AUSTIN—Workers in a statewide voter registration drive are making a concerted effort to reach young Texans, according to Sec. of State Mark White, who is directing the registration project.

White says statistics indicate Texans between the ages of 18 and 20 participate in elections less than any other population segment, with the 21-24 year bracket following close behind.

"We have contacted officials in virtually every high school in Texas, and we are now trying to organize registration drives in most colleges," White said. "Young Texans represent a large pool of the electorate that remains untapped, and we hope to register a large percentage by the Oct. 1 deadline for registering to vote in the Presidential election."

White contends that most people, regardless of age, tend to vote once they complete the process of registering.

"Studies indicate that between 80 and 90 percent of

registered voters do vote," White said. "All it takes to register in Texas is filling out a postcard, so if we can get our message to the people, we should see an upswing in Texas voting performance, which has been falling steadily for more than a decade."

Registration applications are available through county tax assessors or by calling White's office in Austin toll-free at 1-800-292-9602.

"Anyone interested in helping us register voters—especially young Texans—can get in touch with us at this number," White said.

REPLACING OR CORRECTING VOTER CERTIFICATES. If a voter certificate is lost or destroyed, the voter should give the registrar a signed Statement of Loss, and the registrar will issue a replacement certificate. If the replacement certificate includes a name change or a change in precinct, it will not be valid until the 30th day after the Statement of Loss is received.

To change or correct the

information on your voter certificate, present the incorrect certificate to the registrar, who will issue a new, corrected certificate.

WHERE TO VOTE. A registered voter casts his or her ballot in the precinct of residence as described by the governmental unit holding the election. The county precinct number is recorded on the registration certificate.

In elections not involving an entire county, precincts and polling places may be combined. The local newspaper is the best source of information on the location of polling places. The authority holding the election will also provide this information.

VOTING AND POLITICAL PARTIES. A person who votes in a party primary becomes a member of that party and may not change party affiliation for the runoff primary. Once you have voted in the primary election of one party, you cannot vote in the runoff election of another party.

Texas physicians participating will be Doctors John S. Stehlin, Jr., Associate Professor of Surgery at Baylor Medical College, Houston; F.

Lamont Jennings, Pathologist from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston; Victorio Rodriguez, Chief of the Center Pavilion at the University of Texas Cancer Center, Houston; R. Don Gambrell, Chief of Gynecologic Endocrinology at Wilford Hall, USAF Medical Center, Lackland Air Force Base; and Gary S. Rapp, Amarillo radiologist.

Featured speaker for the noon luncheon will be Dr. L. S. Thompson of Dallas, President of the Texas Medical Association, who will discuss the medical liability crisis. Dr. Charles K. Hendrick of Amarillo, President of the Panhandle District Medical Society, will install Dr. C. L. Montgomery of Lubbock as President for the coming year.

More than 200 physicians and their wives from a three-state area are expected to attend. Women's activities, under the direction of Mrs. John E. Jones, will include a luncheon and Indian Artfest. Honored guest will be Mrs. Horace H. Trippett of Waco, President of the Women's Auxiliary to the T.M.A.

Wheat Association Pushes For Loan Rate Increases

"If unforeseen price deterioration requires action on my part, I will direct the Secretary of Agriculture to make adjustments in price support loan rates for wheat, corn, soybeans and other feed grains," so stated President Ford on May 1, 1975 when he vetoed a Congressional-passed Emergency Farm Bill that would have strengthened farm income and stabilized food prices.

The President was reminded of these words today and urged to act on them with an immediate announcement of increased loan rates on wheat for the 1976 and 1977 crops, by Winston Wilson, Quanaah, farmer-elected President of Amarillo-based Texas Wheat Producers Association. "The situation is similar and such action would be in keeping with and comparable in affect to producers, with that announced earlier this week of tripling import duties on sugar in order to strengthen prices of domestic producers which reportedly have fallen 45 percent to below production costs," Wilson said.

Pointing to wheat price drops of over \$2.00 per bushel, or about 45 percent since a Presidential export embargo and grain export limiting agreement last fall, the Association had in August requested the President then to: (1) Re-initiate and expand Public Law 480 Export Assistance Programs, (2) Increase loan rates, and (3) Announce a

August County Accidents Kill 3

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of August, 1976 according to Sergeant C. E. Henderson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in three persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1976 shows a total of 26 accidents resulting in five persons killed and 13 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August 1976, shows a total of 506 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 319 injured, as compared to August 1975, with 596 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 292 persons injured. This was 30 less accidents, the same number killed, and 27 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

The 16 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1976, occurred in the following counties: three each in Parker, Hansford; two each in Donley, Motley; one each in Deaf Smith, Foard, Lubbock, Lynn, Montague, Palo Pinto.

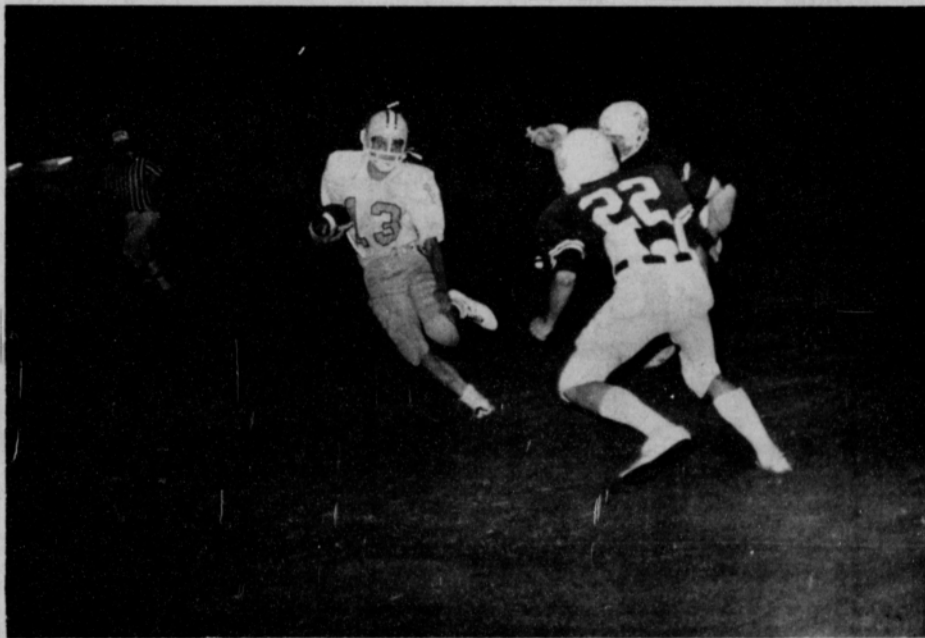

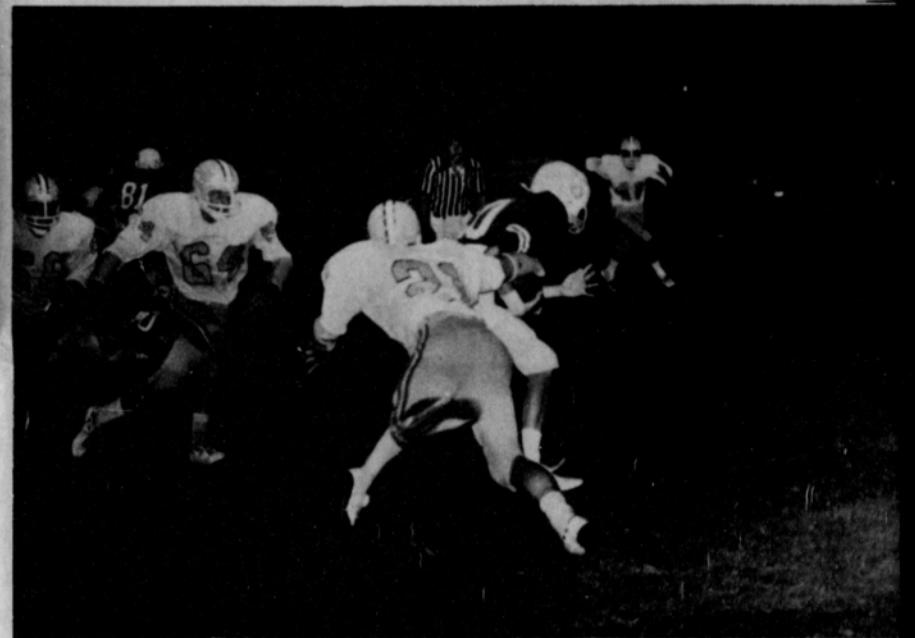

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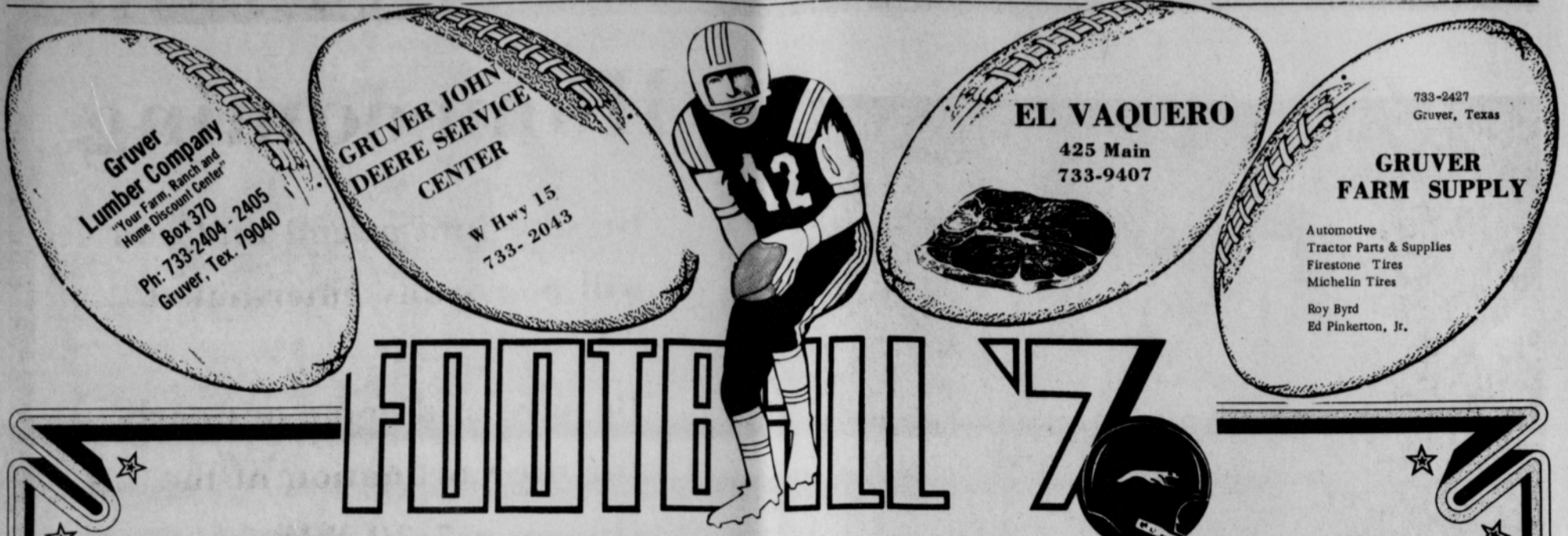

Mrs. Leo "Daisy" Moore is leaving for Austin Sept. 28 to start her push for better highways in the Top Ten counties where she has won the Democratic nomination for State Representative. 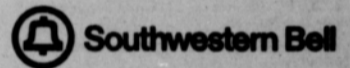

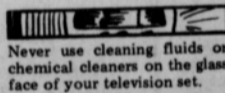

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."
