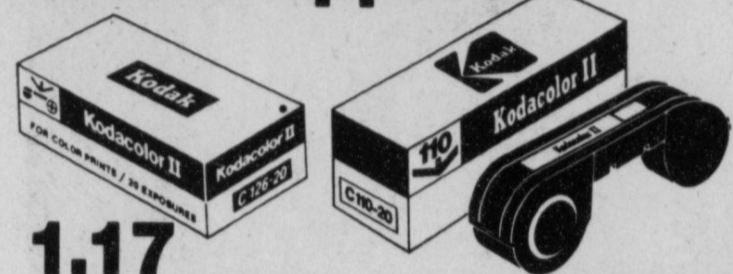

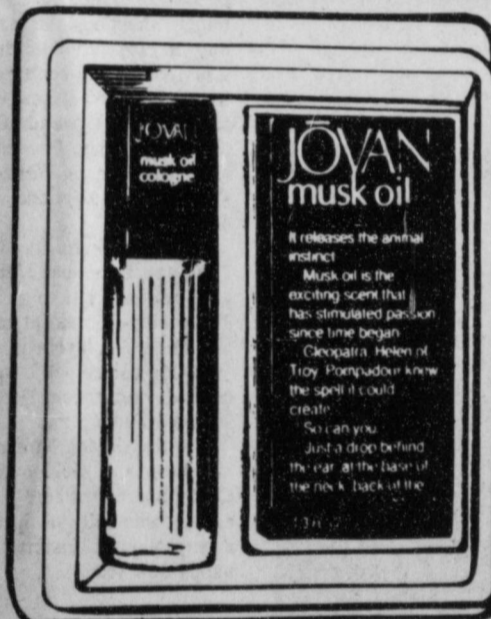

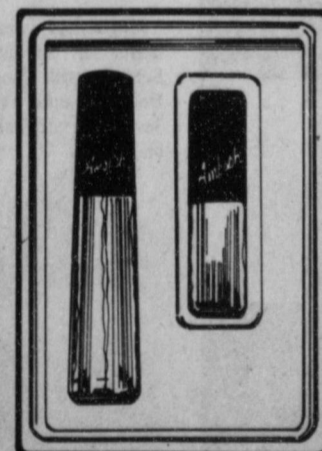

The best piece of fire-fighting equipment you can have in your house is so common and cheap you may have overlooked it - a garden hose. Experts estimate that if a hose was readily available in the early stages of fire, about half of all homes fires could be squelched before the fire engines arrive.

To be effective, one hose should be installed on each floor of the house, under a bathroom sink or in a utility room where it can be unwound quickly to reach all rooms-especially the bedrooms. A hose lying in the yard or piled on a shelf in the garage isn't going to do much good by the time you drag it inside and hook it up. And

spraying a hose from ground to second story doesn't do much more than wash the windows. If you hook up a fire hose yourself it should cost only about \$10 (that's for parts). If you feel more confident with a plumber, it's still not too expensive. The job shouldn't take more than an hour or his time. All that's involved is breaking into your cold water line.

Gardening projects that help 4-H'ers learn to grow vegetables reach some 270,000 youths in the U.S. A recent survey showed that 4-H'ers with gardening projects save an average of more than \$30 for their families each year. That's more than \$8 million nationwide.

In gardening, as in the clothing project, young people learn a variety of other skills, such as management techniques, and acquire attitudes such as cooperation self-esteem and self-confidence which will enrich their lives.

Whether you live in the city or country, 4-H has something for you. For more information contact the County Extension office, says Mrs. Winegarner.

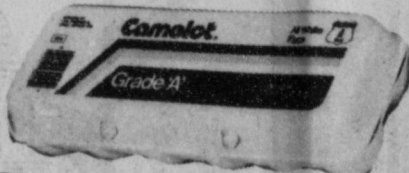

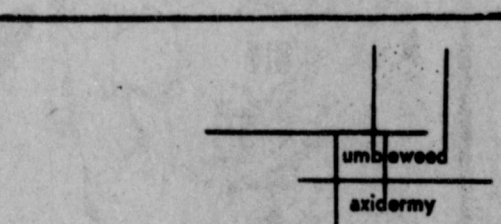

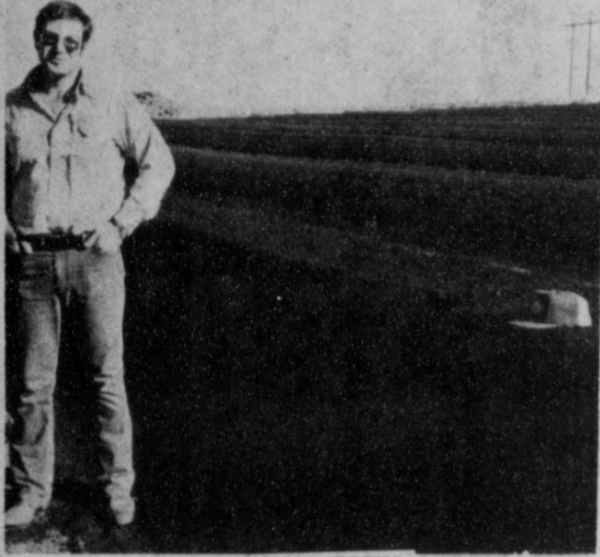

## Holiday Foods & Tradition

COLLEGE STATION -- "Old Country" flavors add a special Christmas magic to New World holiday foods -- especially those with the unique touch of Germany, Austria or Czechoslovakia, says Dr. Rose Tindall, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In fact, holiday foods and traditions throughout the United States owe much to those countries for the rich heritage of celebration they've influenced, she says.

### FROM GERMANY...

German homemakers pride themselves on their baked-goods creations.

Specialties include springerle, lebkuchen, pfeffernusse and Christollen.

Springerle are "picture" cookies.

Carved rolling pins (usually with animal patterns) press over rolled-out dough to make the pictures.

Then they're cut into separate rectangles and baked.

Anise is the traditional licorice-flavored spice for this German treat.

Lebkuchen are gingersnaps -- or gingerbread cookies -- trimmed in white frosting.

Pfeffernusse (pepper nuts) are baked as little balls of dough. They're spicy with cloves and cinnamon and hot with black pepper.

Christollen is a real artist's delight, since it's an oblong, yeast-raised cake filled with raisins, currants, candied fruits, and nuts.

A glaze of fruit sauce or a sprinkling of white sugar tops this festive delicacy.

In addition to sharing its foods, Germany also gave us our legendary Santa Claus -- from their Kris Kringle inspired by Saint Nicholas, who lived in Asia Minor during the 4th century and was known as the bestower of gifts to children on Christmas Eve.

### PFEFFERNUSSE

- Shortening or margarine
- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 t. double-action baking powder
- 1 t. ground cloves
- 1/2 t. ground allspice
- 1/2 t. black pepper

- 1/2 t. ground cinnamon
- 3/4 cup honey
- 1 cup medium or dark corn syrup
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 3 T. butter or margarine
- Preheat oven to 400 degrees F.

Lightly grease a baking sheet with shortening or margarine.

Bring honey, corn syrup and sugar to a boil over moderate heat in a heavy 4-to 6-quart saucepan.

Stir until sugar dissolves. Reduce heat to low; simmer 5 minutes.

Remove from heat and add butter or margarine and mix well.

Combine flour, baking powder, cloves, allspice, pepper and cinnamon in a bowl.

Add flour mixture to syrup

mixture approximately 1 cup at a time and blend until smooth.

Drop by teaspoonfuls onto baking sheet (1" apart). Bake until firm to touch (approximately 15 minutes). Cool on cake rack. Makes approximately 3 dozen.

### FROM CZECHOSLOVAKIA...

From Czechoslovakia are dinner traditions for Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

For the Christmas Eve meal a perfectly fresh carp (fish) is a necessity.

It's such a necessity that the menu includes carp soup in carp sauce, along with another "family favorite" dish containing carp.

Stewed or fresh fruits served with spicy cookies complete the menu.

Dinner on Christmas Day is a festive meal of soup, roast goose, bread dumplings, braised red or green cabbage and hard, spiced cookies.

In addition, a folk custom on Christmas Eve sets the stage for the upcoming New Year, since it involves "Christmas fortune telling."

Each person slices an apple in half horizontally. If the exposed seeds form the outline of a star, good luck will be in store for that person all year.

Good eating is in store for New World families who add a touch of the Old World to their holiday festivities.

He has worked for the USDA's Federal Grain Inspection Service in Stuttgart, Ark. as

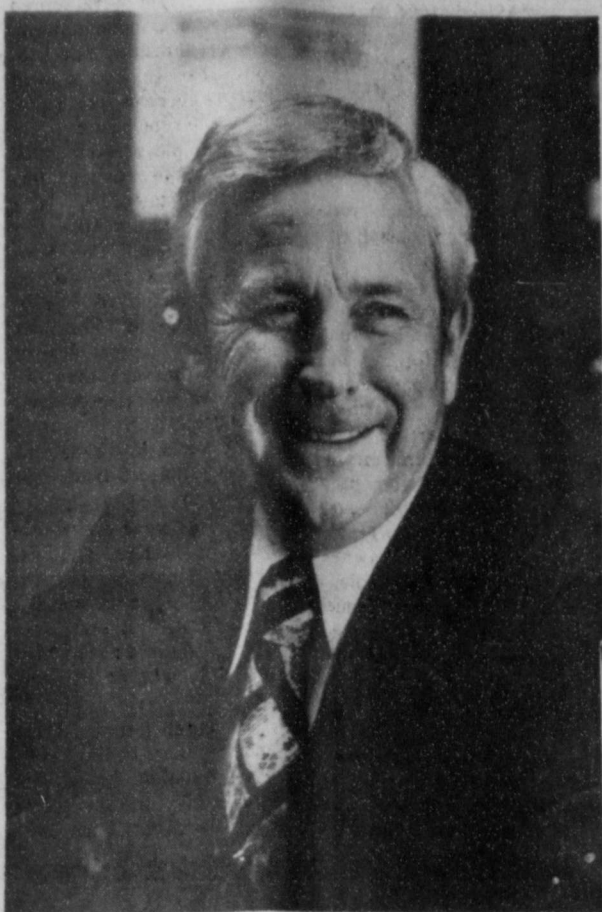
a Grain Inspector and worked for them 1 1/2 years in Washington, D.C. as a Grain Marketing Specialist developing grain standards for inspectors.

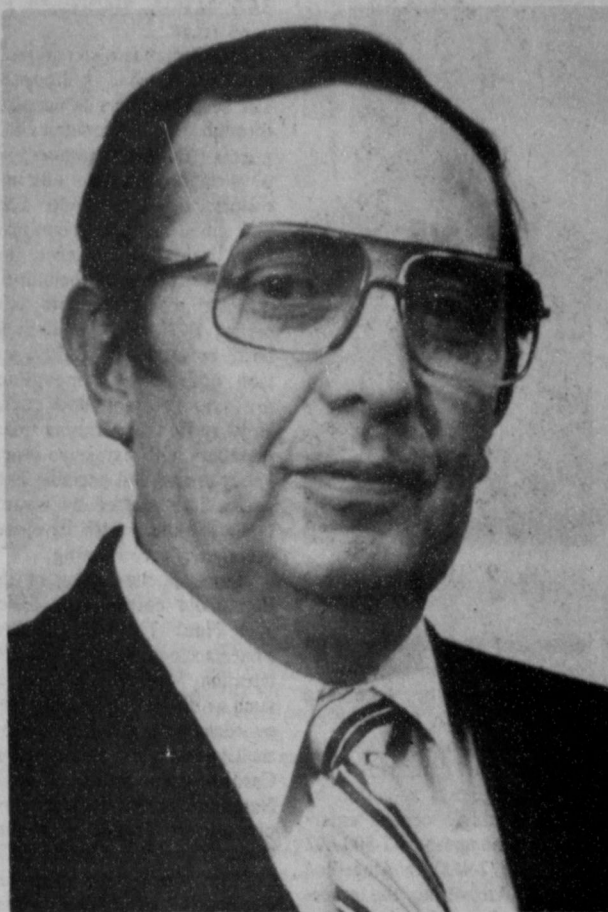
red to Spearman in November.

## Allied Supermarkets Names New Executive Officer

DETROIT, Mich. -- Allied Supermarkets, Inc. (Phila. S.E.), announced today its second consecutive profitable quarter. For the 16-week period ended October 20, 1979 Allied had a net income of \$479,000 or 9 cents per share on sales of \$153,577,000. This compares with a net loss in the comparable period of last year of \$1,282,000 or 25 cents a share on sales on \$195,535,000.

Allied, which has been operating as debtor-in-possession under Chapter XI of the federal bankruptcy laws since November, 1978, stated that it expects to continue to operate profitably throughout the balance of its current fiscal year ending June 28, 1980.

In another development, Earl

W. Smith, Allied's chairman and chief executive officer, announced that he will retire in January, 1980, but will continue as a director and consultant to the Company. Jack Rixmann, the president of the Company, has been named by the Board of Directors to assume the additional duties of chairman and chief executive officer. Rixmann has held several key posts since joining Allied in 1972.

Smith expressed confidence in the management team headed by Rixmann and stated that

he is particularly encouraged by the improving operating trends in all of the Company's divisions.

As previously announced, Allied is attempting to formulate a plan of arrangement to present to its creditors within the next few months and has engaged the services of the New York investment banking firm of E. M. Warburg, Pincus & Co., Inc., to assist it in developing outside financing opportunities.

Allied operates 35 great Scott! Supermarkets in Michi-

gan, 48 supermarkets in Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas under the names of Humpty Supermarkets and Ideal Supermarkets and one K Mart Food Store in South Dakota. Allied also operates the Abner Wolf

Wholesale Company which serves over 100 independent grocery stores in Michigan and Ohio; three Family Drug Stores in Michigan and 28 drug units in Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas.

### "Flat-Out Asking"

State Sen. E. L. Short, D-Tahoka, has "flat-out asked" Clements to rescind priority status for gasoline consumers in Dallas, Tarrant and Harris counties because he fears the South Plains won't have enough fuel for the winter.

Clements wrote back to Short saying he can't agree with the senator's assessment and he will keep the priorities for the urban areas.

### AG Opinions

In two legal opinions issued last week Attorney General Mark White ruled:

—Chief appraisers and other employees of an appraisal district who assess and appraise property for ad valorem tax purposes are required to register with the Board of Tax Assessor Examiners whether or not the district has become fully implemented.

—A Fort Worth I.S.D. policy which permits teachers to work for professional organizations while being paid salaries by the school district constitutes an unconditional grant of public funds to a private organization and is unconstitutional.

### 50-Cent Gas Tax

Clements took a strong stand last week against a proposed 50-cent federal gasoline tax hike aimed at reducing fuel consumption in the U.S.

The governor proposed a state fuels hike of five cents a few weeks ago, but he isn't ready to up the ante that high. He said he was studying ways to voluntarily reduce consumption.

Last week Clements appointed his chief counsel, David Dean, as head of the new Governor's Criminal Justice Division.

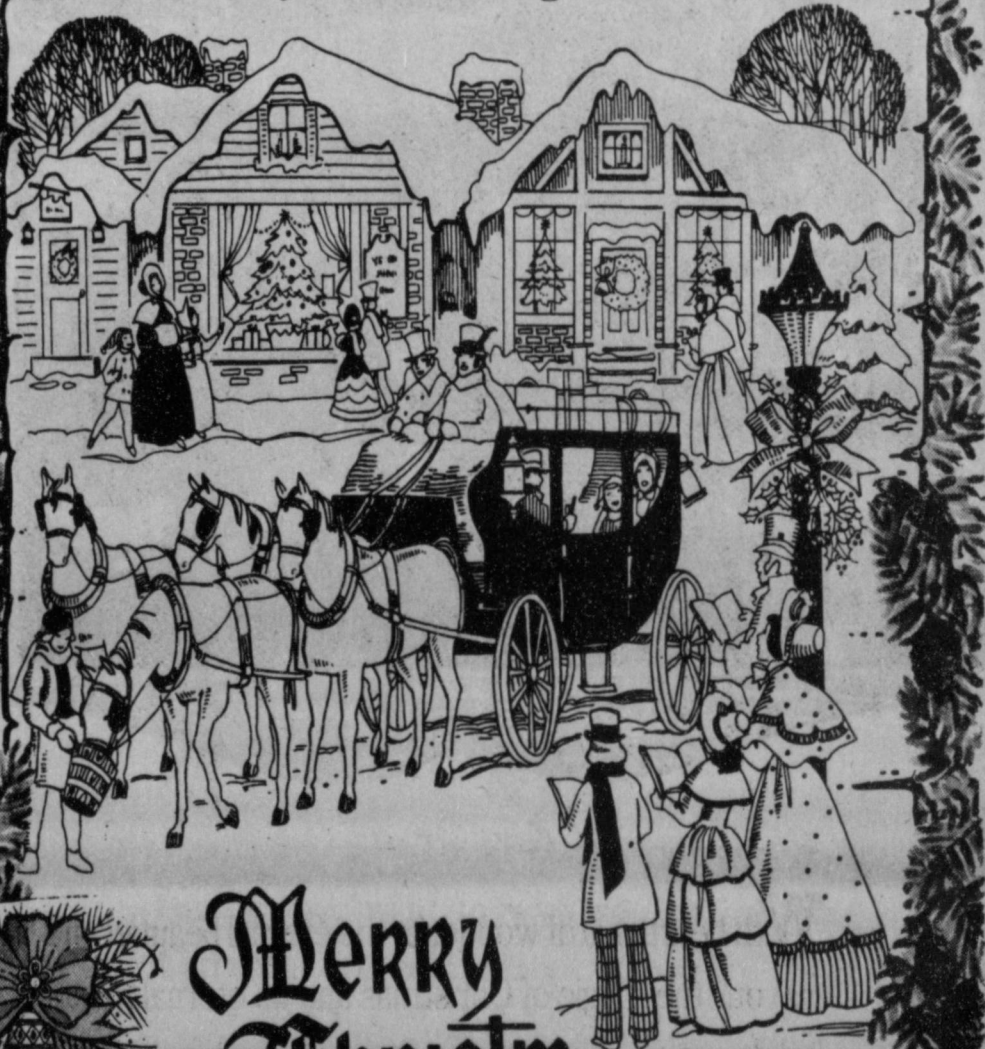

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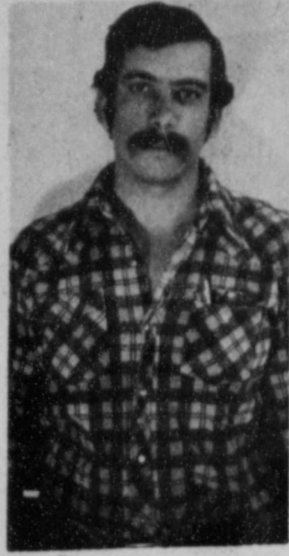




# Spearmanites Accepted For Paramedic Course

Mrs. (Peggy) Carroll of 619 S Bernice and Ed Williamson of 107 Wanda Drive, Spearman, Texas, both serving as Emergency Medical Technicians on the H & S Ambulance Service have been accepted by the Review Board of Panhandle Emergency Medical Services Inc. for the third EMT-IV paramedic course offered at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

The Panhandle Emergency Medical Services Inc. is a plan of total care from the scene of an accident or onset of a critical illness until the patient is able to return to the fullness of life and health. The primary purpose of PEMSS is to coordinate and

implement an emergency medical services system region-wide with emphasis on each and every component of EMS, always recognizing each and every community's needs.

The system is activated by dialing a single central emergency phone number--1-800-692-1331 or 372-4121 in Amarillo/Canyon. Answering the emergency number, the trained communications center operator dispatches the closest available medical personnel and equipment.

The dispatcher may also connect the caller to **POISON CONTROL, SUICIDE PREVENTION, BURN CENTER, NEONATAL ICU, EMERGENCY**

### TRANSPORT BLOOD as the mood exists.

The region is also served by the MED-A-VAC helicopter. The helicopter may be accessed through the communications center (toll-free number) by physicians, hospital administrators, or responsible EMS personnel. The unit is equipped with basic and advanced life-support equipment, including a portable med-radio with telemetry, ECG monitor, defibrillator, burn-pacs, IV fluids, suction equipment, emergency drugs, and portable back packs. It is staffed by trauma team members with extensive emergency care training.

Some of the basics of the Paramedic course are: Shock and Fluid Therapy, General Pharmacology, Oxygen Administration, Medical Emergencies such as diabetic, poisoning and overdose emergencies, Obstetric/Gynecologic emergencies, Cardiovascular System, Central Nervous System anatomy and physiology. Training will include Emergency Room, ICU/CCU, IV Team, Operating and Recovery Room, Labor Suite, Pediatric Unit, Psychiatric Unit, Morgue and Mobile Intensive Care Unit.

Spearman already boasts one Paramedic, Keith Hutton, who finished his course of study in the summer of 1979.

# Elderly Trailblazers Today Follow In Daniel Boone's Famous Footsteps

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- The 33 men who moved through the remote Daniel Boone National Forest in eastern Kentucky, clearing a 254-mile-long hilly trail with axes and bush hooks, were not early frontiersmen or modern construction workers. They were senior citizens--ages 55 to 76.

Like old Daniel Boones, they spent three years on and off in the woods, cutting underbrush, digging out paths in side slopes, removing fallen trees, and putting up trail markers--a white diamond with a turtle on top.

They called the path through the 660,000-acre forest **Sheltowee Trace**. Sheltowee, the Shawnee Indian word for "big turtle," was the name given Daniel Boone when he was adopted into the tribe during the 1760s when he roamed through this part of Kentucky.

**Pioneers Again**--Many who worked on the trail as part of the federal Senior Community Service Employ-

ment Program were retired loggers, coal miners, farmers, and foresters. The U.S. Forest Service, one of eight federal agencies participating in the senior citizen program, employs about 3,300 older persons in national forests in 40 states.

"It's almost like the pioneers again," Bob Stro-snyder, who supervised the recently completed Shelto-wee project, said. "The older people take a great deal of pride in the work they do. They are experienced and dependable."

"Sometimes we had to walk a couple of miles into the woods just to get to work," 71-year-old Willie Dunn, of McKee, Ky., explained. "It was pretty hard. We'd dig down to make a trail and then dig out places to drain off the water so what we did wouldn't wash away."

A retired forester, Dunn and the others had to pass a physical before being sent into the hilly--in some places rugged--forest. There was

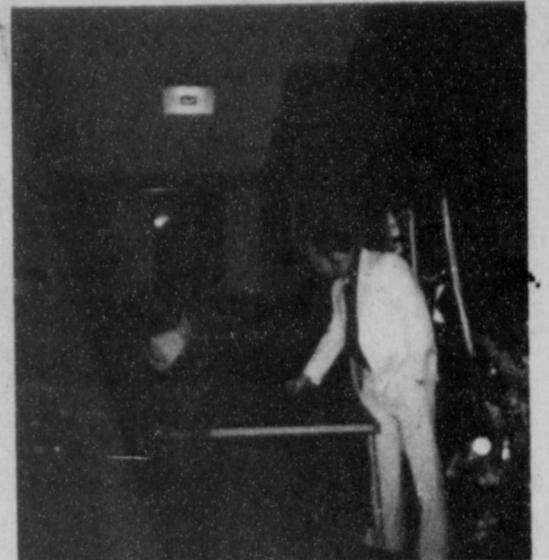
the potential for outdoor accidents--falling branches, tripping in tangled underbrush, and snake bites--but none occurred.

The senior citizens were assisted by members of the Young Adult Conservation Corps (ages 16 to 23 and the Youth Conservation Corps (ages 15 to 18). The older workers had no trouble keeping up, according to Charles Crail of the Forest Service. "In fact we could hardly get them to stop working," he said.

Throughout the country the senior citizens who work in the Forest Service's Senior Conservation Employment Program are generally doing work for which there are no other funds or employees.

The older people, who must be over 55 and economically disadvantaged, each work a maximum of 1,300 hours a year (about 25 hours a week) for at least the minimum wage, averaging about \$2.95 an hour.

One of the major senior citizen projects in the five-year-old program--involving 90 persons, including a couple of husband-wife teams--was the construction of a large picnic pavilion and bike trail in a national forest in North Carolina.

## NEWS REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

Carter Gains Kennedy Slips--The Iran Effect--State Chairmen--

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- President Carter's standing in the polls has improved in recent weeks as the country united by its chief executive in the Iranian crisis.

Polls show the President still trailing Senator Edward Kennedy but the margin has been narrowed. Meanwhile, Kennedy has been losing support as he takes on the issues and makes statements on current problems.

He stumbled in criticizing the Shah, which appealed to some young activists, idealists and students, and no doubt the Shah's regime was oppressive. But so is the present regime in Iran, with its firing squads. Thus, most Americans ask whether it can serve any good purpose, now, to lambast the Shah.

Kennedy's speaking technique also is not equal to that of his late president-brother. He seems to be straining, while Jack Kennedy was more poised.

The Massachusetts Senator has also come in for an awful barrage of effective criticism in the press. So long as he was not asking to be elected President, the press didn't train all its guns on him. But of late, the failures in Kennedy's life are being rehashed, re-investigated and rethought. It is hurting.


In another vital area, within the party, the popularity contest among state party chairmen, President Carter is doing much better and has a comfortable lead over Kennedy.

Some 23 now say they favor Mr. Carter, while less

than half a dozen have openly announced for Kennedy. Some 24 are sitting on the fence, but if Carter gets half of them he will have a big lead among these influential party leaders, who will play a major role at the national convention in New York.


Thus as the year reaches a close, Kennedy has seen his stock fall sharply in the month he has been an active candidate. While many had foreseen and predicted this, his decline has been sharper than expected, perhaps helped by the Iranian crisis, which has strengthened the President and somewhat united the country.

Strangely enough, winter does not have less sunlight than any other season. Fall, which ends December 21, this year, averages the same amount of sunlight, per day, as does winter.

The shortest day of the year, December 22, is the winter solstice and from then until the summer solstice, in June, the days are getting longer. So the days actually begin to get longer as soon as winter begins.

Winter is the coldest of seasons because the earth loses most of its summer heat by January and February, the coldest months. But January and February contain more daylight than November and December.

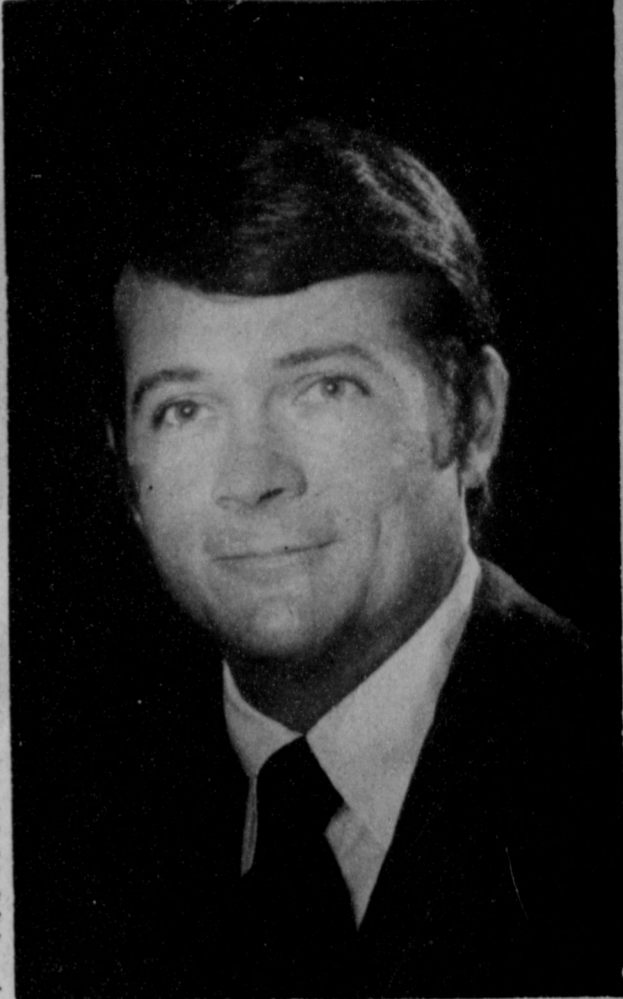
