Lynx lose 1-Point Thriller!

The Spearman Lynx overcame deficits of as high as 16 points during the first three quarters of play Friday night, Feb. 24, in Lubbock Coliseum but were unable to maintain a two-point advantage deep in the waning seconds on the final quarter and bowed 88 to 86 to the Denver City Mustangs in Regional 1-AA Basketball Tournament play.

Despite Randy Reid's game high of 21 points, backed up by hot shooting by Zane Newton

and Tommy Barber, the Lynx journey to Austin was cut short. About midway in the fourth period the Lynx, playing catch-up since the first 30 seconds of the opening period action when the Mustangs netted two points and then sank three more for a total of five points before the Lynx got into the scoring column, got out to four points in front of the challenging Mustangs before the downstate representatives racked up two points to narrow the margin to 88-86 for the

representatives from the Texas Panhandle. It was a Denver City ballgame during the first quarter. At one point the Lynx were behind by as much as 11 points. But Newton's consistency at the charity line kept the Lynx in contention and the 11 points had been narrowed to 8 at the end of the first quarter. Spearman continued to whittle away at the Denver City lead during the second stanza and with some three minutes to

go before the half, the Lynx applied some pressure and went from 21 to 27 points but the Mustangs managed to collect points also and the half arrived with the Lynx on the short end of the 47-57 score. Hot shooting by Reid, who collected 21 points for the night and was the high point man in the game, Newton, who bucketed 14 points for the Lynx cause, and Barber, who put 13 points into the record book, kept the Lynx cause alive. Reid's 21

points came from seven of the two-pointers and seven charity throws. Newton came up with six free throws and five buckets for his 14 points and Barber tallied his 13 on five buckets and two free throws. Both teams were hot as the scoring indicates. In the first quarter the Lynx collected 18 points, adding 22 in the second quarter and topping that with an additional 29 in the third quarter and adding another 19 in the final for the total of 86 points. Spearman came from a 17-point deficit in the first half to a 21-point lead at the end of the

the game, stated in an interview that this was one of the finest teams he had ever coached! Mauler McFarlin and his Sheriff's shooters were just great as well as Lyon's Longshot team. Coach Lyon selected several technicals and put on a "good show" as did Coach Head's team. The benefit game will help the YMCA effort in Spearman, headed up by Jim McLain. In other sports action, the Lynx played at the Lubbock regional tournament Friday and the results are elsewhere in the paper.

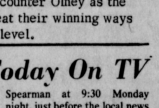

Denver City's scoring was balanced with Ricky Rodriguez scoring 18, followed by Bobby Burkhalter with 16 and Abara with 15 and Mark Ivis with 14. The Lynx wound up their season at 19-7, while Denver City is 23-4 entering today's final.

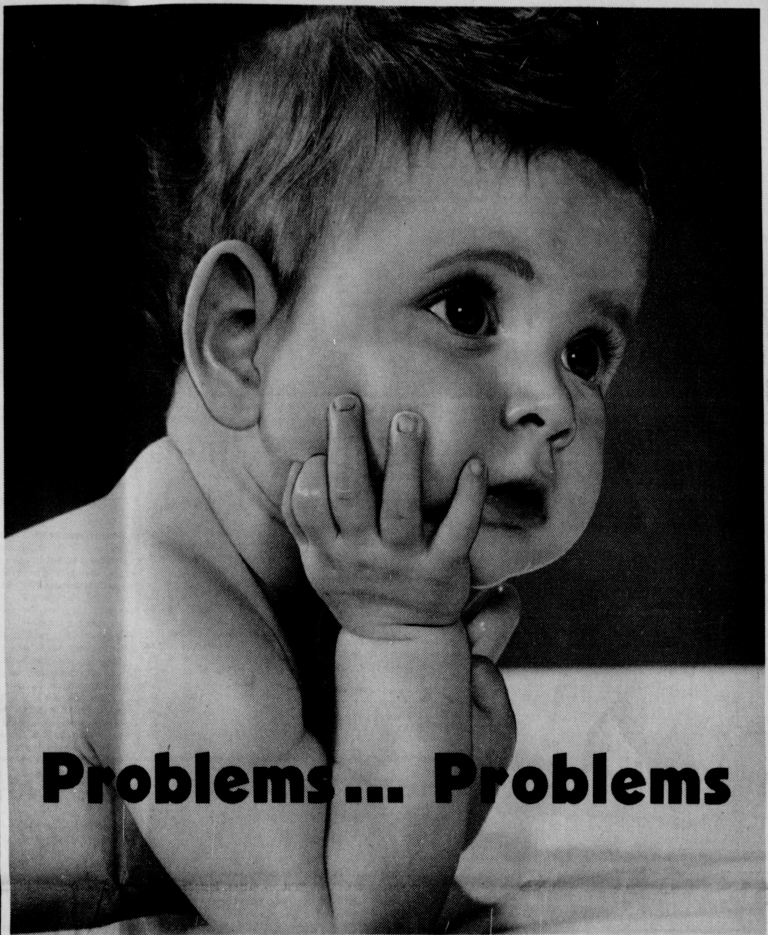



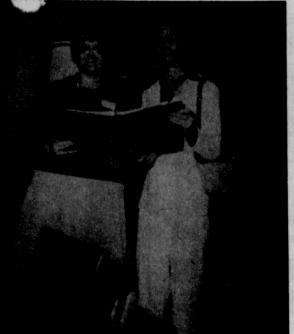

Critical Time For Wind Erosion Nears

The best method to prevent erosion from high winds would be to leave enough residue on or near the surface of the soil to provide a cover and protect it during these high erosion periods.

Sometimes, however, adequate residues are not available so the next best method would be the use of timely emergency tillage.

High winds moving across the surface of smooth unprotected soil will tend to pick up and smaller particles of soil and carry them in the air. They will then blast into the larger particles thus breaking them down into smaller particles.

So a chain of events takes place making more soil susceptible to erosion. The wider the area of unprotected soil the greater the carrying capacity the winds have.

One of the most popular and common methods for emergency tillage in our area is chiseling.

Chiseling in narrow strips and at right angles to the prevailing winds will help break up concentrated wind patterns.

It will increase the size of the soil particles and leave the surface rough and cloddy which makes it more difficult for the

winds to gain any momentum.

The winds that we receive during this time of the year cannot be controlled, but we can through the use of adequate residue and timely emergency tillage keep our soil loss to a minimum.

The Soil Conservation Service in Spearman is available to anyone who would like assistance in planning a conservation practice aimed at stopping erosion on their farm or ranch.

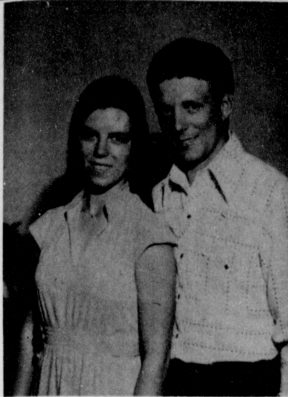

Spelling Bee Time Is Here

Plans for the Spearman Independent School District and the Hansford County Spelling Bee, to be conducted in Spearman, have been completed, it has been announced by Principal G. W. Robinson of Spearman Junior High School and county director.

The SIBD Bee will be on March 20 in the Junior High School auditorium and fifth and sixth graders competing in the junior division and seventh and eighth graders competing in the senior division. Pronouncer will be Mrs. Pauline McGee.

The Hansford County Bee will be in the Junior High School auditorium on March 29 with senior division competition to begin at 1 p.m. and junior division competition to commence at the conclusion of senior division competition. Pronouncer will be Mrs. Mary Alice Gibson.

The local winner can successfully spell out a trip to the national finals in Washington, D. C., in June.

The competition is being conducted this year in conjunction with the 30th Annual Spelling Bee sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University.

Spelling bees are a highly respected educational activity, sponsored nationally by the Scripps-Howard Newspapers and are designed to help students improve their spelling, increase their vocabularies and develop correct English usage. The spelling bee is open to all schools, including parochial schools. Additional information can be obtained from Robinson at 5185.

In the junior bee, students in the fifth and sixth grades compete in the Junior Division and each county may select a champion. The elementary winners do not participate in regional

competition unless they hold the County Championship.

It was noted, however, that the County Junior Champions will be invited to Amarillo as guests of the sponsors and will be awarded trophies.

In the senior division, students must not have passed beyond the eighth grade at the time of their school finals and they must not reach their 16th birthday on or before the date of the national finals.

According to the official rules, participating schools will conduct their own eliminations, advising bee directors the names of contenders in county contests.

Schools may use any method they wish to select their best speller but since the national final will be oral, school finals should be oral in order to give the contestants an opportunity to participate in such a manner. Words used in the national finals shall be selected from the Words of the Champions book from the lists used in the various city and regional contests and from Webster's Third New International Dictionary, Copyright 1971 G.&C. Merriam Co., and its addenda section and/or the book 6000 Words, a supplement to Webster's Third New International Dictionary.

Words shall be pronounced according to the dictionary markings in those books.

In competition, after the pronouncer gives the contestant a word the contestant may also pronounce the word before spelling it, after spelling it, or, if he so chooses, not at all.

The contestant may request the pronouncer to re-pronounce the word, define it, or use it in a sentence. The pronouncer shall grant the request until the judges agree that the word has been made reasonably clear to the contestant. Judges may

disqualify any contestant who ignores a request to stop spelling.

Having started to spell a word, the contestant may stop and start over, retracing the spelling from the beginning, but in the retracing there can be no change of letters and their sequence from those first pronounced. If letters and their sequence are changed in the respelling the speller will be disqualified.

Upon missing the spelling of a word, the contestant immediately drops out of the contest. The next word on the pronouncer's list is given to the next contestant.

When the contestants are reduced to two, the elimination procedure changes. At that point, when one contestant misspells a word, the other contestant shall be given an opportunity to spell the same word. If the second contestant shall be declared the champion.

If one of the last two spellers misses and the other, after correcting the error, misspells the new word submitted to him then the misspelled new word shall be referred to the first speller. If the first speller then succeeds in correcting the error and correctly spells the next word on the pronouncer's list, then he shall be declared champion.

If both spellers misspell the same word, both shall continue in the contest, and the one who first misspelled the word will be given a new word to spell.

The winner of the Hansford County Bee will be in competition during the Regional Bee in Amarillo starting at 1:30 p.m. April 29, in the auditorium of Stephen F. Austin Junior High School, 1808 Wimberly. The afternoon competition will follow a luncheon for all county champions and junior champions at the Amarillo County Club.

On June 4, the 1978 area winner leaves for Washington, D. C., to participate in the National Finals.

Opening rounds of the National Spelling Bee Finals will begin June 7 in the Grand Ballroom of the Mayflower Hotel in Washington.

Final rounds will be on Thursday, June 8.

But if we now embark on a course of trying to stop food from moving through the distribution chain to the consumer—and they know it's available, they just can't get it—we're going to blow the whole ball game by destroying the goodwill we now have from millions who don't lie. True, things will change anyway, even if we lose this reservoir of goodwill, but I'll bet we won't lie it.

there'll be cool moving into distributor channels immediately. If we run low on food, it would take a year to restore normal levels.

We have got all the aces in the deck in our hand—we KNOW that if supplies are reduced, prices will seek a higher level, and we CAN cut production. What we achieve thereby is what we want, higher prices, not absence of food and the chaos that would go with it.

And, as prices climb past parity levels, Congress will be saying "Now, about that parity bill you've been talking about..." We knew when we started it would be a long haul—we can see we've come a long way—and this is not the place to choose a side-track.

So if you're restless, Mr. Farmer, and want to do something, get out among your undecided neighbors and persuade them to pledge a production cutback—THAT'S what will finally get the job done, and it's the ONLY thing that will, without sinking the boat.
