



tory of Henry C. Hitch, his ranch and his family. In the history of the tristate Panhandle region-the three corners of Oklahoma, Texas and Kansasthe saga of Henry C. Hitch and his ranch is also the story of the social, cultural and economic fortunes of the region.

Late in the ninteenth century young James Kerrick Hitch left his home in Tennessee for the High Plains and a hoped-for fortune. After ten years spent working and learning as a cowboy, he rode into the Coldwater Creek region of No Man's Land, the fertile subirrigated valley that was to be his Promised Land.

It was Henry Charles Hitch, James' son, who was to turn the valley and its adjoining uplands into an empire. Henry and the rest of the Hitches were a hardy, long-lived family who eked out a subsistence, raising cattle, borrowing money, going broke several times, flourishing at other times, lending money to neighbors. Always optimistic about the future of the Panhandle, the Hitches were willing to take risks, willing to borrow large sums of money, willing to experiment and change. Henry's genius and hard work paid off. In time the family owned 30,000 acres of land in

After building their cattle empire, the Hitches moved into farming. By 1930 they had become the largest wheat pro-After World War II they drilled irrigation wells to raise feedstuffs and by the 1950's had one of the first large feedlots in the region. Always innovative and willing to adopt new technology, the Henry C. Hitch Ranch became an agribusiness empire with interest ranging from thousands of acres of irrigated corn to a commodities

brokerage concern. But the book is more than an economic history of how one family-owned ranch made the transition from the open range of the 1880's to the last quarter of the twentieth century. It is also the absorbing story of a pioneer family, led unforgettably by Henry, who ate a breakfast of steak, biscuits, and gravy every morning and went forth to conquer his world. Today the Hitches are represented by Ladd Hitch and by his son, Paul, the fourth generation of a family that made indelible tracks across the Panhandle.

"Panhandle Pioneer" is Volume 7 in the Oklahoma Heritage Association Trackmaker Series of the University of Oklahoma Press. It was published in August.




