Sheriff McFarlin emphasized that merchants must insist on identification when accepting a check--especially if the check is tendered for more than the amount of the purchase being made.

Three bills were returned against Walter Elliot for three counts of theft over \$200. Bond was set at \$5,000 on each counts but bond was a moot point since Elliot was sent to the Texas Department of Corrections, Huntsville, to await his return here later for trial on these three charges.

Ricky Allen Beaudette was indicted on two counts of theft of a motor vehicle and bond was set at \$5,000 on each count. Beaudette is in custody in California. Jackie D. Cathey faces two counts of theft

on each count. He is in custody here and has not yet posted bond.

How It Works In winter, the heat pump's refrigerant absorbs heat from the outdoor air and releases it indoors. In summer, the heat is collected inside the house and released outdoors to make

the house cool. A heat pump, say experts at General Electric, is not a furnace. It does not burn fuel to make heat.

A homeowner with a 10year-old central cooling system that delivers 6.0 SEER (Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio) can cut cooling bills substantially by replacing it with a GE heat pump that can deliver 8.5 SEER. That is about a 30 percent increase in efficiency, which means it uses less energy.


