THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS MET IN REGULAR SESSION IN COUNCIL CHAMBERS OF CITY HALL, 30 S.W. COURT, ON SEPTEMBER 9, 1986. MAYOR C. RALPH BLODGETT PRESIDING. ALDERMEN PRESENT: WILSON MC CLELLAN, ED GARNER, BURL BUCHCHAN, MIKE CUDD. STAFF PRESENT: JIM MURRAY-CITY MANAGER, CHERYL GIBSON- CITY SECRETARY. VISITORS PRESENT: MARK SHEETS OF HERGERT BUICK, PONTIAC & GMC, DIANE CARTER OF KRDF, AND DONALD REED OF TRANSPECTO.

PLEDGE AND INVOCATION.
At 7:59 P.M. Mayor Blodgett declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was read by McClellan and followed by the invocation given by Buchanan.

CONSIDERATION OF THE MINUTES OF REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON AUGUST 26, 1986.

Motion was made by Garner to approve the minutes of the regular City Council meeting held on August

26, 1986, as written. Second by Buchanan. Motion Unanimously carried.

PUBLIC HEARING CONCERNING THE PROPOSED USE OF REVENUE SHARING FUNDS FOR THE 1986-87 FISCAL YEAR.

After discussion was held, motion was made by Nicholson to distribute revenue sharing funds in the amount of \$15,297.00 as follows:

- Golden Spread Senior Citizens \$3,000.00
- Stationmaster's House Museum \$1,000.00
- Family in Action \$500.00
- Lease Purchase Equipment for Health & Sanitation Department. \$11,797.00

Second by McClellan. Motion Unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE # 537 AN ORDINANCE APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 1986, THROUGH SEPT. 30, 1987, FOR THE CITY OF

SPEARMAN, HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS.

Motion was made by Garner to adopt ordinance # 537 an ordinance approving and adopting the budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1986, through September 30, 1987, for the City of Spearman, as presented in the total amount of \$2,006,575.00, which is a 4.4% decrease from the total amount of last year's budget. Second by Buchanan. Motion carried, McClellan abstaining on the adoption of the Health & Sanitation Department capitol outlay due to personal involvement. Garner Commended the City Manager and staff on the job well done on preparing the budget.

CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE #538 AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AD VALOREM TAXES ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS, FOR THE YEAR 1986, FIXING THE DUE DATE AND TIME OF PAYMENT THEREOF, PROVIDING FOR DISCOUNT FOR PROMPT PAYMENT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF TAXES.

Motion was made by Nicholson to

adopt ordinance #538 an ordinance levying ad Valorem taxes on all taxable property in the City of Spearman, Texas, for the year 1986, fixing the due date and time payment thereof, providing for discount for prompt payment, and providing for the collection of taxes, at a rate of 0.68 cents per \$100.00 value, which is the same tax rate of last year. Second by Cudd. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE #539 AN ORDINANCE APPROVING AND AMENDING THE BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 1985, THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 1986, IN THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS.

Motion was made by Cudd to adopt ordinance #539 an ordinance approving and amending the budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1985, through September 30, 1986, in the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas. Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE #540 AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF A HOTEL AND MOTEL ROOM OCCUPANCY TAX; PROVIDING FOR CERTAIN EXEMPTIONS; DEFINING TERMS; PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER AND METHOD OF COLLECTION; PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING A SEVERANCE CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Motion was made by Garner to adopt ordinance #540 providing for the assessment and collection of a hotel and motel room occupancy tax; providing for the manner and method of collection; providing a penalty; providing a severance clause; and providing for an effective date. Second by Cudd. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF A LEASE-EASEMENT WITH TRANSPECTO FOR A 4" WATER LINE, PUMP AND APPARATUS TO BE LOCATED AT THE MUNICIPAL LANDFILL.

Motion was made by Nicholson to grant a lease-easement to Transpecto for a 4" Water Line, pump and apparatus to be located at the municipal landfill.

CONSIDERATION OF AN EASEMENT WITH NORTH PLAINS ELECTRIC CO-OP FOR AERIAL ELECTRICAL LINES AT THE MUNICIPAL LANDFILL.

Motion was made by Buchanan to grant an easement with North Plains Electric Co-Op for aerial electrical lines at the Municipal landfill in order for Transpecto to have power for their pumps. Second by Garner. Motion carried, McClellan abstaining due to personal involvement.

CONSIDERATION OF THE CITY TO PROVIDE A WRECKER SERVICE FOR REMOVAL OF JUNKED AND IMPOUNDED VEHICLES.

City Manager, Jim Murray, stated that all Body Shops and Wrecker services that Bid Specifications were sent to had declined to Bid. Mark Sheets of Hergert Pontiac, Buick & GMC was present and stated that Hergerts might be interested if some items in the Bid specifications could be changed. Motion was made by Nicholson for the City Manager to try and negotiate a contract with Hergert Pontiac, Buick & GMC. Second by McClellan. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH McMorries & GLOVIER, INC. FOR PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR PAINTING SPEARMAN'S ELEVATED WATER STORAGE AND GROUND STORAGE TANKS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$6,000.00.

Motion was made by Nicholson to authorize the Mayor to enter into an agreement with McMorries & Glovier, Inc. for professional engineering services for painting Spearman's Elevated and Ground Water Storage Tanks in the amount of \$6,000.00. Second by McClellan. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF APPOINTING ATTORNEY VANCE JONES TO PROSECUTE ALL MUNICIPAL COURT CASES.

After discussion was held, motion was made by Garner to appoint attorney Vance Jones to prosecute all Municipal Court Cases for the City of Spearman. Second by Cudd. Motion Unanimously Carried.

CONSIDERATION OF THE MONTHLY FIRE, AMBULANCE, POLICE, MUNICIPAL COURT, AND ANIMAL CONTROL REPORTS.

Motion was made by Nicholson to approve the monthly fire, Ambulance, Police, Municipal Court, and Animal Control Reports. Second by McClellan. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF MONTHLY BILLS PAYABLE, CURRENT CASH POSITION, AND REVENUE AND EXPENSE REPORT.

Motion was made by Cudd to approve the monthly bills payable in the amount of \$407,055.98, the current cash position, and the revenue and expense report.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION #11-86 A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING A NATIONAL ENERGY SECURITY AND CONSERVATION POLICY AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Motion was made by Garner to adopt resolution #11-86 to support a national energy security and conservation policy and provide an effective date. Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried.

OTHER. No other Action Taken
Motion was made by Garner to Adjourn. Mayor Blodgett declared the meeting adjourned at 8:37 pm.

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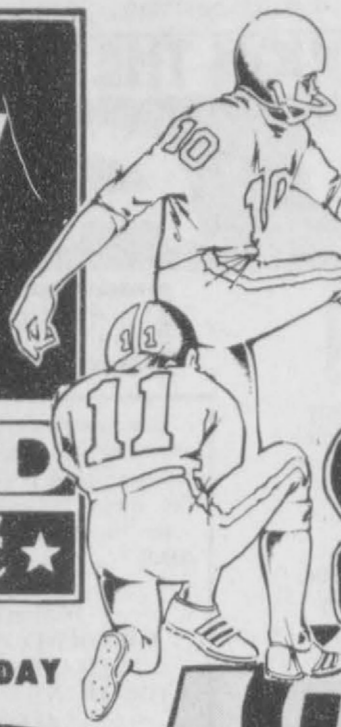

Sandi Rich, Blue on Mother's Refrigerator Bread (Wreath), daughter of Mr. & Mrs. David Rich of Spearman, Cinda Turner, Blue on Basic Sweet Dough Coffee Ring, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Turner.

The awards ceremonies will be held Saturday afternoon for a public review. Each contestant will receive a 5lb. bag of flour from Arrow Head mills and a five dollar premium. The winners will receive other donated prizes and premiums.

We would like to share these prize winner recipes: **WHOLE WHEAT ROLLS BY KARLA KUNSELMAN.**

- 2 pkg. dry yeast
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1 stick oleo
- 1/2c. brown sugar
- 2 eggs

- 2 C. all purpose flour
- 1/2 C. Lukewarm water
- 1 C. scalded milk
- 1C. instant potato flakes
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 C. whole wheat flour
- 1/4 C. all purpose flour a knead in lukewarm water mix the yeast and 1 tsp. sugar. Let set. Put oleo, potato flakes, brown sugar, and salt in large mixing bowl. Scald milk and pour over the oleo. Cool. Add yeast and 2 eggs to mixing bowl. Beat with electric mixer until smooth. Beat in 2 C. Whole Wheat Flour. Stir in white flour. Knead for 10 minutes in 1/4 C. flour. Pour 2 tsp. oil in mixing bowl. Roll dough over in oil. Cover with saran wrap and let rise 1 hour. Punch dough down and shape into rolls. Let rise 1 hour. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Rub top of bread with a stick of oleo after you take the hot bread out of the oven.

- APPLE-WHEAT PINWHEEL**
 1 cup whole wheat flour LYNETTE
 1/2 tsp. salt WILLIAMS
 1 pkg. active dry yeast
 butter or margarine
 1/4 cup pecans
 3 1/2 cups all purpose flour (approximately)
 1/4 cup sugar
 1/4 tsp. ground mace
 3/4 cup apple juice (unsweetened)
 2 eggs
 1/4 cup brown sugar

In large bowl combine first five ingredients and 1 cup all purpose flour. In sauce pan over low heat; heat apple juice and 1/2 cup butter until very warm 120 degrees to 130 degrees F. With mixer at low speed beat liquid into dry ingredients until blended; beat 2 more minutes. Add eggs and 1/2 cup flour to make thick batter, continue beating two minutes. With spoon stir in 1 1/2 cups flour to make soft dough. Knead on lightly floured surface, working more flour in. Shape into ball and place in greased bowl. Let rise until double in bulk. When dough is ready punch down. Cover and let rest on floured surface about 15 minutes. Grease large cookie sheet. Melt 2 tablespoons butter. Roll dough into 18"x18" square. Brush with melted butter. Sprinkle with chopped pecans and brown sugar. Roll up jelly-roll fashion. Place on cookie sheet. Shape into ring; press ends together to seal. Cut ring, in one inch intervals, up to but not through inside edge. Lift and twist each piece. Let rise until double. Bake at 375 degrees F. 20 to 25 minutes. Cool and frost with decorative glaze.

DECORATIVE GLAZE - in small sauce pan over low heat, melt 1 tablespoon butter; stir in 3/4 cup confectioner's sugar and 2 table-spoons apple juice until smooth.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

Currently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pro-

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."
