Sales EXPO '84

The Perryton Equity invites everyone out to their Sales EXPO '84 at the new Ochiltree County Exposition Building, Feb. 22 & 23. The EXPO will be open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. each day.

County aids PARC

Hansford County Judge R.L. McClellan attended the Panhandle County Judges Chemical Abuse Service System Thursday in Amarillo when the system asked commissioners courts throughout the Panhandle Thursday to institute a type of "user fee."

The fee would be a percentage of all fines collected from persons convicted of chemical abuse, including DWI, possession of marijuana, possession of a chemical substance and public intoxication.

The judges also agreed to take over full responsibility for operating the Panhandle Alcohol Recovery Center (PARC) as of April 1. Operation of the center has been contracted out to Mental Health Mental Retardation. PARC will continue to work closely with MHMR in the future.

Wayne Hughes, alcohol coordinator for Panhandle Regional Planning Commission said he had been working closely with the attorney general's office to make sure a plan to collect fees from fines would be legal.

The proposal, which the judges will be taking to their respective commissioners court for implementation, calls for \$100 from each fine to be taken from the county's general fund and used for operation of either a county chemical abuse treatment center or PARC.

Such a system of fees would bring in an income of from \$350,000 to \$400,000 last year.

If the fee plan is adopted and proved successful it would eliminate the per capita assessment now in effect. Hansford County has recently raised its 10 cents per capita to PARC to 50 cents per capita as did most counties to keep the PARC open. These special assessments, fund raising efforts, plus donations have raised approximately \$50,000 for PARC and officials believe that the governor will match those funds.

Additional money is beginning to come in from private industry. Phillips Petroleum recently donated \$1,000 and several other major firms were considering making sizeable contributions to PARC.

A spokesman for Santa Fe Railway Co.'s Western Lines, said his organization is considering making a \$20,000 donation to PARC, which could be an annual donation. Dale Worley, a spokesman for the company, said Santa Fe Railway recognizes that PARC is the best facility of its kind in the Western Line area. Our records show that the success rate of Santa Fe employees who have gone through PARC is 85 percent as compared to a success rate of just 25% for a similar facility in Oklahoma.

He also said Santa Fe Railway is behind PARC 100 percent.

First National Bank granted approval

Word was received February 7 that the comptroller of the currency has granted preliminary approval as of February 1, 1984, for a local group of citizens to establish a new National Bank in Spearman, Texas. The new bank is to be named First National Bank of Spearman and is to be located at the SE corner of the intersection of 7th street and state highway 15. 120 absent from Gruver schools

Spearman schools have been disinfecting the buildings, spraying desks, and cautioning children to wash their hands often, according to Allen Alford, elementary principal.

Thefts, vandals keep police busy

23 year old jailed in shooting

Services were held Friday, Feb. 17 at Hansford Cemetery for Epifano Trujillo, 53, who was found dead at his apartment about midnight Tuesday night. He had been employed by Hansford Feedyards.

Trujillo is survived by a son and two daughters, all of Juarez, Mexico.

Juan Manuel Davila, a 23 year old Spearman man, has been charged with the shooting death of Trujillo. Davila, originally from Hollis, Okla., was arrested by Deputy R.A. Masingill and Deputy Gary Evans about 9:30 a.m. Wednesday.

Sheriff's deputies were called to an apartment about midnight Tues-

day by people who had been among several people who had been in and out of the apartment Tuesday night.

The people at the apartment had been drinking, and the two men apparently got into an argument which led to the shooting, the sheriff said.

Trujillo had been shot by a small caliber handgun, possibly a .22, Sheriff R.L. McFarlin said. An autopsy was performed on the body Wednesday.

Davila remains in Hansford County Jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond after being charged with first degree murder in the shooting death of Trujillo, by Justice of the Peace J.P. Vernon.

On 2-2-84, Rex Ralph Higgs was arrested and charged with sale of prescription drugs. His bond was set at \$5,000.00 by Johnny P. Vernon, Justice of Peace. He is being held in Hansford County Jail in lieu of \$5,000.00 bond.

On 2-12-84, 3 Spanish males were arrested by Sheriff Deputies for Public Intoxication. Subjects were released after posting \$50.00 bond each.

On 2-13-84, at approximately 10:42 p.m., 4 subjects driving a 1982 Blazer, were involved in an accident 10 miles north of Gruver. Subject hit a cow belonging to Elmo Dahl. The animal was destroyed at the scene. All 4 subjects were brought to the Hansford Co. Hospital by both Gruver and Spearman ambulances. Later in the night two of the subjects were transferred by Gruver ambulance to an Amarillo Hospital in critical condition. Deputies found a small quantity of marijuana in possession of one of the subjects. Charges have not been filed at this time.

A 23 year old man charged with the shooting death of another Spearman man Tuesday night, remained in Hansford County Jail Saturday night in lieu of \$50,000.00 bond. Juan Manuel Davila was arraigned before Justice of Peace, J.P. Vernon, who set the bond on the charge of murder in the shooting death of Epifano Trujillo. Sheriff R.L. McFarlin stated Davila was arrested at 9:34 a.m., Wednesday by Deputy R.A. Masingill and Deputy Gary Evans, without resistance.

Deadline for farmer sign-up is Feb. 24

Only about half of Hansford County farmers have made their intentions known as to whether or not they are going to participate in the 1984 farm program, according to Keith Martin, local head of the ASCS. Deadline for signing up is Feb. 24.

The office will be closed Monday and that leaves only 4 days for the other half (approximately 350) to either sign up or decline to do so.

Martin emphasized that the 1984 ACR (set aside) will be required to have sufficient cover to protect the

land from wind and water erosion. Existing residues and volunteer wheat will be eligible cover if the amount is sufficient to provide adequate cover.

Area wheat producers organizations have been putting pressure on Agriculture Secretary John Block to extend the Feb. 24 deadline for farmers to join the 1984 farm programs.

Lawmakers and producers all feel that extending the deadline so that farmers might have a better idea

Police Department had recovered an iron weather vane. The owner came to the Police Department at 11:50 a.m. and identified the weather vane. The weather vane was released to the owner at this time.)

At approximately 10:00 a.m. the Police Department was notified that the person turned himself in to the Sheriff's Office.

On Feb. 16, 1984, at 11:00 a.m. a Spearman resident contacted the Police Department and related that he observed several items in a bar ditch and wanted to know if he should bring the items to the Police Department. The complainant was advised to bring the items to the Police Department. At 11:30 a.m. the complainant arrived and brought the items to the Police Department. A list and a description of the items were taken. The items were stored in the Police Department until the owners could be found. what their wheat looks like in the spring might lead to a larger sign-up.

Participation in the sign-up is reported to be only about 20 percent. Panhandle area farm organizations have expressed displeasure with current government programs. In 1983, farmers received benefits from the payment-in-kind (PIK) program that are not included in this year's plan.

Farmers last year idled 20 percent of their land in the traditional Acreage Reduction Program at no payments, and then had the option of idling another 10 to 30 percent in return for PIK payments.

Those payments came in the form of government-owned commodities and farmers were paid at a 95-percent rate of their base production.

This year's wheat program is the only one that includes a PIK provision. Farmers must idle 30 percent of their land in the ARP and may idle 10 to 20 percent in PIK.

PIK payments this year will be made at a 75 percent rate of base production, and there is the \$50,000 limit on all PIK and deficiency payments.

Feed grain farmers have an option of idling 10 percent of their base acreage in the ARP. Such a move makes them eligible for target price and deficiency payments. They have no PIK option.

With such a non-appealing farm program, the agriculture department itself, expects that farmers will increase their plantings dramatically this year which will continue commodity surpluses and low prices.

1984 ACR (set aside) will be required to have sufficient cover to protect the land from wind & water erosion. To maintain adequate surface cover chisels, sweeps and etc. may be used to control weeds. ACR land that will be planted back to wheat for 1985 may be worked in the usual manner after July 1. 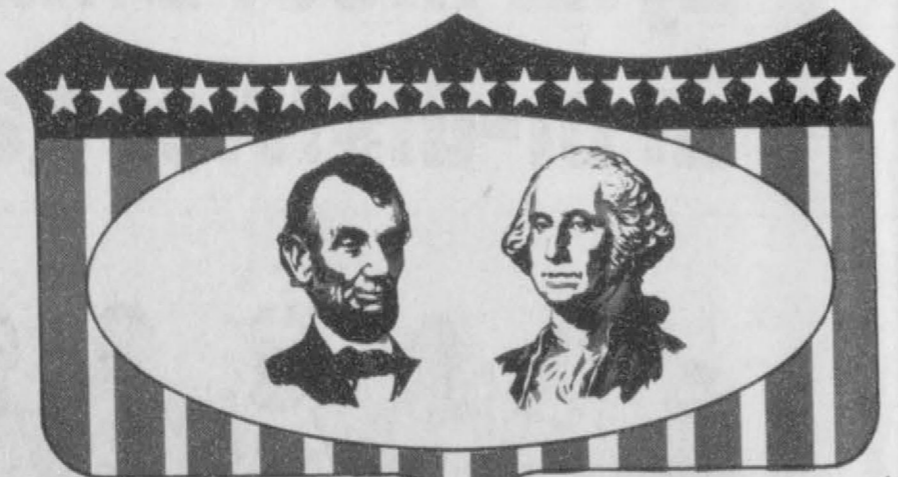

Gaskamp blood drive

A blood drive will be held from 2 to 6 p.m., next Monday, February 20, for Rev. Bruno Gaskamp, pastor of the Bethlehem Lutheran Church of Perryton, and former pastor of the Faith Lutheran Church of Spearman. The drive will be held at the First United Methodist Church, 321 S. Baylor, Perryton.

Gaskamp, who moved to Perryton last August from here, is suffering from myelofibrosis, a rare disease which decreases the body's ability to produce its own blood. The illness was diagnosed three weeks ago, and Gaskamp has been in the hospital receiving transfusions. While myelofibrosis is incurable, it can be treated, but it is estimated that Gaskamp will require a pint of blood each week for the rest of his life.

The Coffee blood bank, which is supplying the transfusions, requires payment in a four-to-one ratio, and the drive will seek to replace as many of the more than 200 pints of blood Gaskamp will need this year. Donors of any blood type are welcome, and while it can also be pledged in anyone's name, it is requested that it be given for Rev. Gaskamp.

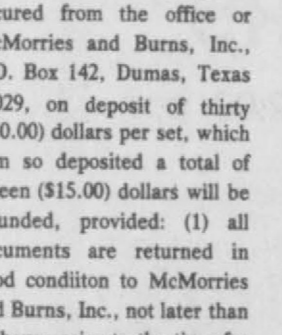

The school calendar for 1984-85 was adopted, indicating student registration on August 17 and the first class day to be August 24.

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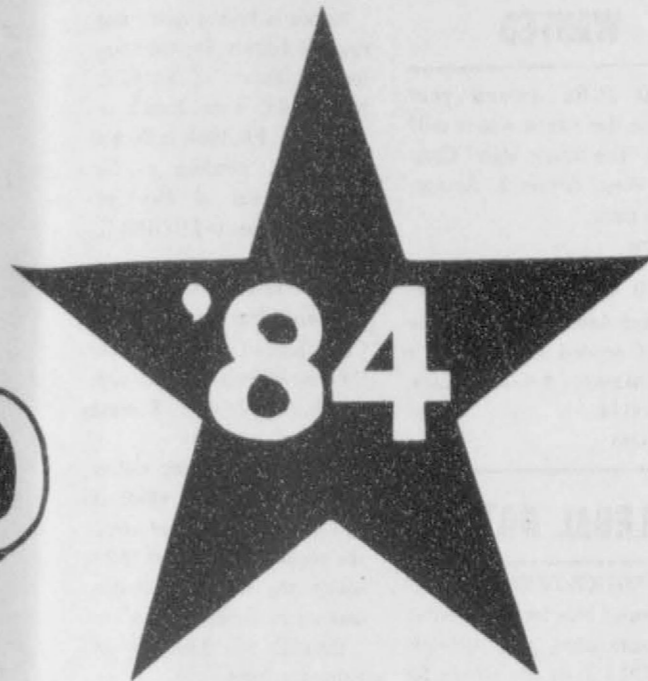

Bids on TNW tracks sought

Bids to rebuild a 40-mile section of Texas North Western Railway lines in Moore, Hutchinson, and Hansford counties - a project estimated to cost \$2,225,515 - are being sought by the Texas Railroad Commission for an early spring contract letting.

The TRC is seeking the bids because 70 percent of the construction cost are being funded through grants of \$1,559,000 from the Federal Railroad Administration.

The Texas North Western Railway will pay the remaining 30 percent of the project, an estimated \$665,000, reports Bill Bailey, TNW president.

WEDNESDAY 2/22/84

TNW officials expect prospective bidders will be in Dumas to inspect the 40-mile project in late February or early March.

"They will have 25 to 30 days to compute bids and submit them to the Texas Railroad Commission in Austin," Bailey notes. "We hope construction can begin by April 15."

The 40-mile section in the project extends east from Etter to Morse, then south to Pringle. It also includes the Sherrin Switch track which serves the Continental Carbon Co. plant, south of

Sunray.

Bailey expects the TNW railroad line will be rebuilt in stages over its 105 miles of right-of-way to Liberal, Kan.

The rail line was formerly part of the Rock Island Railroad system, which ceased operations because of bankruptcy in April 1980.

Texas North Western in November, 1982, purchased 83 miles of the Rock Island tracks, from Etter to Hardisty, Okla., and leased another 22 miles of line into Liberal, Kan., from the Rock Island bankruptcy trustee.

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Hightower urges changes in farm bill

Vernon, Tx--Congressman Jack Hightower today sent an urgent telegram to President Reagan and Agriculture Secretary John Block urging them to make important changes in the 1984 farm programs to boost farmer participation. Hightower is concerned that low producer participation in programs designed to reduce crop surpluses will threaten further deterioration in farm income levels.

"I've said for some time that the current Administration's farm programs were too weak and would not really attract significant farmer support and participation," Hightower said. "Preliminary statistics indicate that only about twenty percent of our Texas farmers have signed up for acreage-reduction programs." The deadline for sign-up is currently February 24th.

Hightower explained that he thought important adjustments could be made in the Administration's programs which would encourage farmers to sign-up. "I've specifically encouraged the Admin-

istration to expand the haying and grazing provisions on the set-aside acreage and to return to last year's conservation regulations on the conservation reserve acres," Hightower said. "I've also urged to advance payment of one-half the deficiency payments, and an extension of the sign-up deadline.

"It's incredible to think that we went through the drought and the PIC program in order to reduce surpluses, and now could very easily return to that situation if Secretary Block and the Administration do not act to increase participation," Hightower said.

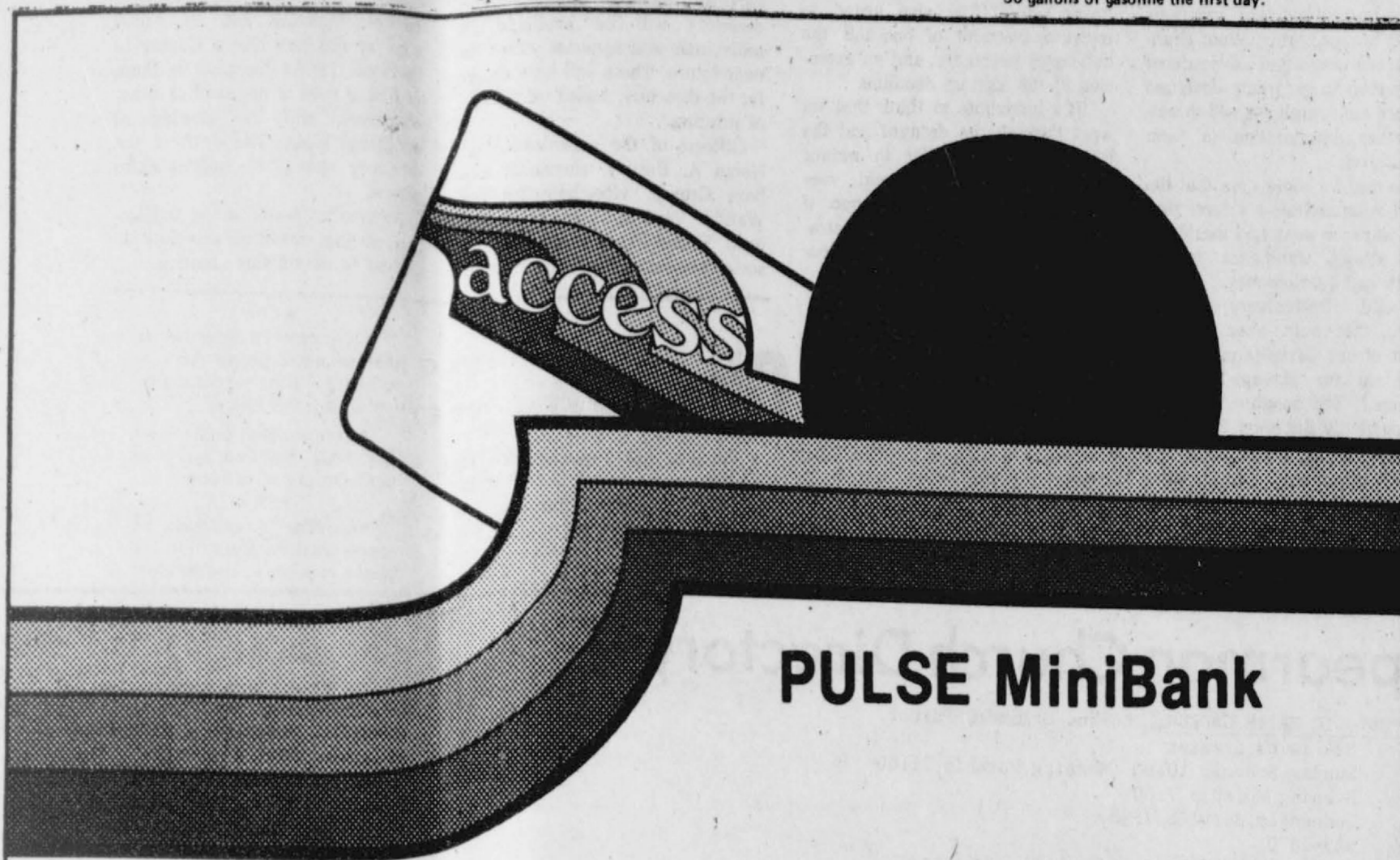
All three are with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in College Station.
