AUSTIN--Workers in a statewide voter registration drive are making a concerted effort to reach young Texans, according to Sec. of State Mark White, who is directing the registration project.

White says statistics indicate Texans between the ages of 18 and 20 participate in elections less than any other population segment, with the 21-24 year bracket following close behind.

"We have contacted officials in virtually every high school in Texas, and we are now trying to organize registration drives in most colleges," White said. "Young Texans represent a large pool of the electorate that remains untapped, and we hope to untapped, and we hope to register a large percentage by the Oct. 1 deadline for regis-

the Oct. 1 deadline for regis-tering to vote in the Presi-dential election."

White contends that most people, regardless of age, tend to vote once they complete the process of registering.

"Studies indicate that be-tween 80 and 90 percent of

registered voters do vote," White said. "All it takes to register in Texas is filling out a postcard, so if we can get our message to the people, we should see an upswing in Texas voting performance, which has been falling steadily for more than a decade."







cighteen wheat-state Congressmen and the Advisory Committee on Grains to Secretary of Agriculture Butz, both urging at least \$2.50, and that of the National Association of Wheat Growers' earlier request of \$3.00 per bushel.

The current parity for wheat—the nationally published price it should be to make it comparable in value to other goods and services—is \$4.91 per bushel. Today's price to Texas producers is in the \$2.60-\$2.75 range, depending on quality and location. Wilson said, "At these prices the 1976 Texas 100 million bushel wheat crop would put

The President was reminded of these words today and urged to act on them with an immediate announcement of increased loan rates on wheat for the 1976 and 1977 crops, by Winston Wilson, Quanah, farmer-elected President of Amarillo-based Texas Wheat Producers Association. ## NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to pro-vide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water develop-ment nursoess as the

for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution." 

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#### League Cites Coaches, 4-H Projects the most rewarding gift you may ever receive. Why not take the time to share some of your knowledge with young and willing minds? School Officials As Guardians of Control

According to a recent article by the University Interscholas-tic League Director General Dr. Rhea H. Williams, coaches and game officials are equally responsible for conduct at a

game.
"The League Office often receives protesting phone calls and letters throughout the school year. Most such letters and calls charge that the game officials let the contest get out of control." Coaches or school officials never seem to be at fault.

fault.

Under League rules, game officials are accepted by both teams and equally represent both participating schools while on the field. Under the playing rules of the NCAA and federation rule book, caches and officials are in charge of the game and have authority to stop the game at any time if it is not going according to provisions under which it was agreed to be played.

provisions under which it was agreed to be played.
"When a school charges that the game official elt the game get out of control", the school or its representative forgets that the school personnel has an equal responsibility in game management.

Whenever it becomes ap-parent that a player or players are in danger of sustaining injuries from unnecessary roughness, it is time for ad-ministrators, coaches, and of-ficials to get their heads together and to remove the troublemakers from the game or park.
"No coach should expect the

or park.

"No coach should expect the game official to serve as disciplinarian for his players. The coach and the game officials must always present a united front. They must at least give the outward impression of working toward the same goal in directing the course of the game. Proceeding with proper sportsmanship should be the prime concern of both coaches and game officials.

When the football or basketball fans step in and decide to discipline the game officials, that automatically involves the school with the State Executive Committee. It is the responsibility of this committee to see that all public school games are conducted in an atmosphere and surrounding which will promote good citizenship and provide sportsmanlike training for the high school participants.
