Thompson Is New Deputy

A new Deputy Sheriff for Hansford County has been hired. Sheriff J. B. Cooke announced this week.

Coy Thompson, former policeman, has been hired and will begin his duties as Deputy Sheriff and Jailer on Feb. 15.

Thompson, his wife and two children, will live in the jailer's apartment in the courthouse. Deputy John Brown is moving out of the apartment and giving up his duties as jailer.

Thompson has five years experience as an officer with the Amarillo Police Department. He was a city policeman in Spearman for six months before going to work for Skelly Oil Co., Jan. 1.

Court Approves Closing Well

The High Plains Water District has a right to close irrigation size wells when drilled in violation of the rules of the district.

In a case filed in 69th District Court, Judge Harry Schultz upheld the District and granted a permanent injunction to close a well drilled in violation of the rules.

In his decision Judge Schultz pointed out that the defendant knew the rules of the District and of the requirements of permits for drilling water wells over a certain size.

Hansford Top Irrigation County

Hansford County is the leader in the number of irrigation wells on farms, but Moore and Sherman counties are close behind, according to statistics presented by the North Plains Water Conservation District. Hansford County now has 657 wells and is the only county over the 600 mark.

Last year farmers and landowners in the county took out permits on 271 wells and completed 222. These are also the leading figures in the district. Moore County is second in number of wells and permits issued, but Sherman County is second in number of wells completed last year.

Moore has 592 wells and there were 204 permits issued to farmers last year. However, they completed only 172 wells during the year. Sherman County was second in wells completed for the year with 186 wells completed from 187 permits issued. (Con't on page 5.)

Wilde, Patterson Lead Scoring Parade

The Lynxettes' one-two scoring punch of Vicki Wilde and Phyllis Patterson worked to perfection during the first quarter Friday night in Stinnett, then they coasted to a 46-33 win. The victory wrapped up the district championship for the Lynxettes for the fifth consecutive year. The string of championships began in 1961 when the Lynxettes rolled on to the finals in the state tournament

before falling to Buna. For the next two years, the Lynxettes stumbled in the bi-district contest. Last year, the Lynxettes eased by Abernathy in bi-district, then lost to Friona in the first round of regional. This year the Lynxettes will apparently play Olney for bi-district. They are leading District 2-AA. This is the first year for Olney to compete in girls' basketball.

Bean Meeting Set Friday

A meeting to introduce Hansford County farmers to Castor Beans as a cash crop will be held at 1:30 p.m. Friday in the Farm Bureau Meeting Room.

The meeting, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Committee, is open to everyone in this area. It is designed to inform farmers about the bean as a cash crop.

People on the program include representatives of the Baker Castor Oil Co., of Plainview, Soil Conservation Services, Texas A&M Experiment station in Moore County, and farmers from the Waka area and the South Plains who have grown the beans.

There will be question and answer sessions during the meeting.

Stinnett had lost only one game before running into the Lynxettes Friday night. They lost to Spearman earlier in the race.

Wilde and Patterson settled the matter of who was going to win early in the contest Friday night.

Working their inside and outside shooting combinations to perfection, they rolled up 21 points before the Stinnett six knew what had happened.

While the point-makers were burning the nets, the Lynxette guards, Kathi Pattison, Susan Hutchison, Bethany Donnell, augmented by Robbie Ownbey, were chewing up the Stinnett offense.

They allowed Stinnett only eight points in the first quarter and four in the second eight minutes. The quarter scores were 21-8, 30-12 and 35-22.

Vicki Wilde led the scoring parade with 17 and Patterson (Con't. on page 5.)

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Stinnett Drops Spearman 39 - 48

In Their Final Clash of Year

Two or three scoring surges fell short Friday night as the Spearman Lynx could never come from behind, and fell to Stinnett 39-48.

Bari Blevins cut the margin of defeat by two points after the game was over. He was fouled at the final buzzer and

made both free shots. Spearman could never successfully penetrate the Stinnett defense and did most of their shooting from the outside. Stinnett controlled the rebounds and Spearman seldom got a second shot.

None of the Lynx broke into

the double scoring figures. Jim Kirkland led with four field goals for eight points and substitute Carl Close was second with seven points on three quick field goals and a free shot.

Stinnett jumped into a big 16-8 first quarter lead, but Spearman came on to trail only 17-23 at the half. They cut the lead to three points at one time in the third quarter, but trailed 32-25 at the end of the third quarter.

Fouls cost the Lynx, as Kirkland, Phillips and Shufeldt all fouled out of the game.

Draft Quota Up for March

AUSTIN—Feb. 2—State draft boards will forward around 5,730 males for Army mental-physical examinations in March, 1,150 of whom will be 18-year-olds. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tues.

These tests for 18-year-olds are the result of President Johnson's action in 1964 which ordered all newly registered men who are out of school and available for service, to be examined.

Col. Schwartz stressed that these youths will not be con-

sidered at this time. Normally draft for service is about age 22.

The state draft quota for March called for 155 men, compared with 119 for February. The March quota is Texas share of a national call for 3,900 men all for the Army.

The March quotas have already been figured and sent to the state's 37 local boards.

Miss Thelma Groves, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Groves of Spearman is a mid-term graduate of Texas University.

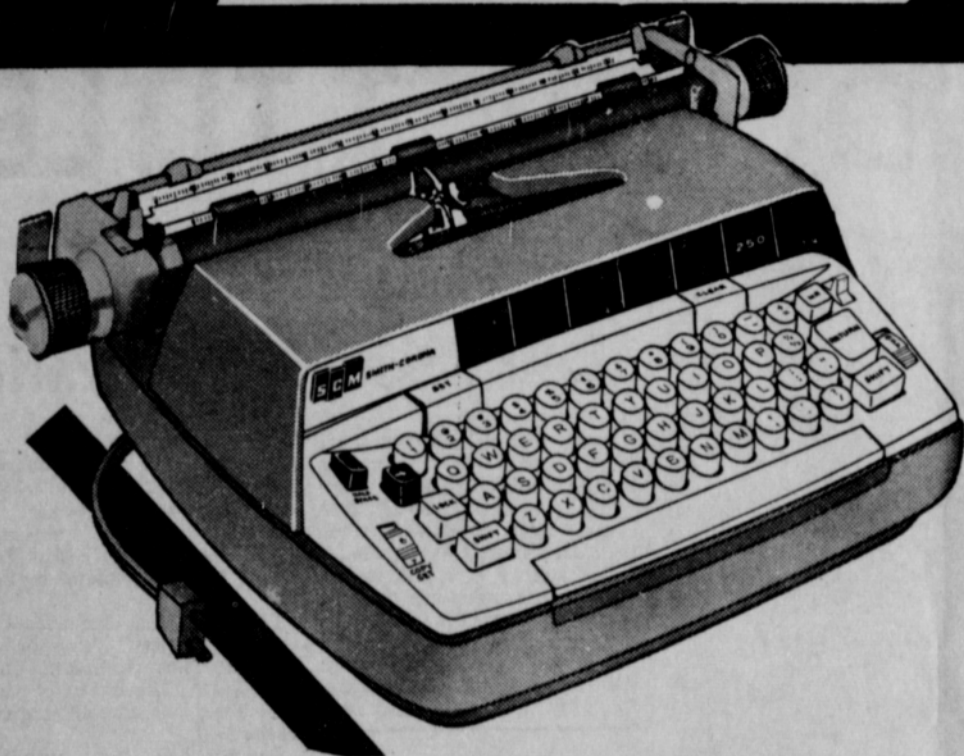

Soybean Research Shows Best Variety For Area

Research results throughout the High Plains of Texas in soybeans have been most gratifying for the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas.

"Farm Centered Research" plots, which are actual tests on farmers' land over the country, have been most successful according to Jack Werner, Associate Agronomist of the Foundation staff. Werner, who is in charge of Farm Centered Research tests reports that information gained in the soybean variety tests has been most helpful in finding the proper soybean for each specific area of the Plains. The Foundation staff planted and supervised some eight "Farm Centered Research" test plots scattered from Farnsworth in the northern Panhandle to Ralls on the South Plains. On each of these test plots, ten different varieties of soybeans were tested.

HINN, the new soybean developed for the Plains by the Foundation, was tested against the standard beans grown in the area as well as several new experimental soybeans being developed by the Foundation. In all of the tests, HINN out-yielded the standard varieties by from 5 to 10 bushels.

One of the new beans being developed at Halfway and included in the Farm Centered Research plots is an early maturing short season bean that has a low water requirement. This new soybean will be best adapted to the north Plains Region which has a shorter growing season. In the south Plains, this bean will be a good crop to plant in case of "hail out" when it is too late to come back with either cotton or grain sorghum. In one test north of the Canadian River, this short season bean produced 45 bushels per acre when planted double-row. On the Clayton Terrell farm east of Plainview, another yield of 38 bushels per acre was harvested.

Werner stated, that "Texas is now the number one leader in the nation in bushels harvested per acre of soybeans. With the new varieties being developed, Texas can become the top-ranking state in number of acres in a few years. Soybeans that yield as high as the HINN give the farmer a good net per acre return, and this is what the farmer wants."

One young farmer from Spearman, Don Robinson, grew 136 acres of the HINN soybean under adverse conditions, yet harvested around 32 bushels of beans per acre. This field was ready for harvesting on November 5, but due to the weather, harvest was delayed until December 27. During this time, the soybeans received two heavy rains, a 6-inch snow, a sleet coating and strong winds.

The HINN withstood the weather by standing up till harvest and had very little shattering. Robinson said that less than 2 bushels per acre fell out of the pod. This shatter resistance along with a higher yielding ability and the characteristic of fruiting about 6 inches off the ground were some of the reasons that the HINN was developed by the Foundation.

Ten killers are at large in Texas.

These killers aren't bandits or criminals—they are the ten leading causes of Texan's deaths.

The ten leading killers account for a giant share of 82,692 Texans who died in 1963.

The latest statistics released by the State Health Department categorize, profile and dissect the leading killers.

This is how they stack up on paper.

Heart disease took the lion's share—one out of every three deaths in the State. National statistics also show the same leading cause of death.

Cancer ranks second, taking 15 percent of the State's total number of deaths.

Apoplexy—or stroke—is classified as the third most deadly, with 11 percent of the death total.

Accidents, as the fourth leading killer, claimed 5,999 lives, or seven percent of the total. Death due to accidental cause

takes the largest percentage of lives for the age groups between one and 45.

Disease of early infancy, fifth in sequence, takes its toll—of course—below the one year marker.

Pneumonia ranks sixth in the line-up of killers claiming five percent of the deaths.

General arteriosclerosis, diabetes mellitus and congenital malformations are the seventh, eighth and ninth cause of death, respectively.

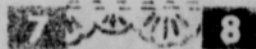
Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death. It first ranked tenth in 1958. Deaths from suicide increase in number each year.

The ten leading causes of death and other vital statistics are released yearly by the Health Department's Records and Statistics Section.

Rather than being cold impersonal statistics, these figures represent your friends, neighbors and loved ones. Take these facts personally, they are killers.

Poll Tax Sales Rise

A last minute rush in payment of poll taxes sent the Hansford County total to 1530 for this year, according to Tax Assessor-Collector J. B. Cooke.

The late surge was spurred by an announcement by the Spearman Independent School District of a school bond election this month.

Cooke said a large part of the tax payments were in the Spearman area.

The tax official estimated that there are about 2500 people in the county eligible to pay poll taxes and vote.

Until the final week before the deadline, only 500 poll taxes had been paid.

Persons with valid poll tax receipts will be eligible to vote in the school bond election, city election and school trustee election later this year.

Ochiltree County has 190 wells and 82 of these were drilled last year. There were 108 permits issued during the year.

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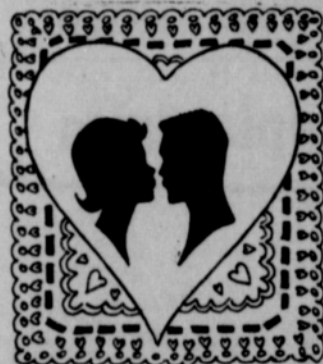

Mule Train Leaves May 12 For Hall of Fame Dedication

The famous Rolling Plains Mule Train of Spearman will complete a 300 mile trip at the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City on Memorial Day, May 30.

Officials of the Cowboy Hall of Fame told the organization this week that Oklahoma Gov. Henry Bellman and other officials of the state and Oklahoma City will be in Spearman to officially open the trip.

Texas Lt. Gov. Preston Smith has indicated he will be

here for the beginning of the trip and an invitation is being extended to Gov. John Connally.

The Mule Train has 14 wagons and drivers signed up for the trip and more will be added before the starting date.

Several wagons and the owners come from towns other than Spearman. This year a man and woman from California who have pack mules out there, are coming to make the trip, but they will get mules and a wagon here instead of bringing their own.

This organization started their long distance covered wagon trips last summer when they traveled 500 miles from Spearman to Graham in 32 days.
