## Continental Singers To Perform Here

The 40-member "Continental Singers and Orchestra" will perform a live concert of contemporary Christian music in person on Monday, August 20th, at 7:30 p.m. at the Spearman Methodist Church.

## City Gets Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced this week that Texas cities shared \$268.9 million in rebates from the one-per cent city sales tax during the

first eight months of this year.

Bullock, who announced the cities' August allocation at \$27.3 million, said the yearly total is up 25 percent over the amounts cities received during the same period in 1978.

August allocations for the more than 900 Texas cities are running about 12 percent higher than August payments last year.

The City of Spearman sales tax check for August will be \$7,474.27 bringing 1979 payments to date of \$67,852.16. Payment for August 1978 was \$4,543.60 and payments through the eighth month in 1978 were \$67,584.81.

The City of Gruver will receive a check for \$1,609.61 for the month of August bringing their total payments to date for 1979 at \$13,526.42. Payment for August last year was \$567.69, with payments for the first eight months of 1978 totaling \$11,586.88, a net increase of 16 percent.

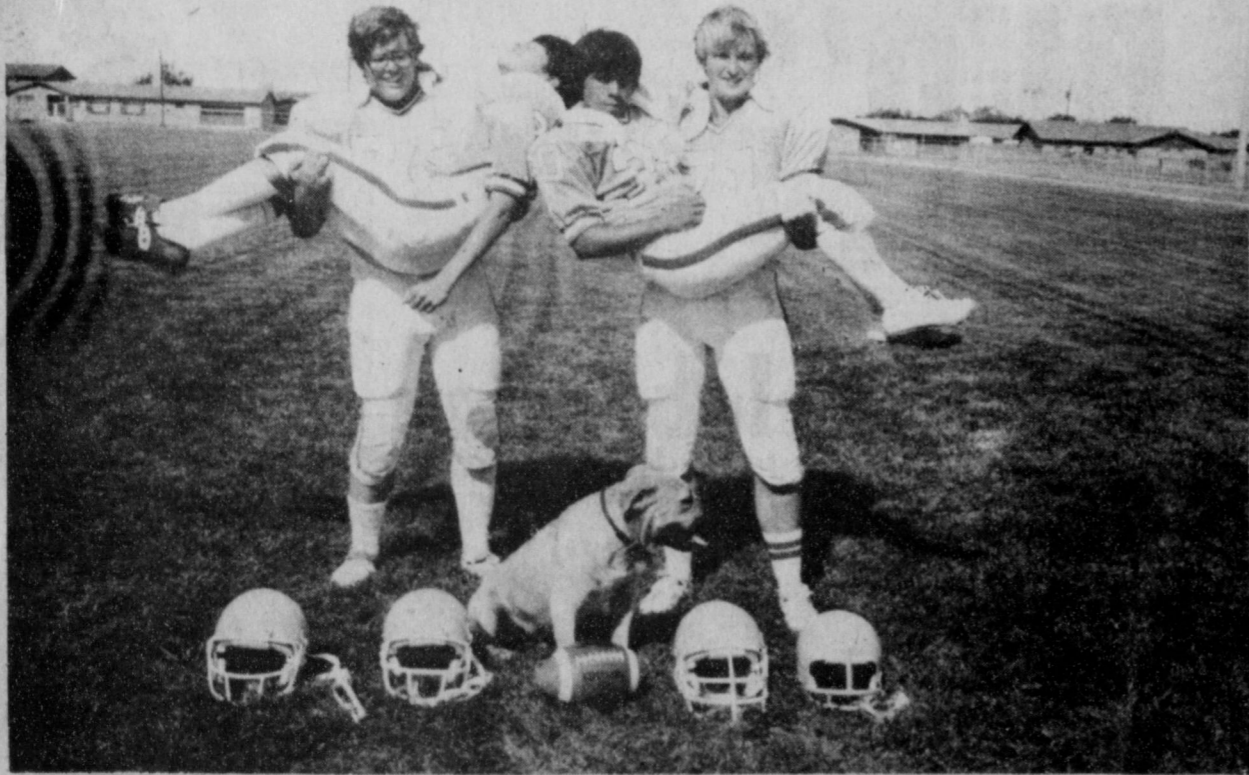
## Buried Saturday Hospital News

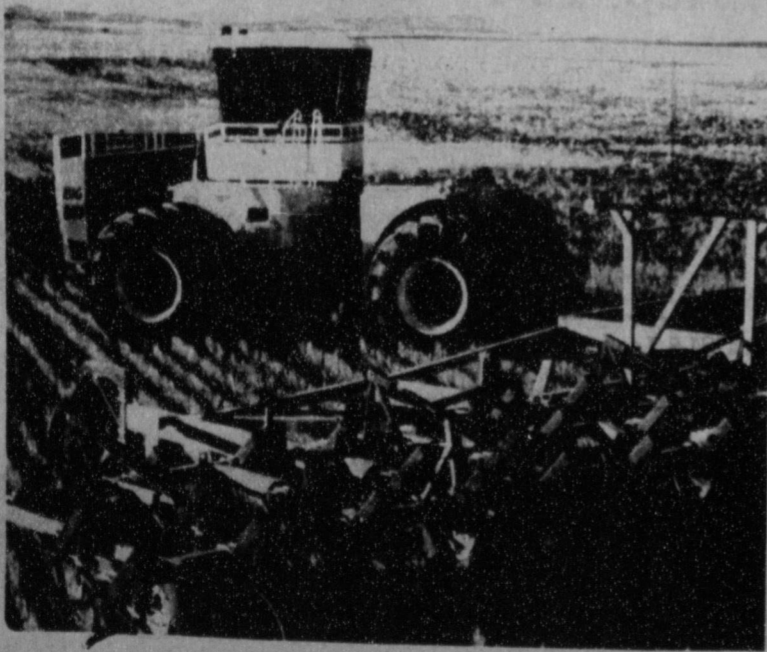

## USDA Proposes Amendments To Beef Referendum Regulations

Proposed amendments providing for confidentiality in voting and making the conduct of a beef referendum more efficient and less time consuming were announced today by Ray Fitzgerald, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

Under the Beef Research and Information Act, beef producers may vote to authorize the federal government to withhold a fixed amount from each cattle sale to be used for research and promotional purposes. Under an amendment to

the Act passed last year, the number of producers needed to approve such an order was reduced from two-thirds to a majority of producers voting in a referendum. Today's proposed amendments to the regulations are to reflect this change in the law.

The proposed changes provide for: (1) voting by secret ballot; (2) reducing the registration and voting periods from 12 days to 4 days; (3) reducing the time allowed for challenging a producer's eligibility to register and vote; and (4) reducing the time for the county ASCS executive director to make a

determination on the challenges.

The proposed amendments in no way obligate the Secretary of Agriculture to hold a referendum.

The amendments appeared in the Federal Register Aug. 7. Written comments must be received no later than Oct. 9 and may be sent to the Hearing Clerk, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250. 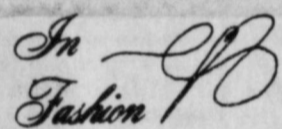

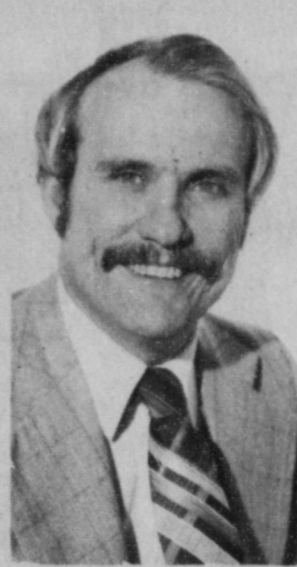

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Lesley Stinson, Bruce has had to relearn to walk and speak in the past nine months. He has undergone a total of eight surgeries in the past year and

more will come. But his parents are elated at his progress and that he will be able to return to school.

Bruce was injured September 19, 1978 in the high line accident near Canadian. He was flown to Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas and was in the burn center for 10 weeks. While at Parkland, he had four surgeries and used a total of 38 pints of blood.

There were complications

and the Waka youth came up with spinal meningitis and also went into a coma for six days. He submerged from the state of sleep with a loss of memory and he was unable to speak.

On November 17, he was released from the hospital and returned to his home in Waka. He later contacted hepatitis and became so weak that he couldn't walk.

Vera Cruz, New Spain, April 1554

"Woe to those of us who are going to Spain, because neither we nor the fleet will arrive there. Most of us will perish..."

The prophecy of doom delivered by Fray Juan Ferrer came true 29 days later. A spring equinox storm of yale force drove the small Spanish fleet due west through gulf waters. The Costa Dela Madalena loomed on the horizon. Minutes later three of the fragile wooden vessels were pounded against the white sand beach. Thus begins the story, "Treasure, People, Ships and Dreams," an exhibit of the 1554 Spanish shipwreck artifacts. The wreck touched off an im-

mediate salvage and rescue operation by Spanish officials, and other events lasting to the present; beachcombing, treasure hunts, court fights over artifact ownership, and scientific archeology and conservation efforts.

The artifacts featured in this display include cannons, silver coins, gold bullion, an anchor, a crossbow, and the oldest known astrolabe in existence. Text, photos, drawings and maps give the background of the Spanish shipwreck off Padre Island in 1554.

**Insurance Corner**

**LOSS OF SUPPLY SOURCE**

There are two types of contingent business interruption insurance. One of these, contributing properties coverage, indemnifies a company in case of a loss because of damage or destruction to ANOTHER firm supplying services, materials, or parts to the insured. For example, ABC Company supplies engines to the XYZ Auto Corporation. If a fire should completely destroy the ABC plant, the auto firm would experience an extremely serious interruption of business. Contributing properties insurance would cover that loss to the auto company.

The other type, recipient properties coverage, would be used by a subcontractor who sells products TO a prime contractor. If the plant of the prime contractor is damaged or destroyed, the subcontractor would "lose" its customer. This insurance would indemnify the subcontractor against this loss. Coverage of this type is considered essential when a company sells a great deal of its products to one large buyer, and when the product has a limited market potential.

**Free & Reduced Price For School Meals**

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the attached scale are eligible for free and reduced price meals. If children are eligible for free meals, they are also eligible for a free extra carton of milk, if served at a time other than the lunch hour. The reduced price for lunch and breakfast is 10 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills or shelter costs in excess of 30% of your income, or special education expense due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced price meals and milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the attached scale.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and you wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding program, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Applications for free and reduced price meals may be made anytime during the school year and forms are available in the school offices.

**New Rules May Decrease Football Injuries**

New rules and better equipment are slowly decreasing injury rates for Texas high school football players. But parents, players and coaches can do more to prevent injuries that occurred to more than 6,100 players in 1977.

About 7 percent of high school players were injured in

1977, compared to about 10 percent in 1973, said Bill Farney, state athletic director of the Interscholastic League.

Hopefully new rules will continue to reduce injuries. One new 1979 rule is designed to reduce knee injuries by regulating blocking below the waist, Farney said in the August issue

of Texas Medicine, the Texas Medical Association's monthly journal.

Parents, coaches and players need to make sure such rules are followed in order to decrease knee and other major categories of injuries such as ankle and shoulder injuries. Jerry Julian, M.D., chairman of

TMA's Committee on Athletics, said heat-related injuries also are a major source of problems, including death.

Few official rules protect players from heat problems so parents, coaches and players have to use common sense. The National Federation of State High School Associations says some steps to avoid heat illness include scheduling practices

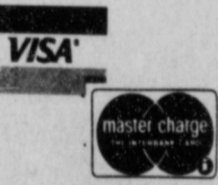
