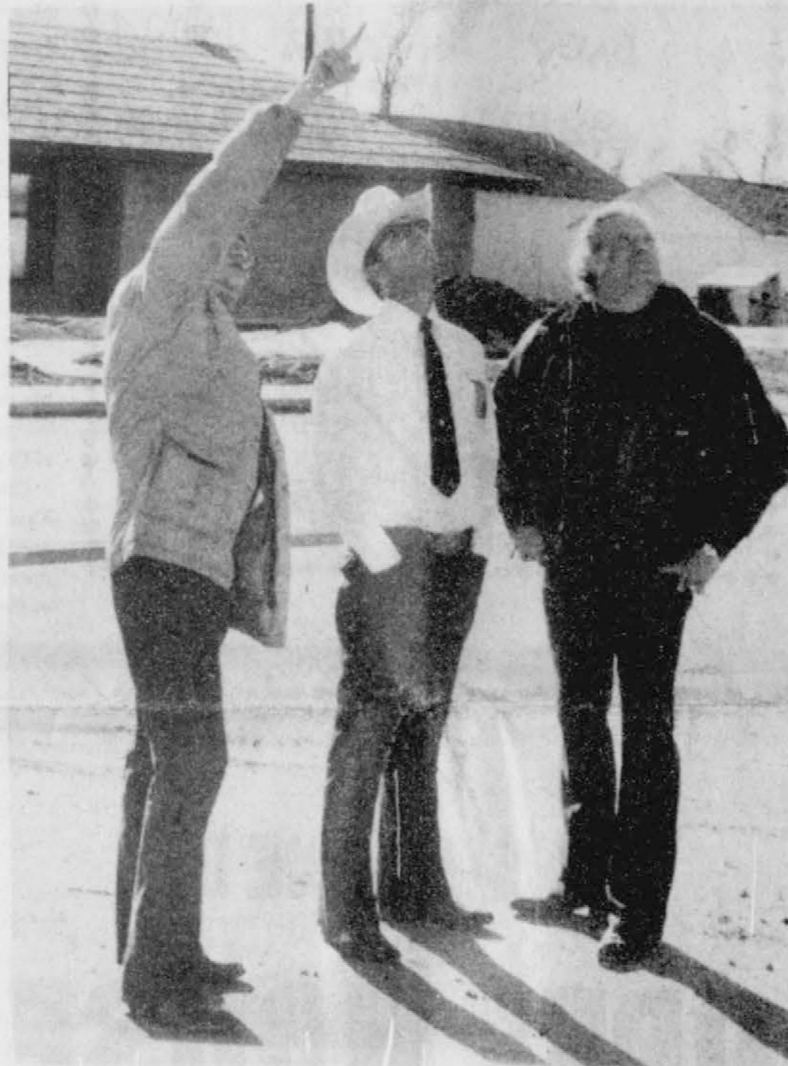
The special sale will include bargains on all fertilizer, chemicals, feed and fencing supplies. An action packed agenda is planned. There will be demonstrations, talks on topics of

## Big cranes repair freeze damages to old Spearman water tower

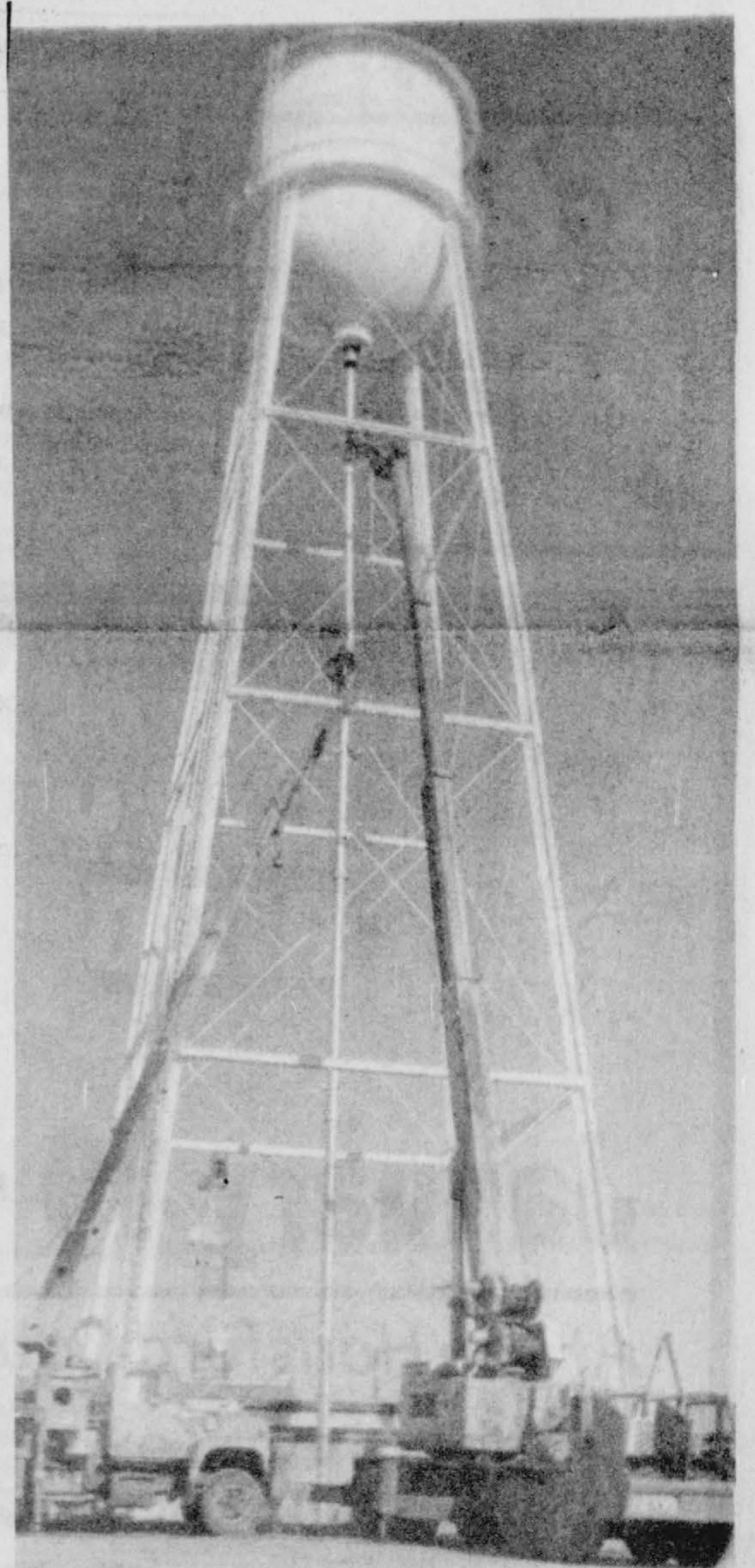
Sub-freezing temperatures of several days running caused the standpipe on the old, central water tower, in Spearman to freeze and rupture.

As the break was complete, Kenneth Street was blocked off by the city as a precautionary measure for a few hours just in case the standpipe might fall, until the standpipe could be repaired on Wednesday.

City manager Jim Murray said

that despite rumors, the old water tower itself was a sturdy as ever and was in absolutely no danger of falling. He added that it was also unlikely that the standpipe itself would fall—and it didn't—but the street was blocked to traffic as a safety measure.

A few minutes after noon Wednesday, two big cranes and work crews from Empire Construction Inc. of Stratford arrived and spent most of the afternoon repairing the standpipe.

The election for school trustees will be held April 7 in the various school districts.

In the city of Spearman election, terms are expiring for mayor Ralph Blodgett and councilmen Jim Nicholson and Ed Garner.

## State Representative Buchanan announces candidacy for re-election

State Representative J.W. "Buck" Buchanan of Dumas this week formally announces his candidacy for re-election in the Texas 88th Legislative District.

The North Plains native has a long record of service in agriculture, civic and youth work, and has received a number of awards for his achievements, locally and regionally.

Buchanan is recognized as a leading authority on North Plains and Texas water resources and has worked in developing Texas water plans and legislation.

Representative Buchanan was elected in 1980 and again in 1982 in his present tenure, but had served 2

terms in the Texas House several years back. He serves on three permanent House Committees; they are Natural Resources, County Affairs and House Administration. He has been named by the House Speaker to serve on three interim committees to prepare recommendations on legislation at the next session in 1985.

"I believe that my experience in the Legislature, at different periods, give me a perspective to effectively serve the area, particularly with the problems that are coming up on how the state is going to finance Education, the Highway System, Water Plans, Pollution Control and

the Department of Corrections. All of these will have to be taken care of in the next Session."

"With the Federal Government eliminating its grants program in favor of giving this job to the states, this means that the Texas Legislature will figure in financing for local projects that previously have been designated out of Washington. I will work to assure that the people of the 88th District have their needs heard and met in Austin."

Representative Buchanan devotes much of his time to his job as Representative in the District and in Austin and says of the office: "I have worked constructively in Austin for the Panhandle and I have

worked to defeat legislation that served special interests or that increased State spending needlessly and carelessly. I am proud to have a record of being conservative and responsible, as my district expects me to be."

"I am asking your support and vote in the 1984 election on my record of serving the district," Buchanan adds. "I will be visiting over the district in the months ahead to keep abreast of the people's needs and wishes - and to ask and thank you for your support."

Superintendent James Cunning-  
ham will submit a letter of recom-

Kelly Crawford 8, Jill McLain 7, Robbie Heinrich 6, and Shelly Cook and Carrie Guthrie 4 apiece.

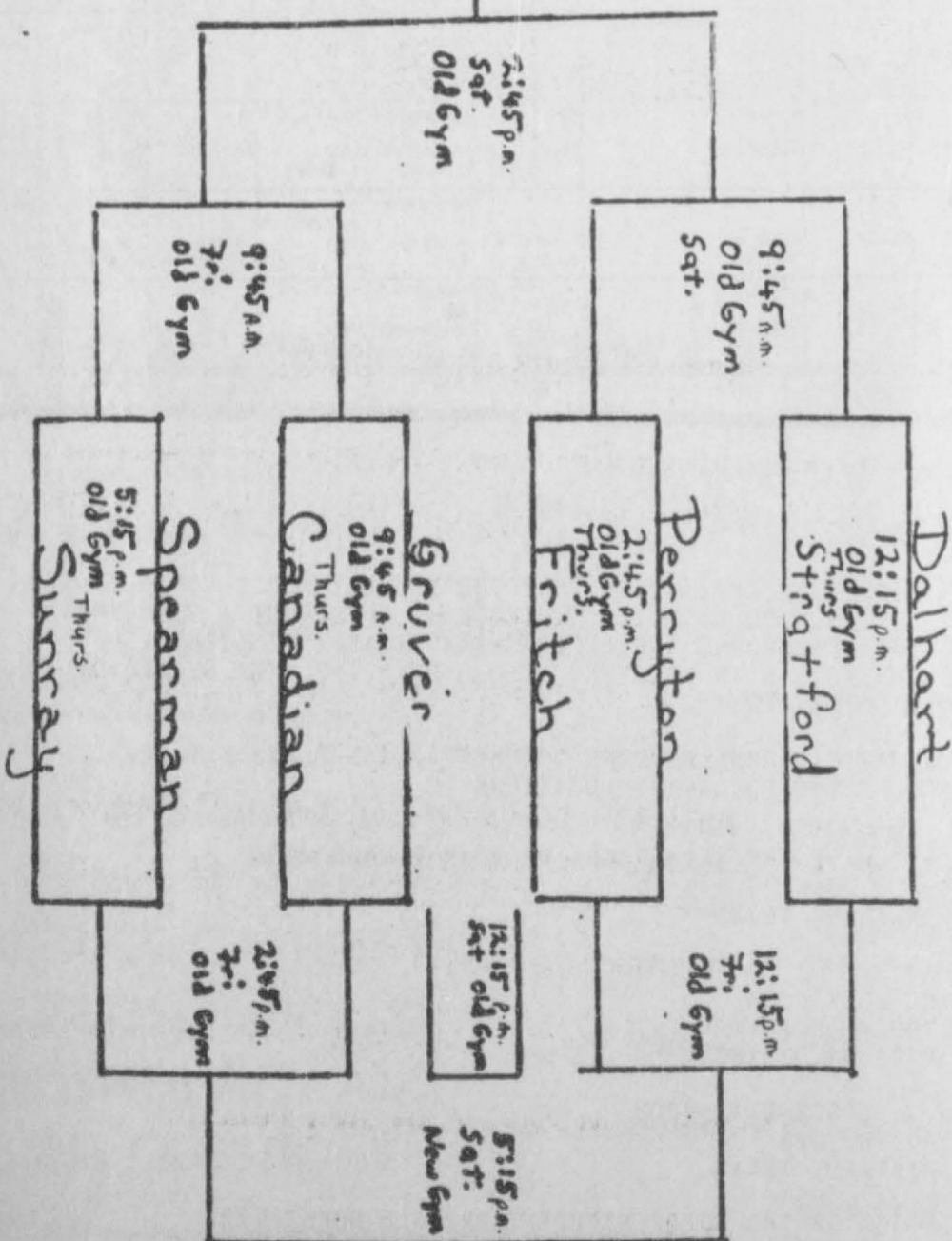

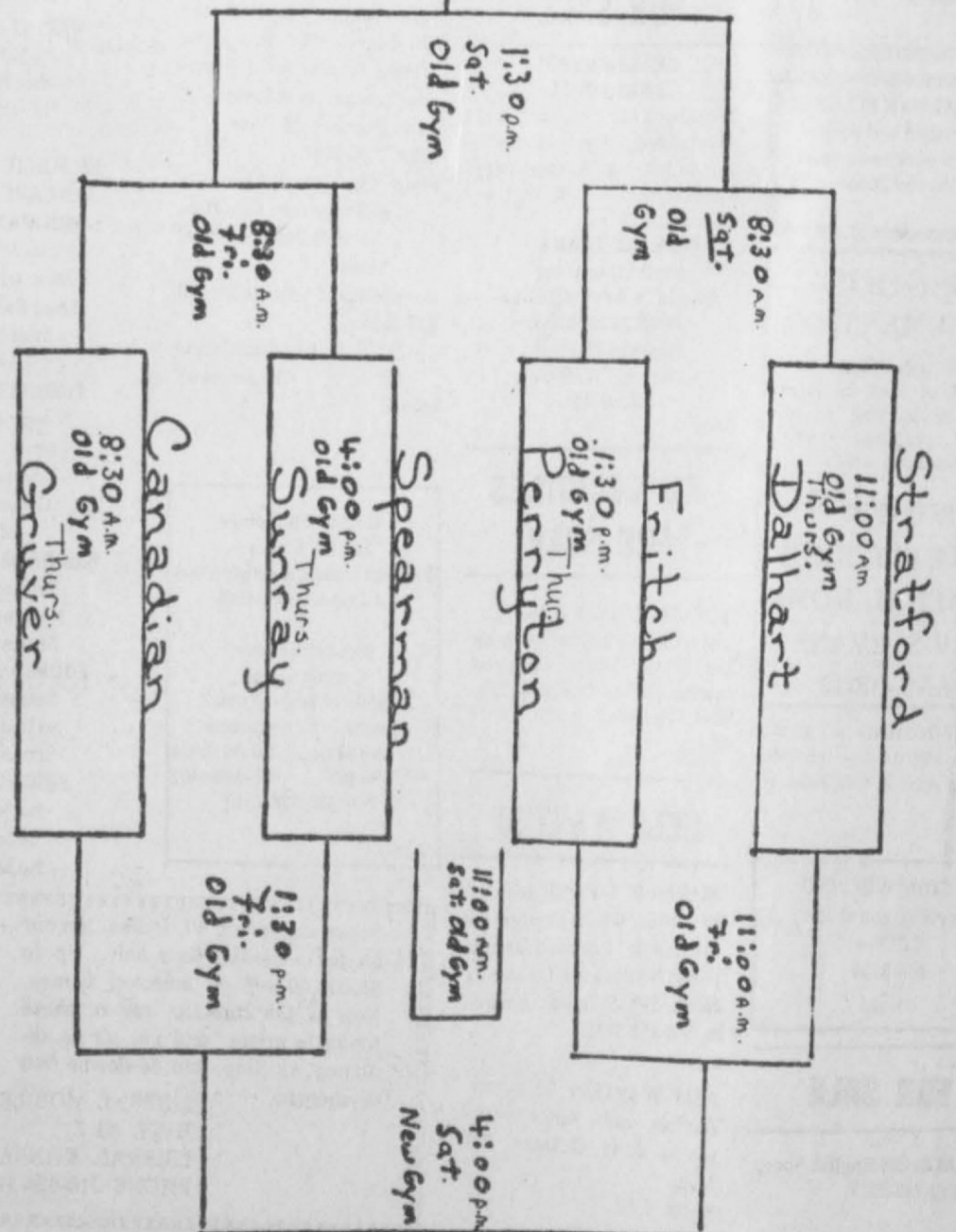
