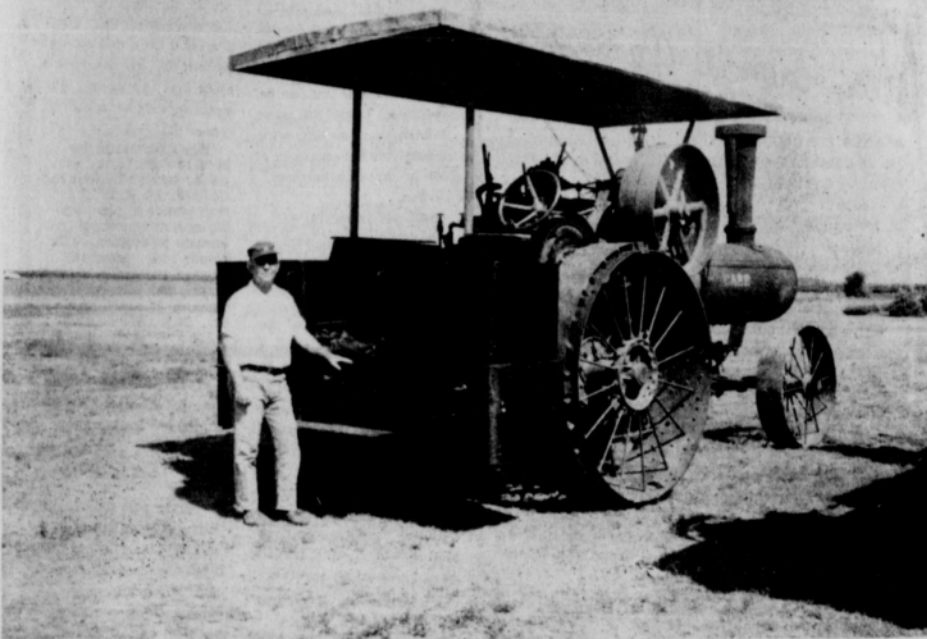
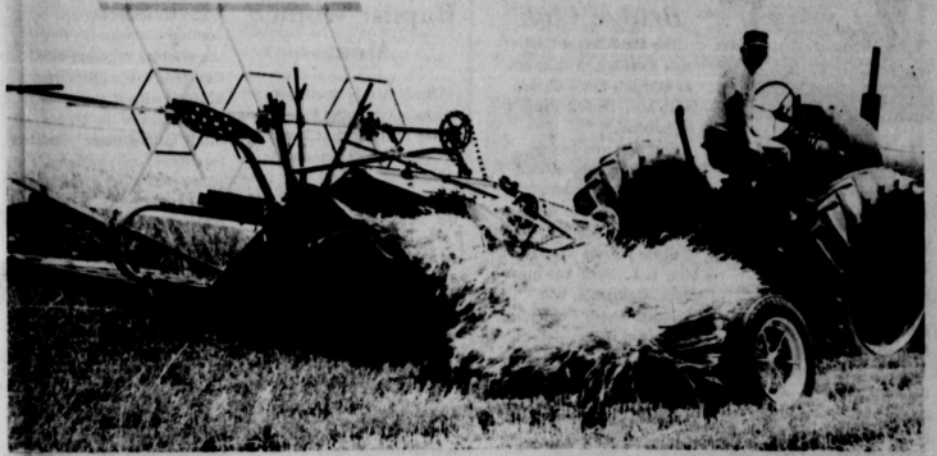


Threshing Bee At Wilbanks Farm, Sunday August 17

Commission Issues Ruling

The City of Spearman has received a ruling from the senior examiner of the Railroad Commission that the rate for natural gas and natural gas service at the Spearman-city gate shall not exceed 59.1¢/Mcf.

The commission finds that this would give the High Plains Natural Gas Company a 7 1/2% rate of return which it considers fair and reasonable.

The commission also ruled that the incorporation of a purchased gas adjustment clause in the Spearman city gate rate is in the public interest. High Plains has several sources of natural gas from unaffiliated suppliers including

suppliers under the jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission; that High Plains purchases winter peaking gas supplies at substantially higher prices which will dramatically affect its monthly weighted average cost of purchased gas and that High Plains' weighted average cost of purchased gas for the month of December, 1974 was 36.53¢/Mcf.

The purchase gas adjustment clause reads: The authorized city gate rate for the Spearman city gate is based upon a weighted average cost of gas purchased by High Plains Natural Gas Company of 36.53¢/Mcf. The city gate rate shall be increased or decreased by one hundred percent of the amount by which the weighted average cost of purchased gas during the using period as described below is more or less than

36.53¢/Mcf to the nearest one-hundredth of one cent per Mcf.

The weighted average cost of gas shall be determined monthly. The weighted average cost of gas shall be the cost of gas only from each supplier and shall not include other expenses charged by the supplier to High Plains Natural Gas Company, such as interest expenses.

Liquid natural gas, synthetic natural gas gasified coal, or any artificial gas shall not be included in High Plains Natural Gas Company's cost of purchased gas without prior Commission approval.

The weighted average cost of purchased gas shall be computed from "old" gas supplies as of February 1, 1975 and shall not include additional gas supplies connected to the High Plains Natural Gas Company system after February 1, 1975. "New" gas supplies for purposes of the purchases gas adjustment clause shall be defined as gas supplies not presently under contract and not connected to the system as of February 1, 1975. New gas supplies shall be included in determining the weighted average cost of purchased gas for sales at the Spearman city gate after written approval by the City of Spearman.

If "new" gas is not approved by the City of Spearman, if "new" gas is not approved by the City of Spearman within thirty days after "new" gas is attached to the system an appeal may be made to the Commission.

The following procedure was given by the Railroad Commission; High Plains Natural shall on the 20th of each month file with the Commission its certified statement of the weighted cost of purchased gas, the gas cost adjustment; and the amount of the adjustment to be added or subtracted from the 59.1¢/Mcf city gate rate. In addition, a copy of the certified statement shall be filed with the City of Spearman.

Upon determination of the accuracy of the certified statement by the City of Spearman, or if after 20 days from the date of filing, no action is taken by the City of Spearman, a new city gas rate shall become effective in the event such statement reflects a higher or lower weighted average cost of gas.

If the City of Spearman wishes to protest the accuracy of such statement, such protest shall be made within twenty days of the date such statement was filed. Upon such protest a hearing shall be held by the Commission to establish the accuracy of the statement filed by High Plains Natural Gas Company, and at the hearing the only issue to be determined shall be the accuracy of such statement.

If, upon protest, a final determination is made by the Commission that the weighted average cost of gas should be either higher or lower than reflected on the certified statement in question, then High Plains Natural Gas Company shall make a corresponding adjustment in a certified statement to be filed on the first day of the next month after the final determination has been made by the Commission.

Exceptions to this ruling, by the Railroad Commission, must be filed within 30 days from the date of August 6, 1975. If exceptions are filed, replies may be filed within 20 days after the final date for filing exceptions.

High Plains Natural Gas Company had asked for a rate increase to 67¢/Mcf in their petition to the Commission and the City of Spearman had asked for a continuance of the rate of 54¢/Mcf.

According to City Manager Ed Thompson, the attorney for the city, Robert Wilson, of Austin, stated that this rate of 59.1¢/Mcf is about 1/2 of the rate for the city of Austin, for their gas, so Spearman residents are certainly better off than those downstate.

The ruling will be discussed at the city meeting Monday night, August 11 by the city council. Thompson stated that much work has been done on the dips on Bernice, Honey Barkley, Radcoot, Ancher and other locations and feels that the work will last for several years. He stated that he was looking forward to the young men who have been helping the city during the summer this week and some more will quit next week due to school starting soon.

The City Council of Spearman, Texas met in Regular Session on July 24, 1975, at 8:00 p.m., in the Council Chamber of City Hall. PRESENT: Mayor Pro Tem - Roscoe Nelson, presiding. ALDERMAN: Jackson, Nicholson, Ellsworth, Holton, ALSO PRESENT: City Manager Ed Thompson, City Secretary Mark Neff, Attorney for the City J. E. Blackburn, Chief of Police Lee Phillips, Water/Sewer Supervisor Ted Scroggs. VISITORS: George Hensley.

PLEDGE AND INVOCATION: The pledge of Allegiance to our Flag was led by Alton Ellsworth, followed by the invocation given by James Jackson. EXECUTIVE SESSION: Mayor pro tem Nelson called for Article #62-52-17G for an executive session for discussion of legal matters. Mayor pro tem Nelson then called the meeting back into open session, stating that no action had been taken, only legal matters were discussed.

MINUTES: Motion by Jackson, second by Holton, to approve the minutes of the July 7, 1975 Regular Meeting as read. Motion carried.

SOLID WASTE REMOVAL CONTRACT: Discussion between the Attorney for the City J. E. Blackburn, Council and George Hensley, concerning the removal of solid waste from the land-fill site. Blackburn then read a contract for specifications of removal and payments to be made. Motion by Jackson, second by Ellsworth, that the City enter into a contract with Hensley and Ashbeck, for the removal of solid waste. Motion carried.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE GRANT: Motion by Jackson, second by Nicholson, that the City enter into Grant Application for Emergency Medical Service funding in the amount of \$20,610. Motion carried.

discussed the need for drilling an additional water well, and the requirements of the Health Department for an engineer to make application for such operation. Motion by Jackson, second by Holton, that the City enter into an engineering contract with McMorries and Burns for a water well application, with this contract subject to approval of the Attorney for the City J. E. Blackburn. Motion carried.

PAVING OF 9TH STREET: None of the property owners along 9th Street were present for discussion of paving. Therefore, no action was taken, and City Secretary Neff was instructed to send Certified Letters to all property owners, inviting them to be present at the next Regular Council Meeting.

SPRAY PLANES: Council and city manager discussed spray planes flying over the City and wash-down requirements concerning pesticides. Chief Lee Phillips was instructed by Council to work with city manager Thompson in regard to the ordinance of the

use of the airport and the City manager was also instructed to meet with owners of spraying services, following up on this ordinance and pesticide control requirements.

MEETING DATES: Motion by Jackson, second by Nicholson, that meeting dates for August be set for Monday the 11th and 25th. Motion carried.

OTHER: Chief Phillips discussed with Council his applications for personnel, and overtime requirements for supervisors at times when they are filling in for absent personnel.

Tax Assessor-Collector Mark Neff reported on the recent Tax School held in Amarillo and expressed his and Mrs. Johnson's appreciation for being able to attend.

ADJOURNMENT: Motion by Jackson, second by Holton, that there being no further business, the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

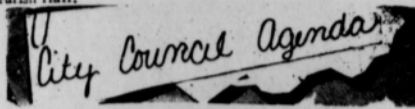

Guidelines For Donors

In a manual of information published by the Wichita Regional Red Cross Blood Center, of which Hansford County is a part, guidelines have been published so that laymen might know if they are eligible blood donors or not. If one has doubt concerning whether one should serve as a blood donor, a physician should be consulted for further guidance.

There are no dietary restrictions but, regardless of sex, no one weighing under 110 pounds is eligible. A person must be free of obvious acute symptoms at the time of donation of head cold, sore throat, or flu. Permanent deferral is the present policy for those who have or have had hepatitis, infectious or serum type, and persons who have had close contact with a known case of viral hepatitis or with a patient on a kidney machine or with any patient with jaundice or liver disease must be deferred for six months after exposure.

A person who has received blood within the past six months must be deferred. There is a mandatory deferral during pregnancy and for six months thereafter irrespective of how it is terminated. Those who have had malaria are acceptable if no symptoms have been evident nor there has been no treatment for three years. Certain limitations are also in effect for those taking malarial suppressive treatments and for those who have traveled in known malarial areas.

Persons who have had tooth extraction within 72 hours should be deferred for filling or cleaning, no deferral is necessary. If one has had a stomach ulcer and is essentially symptom-free and no history of recent bleeding, it is usually okay to be a blood donor, however, a check with a physician or RN in charge of the blood mobile would be very wise.

For immunization shots for the various diseases which follow, a twenty-four hour period following the immunization is required. Immunization which requires 24 hour lapse include cholera, influenza, diphtheria, paratyphoid, plague, polio (injection), Rocky Mountain spotted fever, tetanus toxoid, typhoid, typhus, whooping cough. Acceptable after 2 weeks after last shot or sugar cube are measles (regular), mumps, polio (oral) yellow fever, and tetanus antitoxin. Acceptable after crust falls off or 2 weeks after a declared immune reaction is small pox. Acceptable

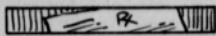

T. O. Lesly Expecting Golden Harvest In Fall

There has been a lot of information put out in recent months about the possibility of raising sunflowers on the high plains, and soon farmers in Ochiltree county will have a good idea of how the plants will do here.

T. O. Lesly has 200 acres of the yellow-headed plants growing in the southwest part of the county, and at present their heads are so heavy that most are hanging over toward the ground and due to be harvested soon.

Extension service specialists say there are nearly 300,000 acres of sunflowers planted on the high plains this year, most of them farther to the south than Ochiltree county.

In 1974 there were only 5,000 acres of the sunflowers harvested, resulting in a yield of 1,500 to 2,500 pounds of seed per acre on the irrigated crop. The results spurred a boom in planting that led to 80 times as much land being devoted to the crop this year.

Lesly says his reason for putting in the crop may appeal to others in the area. He decided to try out sunflowers to get a field back from grain sorghum production so he could plant wheat this fall.

"Sunflowers are a short crop and should be off the field in enough time to get it ready and plant a winter wheat crop," Lesly says.

Talking about the good points of the crop, Lesly said, "They don't take much fertilizer or water to grow and give a good crop, and on that field I had more ground per water well than I needed anyway."

The southwest Ochiltree county resident has a contract with Frito Lay in Lubbock for the sunflower seed that he produces this year. "The company uses the seeds for an oil that goes into the products. It is supposed to give them a longer shelf life," he notes.

Lesly also says that he has read about a lot of demand for the sunflower oil to take the place of vegetable oil that is used in making margarine, cooking oil and other food products.

Talking about the mechanics of raising the plants, he notes that some problems he had in planting them may turn out to be educational for him in the future. Many of his plants are fairly close together and the resulting heads of the sunflowers are only in the six to eight inch range.

"But in several places I had trouble with my machinery and planted the seed farther apart, and in those areas the heads on the plants are quite large and full of seeds," he says. He plans to check each area when harvesting to see which produces the most seed weight per acre.

"I will probably harvest the crop about the first of September and expect to get about 2,000 pounds of seed per acre," the farmer said. His contract with Frito-Lay guarantees 15 cents per pound for the nutritious seed, so total income per acre should be about \$300.

In addition, the company figures the total cost of the crop at about \$71 per acre to the farmer. "Of course, those are the figures on paper, and in reality it may cost a little more to put in the crop and get it harvested than the company thinks it will," he points out. Even so, Lesly expects his profit per acre on the crop to be about \$194 per acre or slightly below that.

He notes that the plants have had no damage from insects yet, but some were found in the fields about two weeks ago and he sprayed the field last week, "just in case they laid any eggs in the plants." He plans to spray again this week as a follow-up since the crop is particularly susceptible to some types of insect infestations.

As for harvesting, Lesly notes that it requires no special equipment that he does not already have for use with wheat and grain sorghum. "I will just have to slow the cylinder on my combine down to about 250 or 300 revolutions

per minute instead of the regular 1,000 revolutions for wheat and 800 for grain sorghum.

Lesly notes that he was down in Lubbock last weekend and saw a great deal of the area turned over to sunflower production.

"They have gone into sunflower production in a big way down there both because the cotton market has dropped and because they have enough water to try it," he said.

There has been a lot of work on the sunflower by the Texas A&M Extension Service, and scientists at Lubbock are working on a number of problems the plant has as well as finding new aspects of planting the crop.

Some of the problems the researchers are working on include the sunflower head moth and the carrot beetle, while the new aspects they are looking at include areas like increases in wildlife like dove, pheasant and quail because of the fields.

Experts say that even with the most modern harvesting equipment between five to ten per cent of the seed will fall to the ground ready for game birds to find and eat. In a good field the seed left on the ground would total 100 to 250 pounds per acre for the birds.

Because of this and the large amount of acreage planted with sunflower seeds this year, some of the experts are predicting a record harvest of game birds on the high plains this fall.
