

School Sets Vocational Job Survey

A vocational survey of employment needs in Spearman will be conducted next week by members of the high school faculty and some other local people.

The survey is being made under the direction of the Vocational Program Development branch of the Texas Education Agency.

The local school system plans to add more vocational training in the curriculum, but before this can be done, a survey of the needs of the community must be made, so the proper courses may be taught. This is a new requirement of the Texas Education Agency.

Henry Bobo of the TEA will meet with the survey crews at 7:30 p.m. Monday, to instruct the teachers and others in how to conduct the survey.

Principal Jim Cherry said the school has compiled a list of 206 businesses, offices and service organizations that hire employees.

Members of the survey team will call on all of these firms and offices to find out what their present and future employment needs are. The team will also find out if the firms have training programs or would be interested in training employees.

All information collected by the teams will be confidential and no one will be calling on firms seeking jobs. The information will be turned over to Bobo and his staff and they will compile a survey report from the information.

From this report the school can see what kind of employees are needed and what courses and kind of vocational programs should be offered to local high school students.

Principal Jim Cherry said the school hopes to be able to include a vocational program that will provide students who are not going to college with a trade or training to prepare them for jobs in the community after graduation.

Vertical Pipe Snaps Phone, TV Cables

Telephone and cable television service to the east side of Spearman and some rural telephone service was knocked out Wednesday afternoon when a truck broke several telephone and television cables crossing Kenneth Street at 12:30 p.m.

An R.H. Fulton Co. truck driven by Elmer O. Snowder was hauling a large piece of pipe, with valves and other pieces of pipe sticking up into the air.

The vertical pipe snapped a television cable near Consumers on West Kenneth, then got another cable at the corner of W. Kenneth and SW Court. The truck went around the courthouse to E. Kenneth where

it got into the telephone cables and more TV cables.

On East Kenneth the cables were ripped down and five poles were broken off.

Police officers said the truck just cleared a telephone cable that spans Kenneth that if it had been broken it would have knocked out a majority of the telephones in Spearman.

Telephones from Third street north and east from the courthouse were knocked out. The entire television cable system service was disrupted in the east part of Spearman.

Dayton Phillips of Spearman Cable TV said he got service restored by 3 p.m. Phillips said the repairs were temporary and he would have to run some new cable, but service was restored.

Telephone service was still out in some sections of the disrupted area Wednesday morning, according to people living there.

Frank Covington of General Telephone said Wednesday afternoon that about 125 phones were knocked out and damage was around \$1200.

Telephone repairmen worked through the night, but not all service has been restored Wednesday afternoon. He said when lines are torn down the repair work is much slower than if the line was cut.

Electric power was not disturbed as the lines were high enough that the pipe did not reach them and all of the poles broken were telephone company poles.

Commissioners Decides Against Invoking Herbicide Law

After a long session Monday the Hansford County Commissioners Court decided against invoking the herbicide law in the county to control the use of weed killing chemicals on

crops. The fact that it takes an act of the state legislature to remove the law once it is invoked and more state controls on farming and business turned the commission against the law.

To try and avoid the state controls and added costs, the county is beginning an extensive educational campaign on the use of the weed killers and asking that their use be controlled voluntarily.

Judge Johnnie Lee said the court decided to try the voluntary controls for this year, then if careless use of the sprays continue to destroy broadleaf crops, the commissioners will have to reopen the matter.

Lee said some grain farmers said the court was letting a few cotton farmers work a hardship on everyone by fighting the use of weed sprays on milo and other grain crops.

Cotton is minor, Lee said, when one considers the number of acres of soybeans, castor beans and other broadleaf crops being introduced into the county. The weed sprays kill all of these crops.

Lee said the herbicide law added little to the responsibility for damages from the use of weed sprays. It just brings in more state officials to enforce the laws.

The judge reminded farmers that a farmer having his crop sprayed with weed killers is just as liable for any damage done to his neighbors' crops as the man applying the spray.

A civil damage suit is now pending in district court from crop damage alleged to have been done last year.

County Agent Robert Adamson said the county is urging all farmers to use an amine

HOMEMAKING NOTES

The sweetest month of the year could be April. That's because honey is plentiful this month, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

A choice sweetener for your baked goods, honey absorbs and retains moisture. Cakes and cookies made with honey have fine keeping quality.

Some tips on using honey-- To measure honey, measure shortening first then measure honey in the same measuring cup. It slides out with ease.

To replace other sweetening with honey in cake or cookie recipes that call for other sweetenings, the general rule is to reduce the amount of liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of honey used.

To liquify honey that has granulated or solidified place the container in a bowl of warm water (not warmer than the hand can bear) until all crystals are melted and honey is liquid.

To store honey, keep liquid honey in a dry place. Freezing does not injure the color or flavor, but may hasten granulation. Don't put honey in the refrigerator. Avoid damp places for storing honey as it has the property of absorbing and retaining moisture. Crystallized honey is just as good as liquid honey.

I made this cake especially for the Easter weekend and it is quite good as well as pink and pretty.

STUFFED STRAWBERRY ANGEL RING

large angel food cake (baked)
small package strawberry Jello
10 oz. package frozen strawberries
package Dream Whip or 1/2 pint whipped cream
cup boiling water
tbsp. sugar

Thaw strawberries and strain, saving juice. Make Jello using cup boiling water and 2 tbsp. sugar. Add strawberry juice to Jello (there should be 1/2 cup of juice--if not, add enough water to make that much). Cool in refrigerator until partially set.

When Jello is partially set, whip it. Whip Dream Whip according to package directions (or whip cream). If you use cream, add 2 tbsp. sugar.

Fold together Jello, whipped topping and drained strawberries. Put in refrigerator until stiff enough to stay on cake (about 5 minutes).

To fill and frost cake, cut off top of cake (about one inch thick) and hollow out inside of cake leaving about a one-half inch wall on sides and bottom. Fill with whipped mixture, place top of cake and frost the outside and top. Chill in refrigerator until serving time.

Council Instructs Police To Clear Traffic Congestion around Post Office

Police and Corporation Court business was on the increase last month in Spearman and will probably be increased more, if the City Council's instructions are carried out.

In its meeting Monday night the council again instructed the city police to straighten out the traffic problems around the post office and put an end to the blocking of the alley by cars being parked there while their drivers go in the post office.

Councilman James K. Hicks, who has conducted a continuing fight for stronger traffic enforcement all over town, got his strongest support Monday night.

After his motion to remove the "no parking" signs from the alley by the post office was defeated, the council did instruct City Manager Dare Foshee to have the police correct this traffic problem.

Hicks' contention is that since the ordinance is not being enforced, the signs should be taken down.

This time the council did not suggest stronger enforcement, but told the manager to have stronger enforcement put into effect.

In March the city police issued 52 traffic tickets. This was a big increase over the previous months.

Corporation Court Judge T. J. Pittman had 37 cases in his court for the month and assessed \$411.50 in fines.

The returns of the city election of April 5 were canvassed and declared to be correct. Mayor R. E. Vaughn and councilmen R. B. Holton and E. J. Copeland were re-elected. There were 288 votes cast in the election.

After being sworn in, Mayor Vaughn said the vote was certainly not mandate from the people, with only 288 voting, but he did feel that the election showed that a majority of the people of Spearman were satisfied with the way the city's business has been conducted over the past few years.

Mayor Pro Tem James K. Hicks administered the oath of office to the three re-elected officers.

Judge Pittman was re-appointed to office for a two year term and Hicks admin-

istered his oath of office.

City Health Officer Dr. D. E. Hackley was re-appointed to office for another year, if he feels he can serve.

Community Public Service Manager Charles Gilliam met with the Council on some questions concerning the franchise tax. The electric company pays a tax of two percent of its gross sales to the city for its franchise here.

In the past the income for the sale of electricity used by the schools, hospital and courthouse had been excluded from this franchise tax. However, because these concerns pay the same rate as other consumers, the city contended the income should be included on the gross sales. Community Public Service agreed to do so.

City Engineer L. D. Burns reported to the council that damage to city streets from the winter weather was not bad. He said Spearman has much less damage than either Dumas or Stratford.

Burns said that most of the damage was just holes that city crews could fix. He recommended that a few places where water has softened the base of the streets, the asphalt be taken off allowing the base to dry, then the area be retopped.

Name Ways To Beautify Community

How does one go about making a home, a neighborhood or a community more beautiful?

H. P. Quadland, beautification expert for the American Association of Nurserymen, makes the following suggestions:

"Beautification, to be most valuable, should be planned. Whether you are beautifying your home grounds, neighborhood, a street, or a whole community, the best thing to do is to make a preliminary survey.

"Where, for example, are your home grounds or community ugly? They actually may not be exceptionally ugly. Your goal may simply be to make the area more beautiful."

The steps to achieve this include:

1. A survey of the area. Check locations where a flowering tree or shrub that has lovely flowers may "set off" the location and help to beautify the whole area.

Not only flowers but leaves, barks and berries are beautiful at various times of the year.

Plantings should provide for an attractive effect at all seasons.

2. Select the best sites to be beautified, especially those that will attract attention from the largest audience.

3. Try to have all local groups cooperate by contacting service clubs, garden clubs, others.

4. Once a site is beautified, make sure that it remains so through adequate maintenance. Proper planting of trees and shrubs at the start will help.

After planting, the most important thing is regular watering and annual fertilization.


Linoleum makes a good covering for the back flooring of a station wagon. It provides excellent protection for the floor and is easily cleaned.

Stop Zipper Sticking



Barker Gets Fellowship; Will Resign Science Job

A fifteen year local teaching career that has given Spearman High School one of the strongest science departments in the Panhandle will close here this Spring.

Robert Barker, head of the high school science department, learned Tuesday that he had been granted a fellowship at the University of Texas to complete his doctorate degree. Barker has been working on his doctorate and doing research at the University for the last few years. He has taken one year's leave of absence to study.







County Agent's Report

BROWN MITES

Brown wheat mites are attacking wheat in parts of Hansford County, but control of the pests with insecticides will not necessarily increase yields.

Texas A&M University researchers at the Bushland Research Center believe chemical control on dryland wheat will pay only when mite infestations are severe and the attacked wheat has enough soil moisture for good crop potential.

The researchers have seldom gotten significant yield increases when control chemicals were used on dryland wheat.

A good rain or heavy irrigation would greatly reduce the brown wheat mite population.

The mature mites are metallic brown or black. Young mites are bright red after hatching and are sometimes mistaken for red spider mites.

Wheat infested with the pests suffers from a loss of plant juices withdrawn by the mites for food. Heavily infested wheat appears dried out although sufficient moisture may be available in the root zone.

NEW DRUG

The discovery of a new drug, poloxalene, represents a major breakthrough in the search for a preventive of legume bloat in livestock.

Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension veterinarian at Texas A&M University, says tests made in Kansas and other states indicate the new drug is very effective in preventing legume bloat which annually causes losses approximating \$100 million for U.S. farmers and ranchers.

Patterson said Dr. Erle Bartley, a dairy nutritionist, developed the bloat preventive use of poloxalene. The drug was developed by Kansas State University scientists in cooperation with other university and industry scientists with help from Smith Kline & French Laboratories, Philadelphia, Pa., which will market it in the U.S. in the near future under the trademark, "Bloat Guard."

Although specific causes of bloat elude researchers, they agree it is brought on by excessive foaming of rumen contents of dairy and beef cattle and sheep. To meet the needs of stockmen, an anti-bloat product had to do several things.

It had to prevent bloat for at least 12 hours in animals fed green legumes, had to act fast and be palatable and economical enough for general use. It could not leave any residue in milk or body tissues or cause any bad effects on health, reproduction, rumen function, feed intake or milk quality or quantity.

Tests conducted in Kansas, Montana, Iowa, Illinois, Mississippi and Louisiana show the new drug has satisfied all of these requirements.

"Bloat Guard" is a dry product which may be spread over grain as a top dressing. If this is fed to cattle a few minutes before they are pastured or fed freshly cut legumes, bloat will be prevented. Animals weighing 1,000 pounds or more need 20 grams per day and smaller animals 10 grams.

With the bloat preventive, Patterson says stockmen can safely feed legumes and make much wider use of good legumes for pasture.

PUREBRED BULLS RAISE WEANING WEIGHTS

Purebred bulls are worth more in a crossbreeding program according to research at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Center.

Walter Kruse, animal husbandman at the Center, says crossbreeding offers for the first time a truly sophisticated method to prove the value of a purebred bull.

In one test at McGregor, crossbred cows, half Hereford and half Brahman, were mated

with a purebred Hereford bull. At the same time, Hereford cows were mated to a crossbred, half Hereford and half Brahman, bull. The calves from both matings had the same genetic makeup--three-fourths Hereford and one-fourth Brahman.

What happened? Calves from the purebred bull and crossbred cows weighed a good 40 pounds more at 180 day weaning time.

Kruse says this illustrates a vital point to cattlemen-how the cross is made is the key to higher weaning weights. He says A&M research at McGregor has shown time and again that purebred bulls and crossbred cows are the money making combination.

In the girls singles Catherine Lyon beat Stinnett, then lost to Phillips 6-1, 6-2.


In the girls doubles Cindy Cochran and Jeanette McAdams lost the first match to Phillips.






