Agricultural Experts To Be Here For W.I.F.E. Supper

Besides the meal, the program will feature Congressman Jack Hightower of the

13th District, Ray Pewett Assistant to the Commissioner of Agriculture of Texas, Charlie Ball Executive Vice President of Texas Feeders Association, Elbert Harp Executive Director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers, Carl King President of Texas Com Growers, Bill Nelson Executive Vice President of Texas Wheat Producers and Dale Hendricks President of American Council of Agriculture. Each of these men will speak, followed by a question and answer session.

These men have helped work on the current farm legislation, and they are quite knowledgeable about the present farm situation. This is an opportunity for the High Plains area to meet with and discuss problems that are affecting us right now.

WHO IS CHARLIE BALL? Mr. Ball is Executive Vice President of Texas Feeders Association from Amarillo, Texas. Mr. Ball can explain the beef referendum that was recently failed. There was also information concerning this subject, now we have an opportunity to find out what it really was about. Come to Spearman, Texas, Sept. 1, and meet Mr. Ball, let us learn what really is going on in the beef industry.

WHO IS ELBERT HARP? Mr. Harp is Executive Director of the Texas Grain Sorghum out of Lubbock, Texas. The Texas Grain Sorghum board has five active members when they need at least 15 to be successful. Even with this serious drawback, Mr. Harp was able to work with our legislators on the current farm legislation and he was successful in having milo separated from corn, thereby, allowing milo a higher target price.

For instance the current target price for milo is \$2.88 per hundred wt, with the new target price which will be \$4.02 per hundred wt. That's a nice increase!! We owe our special thanks to Mr. Harp and people like him for their hard work. Come to Spearman, Texas, Sept. 1, and meet El-

bert Harp, and learn what's going on with things concerning you.

WHO IS CARL KING? Mr. King is President of the Texas Com Growers from Dilmitt, Texas. How many acres of corn were planted in the Texas Panhandle this year? Did you participate in the Com Referendum?

Mr. King can explain about the corn referendum and hopefully he can explain why the referendum failed. It is important that we support our Com Growers Association, because through them we will be able to market our corn. At present Mr. King is working with the Secretary of Agriculture on an agreement for the U.S.D.A. to pay the transportation of corn being shipped from the local elevator to the terminal. This is corn that's been placed in the loan. Come to Spearman, Texas, Sept. 1, to meet Mr. King and find out how

School Crossings Spruced Up

Members of the Spearman Police Department Friday, Aug. 26, went about their housekeeping duties in the city by straightening out all school zone signs and painting crosswalks as part of the ready-up for Monday's opening of school.

Chief Steve Wisniewski and Officer James Mennen were joined by Mike Slater, the city's new animal control officer, in the operation around the elementary school area.

Wisniewski reported that all intersection crosswalks along Barkley, Dessen and Townsend from fifth to seventh streets were given a new coat of paint and school zone signs were in place for the control of traffic.

He added that his department will be enforcing the 15 miles per hour speed limit posted for the school area, noting that his department will allow up to 20 miles per hour speed in school zone and all motorists traveling above that speed will be issued a citation.

Slater will serve as the crossing guard in the school zone in the morning and afternoon as well as being animal control officer.

Wisniewski stressed the importance of motorists observing the signs, especially those calling for stopping for children in the marked crosswalks. And he

Peggy's Pointers

First-year school children need parental encouragement. Starting school may be emotional for children and parents when six million 5 and 6-year-olds enter school for the first time.

Treat going to school as routine and expected of children, but offer support and encouragement. Here are hints that may help alleviate some of the stress:

Do not make going to school the topic of daily conversation. Do not let other children frighten or tease with tales of how awful school is. Encourage the child to trust your perceptions of what school is like.

Look over classrooms, school buildings and facilities. Never give the impression that there is a choice about attending school. Make it clear that all children go to school.

Show that you appreciate your child's cooperation in helping with preparations to begin school. Make transportation plans clear. If the child is to walk to school, go along once or twice to establish the route, or arrange for your child to walk with other children in the neighborhood.

If the child is to ride a bus, clearly identify which bus before school starts. Do not get into the habit of seating your child in the classroom. This can lead to tears and clinging, which can start the children off on the wrong foot with the teacher and other children.

If your child does cry, rest assured that in most cases the tears will stop quickly.

Do not overly excite your child about going to school. It is not natural for children to be happy giving up the secure atmosphere of home for the uncertainties of school.

For working mothers, if possible, make arrangements to be at home for the first day or two when your child gets home from school.

Let your child know that during the school day you will

be going about your usual work. Maintain a normal home life during the first days of school. Be mindful that some of the child's anxieties will be associated with the opening of school, and this attitude is likely to filter down to the child.

Even with the best made plans, there is still the possibility that when the day arrives, the child will cry or be "sick". Try not to overcome with sympathy.

Standing firm from the beginning will help to alleviate problems which could arise later. Be patient and reassuring to help your child feel secure about the first days of school. **REDUCE RISK OF SAMONELLA**

You can reduce risks of having your small, adventure-some child coming home with headache, diarrhea, abdominal discomforts or vomiting, by heeding these warnings.

Samonella bacteria occur naturally on the curious creatures children like to romp with, such as turtles, dogs, cats, fish, birds and small rodents. These bacteria can be transferred from unclean hands to food. When eaten, the bacteria may multiply to toxic levels that can cause serious illness to small children within 24 hours.

To prevent food poisoning from samonella, make sure hands are cleaned and use sanitary utensils. Cook foods thoroughly and serve them hot. Promptly cool or freeze foods not used immediately after preparation to retard multiplication of many bacteria. Fully reheat stored food to kill bacteria.

By being careful, you can help your child enjoy each day safely. **JUDGE BY SMOEL**

Judge cantaloupe by smell, netting and stem. Cantaloupe should smell ripe and fresh, but many stores are too "air conditioned" to permit detecting the smell.

Also, the netting should be raised and heavy. Check the stem area. It should be smooth and sunken, which would indicate that the cantaloupe left the vine early.

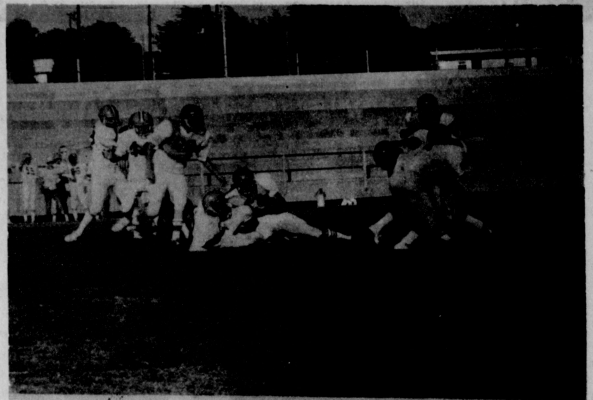

FUND RAISING
For the first time in a nine year history the Texas Panhandle which benefits so directly from PPPA's services is being asked to lend financial support. The goal set for the 1977 membership drive was \$20,000. The Board and Fund Raising committee agreed to accept the challenge of our first major membership drive and has appealed to the business community in Amarillo and Borger. Moore County United Way has made an annual donation for the last three years. We have received approximately \$8,000 so far and have several other donations still anticipated. We want to increase private funding so that:

1. Services will continue if government funds are decreased.
 2. The quality of services and facilities can be maintained above the minimum government standards.
 3. Services can be extended to a continuously growing number of people—though federal and state funds remain the same.
- FALL WORKSHOP**
Several months ago a questionnaire was mailed to youth advisors of local agencies serving adolescents in order to determine if a seminar on teenage sexuality would be beneficial to our community. The greatest response came from school teachers and counselors, but responses were received from churches, an adop-

tion agency, a center for mentally handicapped, a home for pre-delinquent teenagers, etc. At the present time we are planning to hold such a workshop in the fall with the topics which were of greatest concern—problem counseling, sexual roles of our changing society and teenage sexuality and responsibility. The workshop is designed to give professionals, paraprofessionals, and parents basic information in order to work more effectively with the problems facing the teenager of today, provide a list of referral resources, and to enlist support for PPPA's goals and objectives. TEEN PREGNANCY REACHES EPIDEMIC PROPORTION
The Alan Guttmacher Institute (Research and Development Division of Planned Parenthood Federation of America) has just issued a report in which the problems of teenage pregnancy has been termed "epidemic". Some startling facts have been uncovered:
Out of 21 million U.S. teenagers (age 15-19), 11 million are sexually active.
One million teenagers between 15 and 19 get pregnant annually, and 30,000 girls under age 15 become pregnant annually.
One-fifth of all U.S. births are to women still in their teen years, and 12,500 births each year result from pregnancies to girls under age 15.
One-third of all births to teenagers are out-of-wedlock and one-third of all teenage marital births are conceived before marriage.
U.S. teenage childbearing rates are the main reasons for non-use of contraception.

Only six states and the District of Columbia mandate the teaching of some form of family life or sex education and over half of all sex education programs exclude birth control information. In contrast, eight out of ten Americans old enough to have children of junior high or senior high age favor sex education in the schools and provision of birth control methods to unmarried teenagers.

SAFER PREGNANCIES
A Worldwatch Institute report says that pregnancy risks could be minimized under the following conditions:
Births spaced at least two years apart
Families limited to no more than four children
No children born until the mother is 18 or 20 years old
No children born to women over age 35
"THE THIRD VENEREAL DISEASE"
Herpes Simplex Type 2 is increasing to the point where it may yet outstrip gonorrhea in numbers of sufferers. At this time, there is no method of curing herpes infections. The disease is caused by a virus which is spread during sexual intercourse and causes sores or blisters on the genitalia which are similar to fever blisters. These blisters develop 3 to 20 days after sex with an infected person. Later the painful blisters break, forming superficial sores. This initial reaction usually lasts from 2 to 4 weeks at which time the virus become dormant. Later recurrences are similar to the first reaction except they are generally milder and last only 1 to 2 weeks.
There is some evidence that Herpes Simplex Type 2 may be related to cervical cancer in women and prostate cancer in men. Therefore, persons who have had herpes infections should have their physician check them for cancer at least once a year. Also, Herpes in pregnant women may be transmitted to the baby during delivery causing a serious infection. Sometimes a Cesarean section is necessary to prevent this from occurring. Nevertheless, a woman's obstetrician should be informed about any herpes infection which she has had.
