# Zoning board rescinds ordinance

The Spearman Planning and Zoning Commission met in a special called meeting Thursday, April 14, with many concerned citizens present. President of the Planning Board, J. L. Brock, called the meeting to order and turned the floor over to Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett. Mayor Blodgett stated that the City Council had decided to recommend the Zoning Board, that it rescind the new Zoning Ordinance, and revert back to the old ordinance, until the problems could be corrected, and a new ordinance designed.

The Zoning and Planning Commission had worked on the new ordinance for two and a half years, with help from a professional city planner from Wichita Falls. There was a misunderstanding in several parts of the ordinance, as to how the different parts could be interpreted. James Cunningham, J. L. Brock, and several other members of the Zoning Board, stated that there was no intention to impose any hardships upon mobile home owners; stressing several times that planning meetings had not been held in secret. Members of the board admitted that they had made a mistake. James Cunningham put it into these simple words, "We blew it! That's all!" But several of the city officials stated that the people "blew it" also, by not contributing more input to the board.

At that stage of the meeting, the City Council Meeting Room was jammed full, with people overflowing down through the corridor, and outside the City Hall. It was decided to move the

meeting to the fire engine garage where everyone could hear what was taking place. The Mayor, in reference to the ordinance, stated again, "We will try to change it—no—we will change it."

The City Manager stated that public participation in such an undertaking was essential; that he worked for the City Council and the citizens of the city. He explained that with the people's help and support, an ordinance could be developed that everyone could live with. The City Manager, along with the Mayor, and members of the Zoning Board, encouraged more citizen attendance to the city meetings, stressing the fact that they needed the people's input, to do a good job. Mayor Blodgett said that as long as he was Mayor there would never be a City Council Meeting closed to the public and once again urged people to attend the meetings.

The next Planning and Zoning Commission Meeting will be Thursday, April 21, at 3:00 P.M. All interested citizens are urged to attend, with suggestions for more input to the board, to start work on a zoning ordinance that will be fair and correct.

## Bank Condition Healthy

The plus side of the ledger in Spearman last week checked out two entries—some much needed moisture dropped by and the First State Bank is in healthy conditions, according to the response to the March 31 bank call.

Assets as of March 31 were \$24,540,000 up \$659,000 from the total as of December 31, 1976.

Also on the upswing were total deposits. As of March 31, the bank reported \$21,121,000 which is \$586,000 more than the deposits at the December call.

Equity capital also rose \$209,000 in the last three months to \$2,104,000 as of the March call.

Net loans showed a decrease of \$1,966,000 with only \$10,260,000 in net loans through March 31.

Early Friday morning, .22 of an inch had been officially received in Spearman and .75 of an inch had been recorded in Gruber and varying amounts estimated throughout the rest of Hansford County and the High Plains area.

All parts of the immediate area as well as a rain-delivering weather pattern throughout the State has resulted in needed soil-soaking moisture.

The Spearman Varsity Girls gave a full-hearted effort in the District 1-AA Track Meet Thursday. What the girls lacked in speed, they made up for in one word—"try". Denise Ware hurdled to first place over the 80 yard Hurdles. Debbie Greene flew through the air for a first in the triple jump and a second in the long jump. Umphress and Platt also performed well in the field events with respective seconds in the shot put and the discus throw. Miler Hagerman ran for a third in the mile run. Our mile relayers, JoNeel Comegys, Denise Ware, Debbie Greene, and Kendra Ivey spirited to a second place finish. The Lynxettes displayed once again that they don't retain the word "quit" in their vocabulary. They finished third in the track meet, but they are still number one to all of Spearman. Although the team placed third in the meet, the girls that placed first and second in their events will go to the regional for individual competition. Regional participants will be Debbie Greene, in the triple jump, long jump, and the mile relay; Denise Ware in the 80 yard hurdles and the mile relay; JoNeel Comegys in the mile relay; Kendra Ivey in the mile relay; Jennifer Umphress in the shot put; and Letitia Platt in the discus throw. ## North Plains annual meeting

The annual meeting of the North Plains Electric Cooperative will be held on Monday, April 18, at the Perrin high school cafeteria and auditorium, with approximately 1,000 members and guests expected to attend.

Guest speaker for the event will be C. F. (Cliff) Milner, vice president of Southern Public Service Co. of Amarillo.

The annual meeting will begin with the dinner in the cafeteria, beginning at 6:30 p.m., followed by the business session which is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

### Hospital Board Acts on Agenda

Hansford Hospital Board of Directors met irregular session Wednesday, April 13, in the hospital library for consideration of a number of agenda items. Administrator Jerry Taylor reported on results of physician recruitment efforts by informing the board that Robert (Bob) Phillips, former

Spearman resident who is to be released from military service in the near future, is working toward being licensed in Texas and setting up an osteopathic practice in Spearman. July is the tentative target date. Directors approved a change order in the nurse call system to allow for pillow speakers and under the change, 28 are to be installed in rooms in the hospital. The hospital also plans to advertise shortly for bids on up to 20 television sets for use in patient rooms at the hospital. The board discussed housing for nursing and doctor personnel and found that at this time there is a lack of it, a situation which is expected to be remedied as housing becomes available.
