\$750,000 boost to economy

New company purchases feedyard

C & M Land and Cattle Company are announcing the purchase of Hansford Feedyards from Carl and Dan Archer. The purchase includes the feedyards, feedmill and 705 acres of land.

The new business will operate under the name Colbert's Cattle Feeders, Inc.

Boyd Colbert, Perryton, will be the operator of the feedyard which is expected to be open in approximately 2 weeks.

The feedyard has been closed down for the past 2 years.

Colbert said "Spearman is an ideal location for a feedyard because of the proximity to packers, feeder cattle and the large amount of feed grown in this area." He stated that they expect to employ 50 to 60 people when the 50,000 head capacity feedyard gets in full operation.

"We plan to use local people as much as possible in the feedyard. We will be needing truck drivers, cowboys, maintenance men, etc."

"We anticipate that the operation will add about \$750,000 per year to the local economy."

Colbert is optimistic about the success of the feedyard.

He has been in the feeder business for 9 years, and has been the manager of Perryton Feeders for the past 4 years. He grew up on a ranch and has been in the cattle business since 1947.

Green Thumbers attend seminar

When the storm sirens blare and the radio warns that a "twister" is on the way, what can you do to improve your chances of surviving a Texas tornado?

For one thing, studies show that if you're in your house, you should stay right there. Only 3 per 1,000 people in houses hit by tornadoes are killed--or, put another way, 99.7 percent survive.

This somewhat comforting statistic is especially welcome to the older workers enrolled in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb employment program, because most of them live and work in the northern half of the state so often assaulted by spring storms.

More than 20 Green Thumbers from 5 counties attended a training session at the Perryton Senior Citizen Center on April 3, and learned how they could save their lives if a tornado should come their way. Those attending from Hansford County were Alma Remy, Floyd Gattin and Ernest Newcomb, also a sponsor from the museum, Helen Boyd.

"In the case of severe storms, there truly is no place like home," said Green Thumb Director Diane Parrish of Waco, "provided your home is a sturdy house."

Parrish used a slide presentation to illustrate the kinds of tornadoes that can develop and to describe the techniques most likely to enhance survival. Slides of twisters that hit Lubbock, Waco, Wichita Falls, San Angelo, Clarendon, and northeast Texas were used in the presentation.

According to Parrish, most tornado deaths result from head injuries caused by flying

debris. People in mobile homes are at much greater risk, and in fact may be even more vulnerable than persons in cars.

"The key to survival is to stay in your house and put as many walls as possible between you and the tornado," she said, adding that most tornadoes approach from the west and southwest. "And don't try to outrun the storm--many people are killed when they try to escape in a panic."

Mike Moeller, president of Texas Farmers Union, told the workers that "Green Thumb's future appears bright" as a result of recent budget decisions in Washington. "The program has earned its way through hard work," Moeller said, "and the 1,000 Green Thumbers in Texas will continue to serve the senior centers, libraries, and schools of this state."

No fines at Library this week

Hansford County Library has good news and bad news. The good news is that during National Library Week, April 8-14, the library will not charge fines for any overdue library materials returned, no matter how long overdue.

The bad news is that following National Library Week, beginning April 16, the Hansford County Library will begin charging 5 cents a day for each item overdue. The maximum fine per overdue library item will be \$2.00. If the item is not returned, replacement value of the item will be charged. These fines will be strictly enforced. No one will be exempt.

Failure to pay fines or to return library materials will result in the loss of library privileges until reimbursement is made to the library. In other words, no books, records, tapes, will be checked out to delinquent borrowers. If the library is forced to collect overdue library materi-

als from a patron, that patron loses library privileges at our library permanently.

The Hansford County Library has been very lenient with overdues and fines during the last few years. However, there is now in excess of \$4,000.00 worth of overdue library materials. This is approximately the amount of our yearly book budget.

Library items may be rechecked over the phone, and if the library is closed, books may be returned in the book depository in front of the library. So there is no valid excuse for books being overdue. If you can talk or walk, you return or recheck library materials.

There are currently 261 delinquent borrowers at Hansford County Library. If you are one of them, please help us celebrate National Library Week by returning your overdue books, records, or cassette tapes free of charge April 8-14.

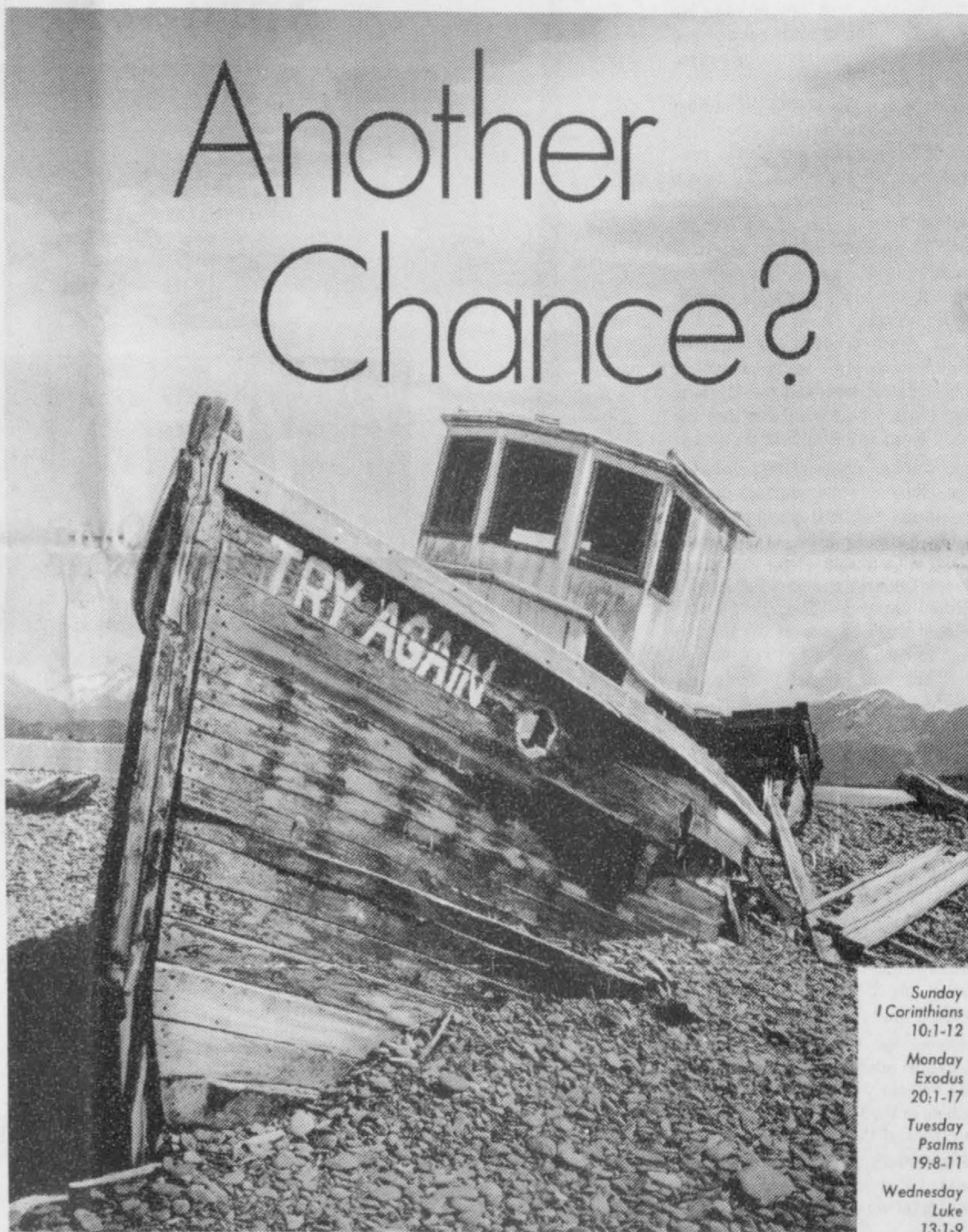

The 1981 Budget was \$926,675, Ad Valorem Tax was 27% of Budget, and Sales Tax for 1981 was 21% of budget.

1982 Budget was \$1,193,339. Ad Valorem Tax was 28% of Budget, and 1982 Sales Tax was 15% of budget.

The 1983 City Budget is \$913,801, Ad Valorem is 37% of budget, and 1983 sales tax is 20% of budget.

Street Repair comes from the General Fund and this year is budgeted for \$159,057. Our sales tax helps pay for our street repair along with Health & Sanitation, police, Fire Dept., Ambulance, Parks & Recreation, Senior Citizen programs and many other services we take for granted. Just remember when you buy in Amarillo you get no benefit from your sales tax at all. Let's all try to remember to check at home first, then if they don't have what we want go someplace else.

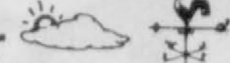

THE Know Weather

Should you consider the direction of the prevailing winter winds, and the path of the sun through the sky, in constructing your new house?

Modern heating and cooling equipment can make almost any house comfortable. But to lessen your utility bill, both the sun and the wind should be considered by today's home-builder.

The roof of your house should, if possible, be slanted so as to facilitate the deflection of winter's prevailing cold winds.



The side of your house that gets the winter sun will be more easily heated and warmer if a wall or roof is built to absorb the heat of the sun.

Some of the new heating systems utilize the sun's rays for heat. Large glass areas should not be placed so as to face direct winter winds, or to get the full force of the sun in summer.

Certain lots require houses facing certain direction, but minimize as much as you can the effects of cold wind and the sun.

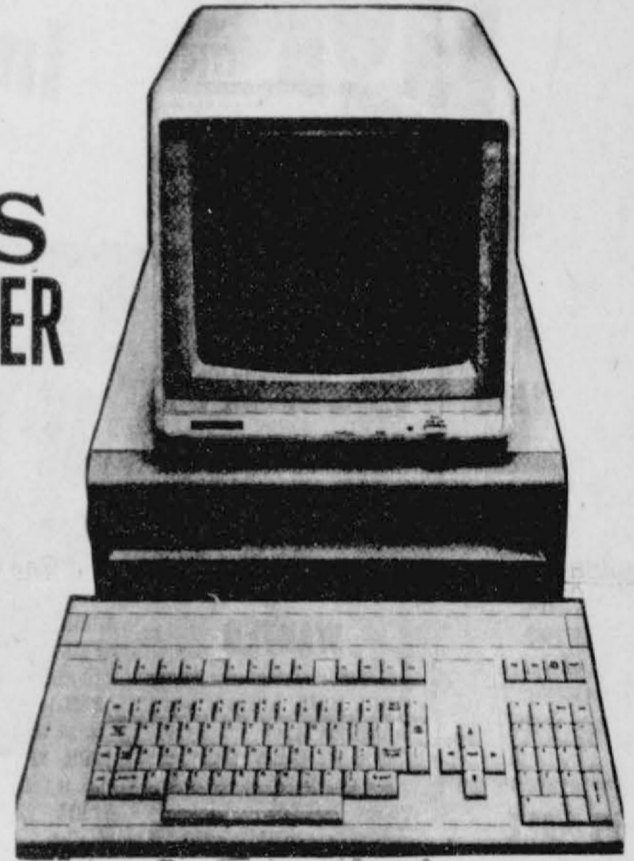
