

Taxpayers' Information Pamphlet

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the Hansford County Appraisal District, offers area taxpayers a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" to help them save on

their property taxes. Published by the State Property Tax Board in Austin, the pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and offers suggestions for possible tax savings. Mrs. Peddy noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: counties, cities, school districts and special districts (such as municipal utility districts, water districts and hospital districts).

Homeowners may qualify for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads, Mrs. Peddy said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet lists and explains each exemption and how to apply for them.

For example, all school district homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. And, certain disabled homeowners and those aged 65 and older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homesteads.

'A school tax freeze, or ceiling, on the residence homestead is a benefit for a homeowner who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year, Mrs. Peddy, said.

"In other words, the homeowner's school taxes cannot increase above the amount assessed in the year the homeowner first receives the over-65 homestead exemption. This tax ceiling stays in effect as long as the elderly taxpayer owns the homestead and doesn't make an improvement or addition to the house, such as a pool or patio," Mrs. Peddy continued.

The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that over-65 homeowners do not need to re-apply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Only those who became 65 during 1986 and those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling must apply in 1987.

Homeowners are also eligible for a \$3,000 general homestead exemption from the county on the tax which the county levies for farm-to-market raods or flood control.

Mrs. Peddy added that any taxing unit may offer a local-option home-



stead's appraised value to be exempt. In 1987, a taxing unit may exempt up to 30 percent of each qualified homestead's appraised value.

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The pamphlet also describes other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans, disabled persons, and senior citizens.

Productivity valuation is another type of tax relief available to owners of agricultural land. It is available in tow forms, generally referred to by its location in the Texas Constitution: agricultural-use or "1-d" valuation and open-space land or "1-d-1" valuation.

Landowners who wish their land to receive 1-d valuation must spply each year. A signed, sworn application must be filed with the cheif appraiser by April 30. However, owners of land receiving 1-d-1 valuation do not need to re-apply, unless the chief appraiser requests in writing that they do so.

Appraisal district personnel can offer more information about special land valuation, tax renditions and exemptions," Mrs. Peddy said. The information is also found in the Remedies pamphlet.

She said the pamphlet also contains information about preparing and presenting an appeal to the appraisal review board (ARB). The ARB is an appointed body which examines appraisal records and hears appeals to ensure that property values are fair and uniform.

Another section deals with the process of initiative and referendum by which voters can petition for an election to limit the amount of tax increase adopted by any taxing unit.

"I urge all property owners in the Hansford Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and avail themselves of all possible property tax relief," Mrs. Peddy said. "Remember, all applications must be filed with the appraisal office by April 30.'

Cost-efficient management was important to John McCrorey. He quickly dropped the silent "e" from his name to reduce the cost of the gilt-lettered signs over his stores.

By 1911, the McCrory chain boasted 69 stores. Its main offices were moved from Hohnstown, Pa., to New York City.

McCrory Stores Corp. opened the worl's largest variety store in Brooklyn, N.Y. in 1922 with 2,500 lineal feet of counter space on two floors.

By John McCrory's retirement as president in 1931, his McCrory stores had firmly established a tradition of growth and customer service.

In 1936, United Stores Corporation assumed control of both McCrory Corporation and McLellan Stores Company, although the two were not merged until years later.

The McCrory organization pioneered store modernization. In 1940, it extended assortments and price ranges, modernized with special fixtures that highlighted certain merchandise, and changed window displays to bring merchandise closer to the customer's eye.

The company's founder, John Mc-Crory, died in 1943.

Returning to its "home" state in 1966, the headquarters of McCrory-McLellan-Green moved from New York City to York, Pa. In 1969, 22 former Super Stores were integrated into M-M-G. Riklis' Rapid-Merican Corporation acquired the 439-unit J.J. Newberry Co. in 1972, merging it with the McCrory-McLellan-Green organization, and renaming the new variety division G. McNew. The division name changed in 1975 from G. McNew to McCrory Stores. In that year, fifteen former W.T. Grant Company locations also became a part of McCrory Stores.

Render Income-Producing Property rendition forms must be in estimate property value. However, the Hansford County Appraisal Dis-

trict office by March 31, 1987, chief appraiser, reminds local property owners. A 30-day extension of this deadline is available to property owners who file a written request for

A rendition is a special form, available at the local appraisal district office, on which a property owner lists taxable property. It can also list the owner's opinion of the property's value. Property owners file these renditions with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the property is located.

The law requires certain property owners to file renditions each year. Anyone who on January 1 owns or manages tangible personal property used to produce income must render that property for taxation. Business inventories, office furniture and fixtures and business vehicles are examples of income-producing personal property. The chief appraiser may also re-

quire others to render property they own or manage. If so, the property owner will receive a written notice of the rendition requirement and an appropriate rendition form. (List renditions required in your district.)

Anyone may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district, although Texas law doesn't require the average property owner to render a home or personal property not used to produce income. Further, property there are several good reasons to do

First, rendition is a means for a property owner to record an opinion of the property owner to record an opinion of the property's value.

Second, by recording an opinion of the property's value, the property owner has ensured that the chief appraiser must send a notice before placing higher value on the property. This notice allows the property owner time to gather information to protest the value to the appraisal review board.

Third, the property owner ensures that the appraisal district has the correct mailing address and property description.

A "report of decreased value" is also filed by March 31 with the chief appraiser. A property owner who believes property value has decreased during the preceding tax year, for reasons other than normal depreciation, files the report which describes the property and the nature and cause of the decrease.

Rendition forms and reports of decreased value are available at the Hansford County Appraisal District office. Law requires that each form or report must include all information requested and that it must be signed by the property owner or the owner's authorized agent.

Mrs. Peddy reminds property owners that rendition forms and property reports are confidential and there fore

not open to public inspection. Property owners should file the forms with Mrs. Peddy by March 31 at the appraisal district office, 709 West Seventh more information, call 806-659-5575, Gruver 733-5139.





HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1987. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer: • You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments. • You can put your own opinion of your property's value on

• By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1986. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1987 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.

The deadline for 1987 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

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Homestead Exemptions

Homeowners can reduce their pro-perty tax bills in 1987 by taking advantage of partial exemptions for residence homesteads. Application forms are available locally at the Hansford County Appraisal District office.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the district, informs homeowners that Texas law allows them to make a single, one-time only application for residence homestead exemptions.

Taxpayers who have never received residence homestead exemptions on the homes in which they were living on January 1, and those who became 65 or disabled during 1986 must apply this year to receive exemptions for 1987. Homeowners must file signed, completed applicatons at the appraisal district office by April 30.

A homeowner's principal residence and yard are considered as the residence homestead. It can include up to 20 acres of land and any improvements like a swimming pool, greenhouse, or spa, as long as the owner uses them for residential purposes

Mrs. Peddy said that a property

must meet four tests set by law in order to qualify for the residence homestead exemption. The person or persons claiming the exemption must own it; it must be designed or adapted for human residence; it must be

actually used as a residence; and it must be the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption.

A mobile home, even on leased land, can qualify for a residence homestead exemption if it meets the four tests.

"A taxpayer can still qualify for the nestead exemption if part of the

residence is rented out or used for other purposes, such as a home business," Mrs. Peddy said. "And the home will not lose it exemption if owner moves away termporarily, so long as he intends to return and doesn't claim another homestead else-

Texas law provides several types of homestead exemptions for home-owners, including two for school districts. They offer a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all homeowners and an additional \$10,000 exemption to those 65 or older or disabled.

The over - 65 school exemption provides a special property tax "ceil-ing" for taxes. While the market value

fluctuate with the market, the taxes due to the school district cannot increase. The ceiling is raised, how-ever, if the owner adds an improvement, otgher than normal maintenance or repair. When that happens, the new improvement is taxed at its current market value and the school's current tax rate, and the taxes due are added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.


The elderly homeowner must apply for the exemption before April 30, Mrs. Peddy stressed. To qualify, the homeowner must be 65 or older on January 1, 1987.

Counties must offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption to all taxpayers, given only on the portion of

Any taxing unit's giverning body may grant a minimum \$3,000 exemp-tion on the homesteads of disabled or elderly residents, or both. Only school district taxes establish a celing on taxes, however.

Taxing units may also take official action to offer a local - option homestead exemption based on a percentage of a home's appraised value. In 1987, any taxing unit can exempt up to 30 percent of the value of each qualified homestead in the unit. No matter what percentage is adopt-ed, the dollar amount for any homestead exemption must be at least \$5.000.




CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME

A homestead

exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption. your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners to lower their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.



Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available there.


If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1986, you won't need to apply again for 1987 unless your chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1987.

The deadline for applications is April 30, 1987. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.
