Patients can take their turn with Tim and explain to him their feelings and symptoms exactly as they would Dr. David. Tim's training is so far advanced into medical ministering that he can assess vital signs, evaluate symptoms and have the case pretty well in hand when the doctor comes in to monitor it. In most of your cases of normal but not critical need for medical consultation and attention, the doctor will direct the assistant to continue with the patient through the course of what ever treatment is needed in this particular case.

A physician's assistant can be invaluable, too, in manning the hospital emergency room. This is a demanding part of all physicians' practice but necessary. Dr. David has been on emergency room calls every other night. Now, Tim will take his first call of the evening on duty nights. Unless the emer-
