Lynx Band Earns Another 1

Election

Day Nov. 8

Friday is the final day for absentee voting for the General Election on Tuesday, Nov. 8, County Clerk Keese Richard-son reminded voters this week. She said a large number of people have voted absentee. The total at noon Wednesday was nearing 60.

The Clerk said this was more than usually voted absentee in a general election on an off year.

There are no local contests for county offices, but the Democrats and Republicans are in contest for seats in the National and State House of Representatives from this area.

Republican Jack Hart of Hansford County is opposing Democrat Bill Barton of Borger for the seat from this district in the Texas Legislature. Democrat Dee Miller of Amarillo is opposing Republican Bob Price of Pampa for U.S. Representative of the 18th Congressional District.

Musicians Are Best In UIL Marching Show

The "Great White Army" started for its tenth consecutive University Interscholastic League band contest Sweepstakes trophy by earning a I rating in marching Tuesday.

Spearman's High School Band, under the direction of Sam Watson and assistant director, Frank Porter, earned the top rating and plaudits of the three judges working under difficult weather conditions in Buffalo Bowl at West Texas State University in Canyon.

To wrap up the tenth consecutive UIL Sweepstakes award this edition of the band must earn a I rating in concert and sightreading contests next spring in Hereford.

This was the twelfth consecutive UIL No. 1 rating for the band in marching and the twentieth consecutive No. 1 rating counting the competition at the Tri-State Music Festival at Enid, Okla.

Judge Melvin Jenkins, director of the TCU band, wrote: "The band uses all the field. It looked and sounded great despite the weather."

"This is the very outstanding group in the contest,"

Jenkins wrote on his judging sheet.

Eldon Sonanburg, director of the Sherman High School band, wrote: "congratulations on an outstanding performance."

Charles Emmors of the music department at the University of Missouri, wrote: "Good, big, mature sound. Nice uniform carriage and strike. Well planned routine and executed well."

Director Watson used 134 members in the marching contest.

There was individual competition for twirlers. Donna Ownbey received a I rating and Shirley Love received a II rating.

Miss Bayless Represents County In Queens Contest

Miss Judy Bayless of Hansford County and Gruver will represent District 1 in the state finals of the 1966 Texas Farm Bureau queen contest Nov. 14 in Corpus Christi.

The 18-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Bayless of Gruver was selected to represent this area during recent district eliminations.

At the state contest, which will be held in conjunction with the 33rd annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau, Miss Bayless will compete with 12 other district winners for the state title. The winner will receive \$500 to cover expenses for herself and a matron escort to the American Farm Bureau Federation convention in December in Las Vegas. In addition, all district queens will receive expense-paid trips to the state convention and will be given a gift by the Texas Farm Bureau.

Miss Bayless, now a freshman at Southern Methodist University was very active while attending high school. She was valedictorian of her class, voted Most Likely to Succeed and band queen. Miss Bayless was also a member of Future Homemakers of America, vice president of Future Teachers of America and president of the Harmony Club.

Friday night will be the time the Spearman Lynx attempt to balance their won and lost record at the expense of the surprise team of the district, Panhandle.

The Lynx now have a record of three wins, four losses and a tie after getting off to a bad start, and dropping their first four games.

Panhandle, a newcomer to the ranks of 1-AA was picked as an "also ran" in the district. They had been on the bottom in class A competition the year before.

Ronnie Mills, the new boss at Panhandle, apparently did some fine corrective surgery on the Panthers and they have been tough all year.

The Panthers lost to Dalhart only 9-0 last week. Coach George Wright says this speaks well for the strength of the Panhandle team.

Wright believes that Panhandle's Hanson is probably the best all around back in the district. He has size, speed, and can throw the ball very well on the halfback running pass. He runs hard and is tough to stop.

Spearman scouts report that Dalhart had to go all out to beat the Panthers.

When Hanson is teamed with Bulla, the Panthers have a real two-way threat.

Panhandle throws the ball more than Shamrock, but otherwise,

the two teams compare equally in all other respects.

Mills was an assistant to Shamrock's Colie Huffman at White Deer and runs a similar offense.

Wright said the upset Friday over Shamrock was a real team effort and it would be very hard to single out any one outstanding player. Every boy played hard and with determination.

Shamrock riled the Lynx even before the game started. They took a big portion of the field for their warm-up drills and ran plays right into the Spearman warm-up drills. Also, some of their coaching staff was inspecting the Lynx warm-up drills rather closely, Wright said, and that is not normally done by opposing coaches.

Wright said they knew Shamrock was weak in certain areas and they worked on those areas. Our two fullbacks, Hal Shufeldt and Jerry Holton, slammed and drove hard all night.

They really took the extra yardage by just lowering their heads and driving, Wright commented.

Our offensive line was the big factor, Wright said. They moved out low and hard, opening big holes. The first two scores were the results of sheer team effort.

He said Mike Hendricks, Harley Reeves, Steve Holton, Glen Blodgett, Phillip Renner, Randy Moore, Ronnie Gilbert, Ronald Grey and Karl Kunselman were the main front line troops in the drives.

The big factor in the past few games has been the continued improvement of our blocking and low charging in the line.

Our backs have continued to improve their blocking, running, faking and ball carrying, Wright said. He pointed out the work of Bobby Smith, Steve Jordan, Wesley Jenkins, Hal Shufeldt, Jerry Holton, and Charles Shield-knight.

On pass defense Wright was pleased with the work of Gary Cates, Shufeldt, Mike Davis, Smith, Jenkins and Jordan.

Wright felt that Shamrock planned to try and pass over Jordan, but the cornerman showed them the folly of their planning by breaking up two in his area, and intercepting one. He ran it back 54 yards to set up a Lynx score.

Wright said penalties and over eager mistakes on third down when the Lynx had the Irish in the hole gave them first downs and kept their drives alive. The Irish rolled up over 200 yards rushing.

A few months ago my mother-in-law gave me this recipe for a moist, yummy chocolate cake. I didn't use it in my column because it is in the Favorite Recipes of Texas cookbook which was sold here a year or two ago. However, in the past few weeks I've heard numerous comments about the cake and I find that not too many of you have that particular cookbook. So, here's the recipe. It's very simple to make as the name implies.

22 MINUTE CAKE

2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
1 stick margarine
1 cup water
1/2 cup shortening
3 1/2 tablespoons cocoa (or 1/4 cup chocolate syrup)
1/2 cup buttermilk
2 eggs
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon vanilla (or 1 teaspoon cinnamon)

Combine sugar and flour in a large bowl. Do not use mixer. In a saucepan, combine margarine, water, shortening and cocoa; bring to a boil. Pour over flour mixture. Combine remaining ingredients; add to batter and blend thoroughly. Pour into 12" x 18" greased pan. Bake 20 minutes at 400 degrees.

ICING

1 stick of margarine
3 1/2 tablespoons cocoa (or 1/4 cup chocolate syrup)
1/3 cup evaporated milk
1 lb. powdered sugar
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup coconut

When the cake has baked 18 minutes, combine margarine, cocoa and milk in same saucepan used for chocolate mixture. Bring to a boil and add remaining ingredients. Pour over cake as soon as it is removed from the oven. NOTE: Coconut may be omitted and 1 teaspoon of vanilla used in its place.

Homemaking Notes

Can you get better nutrition for your family without spending more money for food?

You may be able if you are willing to spend some time planning and informing yourself. In many cases you will be able to spend fewer dollars and eat better for the money you spend.

First, base your plan on an adequate diet. A list of foods you should eat each day to be well nourished is listed in several Extension Bulletins available from my office--"Food For Fitness", "Nutrition Up To Date, Up To You" "Good Nutrition is a Treasure" and others.

Do you use a food plan to see what your family needs? A food plan helps you know that over a long period of time you are getting enough essential foods and not too much sugars, fats and starches.

Knowledge on making intelligent substitutions on basis of nutritional values may pay big dividends.

Are you using up-to-date methods for food preparation? If you overcook your food, you will be wasting nutritional value as well as time and fuel.

How much you should spend on food varies with each individual family. Keeping records of the money you spend for food alone will help you analyze your food spending. Compare your expenses with the food plan you make to get an accurate picture.

Try keeping a record of food bills for at least one week (food only--don't include soap, cleaning supplies,

cigarettes, etc.) Repeat at 2 or 3 month intervals to help guide your food spending.

If you plan ahead for the food you buy, and make your grocery list from these plans, most families can cut down lots of expense. It helps counter any impulse buying you do.

In preparing meals, if you spend more time in preparation, the cost is usually less than if you buy that article already prepared. Meals prepared at home from individual ingredients usually cost least, while those purchased ready to serve cost most, with the partly prepared meals somewhere between. You can make your own comparisons here.

Do you keep the waste in your kitchen at a minimum? A careful check on the waste from your refrigerator alone may surprise you, and the garbage pail can teach you valuable lessons if you will study it closely.

What about your food storage facilities? Do you have a cool, dark storage for flour and cereal products that is insect proof, dry, and large enough to handle the amount your family will eat in a reasonable time? Do you use your refrigerator to greatest advantage?

Sometimes home produced foods can cut your food costs, but for many families, this is impossible to do. We have to look to these other ways to cut our family food bills. I hope these hints help you to look at your own food buying habits and see where you can improve.

The 1967 Golden Spread Bee will be co-sponsored by West Texas State University and the Amarillo Globe-News. L.J. (Jack) Edmondson, West Texas State University Director of Public Services, will be Bee Director for the Golden Spread. Again there will be a unique secondary contest—the Junior Spelling Bee, open only to contestants from the 6th and lower graders. The National Spelling Bee is open to all students, from 1st to 8th grades.

The Hansford County Junior Champion for 1966 was Camille Baggerly, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Baggerly. She was a 6th grader in the Spearman Junior High school.

First place winner in the Golden Spread Bee will go to Washington during the first week in June 1967, to participate in the National Spelling

Bee. The winner will also receive several other attractive prizes, and his (or her) school will have a full year of use of the Britannica film service. A traveling plaque, carrying the names of all Regional winners since 1949, will hang at the school of the winner.

Last year's prizes for other top contestants included a Zenith stereophonic record player, a 24-volume set of Encyclopedia Britannica, several volumes of the Lincoln Library, a Capri Paper-Mate pen set, the seven-language Britannica dictionary, a World Atlas and cash prizes. Virtually the same prize list will be available this year.

Each County Champion receives an engraved plaque and a gold pen. Each County Junior Champion is given and a silver pin during the intermission at the Regional Bee (but there is no regional contest between the juniors; they are merely guests for the annual Spelling Bee luncheon held in the Amarillo Club).

In the school contests, each winner receives a Paper-Mate pen, inscribed "School Champion" and a blue and gold ribbon likewise imprinted. Each school junior winner receives a red and gold ribbon trophy. Each student who entered the Bee receives a ribbon

trophy also.

The National Spelling Bee, sponsored by newspapers throughout the 50 states is in its 38th year. High Plains champions have placed fairly high in the contests, but none has won the national crown.

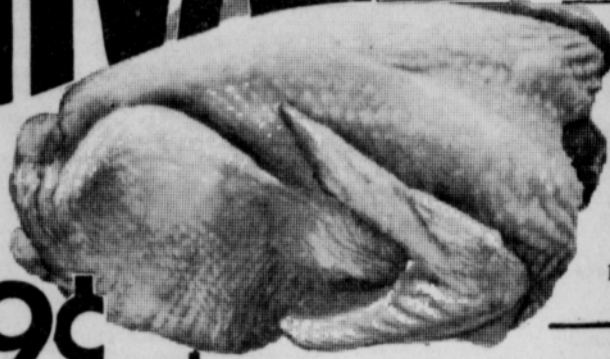

An Editorial

Extremism

Extremism begets extremism. Violence produces counter-violence. Everyone knows this, except the extremists.

Now we have Lester Maddox chosen as Democratic candidate for Governor of Georgia. "Mean" Maddox they called him after he began distributing ax handles to patrons of his restaurant who did not wish to eat where Negroes ate.

Would Georgians have chosen Maddox, after giving such a large plurality to Ellis Arnall, a racial moderate, only a few weeks ago in the pre-run-off votes? Most observers say "no". With Atlanta in the lead Georgia was making great progress in this transition period of race relations.

But then Stokely Carmichael went to Atlanta, a riot ensued, a fine Mayor and a progressive city were thrown into turmoil. There was a "backlash" and Mayor Ivan Allen says of "Mean" Maddox that he is probably the least competent, most unfit candidate to be offered Georgia voters in decades.

The Maddox victory is not, unfortunately, simply limited to Georgia. In Maryland a splendid candidate edged out by a racist. There are signs of more such results in tight races elsewhere in the country, in from the backlash.

What will the end result be? On the legislative front it undoubtedly means no more new civil rights legislation for a long time to come.

But more than that it may also mean that those whites who have been so active in helping the civil rights movement will lose interest, repudiated on all sides, by the segregationist whites and Negroes.

Carmichael may take some comfort from this, because it gives some validity to one part of his argument, that Negroes must do more for themselves. But at the same time it is evident that real "black power" results only from good working relations with the majority of American citizens who are white, 10 to 1.

A very large part of the Negro community is sick of Carmichael and disheartened by the Maddox vote. I have talked with many of them who know-as Carmichael does not-how hard and painful and long the march towards equality has been. To see it all blown up by a wild man, whose organization according to the New York Times claims exactly 135 members, is discouraging.

It's also not conducive to doing much more than marking time. But there may be another result; those who have been griping so much about the President's reluctance to go farther,

faster, may begin to realize just what is involved and how difficult it is to work out better race relations.

Mayor Daley of Chicago recently said television has a big responsibility for what has been happening. The kooks and psychotics are put on the air; on both sides, he might have added. But those who are working hard for domestic tranquility are not considered "newsworthy". Their voices are unheard of on the most important medium for reaching the people.

Perhaps the Maddox vote will stimulate a new look at TV coverage of race relations. If it does, that might be one salutary result.

Law Enforcement

It's about time that we turn our attention to law enforcement. Across the country policemen are quitting in disgust. Last year 53 policemen were murdered in line of duty and 6,836 were injured.

It is no rarity now for officers to be attacked by a mob while trying to arrest a suspect at the scene of a crime. There is growing police uncertainty, even timidity in going after criminals.

Even when a criminal is caught redhanded he has a good chance to walk away free while the policeman may be reprimanded for "police brutality."

In some cities police are admonished not to speak to a suspect in a "rough tone of voice."

To cap it off, policemen are underpaid. Houston Police Chief Herman Short says 75 percent of his men are "moonlighting" on extra jobs just to make ends meet.

The most discouraging aspect of the whole picture is the fact that society is not particularly in favor of good law enforcement.

If society doesn't begin backing its law enforcement agencies, we may see anarchy or quasi-anarchy sooner than we think.

Who's Who membership is based on scholarship, leader-

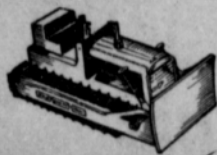
ship, participation in student affairs and potential. Nominations for Who's Who are submitted by campus departments and organizations. Final selection of candidates is made by the Student Honors Committee.

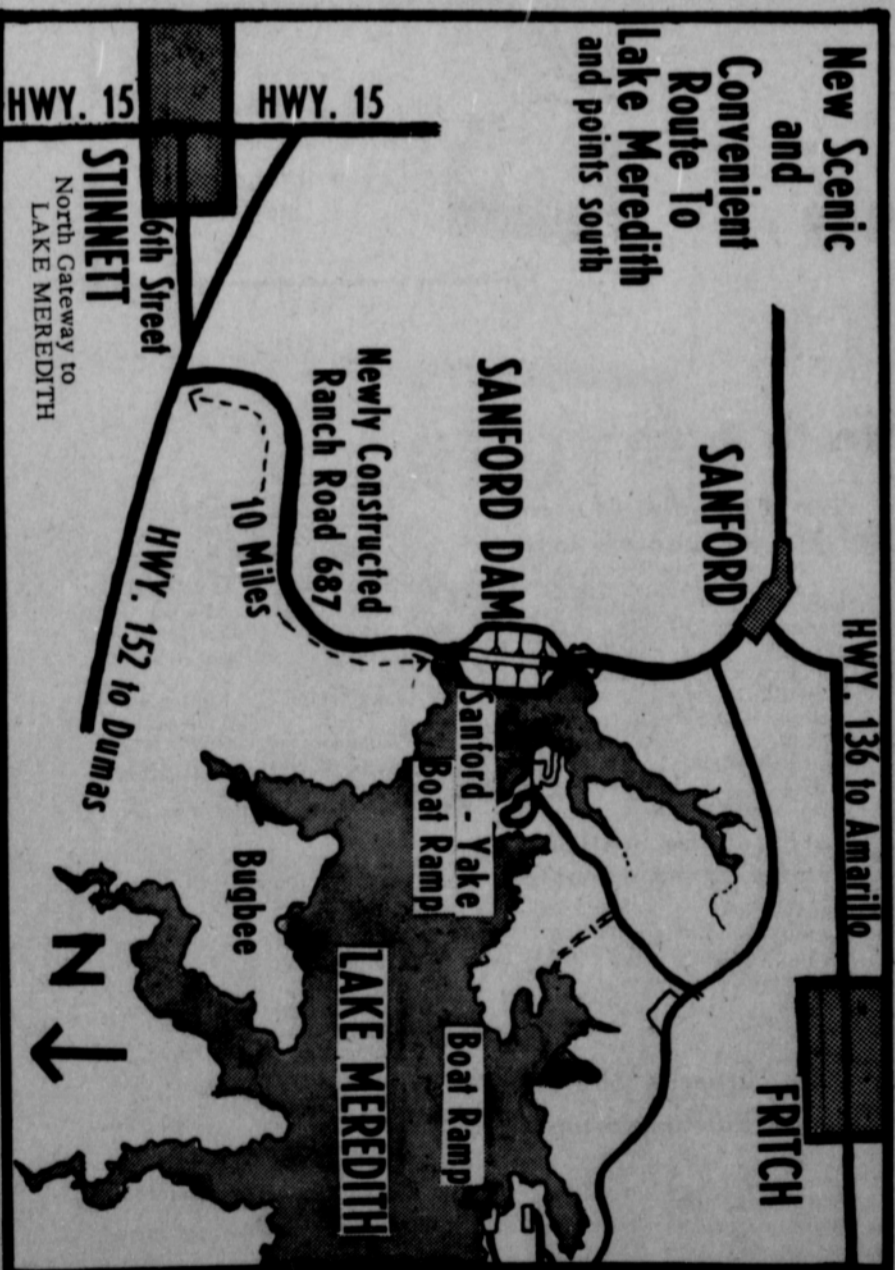

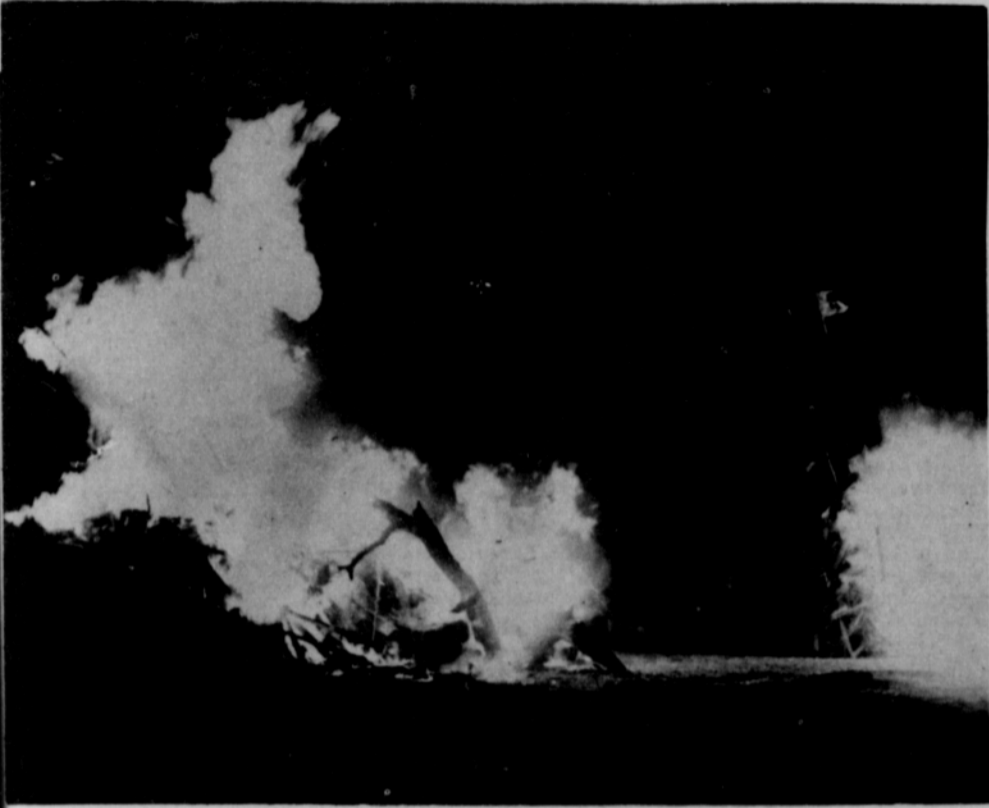

Mrs. Evans said the two camps make it possible for all girls to attend camp in the summer and use equipment which the Spearman troop alone could not afford.

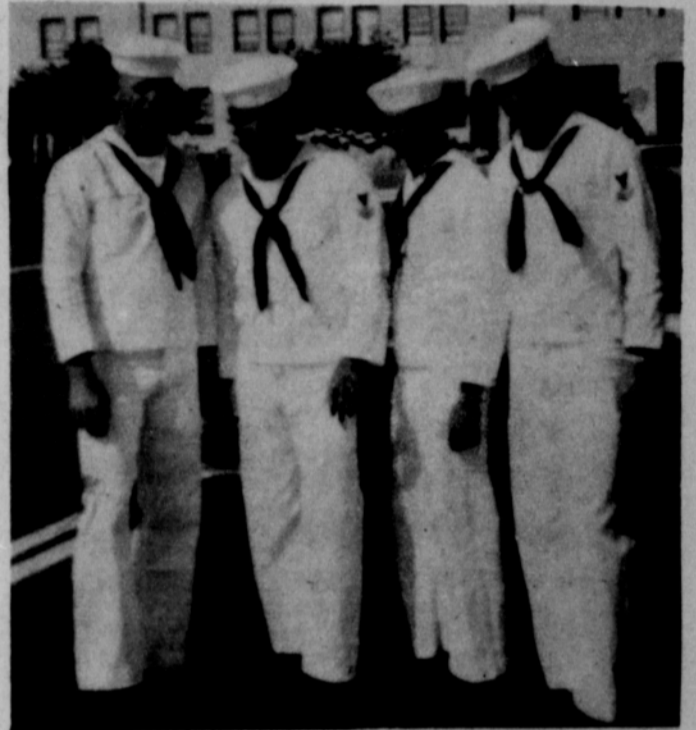
Four Sailors Leave for New Stations
