## Monthly Benefits Total

 Over $\$ 23,8000$ in CountyMonthlyold-age, survivors, and they have continued and disabillity insurance beneits in Hansford County now top $\$ 23,858$., Hal Gellon. District Manager of social security in Amarillo, said today on releasing his annual ounty benefit date report. The new monthly figure re-
presents an increase of $\$ 1296$. per month over the corresonding period last year. "This Increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of our aged Topulation," Geldon sald. This money stimulates spent for food, clothing, and shent for
"There is no longer any doubt Social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in Hansford
County. Monthly benefits first be-
and they have continued without interruption for years growth in the number of beneficiaries. Geldon noted tha as of January 1, 1965, some 382 Hansford Countians were collecting about $\$ 286,296$ annually from social security an increase of $\$ 15,552$, an
nually over the same date last year.
As of January 1965, in the nation at large, more than 19 million beneficiaries were receiving payments at the rate of over $\$ 1.3$ billion per month
The average monthly oldage retirement benefit in January was $\$ 77.57$ for all
States, while in the State of Texas the average was $\$ 69.43$ Geldon said.
The following shows the number and amount of each type of monthly benefit paid
in Hansford County, as of December 31, 1964:

The year 1965 marks several milestones in the history of social security. In addition August is the 30th anniversar of the signing of the Socia Security Act by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Gel don said.

## Cattle Prices Averaging

## Well Above Last Year

Cattle prices during the last
two months have averaged
well above those of the same period a year ago, reveals John G. McHaney, Extension economist, Texas A\&M University.
"With few exceptions, range and pasture grasses are in good condition in Texas, and grazing prospects through the excellent," he explains . "Range feed is generally showing good growth over the Western range area of the United States,
This is favorable from a price standpoint because it permits producers to hold longer, This produces orderly marketing.
Although feeder cattle prices remained low through Feb., the increased in March and April. The recent rise of feeder cattle prices can be fed cattle prices, strong demand and a smaller seasonal
supply.
Meflaney says that feeder
cattle prices will likely stay cattle prices will likely stay above year-earlier levels through the rest of the second quarter and into the summer of 1965
During this period, it is anwill continue to place large numbers of cattle on feed. At the same time, good grazing conditions will enable ranchers to hold more feeder cattle on the ranges. This will restrict replacements and will tend to strengthen feeder cattle prices A further increase of feeder cattle prices would probably curtail the slaughter of nonfed animals as feedlot operators would compete strongly with packers for these cattle, the economist explains. fall and early winter of 1965 will depend largely upon range conditions at that time, McHaney adds.
He points out that fed cattle prices were steady through the winter, averaging $\$ 2$ to $\$ 3$ spring of last year the early pring ast year, slightly about mid-year 1965 . but in the third quarter, July,

August and September, they are expected to average about the same as those of a year earlier.

Livestock industry representatives from the United States and Mexico have gone on rethe screwworm aradication program to include all of Mexico as soon as possible, Industry leaders from Texas Oklahoma, Arizona and California, met with officials of Mexico's National Livestock Confederation in Mexico City recently to draw up a statement requesting their respec-
tive dovernments to establish tive governments to establish
a joint commission to administer the international eradication effort. The declaration emphasized that further advances in the battle against the screwworm fly will require the pooling of resources by both countries as was done to eradicate foot - and -mouth
disease in the 1940 's isease in the 1940 's
The statement was handcarried to Juan Gil Preciado, Secretary of Agriculture and
Livestock in Mexico, and will Livestock inMexico, and will
also be delivered to United States Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman.
Mexican ranchers have beie interested in screwworm - adication as a result of sterile screwworm flies being dispersed along their northern prevent native screwworms from migrating into the U.S. and has reduced their infestations at the same time. The sterile flies mate with fertile flies and precent offspring fom being produced. Secretary Gil Preciado told the visiting livestockmen that by eradicating screwworms
from Mexico and establishing the live fly barrier at the narrow neck in lower Mexico annual costs of operating the program could be substantially reduced.

Miller, Dept, of Geosciences Miller, Dept, of Geosciences Lubbock, Texas, several types of micro-organisms were isolated in irrigation wells on the High Plains. It is Dr. Miller 's opinion that the North Plains are polluted

The predominate organisms found in the water are also present in the soil, which suggests that wells on the High Plains are not properly cemented at the surface to prevent infiltration of soil organ-
