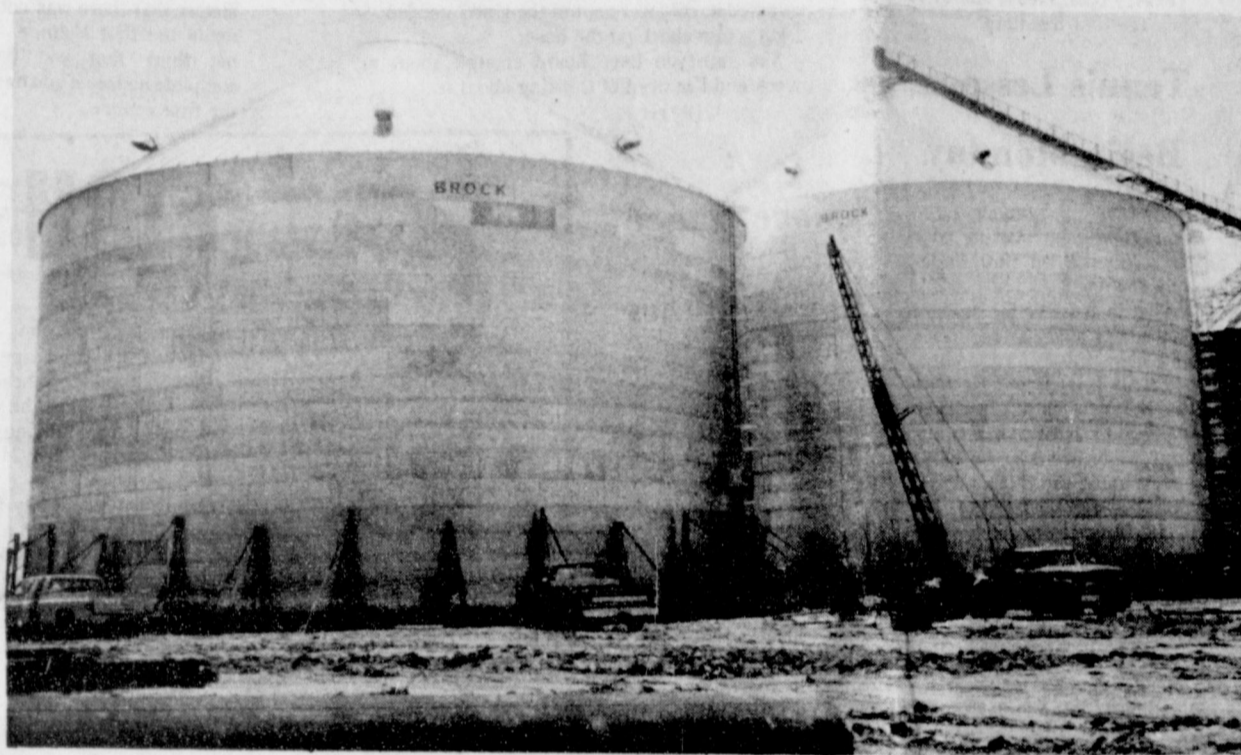

Economy boosts checks

Traffic in worthless checks across the counters in Hansford County is up significantly.

"I hate to make this report immediately following the period of the lowest number of bad checks in the history of county business," Sheriff R.L. McFarlin said just before press time. "But it is a fact!"

"We should not have been surprised because this always goes along with the state of economy plaguing us right now."

Sheriff McFarlin emphasized that merchants must insist on identification when accepting a check—especially if the check is tendered for more than the amount of the purchase being made.

"Hard on the heels of the biggest 'low' in worthless checks we have ever achieved and needing all sales possible, merchants

are going along with some customers paying by checks they would not accept in normal times," the sheriff noted.

He also pointed out that many young employees new to the checkout counter are quick to accept the word of a check-wielder that "the manager knows me, I trade here all the time."

The sheriff summed up his warning with observations he has made before: "It is better to miss a \$10 sale than to accept a worthless \$25 check for it and lose money and merchandise," he said.

"...And when worthless checks are confirmed, the merchant should get with the Hansford County Sheriff's Department immediately so work can begin on recovery before the worthless check passer is beyond recovery and prosecution," Sheriff McFarlin concluded.

The Tennis lessons or instructions will be held at the high school tennis courts. The schedule for the classes is as follows:

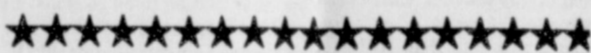
Students from 9 to 12 a.m.

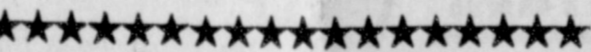
Swim Lessons Begin Monday

Heat oven to 350° F. Slice well-chilled cookie dough into 1/2-inch slices. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350° F. for 10 to 13 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on cookie sheet 2 minutes. Remove. Cool completely.

Place 1 large rounded scoop ice cream in center of each cookie. Press down lightly to secure. Place cone, wide-end-down, on top of ice cream; arrange to make hat. Freeze until firm. Remove from freezer; add candies to form eyes, nose and mouth. If desired, using decorator icing make collar around ice cream with star tip. Freeze until serving time. Hints For Homeowners

HEAT PUMPS COOL EFFICIENTLY

Most people this time of year are concerned about cooling their homes and saving energy. One way you can cool yours efficiently is with a device that also can heat it: a heat pump.

What is a heat pump? It is a machine that provides central heating in the winter and central cooling in the summer by transferring—pumping—heat from where it is to where it is wanted.

How It Works

In winter, the heat pump's refrigerant absorbs heat from the outdoor air and releases it indoors. In summer, the heat is collected inside the house and released outdoors to make the house cool.

A heat pump, say experts at General Electric, is not a furnace. It does not burn fuel to make heat.

Economy

A homeowner with a 10-year-old central cooling system that delivers 6.0 SEER (Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio) can cut cooling bills substantially by replacing it with a GE heat pump that can deliver 8.5 SEER. That is about a 30 percent increase in efficiency, which means it uses less energy.

Come winter, the heat pump can gather heat from the cold outdoor air because even at 0°F there is 89 percent as much heat in the air as there is at 100°F. This ability to capture outside heat in winter makes it



possible for the heat pump to save up to 60 percent on electric heating bills, depending on geographic location and the equipment used.

Can Be Added

Heat pumps can be added to gas or oil forced air systems, and an accessory called a Hot Water Bank even turns waste heat from the heat pump into hot water for household

There is an important difference. "Replacement value" means the actual cost to replace—brand new—the stolen item. "Cash value" means the current depreciated amount the item was worth at the time of the loss.

For example, if your stereo is stolen, a standard homeowners policy would give you the "cash value." Assume it would cost \$1,000 to replace a ten year old stereo; today it may be worth \$500. So you would get \$500 from your insurance company, minus the deductible you have selected.

Policies are available that offer "replacement value" or "agreed value." But, of course, these kinds of coverage are more expensive than the conventional homeowners policy.
