Our Heritage of Faith

notes from Faith Lutheran Church.

One of the sad realities of the church is its splintering into so many different denominations. Unfortunately too often we really do not have a clear idea of what other denominations are like. We only hear rumors and have little direct contact on which to base our conceptions of these other denominations.

Nor does our own single denomination have the monopoly on truth. God and theology is broader and greater than our own understanding. Each denomination looks at it from a different angle and so has a different emphasis than the others.

There is much that we can gain from listening to other denominations and their various emphases. If we only listen to ourselves and think that we are the only right ones, our understanding will remain quite narrow while our prejudice against other denominations will continue to grow.

With this in mind and for the purpose of correcting the misconceptions which we have of other denominations and to learn from each other, the Faith Lutheran, First Christian, First Presbyterian, and United Methodist Churches are sponsoring an adult class beginning on May 29 for four successive nights. This is part of the Vacation Bible School on which the four churches are working together.

The adult classes will be held at the Faith Lutheran Church from 8:00-9:00. Each night a Pastor of one of the churches will give a short presentation on his church followed by a time for questions and discussion. Everyone is invited.

Other events at Faith this week are a morning circle for the women on Monday at 9:00 at the church, and a Taste & Tell Dinner at the Oslo Church on Wednesday to which all the women are invited. Those wishing to go are to meet at Faith before 6:15. Next Sunday, May 21, will be a special Evangelism Sunday with a potluck dinner at 12:15 and a program following.

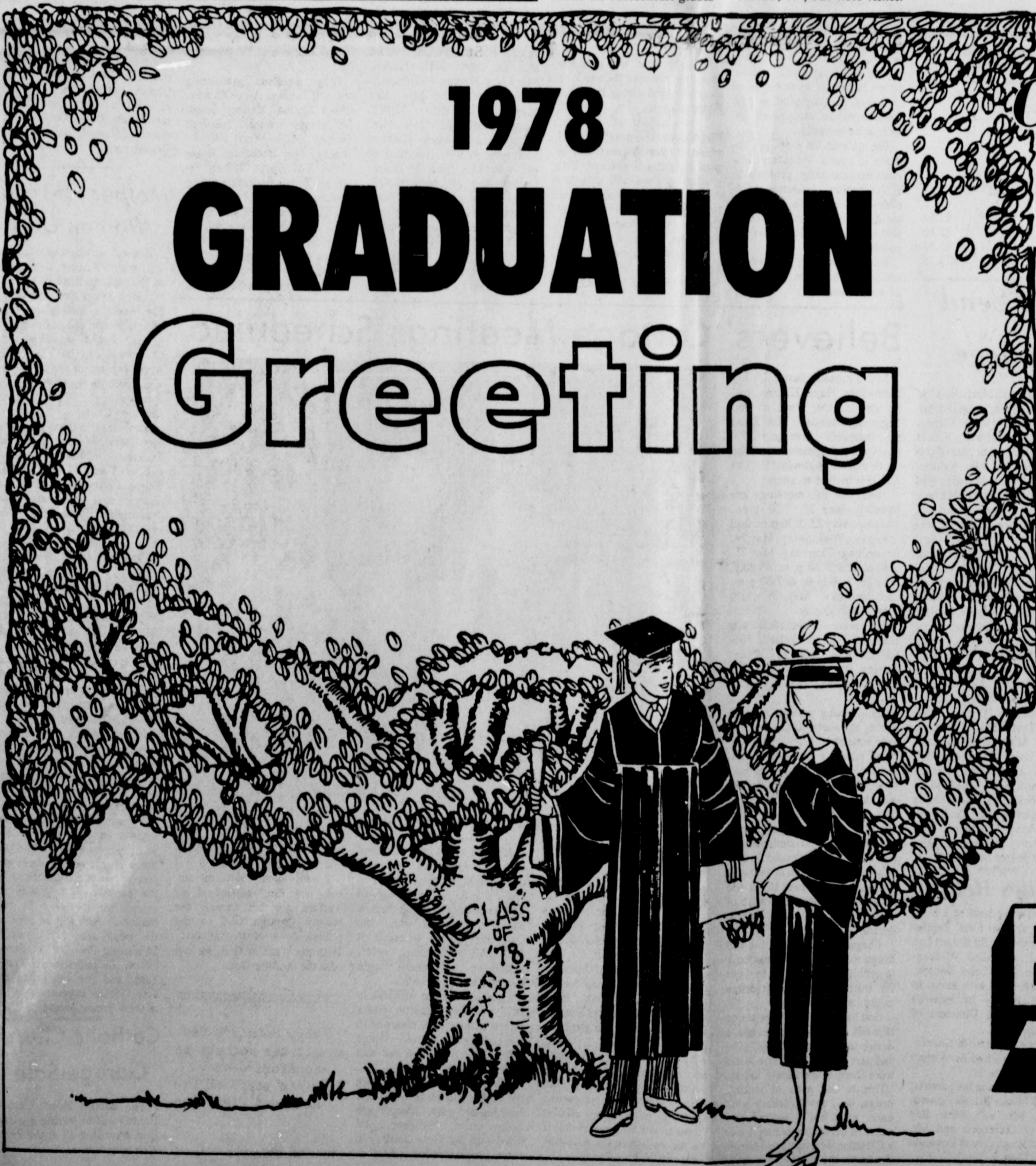

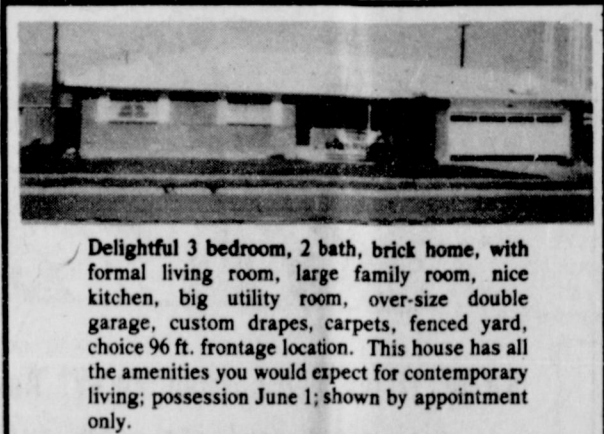

Mailbox Improvement Week Designated

The Postal Service designates a week during May each year when customers on rural, city motorized, and contract delivery routes are encouraged to examine and improve, when necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes. The week of May 22-27 has been selected this year. The purpose of mailbox improvement week is to call attention to the need for providing mail receptacles which are designed to protect the mail from the weather and are neat in appearance, conveniently located, and safe to use. Neat, attractive mailboxes make a significant contribution to the appearance of the countryside and the streets in suburban areas.

Mailboxes of the approved traditional or contemporary design are required whenever a mailbox is newly installed or an unsuitable box is replaced. A list of approved manufacturers of boxes may be obtained at your local post office.

On city motorized routes with curbside delivery, it is recommended that the box be either the approved traditional rural type box or an approved suburban box of contemporary design. Boxes designed primarily for use by customers receiving door delivery are difficult to serve efficiently from vehicles and their use is not encouraged. However, any box that gives protection to the mail and allows safe, convenient delivery from the carrier's vehicle is acceptable. Curbside boxes should be installed with the bottom of the box between 3 1/2 and 4 feet from the roadway. Where box numbers are assigned, the box number must be shown on the side of the box visible to the approaching carrier, or on the door where boxes are grouped. If the box is located on a street other than the one which the customer resides, the street name and house number must be inscribed on the box. In all instances, placing the owner's name on the box is optional.

Mailboxes located on rural routes must be located on the right-hand side of the road in the direction traveled by the carrier. The box must be placed and served to comply with state

laws and highway and postal regulations. The carrier must have access without having to leave the vehicle. Box numbers assigned must be shown on the side of the box visible to the approaching carrier, or on the door where boxes are grouped. Rural boxes should be installed with the bottom of the box between 3 1/2 and 4 feet from the roadway.

Supports for mailboxes should be of adequate strength and size to properly support the box. The ideal support is an assembly which, if struck, will

bend or fall away from the striking vehicle instead of severely damaging the vehicle and injuring its occupants.

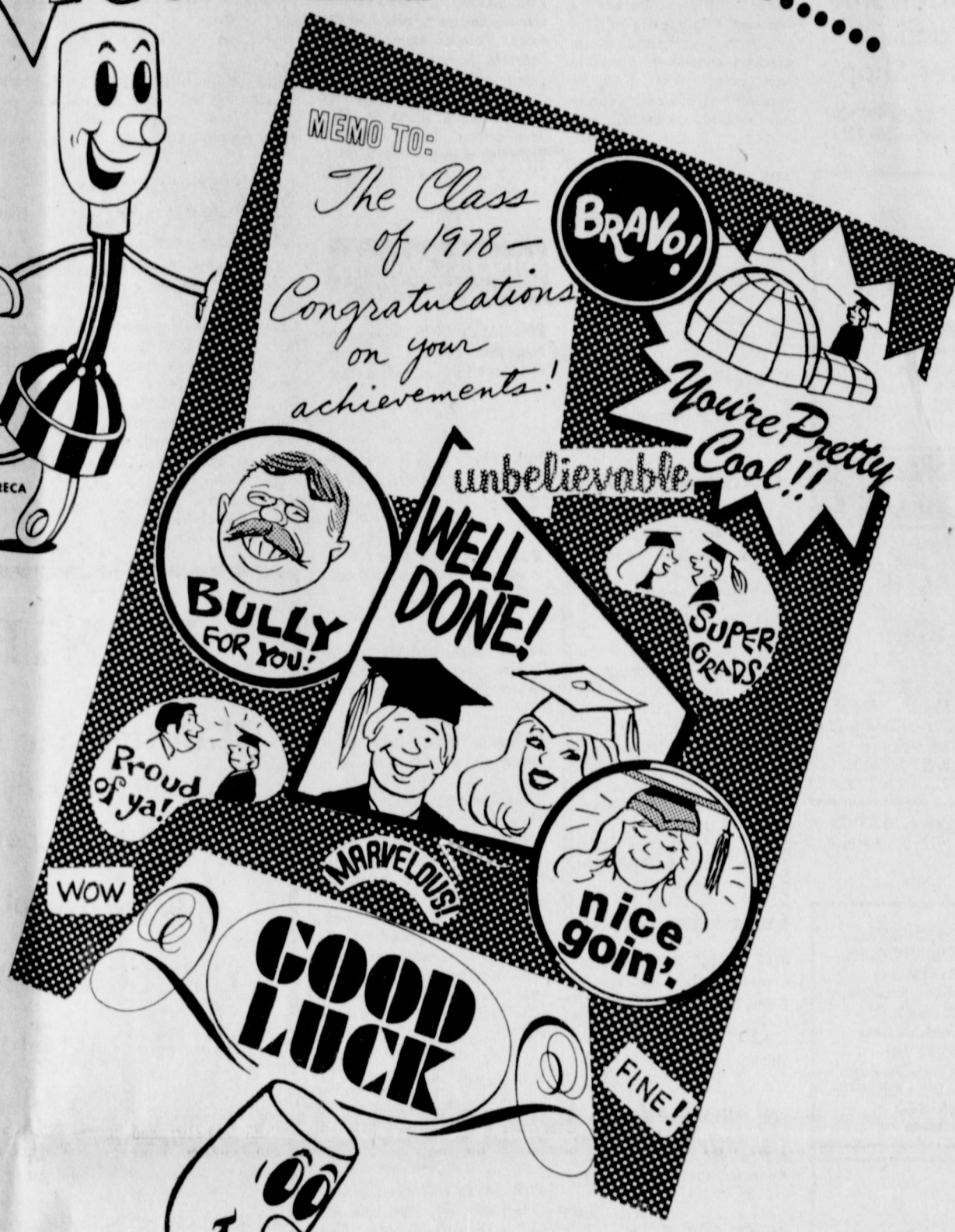
In areas where snow removal is a problem, the use of semi-arch or extended arm type of support is suggested. This allows snowplows to sweep near or under boxes without damage to supports and provides easy access to the boxes by carriers and customers.

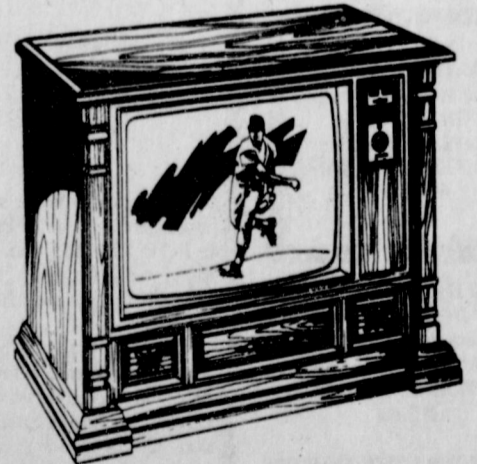
