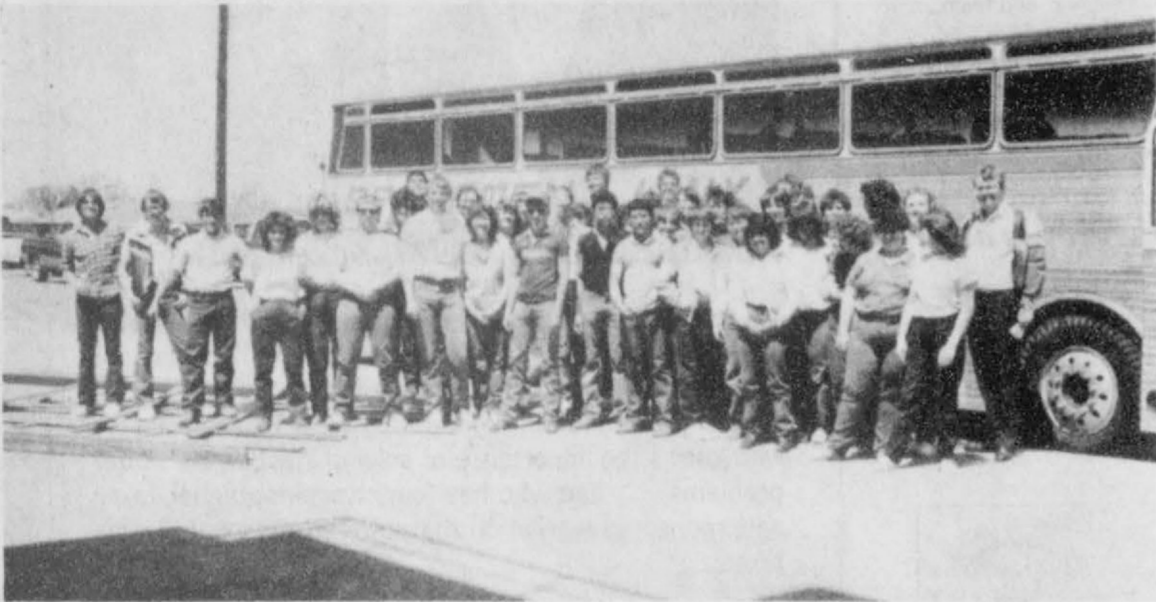

Rev. W.R. Lawrence is the new interim pastor of First Baptist Church. He and his wife moved to the parsonage here last week from Phillips where he has been interim pastor.

Rev. Lawrence is a young 77 years and has served 53 years in the ministry. He has pastored First Baptist Churches in Lefors, McLean, Dumas, Dalhart, and Clarendon.

Clarendon is home for Rev. Lawrence and his lovely wife, Inez. They retired in 1973 from the First Baptist Church.

After retirement they were pioneer missionaries in Spokane, Washington for two years and since that time have gone overseas at least twice a year to various countries on short mission projects.

Rev. Lawrence stated that he is a graduate of Baylor University and Southwestern Seminary.

He also recalls how his life and that of Rev. Ray Stephens who was the pastor here after World War II had intertwined. He and the late Rev. Stephens were chaplains on Guam in World War II, and both came back to the Panhandle to pastor churches. Then during the Korean War both were called back



to the service and when he arrived at his destination he learned of the tragic drowning of Bro. Stephens there the day before.

The Lawrence's have two children, a son, W.R. Jr., a daughter, Mrs. Viril Ruth, 4 granddaughters and 2 great-grandsons.

The City Council met in regular session April 23, at the temporary city hall with Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett presiding. Alderman present were Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Burl Buchanan. Alderman absent was Bob Pearson. Staff present were Jim Murray, city manager; Charlotte Sheets, city secretary; D.J. Alberts, police chief; and visitor, Wynn Crenshaw, YMCA director.

The council unanimously approved the lease with the YMCA for the operation of the municipal swimming pool for 1984 with the

provision that the city will provide utilities and maintenance and the YMCA will split the surplus income over expenses with the city.

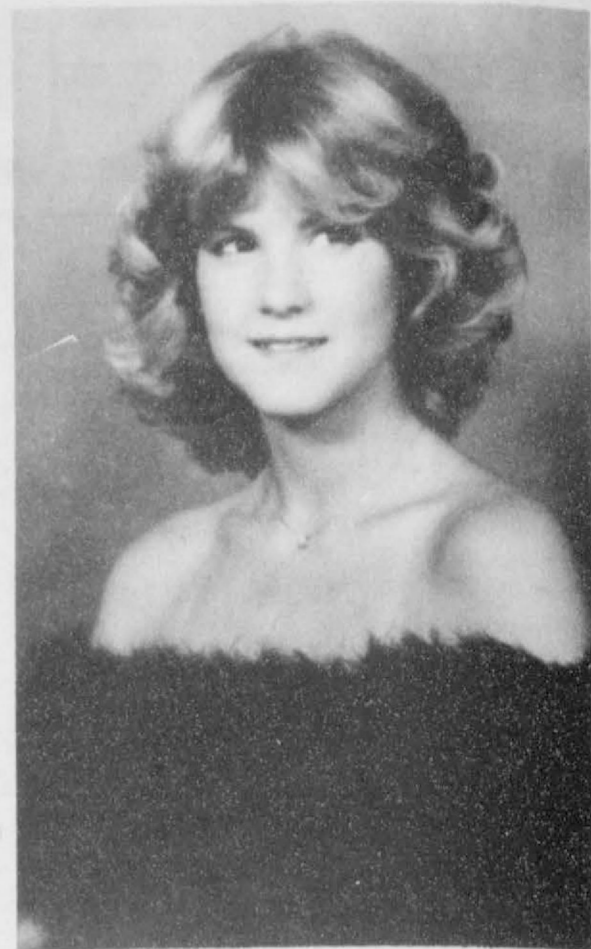

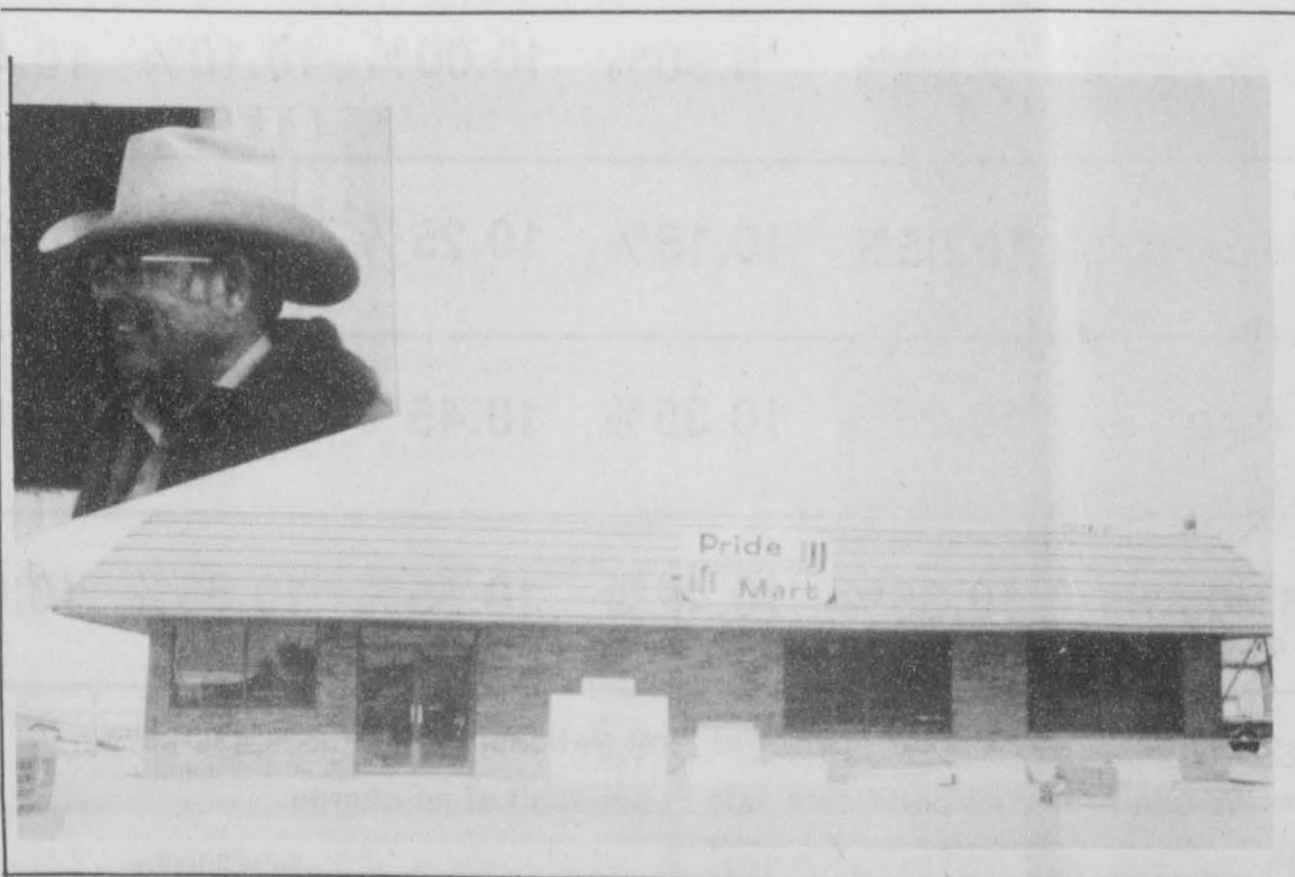

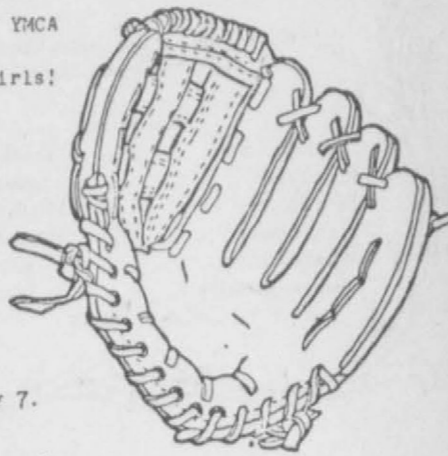

Police Report

On April 20, 1984, at approximately 11:28 p.m. an officer made a traffic stop on South Highway 207. The officer stopped the vehicle for running the flashing red light. After stopping the vehicle, the officer walked up to the vehicle and was met by the driver. The officer advised the driver why he was stopped. The 1984 Cars

The magazine *Consumer Reports* has just issued its annual issue rating 1984 model automobiles. As has been the case for years, foreign-made cars rate very highly.

Most interestingly, the biggest maker in the country, GM, does very poorly in the ratings. In the five categories of cars in which *Consumer Reports*'s magazine (*Consumer Reports*) offers recommendations, no GM car is in any of the five. Three Ford-built cars are included. One naturally thinks of the most prestigious U.S.-built car, Cadillac, when scanning the ratings and statistics.

A surprise in this regard is that both the Buick Riviera and

Olds Toronado have a slightly larger gas tank, bigger engine displacement, higher horsepower, fewer wheel revolutions per mile and a lower high gear ratio than the Eldorado.

Very similar in size, both of these cars sell for less. Cadillac's frequency of repair is also judged far worse than average.

There's much food for thought, plus specifications, performance figures, prices, and other data in the new car-rating issue—always great fun to read each spring.

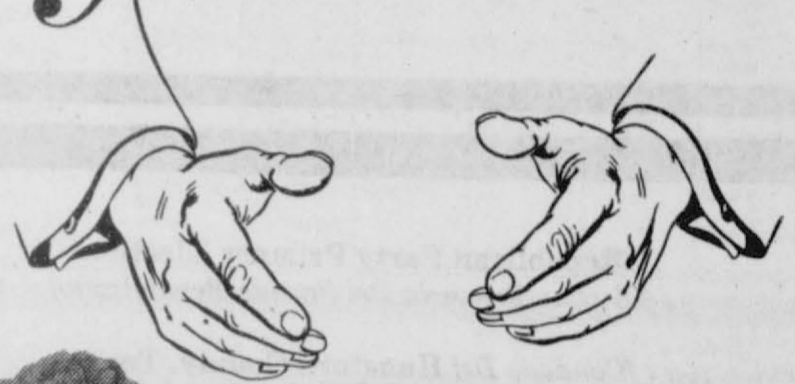

BUSINESS OUTLOOK

By Edward Thorlund
Events may be building up to produce a better economic outlook this summer or fall. The first good sign was an administration report that tax collections were better than anticipated, which will cut the predicted deficit this year by about eight billion dollars.
The \$8 billion itself isn't enough to cause a ripple but in light of congressional budget office predictions of a bigger deficit-the fore-

cast of some months back--the report indicates a different trend.
Instead of rising, the deficit thus may be going down, as a result of the recovery. Second, Congress is about to pass a deficit reduction bill, which will probably provide for a reduction of between \$150 and \$180 billion over the next three years. That will help.
Third, there are now definite indications inflation is not to be a serious threat because of a too-strong recovery. Business in some lines has slowed enough to indicate a slower recovery pace.
This, in turn, eases the pressure on interest rates, which were hiked twice in

late March and early April, to the chagrin of some in the administration. Psychology is all-important in the interest rate field.
If business expansion is slowing, and the deficit down over official forecasts, even if slightly, that's a different economic direction from what has been feared.
There's a good chance now that interest rates could drop in coming months, before the election. That would also help.

April, 1917

In April, 1917 the United States declared war on Germany. Americans believed many atrocity stories and were convinced the *Lusitania* had been wrongly and immorally sunk. They resented U-Boat warfare. The succeeding years have shown most of these convictions were incorrect. The *Lusitania* was indeed carrying contraband--and the German government had publicly warned Americans not to sail on her. And while U-Boat sinkings were a ruthless form of war, Britain was at that time attempting to starve out Germany by blockading all her ports; because Britain was stronger in surface ships, Germany's only recourse was to seek victory with a submarine campaign. U.S. entry into the war insured defeat of the Kaiser's Germany. That defeat and the unfair Treaty of Versailles produced first the Weimar Republic, weak and ineffective, and then Hitler. That, in turn, produced World War II, a divided Germany and the threat of world communist domination. Scholars now wonder long about America's action in 1917.

Rental Car Costs

The impression grows that rental car rates are almost totally illogical. In one area a company offers weekly rates of less than fifty dollars. In another, the same company charges that much for a car for one or two days. Recently cars were being offered by the major companies in Miami for \$39 a week. No comparable offer was available in most other communities. The airlines have followed similar discriminatory pricing for years. One could almost invariably fly from New York to Miami for less than a hundred dollars, both in season and out. To fly half that distance one-way to the Midwest or South would often cost more. No laws are violated in either case. But transportation is almost a public service industry, and there's a moral obligation to provide the public roughly equal treatment, without discrimination by section or region. What airlines and car rental companies do in price structuring can affect the economic well-being of cities and geographical areas significantly, especially those appealing to tourists. Continued frivolous rate structures, illogical and discriminatory, structures which too often "stick" the customer where there's limited choice, invite a negative public or corrective legislative reaction, or both.

EATING OUT

THE biggest failing of U.S. restaurants is in not offering enough good, home-cooked green and yellow vegetables with entrees. STANDARD fare in many restaurants, and practically all fast food outlets, is to offer potatoes and slaw. The slaw often comes in tiny paper cups--which customers should reject. That's not a fair vegetable serving. IF slaw isn't offered, perhaps a "mixed" salad is on the menu. That would likely be the only other hope at some chains. But what many restaurants call a mixed salad is not mixed and doesn't deserve the name salad. COOKED vegetables, while not as loaded with vitamins, are easier on the stomach. Millions have to watch their diets today. A big, raw salad can upset stomachs. That's why cooked vegetables are a necessary part of any good menu. A menu test is whether one can get a good cooked green and yellow vegetable with the entree. If one can't, the restaurant is probably low on imagination, and nutrition. A menu to be avoided, but which many fast-fooders offer, is meat, bread and potatoes. One could ask: "Where's the vegetable?"
