County Commissioners Meet Held

Hansford County Commissioners held their regular meeting Monday, Aug. 11. They conducted routine business, heard the treasurer's quarterly report and discussed evaluation of real estate for tax purposes.

They passed on a request to the state to return approximately \$17,000 to the county. This money is gas taxes and is used in the county road system.

Judge Johnny Lee said the state highway depart-

ment is scheduled to let bids in September for the building of Highway 51.

The highway in the county will begin 6 miles south of Spearman on Highway 207 at the REA booster station and go east by the Skelly and Northern Natural plant into Hemphill County. New construction in Hansford county will be approximately 5.7 miles with rebuilding of approximately another 5 or 6 miles. Specifications call for a 44 ft. wide road. Highway 51 will run from Tulsa, Okla. to Farmington, N. M. on completion.

I'm sure all of the farmers and implement dealers in the area will attend the Bee this Sunday, and of course it is open to the public. Have you ever heard of a Coyote eating up corn? I understand that a farmer in the Gruver area purchased himself a new rifle the other day, to shoot coyotes who were eating up his corn in the field? I don't much blame the coyote, cause this corn that is being raised in Hansford County is so good anything should enjoy eating it!

And, speaking of corn, I had my first roasted corn on the cob the other day. Yes sir, we put some corn, in the husk, right on the camp fire and cooked them until they were done, and they were delicious. 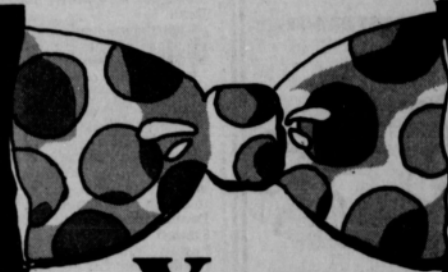

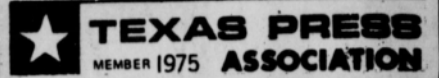

Fabulous Fifties Dance-A-Thon Planned

Get out your bobby socks and start dusting off your saddle shoes. The Spearman Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is having a Fabulous Fifties Dance-a-thon to raise money for this year's Breath of Life Campaign. The Dance-a-thon will be held September 20 at the Community Building from 8 p.m. until 12 a.m.

The money raised through this annual campaign supports research, care and education programs for children suffering lung damaging diseases. The most serious of these children's lung diseases, cystic fibrosis, is the number one genetic killer of children. Cystic fibrosis effects one out of every 1,500 infants born each year and occurs when a child inherits two

genes for the disease, one from each parent. The parents don't have the disease, but they are among 10 million carriers of the gene for cystic fibrosis.

Although incurable, cystic fibrosis can be effectively treated. Diagnosis and treatment of cystic fibrosis and other children's lung-damaging diseases are provided by more than 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the country supported by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Six of these centers are in Texas.

When the Foundation was founded in 1955, most children with cystic fibrosis didn't reach school age. Now, more than 50 percent of those with the disease live past age 18. And many of the treatment procedures developed for cystic fibrosis also help children

with other lung-damaging diseases.

All individuals, especially parents, should know the signs of lung-damaging diseases. Knowing these signs can lead to early diagnosis and early treatment of the disease. Especially with cystic fibrosis, early treatment can help prolong a child's life.

Signs of lung-damaging diseases are recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite but poor weight gain and clubbing or enlargement of fingertips. Other signs that are peculiar to cystic fibrosis are a salty taste of the skin, persistent and bulky diarrhea and nasal polyps.

Most of us don't have trouble breathing. But for millions of children with lung-damaging diseases, breathing can be a real struggle. These children need our support and help. That we can supply by our enthusiastic support of the Cystic Fibrosis Breath of Life Dance-a-thon September 20. 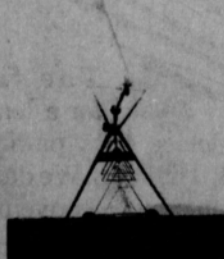

Perryton Jaycees, the main organizers for the events to be held running the celebration, have lined up some special attractions this year as well as the traditional ones featured in the past.

A major addition to the celebration this year will come from a giant breakfast, free to the first 1500 people, on Saturday, August 23, by the UNITED SUPERMARKET in Perryton.

"We felt like we owed the people of the area, especially in Hansford and Ochiltree counties something for the good treatment we have received since

the store opened last year, and we felt this was the best way we could show our appreciation," Max Smithey, manager of the store said this week.

Plans now call for the breakfast to start serving at 5 a.m. that day, the culmination of the week-long Perryton celebration, and for serving to go until 8 a.m.

"We plan to have enough food on hand to serve 1,500 people breakfast," Smithey said. On the menu for the morning repast will be fried eggs, bacon, biscuits and coffee, all cooked outdoors over an open fire.

During the cooking for the mammoth breakfast attempt will be Harold Gibson, and his two sons, Arlo and Leon. The family makes their

home near Hardesty, Oklahoma, and the father has served the breakfast at the Frontier Days Celebration for the past 30 years or more, Smithey noted.

It is understood that the two brothers have between them 14 daughters, but whether they will be on hand to help with serving the food is still up in the air.

"The Gibson family have agreed to make the Perryton Celebration an annual affair and part of their regular schedule," Smithey said.

Asked why the store is putting on the breakfast, at obvious great expense, Smithey said he hopes it will add a little life to the celebration and get more people involved and

willing to work harder to make the occasion a lot more fun.

Following the breakfast the Jaycees plan to re-enact a famous confrontation between the Texas cattlemen and Oklahoma ranchers and "nesters" that took place in the early 1890's.

Researched by Spencer Whippo, a noted student of the history of Ochiltree County and the surrounding area, the play will include a gunbattle between the "Texas Cattlemen" who tried to move their cattle north through Colorado to the vast expanses of the Colorado Range and settlers and ranchers

As the time draws closer for the annual Perryton Celebration, more and more area organizations and groups are planning their activities for the coming week. The Celebration will officially start on Monday evening in the County Rodeo Arena with the "World Championship Goat Roping" that is part of the celebration each year.

There will be a nightly carnival at the celebration each night of the week starting at 8 p.m. with a number of different rides for the children and others who enjoy cotton candy, games of chance and a variety of rides. Also at the carnival will be a number of local booths run by civic clubs offering a variety of foods and other types of entertainment.

Tuesday night there will be a donkey baseball game for all of those brave enough to climb aboard between the Perryton Jaycees and the YMCA Men's Club. The game, which is more a contest between man and beast than between the two teams, will be held at 8 p.m. in the rodeo arena.

Wednesday night will be motorized and will include both a demolition derby "fight to the finish" and a motorcycle rodeo for cycle enthusiasts from the area.

Cars in the demolition derby this year will not be reinforced and all glass, mirrors, lights and plastic will be removed from the cars. Gas tanks on all the cars will be removed or filled with water and the fire department will have a fire engine standing by in case any fires do start in any of the cars.

Thursday will mark the start of the Fourth Annual Tri-State Rodeo held for high school members of the Tri-State Rodeo Association.

Starting at 8 p.m. both Thursday and Friday nights and finishing up Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. the producer for the rodeo this year will be James Martin. Jim Hash of Perryton will be the announcer for the annual event.

Included on the roster of events for the boys in the rodeo this year will be bull riding, bareback riding, tie down roping, ribbon roping, steer wrestling and team roping.

Events that will be open to the girls include goat tying, barrel racing, pole bending, break-away roping and steer riding.

Each member of the rodeo this year will have to be a member of the Tri-State High School Rodeo Association and the competition will be run under the association's rules.

Trophy saddles will be presented to the All-Around Cowboy and Cowgirl while trophy buckles will be presented for the first, second and third place in each event.

Clown for the rodeo this year will be Bill Thorpe of Dumas. Saturday morning will be the big day for most folks with the action starting at 8 a.m. when a free breakfast for the first 1,500 people gets underway at the United Supermarket parking lot.

"We plan to have enough food on hand to serve 1,500 people breakfast," Smithey said.

The Spearman Lions Club has entered Miss Hansford Co., Denise Desimone, in the Wheatheart contest, and the Lions plan to win first place this year! Also, the Spearman Lions Club float will be entered in the parade on Aug. 23!

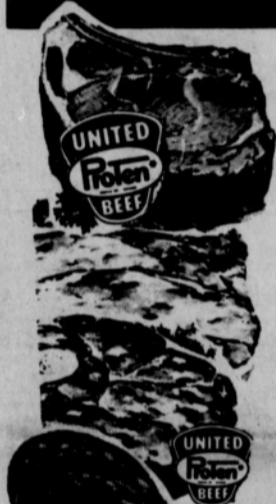

EMS Budget Submitted

A first-year budget of \$436,607 for the Panhandle Emergency Medical Service System has been submitted to the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

All except \$64,513 of the money will be used to purchase communications equipment and emergency

vehicles for members of the system.

Twenty four counties of the Panhandle will be served by EMS which will eventually provide prompt medical service to victims of illness and accidents throughout the area via a region-wide radio communications network, efficient emergency transportation, in the presence of trained emergency medical technicians.

Equipment to be purchased includes: 10 van-type am-

bulances; 55 UHF, 12 channel mobile radios; 40 two-channel remote control units; and additional equipment for existing emergency vehicles.

Spearman will receive \$22,871 and Gruver, \$4,228. Plans call for 2 mobile radio transceivers, a communications control station and an equipped ambulance for Spearman and Gruver is asking for 1 mobile radio transceiver.

EMERGENCY CALL FOR HELP

It could be fatally-time consuming to search through a phone book for a number during an emergency. Have them posted in an obvious place near the telephone. If it's night and the lights won't work or you've been blinded by smoke, dial "operator." Feel for the dial opening just beneath the finger stop and pull around. If you've got a pushbutton phone know where the "0" is located - now!

Here are major points to cover in an emergency call for help:

1. Tell where it happened. Give your complete address. Repeat it. A brief description of the house will help, especially at night.
2. Tell what happened. Is your house on fire? Is

someone bleeding badly? Has someone had a heart attack?
 3. Tell who you are. This is important where the emergency is not obvious from the outside, especially in an apartment house. Also, a neighbor is more likely to know your name than your number.
