During the eight months of this fiscal year the 25 cent collection has totaled \$2,280. At the beginning of the tax year, Oct. 1, 1964, the records show a balance of \$78.08 in the fund.

Since that time the fund has paid \$1,576.20 for seeding and fertilizing half of the park in Blodgett-Linn addition.

Part of one man's salary paid from the park fund has total \$2,775.36, plus \$98.06 for social security.

These expenses, plus other bills for insurance, fuel, utilities, supplies and insurance bring the total expenditures from the park fund to approximately \$4,400 and deposits to that fund totaled over \$4,500.

The park fund balance at the end of May was \$184.32.

Funds were transferred into the park fund to make-up the deficit.

When asked about a full time employee in the parks, Foshee said he was not aware of such a policy. He said the records showed that part of

one man's salary had been paid from the park fund each month. Therefore, he had been sending men to work in the parks when they were available.

Foshee, who became City Manager Feb. 15, did not know of an agreement between the Park Board and then City Manager Ken Conrey. This agreement was that one man would be employed fulltime in the park during the summer months.

This agreement was reached after the City Park Board threatened to resign. The women on the board were protesting the care being given the parks at that time.

The manager said the fee would pay for one during the three months of the summer and also pay for the upkeep expenses. However, it was his understanding the fund was supposed to provide a man the year around and since

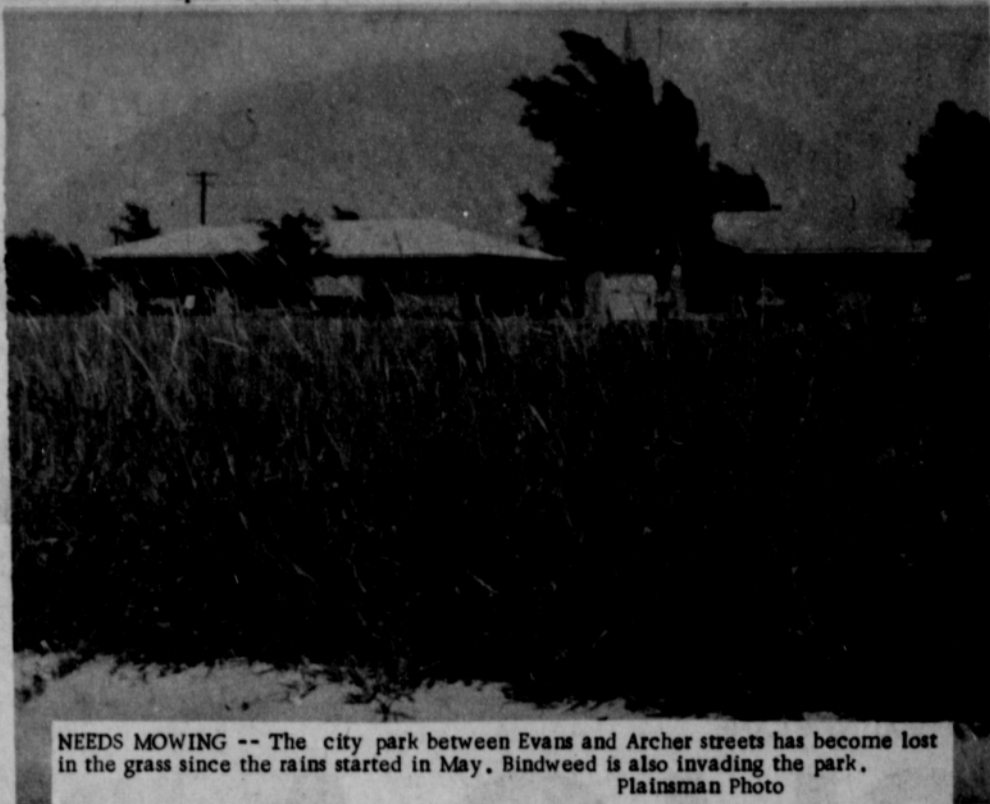
there was not enough money to do this, he had been using what help he had available.

The sprinkler system in Blodgett-Linn Park cost the city very little. Foshee said Leo Dacus provided the pipe from old pipe not good enough to be used in the water system and all the work was done by city employees and equipment.

The only cost was for grass seed. The seeding there last fall died during the cold, dry winter.

Foshee said workers were scheduled to go to work in the parks Friday and the areas will be cleaned up as soon as possible.

In the past only the amount of money actually collected has been deposited in the park fund. Foshee now is depositing the amount billed each month to the park fund.

Wheat Harvest Is Started

Wheat harvest in the Spearman area started rolling late Friday afternoon and was picking up speed Saturday afternoon.

A large number of farmers were able to get in their fields Friday and even more were going to start Saturday. Combines are having to

wait until noon to begin cutting because of the high humidity in the morning.

Elevator men said the wheat brought in Friday afternoon was making about 14 to 16 bushels per acre. It is expected the dryland crop will run from 10 to 20 bushels per acre.

Highway Dept.

Pre-Construction Safety Conference Held Here

A Pre-Construction Safety Conference, covering highway construction work to begin soon in Hansford County, was held Wednesday in Spearman.

The Texas Highway Department has awarded a contract

to Cooper & Woodruff, Inc., Contractors, of Amarillo for widening Farm Road 759 from the east city limits of Spearman, east to the Ochiltree County Line and for widening Farm Road 760 from Farm Road 759 to one mile south.

The project has two objectives: to provide a wider stronger pavement and to improve the bad drainage situation in the east part of Spearman.

These two highways are presently twenty feet wide with six inches of caliche base. They will be widened to twenty-eight feet and the caliche base will be increased to a thickness of twelve in.

The City of Spearman has acquired additional right of way along the east side of FM 760 and along the south side

of FM 759 to the lake east of Spearman. The highway ditch will be widened so that it will have approximately twice the water carrying capacity that it now has. Additional culverts will be installed across FM 760 at Third and Seventh Avenues.

The estimated cost of this highway work is \$134,300. It will be financed from state highway funds.

Charles Schmidt represented the contracting firm at this meeting. He stated that caliche was already being crushed and stockpiled on the Charles C. O'Loughlin property northeast of Spearman.

Culvert work is scheduled to begin about June 21st. Excavation of the wide ditch will begin about July 20th with caliche hauling and asphalt surfacing following immediately. The work should be completed by September 1st.

Mr. L. R. Loyd, resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department in Perryton, will be in charge of the construction.

The roadway will be kept open to traffic at all times but motorists may be asked to drive along the shoulders or in the ditches for short distances. A temporary forty-five mile per hour speed zone has been authorized for the construction areas. Motorists are urged to observe and obey the signs, lights, barricades, and flagmen used to direct traffic.

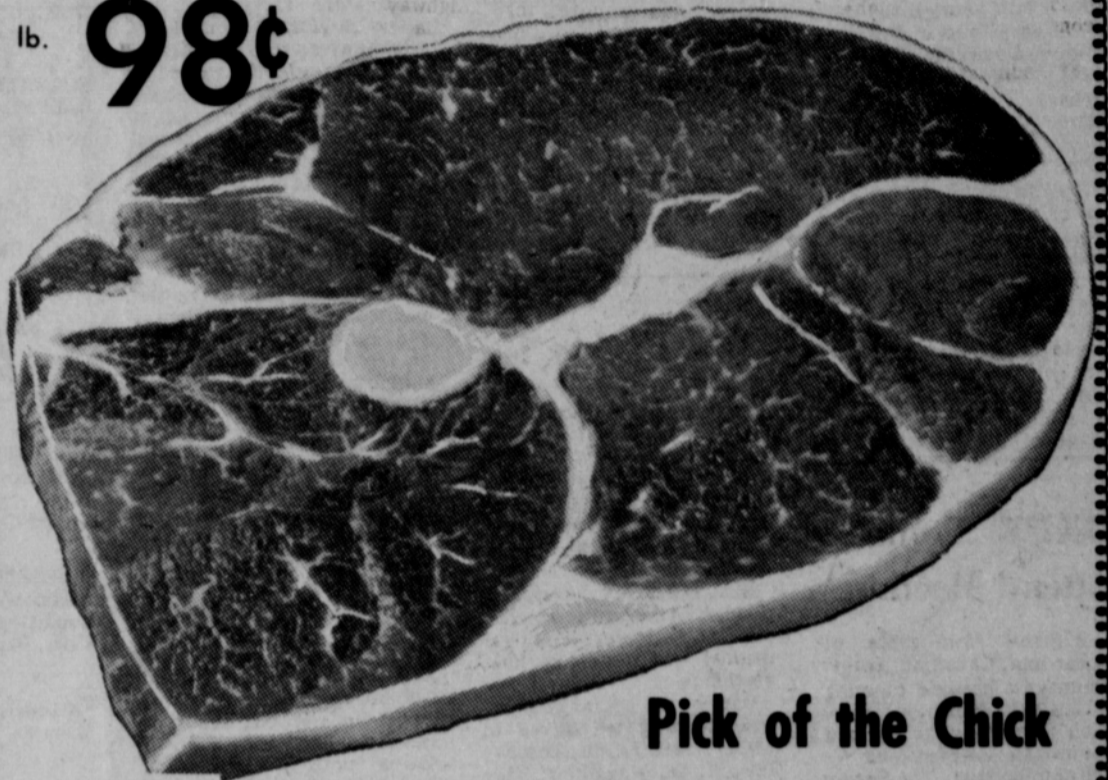

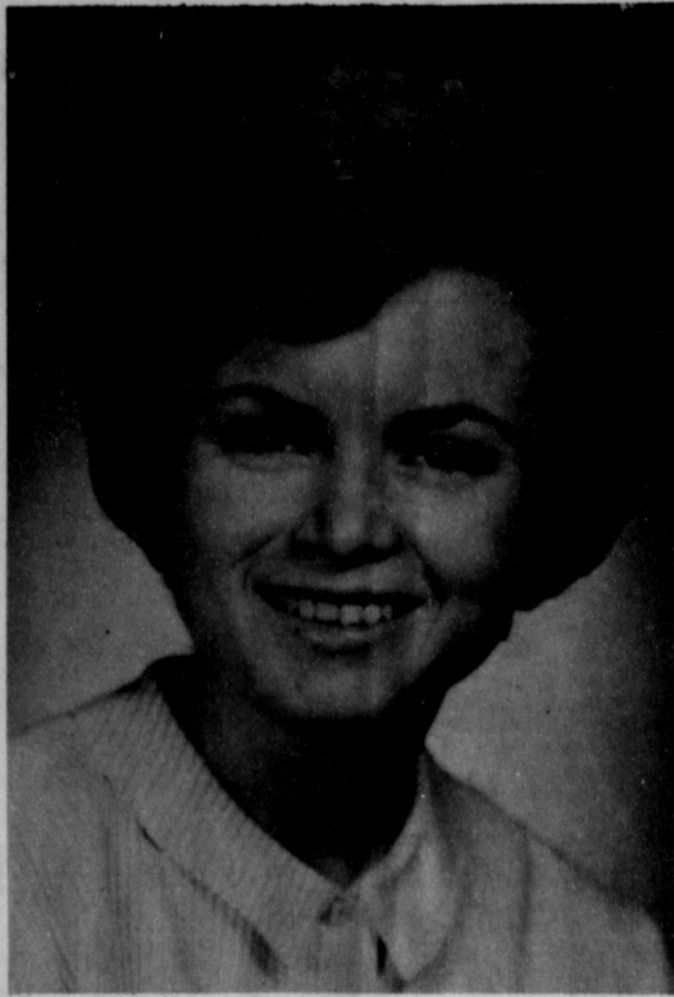

I believe in the reality of sin. Sin is "missing the mark" of perfection set for us by God. Sin is a fall from righteousness it is lawlessness, it is a transgression against God's Law, it is wickedness. These descriptions of sin are used in the Bible. Sin thus is not only evil deeds, but is a condition in which we find ourselves.

Man is not his own savior until he can perfectly keep God's Holy law perfect. And according to Scripture, not one of us does. Try as hard as we can we cannot run away from the shadow of sin.

The Bible teaches sin terminated man's fellowship with God. Romans 5:18 reads. "Then as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all men" Adam led all humans away from God. Or Romans 5:12 states "Therefore as sin came into the world through one man and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all men sinned." The last phrase "All men sinned" in the original tongue means a completed act---all men sinned vicariously in Adam. All men to be born were now regarded as having broken God's Law, having been

counted as being spiritually dead and in need of being born again.

It is at this point many Christian churches part company. It is unfortunate that churches can't agree what happened at the fall. This leads us to various denominations---some who say infants must be baptized to be brought into a living relationship with God. Others say man only has a learning for sin and is not held accountable until the age of discretion. We must be careful not to read into the Bible---for this idea isn't promoted by Scripture. But so many do follow it blindly. Thus we vary on just what sin is. Perhaps Christians need to get together for sensible, unheated Bible study and come to some understanding just what sin is---condition or only acts.

But anyone that sins is outside the Kingdom of God unless that guilt is erased or forgiven. Thus God in His Son Jesus has sought to love us and win us back to heaven. We all agree sin needs the atoning blood of Christ to be forgiven and we invite you to the Savior Jesus.

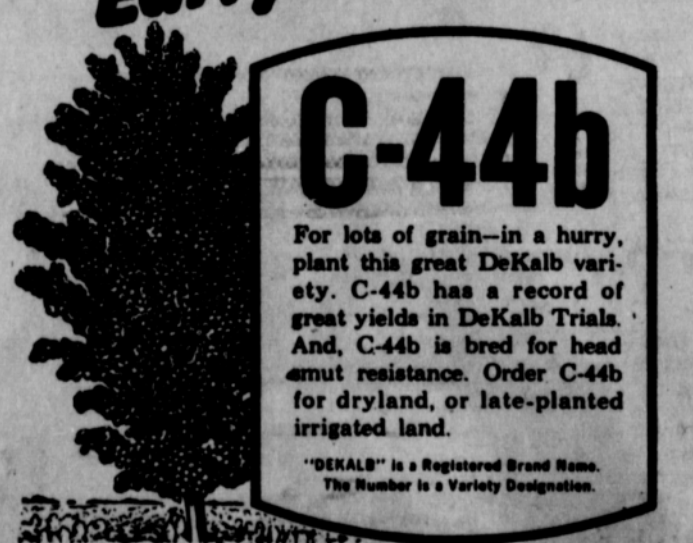


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
