Council awards sealcoat & tractor bids

The City Council met in regular session March 13 with Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett presiding. Aldermen present were Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Bob Pearson, Burl Buchanan and Jim Murray, city manager, Charlotte Sheets, city secretary and D.J. Alberts, police chief. Visitors at the meeting were Robert White, Mike Farney and L.D. Burns.

Councilmen unanimously voted to accept the contract for professional services with McMorris & Burns on the 1983 Texas Community Development grant in the amount of \$15,400.00. The grant is for \$196,655 for water line replacement and fire hydrants in low and moderate income areas of the city.

The 1984 sealcoat bid was awarded to Lipham Construction Company who bid .5314 cents per yard. Lewis Construction of Dumas entered a bid for .67 cents a yard. Last year the sealcoat bid went to Lipham Construction Co., at .52 cents per yard. The city budgets \$40,000 each year for sealcoat.

The bid for the lease-purchase of a tractor with a backhoe loader to Case Power & Equipment Company, Amarillo for \$26,800.00 was awarded. Those in favor were Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Bob Pearson and Burl Buchanan. Wilson McClellan was opposed.

Additional funds of \$250 was approved by the council to provide necessary funds for a responsible cable TV policy. The Texas Municipal League along with other state organizations is working to keep regulation of cable TV under cities instead of the federal government.

City manager Murray was authorized to take bids for a gas leak survey of the municipal gas system. Bid specifications are to be made for petroleum products used by the city.

Consideration of accepting the 1982-83 annual audit performed by Mason & Henton and the payment for their services was tabled until the next meeting.

Monthly fire, ambulances, police, municipal court and animal control reports were approved.

Approval of monthly bills payable in the amount of \$15,707.16 and current cash position was made.

A letter from the department of agriculture, soil conservation service concerning the flood plain management study was discussed. The city received a grant of \$86,000 for this study for Spearman and surrounding area.

Ed Garner gave a report concerning the GTE rate increase meeting held March 9 in Austin.

GTE plans improvement

General Telephone's service improvement and modernization program for Spearman is getting into full swing, according to Robert J. Meyers, operations manager for the company.

Extensive rehabilitation of the outside plant lines and cables is planned over the next two and one-half years to coincide with the installation of a new digital electronic switching office for Spearman. Under the current schedule, the most modern computerized telephone switching system is scheduled to be in service for Spearman customers late in 1986 or early 1987, depending on market requirements.

In preparation for the new sophisticated switching center, Meyers said the company plans to spend nearly \$1.5 million replacing, rehabilitating and adding cable to the network in Spearman during the next 30 months. "It is not too early to get started," said Meyers. "In addition in the near future, special testing equipment will be installed in Spearman which will check each subscriber line for trouble. The information from the analysis of facilities is used to establish patterns and develop priorities for cable work."

The new switching center equipment will be installed in the existing General Telephone building at 110 N. Bernice Street. "The cost associated with the switch itself is in excess of \$900,000," said Meyers. When the new switch is operational, Spearman customers will have new features such as call waiting, call forwarding, speed calling and conference calling available for a small monthly charge.

"Major expenditures of this type are taking place throughout General Telephone of the Southwest's serving territory in the states of Texas, New Mexico, Arkansas, and Oklahoma, as a part of the continuing effort to provide our customers with the best possible communications service available," commented Meyers.

General Telephone Company of the Southwest serves over one million customers in its four-state area and is a subsidiary of GTE.

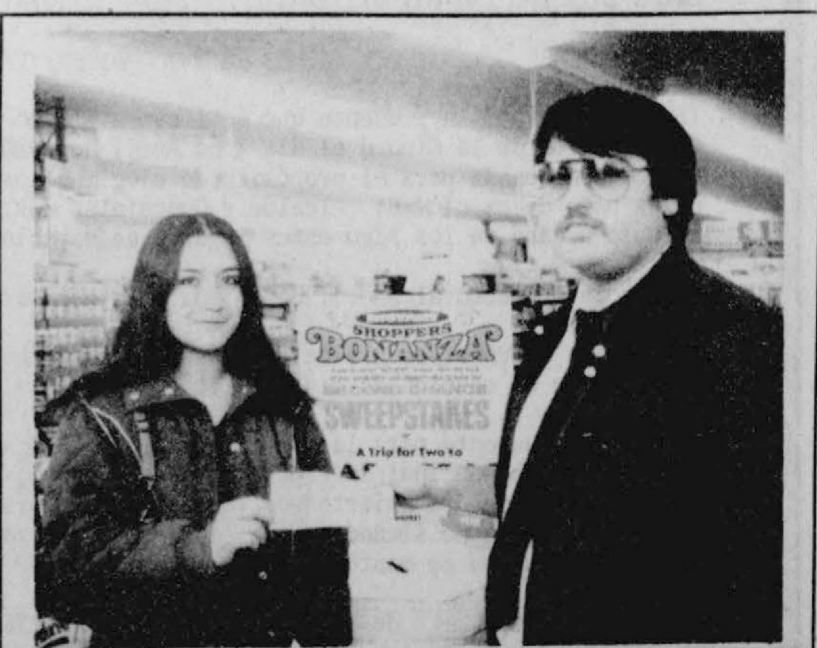
The surplus food is being distributed by the United States of Dept. of Agriculture.

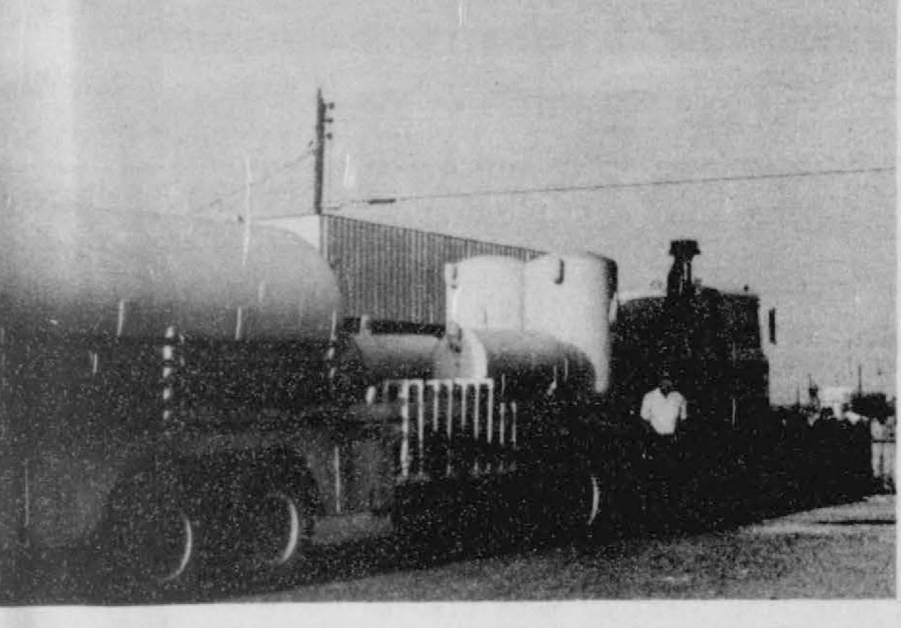

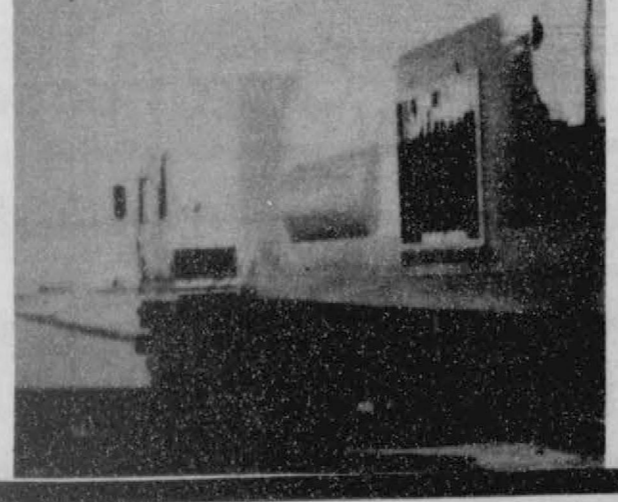

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Karen's Krazy Korner

With the increasing life-span of Americans, more and more of us will be a part of three- four- and even five-generation families.

Building a strong family across several generations requires effort. But there are no easy rules to tell us how it's done.

Living close enough to visit, talk and support on another helps maintain bonds between parents, children and grandparents.

In addition, researchers in family relations have found certain characteristics that contribute to a "quality" relationship among generations. Here are some of these traits that we might try to develop in our families:

*Affection is closely related to emotional closeness among generations. The closest inter-generational ties are based on mutual affection, interdependence and giving to each other.

*Similarity of interests, personal and social values, opinions and beliefs also create closeness among generations.

While children and parents don't always have to agree with one another, they must at least respect each other's ideas and opinions.

*Effective communication enhances relationships and affects the life satisfaction of family members. Regardless of their age. Lack of communication leads to submerging negative feelings which means that relationships between older parents and adult children may be difficult to improve over time.

*Expectations that older parents have for their children and grandchildren also affect the inter-generational family. If older parents have either more contact or less contact with their children or grandchildren than they expect, it can strain the family ties.

Most older parents want to live apart from their adult children, yet see them frequently and feel close to them. Parents and children may have to work out a situation in which the amount of contact is satisfying to both generations.

*A sense of obligation and duty to parents is also an important indicator for a quality relationship among generations. This sense of responsibility is usually developed as children grow up. Children observe how their parents treat their grandparents, and use this as a role model for their own future behavior.

Each generation—older parents, adult children, and children—must work at strengthening family ties. Because they have so much to give and to gain from each other, inter-generational family members will find it's worth the effort. Price for the meal will be \$4.50 for adults, \$3.00 for children 6 yrs. to 12 yrs. and under 6 yrs. free.







Police Dept. has busy week

On March 9, 1984, an officer was on patrol by the YMCA and noticed a Huffy Bandit bicycle laying on the sidewalk in the front. The bicycle was picked up and brought to the Spearman Police Department for safe keeping until the owner could be found.

On March 9, 1984, the bicycle that was found at the YMCA was given to the owner.

On March 9, 1984, at 9:52 p.m. an officer was dispatched to a Spearman business in reference to a theft. Upon arrival, the officer was met by an employee who advised that one of their customers had his wallet stolen. Upon talking with the owner of the wallet, he advised that he had left his wallet laying on the chair on the balcony right outside the room. When he came out, his wallet was missing. He advised that it contained (3) three \$20.00 bills, an American Express card, and several Alron Ins., ID cards. He stated that they had taken his drivers license out and left them on the chair. Upon talking with the employee, she advised that there were several children playing in that area when the wallet was taken. She gave a list of the children to the Officer. At 10:52 p.m., the owner of the wallet came into the Spearman Police Department and advised that he had found his wallet. He advised that he had recovered the wallet from one of the children that was playing in the area at the time it was taken. He

advised that he did not wish to file any charges.

On March 11, 1984, a complainant advised the Spearman Police Department that on January 21, 1984 that someone had entered her vehicle and had taken a cassette box with 12 tapes inside. She advised that her vehicle was unlocked. A report was made on the missing tapes.

On March 11, 1984, an officer was notified by the dispatcher to locate (4) four, (14) year old white females that had left the house while spending the night at a Spearman residence. On March 10, 1984, a Spearman Police Officer observed a stop sign laying on the ground at the intersection of West 5th and S. Highway 207. Upon checking the pole, the officer noticed that it was broken off at the ground level and that there didn't appear to be any paint left on the pole from the vehicle involved. No clear tire tracks could be found at the scene.

On March 12, 1984, a Booker, Texas resident entered the Spearman Police Department and advised that on Feb. 27, 1984, his vehicle had been struck by an unknown vehicle while it was parked at the Plains Shopping Center. The vehicle had been struck in the front center

with damage rating of (1). He further stated that he believed the accident had caused his windshield to crack. A report was made of the accident.

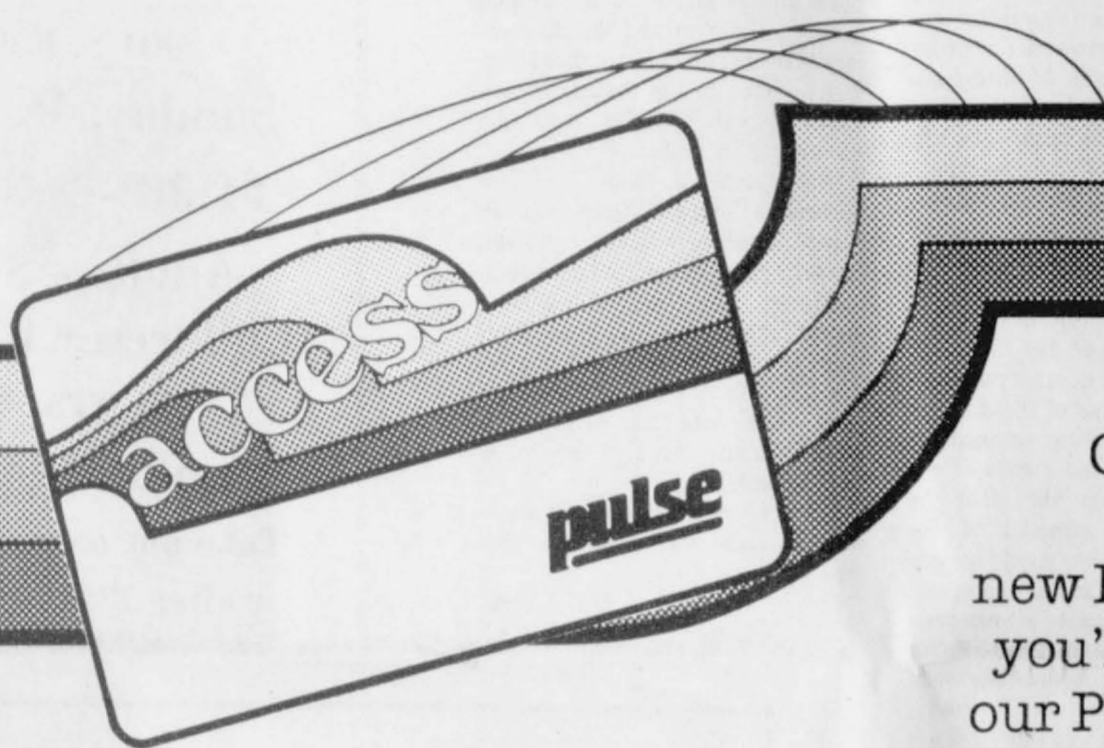
