Hansford Placed On Drouth Aid List

Quietly, a helping hand has been extended to farmers and ranchers in Hansford County feeling the effects of the extended Fall drouth economically.

Earlier, virtually all the Texas Panhandle counties had been declared a disaster area as a result of the extended dry period from June 10 to Oct 21 without significant rainfall.

Hansford County was not included in the original designation.

An assessment of conditions led to the inclusion of Hansford and Somervell counties in the declaration.

What the move means to Hansford Countians who live by

the land is that financial aid is available to qualified farmers and ranchers under the new ruling.

Anyone in Hansford County interested in the program can call the Small Business Administration Disaster Office, area code 806, phone number 762-7481, Lubbock.

It is believed any farmer or rancher will be able to fill out the application without additional help or instruction. However, there will be a meeting at Childress, Tuesday, beginning at 11:30 a.m. to brief prospective applicants on procedures and benefits available. The meeting will be conducted in

the West Texas Utilities building at Childress.

Somervell County is in Central Texas where agriculture has recently taken a back seat-at least interest-wise-to the controversy over the nuclear power plant under construction there.

Hansford County Judge R.L. McClellan, who released the news of the expanded declaration this week, said he believed any interested applicant could get all the aid and information needed by contacting the SBA Disaster Office, Lubbock, at the number above. However, he felt the Childress meeting could be helpful if local farmers and ranchers wished to attend.

Trimmell Speaks at Breakfast

John Trimmell, owner of B & J Wholesale Plumbing Supply Co. and a deacon in the First Christian Church, spoke to the interdenominational men's prayer breakfast Wednesday morning, December 3, in the garden room of the Cattleman's Restaurant.

He said that he felt like Moses, when he said, "I'm not an eloquent speaker. Send someone else." God's reply to Moses was, "Did I not make your mouth?"

John said that he grew up in Balco and was raised a Roman Catholic. They had to drive thirty miles to church every Sunday. That sacrifice to go to church made him appreciate it more. He said that he received a fairly good background in scripture in his church because there were always three scripture lessons in every service.

When he went to college, he met Bev and fell in love with her. Bev was a Baptist. When they married, they found an intermediate point in the Christian Church.

He said that sometimes we don't really hear what is said in church or we don't really hear what God is saying to us when we read the Bible. We need to listen more intently. We sometimes think we need to pay more attention to the big things, but we really need to pay more attention to the little things each day and be faithful in them.

Every Christian needs to win souls to Jesus Christ. There are a thousand ways of doing that. All of them are better than doing nothing.

It is easier to preach the Christian life rather than to live it. We need not only to listen to what God says to us, but we need to do it, to live it, and to love. We get wrapped up in the other things, but we need to love our wives. Behind every good man there is a good woman. Love can overcome anything.

We need to listen to our children more. We need to listen to other people. We need to love them. We don't always take enough notice of other people. They are important. We need to appreciate them and thank God for them and pray for them.

God has authority over everyone. We need to accept His authority. We shouldn't judge others or condemn them, but love them, witness to them and pray for them. We need to let God help us overcome our weaknesses, accept His strength, rather than letting circumstances get us down.

When God wants us to do something, we need to be obedient. God wants us to accept responsibility.

God has been good to us in our business. The Lord has prospered us because we have turned it over to Him. God has taught us not to worry about anything, but to trust Him.

God has taught me a lot about giving. Everything belongs to God. God will prosper the Christian who is obedient and responsible. A person can expect if he is faithful in his giving, a 100% return on his investment. We need to do what God's Word says. We need to

know what the Bible says, not what man says. We should put our trust in God, not in man. God is always faithful. Man will disappoint us.

He said that he had resolved to read his Bible an hour a day. One needs to prioritize that. You can do it if you really want to. We need to use our time wisely.

One should not put oneself above others, nor below. God loves everyone and treats us equally. We need to respect everyone and never look down on others because of circumstances or predicaments. Most people are basically good. Everyone has some outstanding qualities. Everyone has a mother. Mother always loves you.

Each one should accept responsibility to be righteous in everything. Then we will make a difference in our world. We are sometimes impatient to see good happen right now. We don't see all the good people do. Everyone is growing in their faith and we can learn from other people. You don't know what an influence you are on other people.

Carl Kuseiman has been a tremendous influence for good on my life. One of the things he taught me that I found to be true is there is no such thing as luck--you make your own. We need to put our trust in God--not in luck. God will work for you, luck will not.

What is Going on in A.A.M. ?

A lot of people are asking the same question, as has been asked many times in all A.A.M. (American Agriculture Movement) offices, across the nation. Much is going on, probably more positive action than at any time, since our beginning. In Washington D.C. our national president, Marvin Meek & national coordinator, David Center, both Texans, are being called by President Elect Ronald Reagans' transition team, daily, for information as to what A.A.M. would recommend for changes in agriculture policy of the U.S.D.A. It is hard to believe that we are, now, getting a listening ear in D.C. are they listening? We believe they are & we'll be filling their ears with ideas like a support price at just above what commodity market prices are at present, with a gradual increase, each year, until we reach a fair & equitable (Parity) price. Since we export 80% of all the wheat grown in the U.S. and half of all feed grains, this would reduce the trade deficit & help balance trade; if we sold these commodities at a price with the products we are importing. This would also strengthen the dollar.

National coordinator, David Center, said they are receiving over 100 phone calls per day. This is an indication the people throughout the country are becoming active. State officers & many key people will be lobbying in D.C. this winter, but not the mass of people as we have done in the past. All we have done, has had a part in calling attention to the depressed situation of agriculture in the U.S. We are constantly regrouping and making new approaches to the problem.

All this cost money and A.A.M. is supported by dues paying members. These dues are \$150.00 per member. Anyone can be a member, but only producers of agriculture products are voting members. All officers take instructions from the grass roots people at home. We invite everyone's support. We need it, the U.S. needs
